Bale Count Near 50,000

The bale count for the Slaton area climbed to the 50,000 mark this week as the harvest reached the "scrapping stage" and considered over 95 percent complete.

Since the last bale count was made two weeks ago by The Slatonite, less than 10,000 bales had been ginned. Last year at this time the total had reached 92,000 bales at 12 area gins, the decrease reflecting the reduction of acres along with an early freeze that left heavy damage to crops.

The final bale count this week showed the following totals: Slaton Co-Op 9,200; Farmers Gin 1976; Campbell Gin 1486; Posey Gin 2,000 (est.); Acuff Co-Op 13,283; Union Co-Op 3660; Mc-Clung 3900; Basinger 1250; Wilson Co-Op and Wayside 7700; Gatzki 1250.

> The South Plains cotton harvest reached the final scrapp-

ing stage in most counties this week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA. Most of the remaining cotton to be harvested is in the Lamesa area.

The seasonal classing office at Brownfield closed Friday and samples remaining to be classed from that area will be classed at Lubbock.

Through Dec. 14 the Lubbock office had classed 846,000 samples of this year's crop, the Brownfield office 163,000 and the Lamesa office 160,000. This brought the season's total for the three offices to 1,169,000. Through Dec. 14 last year the three offices had classed 1, 139,000 samples of the 1965 crop,





If you were not aware that Slaton has a Youth Council Board and has had one since 1964, there is a story in today's Slatonite explaining some of the ways in which it works. In the face of an apparent outbreak of drinking among teenagers, I read about a law passed in Connecticut in June 1965 which might be worth considering in Texas. It called for the suspension of the driver's license of any teenager who is caught driving a car containing alcoholic beverages. Since the law went into effect, roughly 850 teenagers have received such summonses; of these, a little more than 550 have had their licenses suspended.

One encouraging note is that the number of repeats has been minimal. Apparently, the prospect of losing a driver's license for from 30 to 60 days has been a deterrent factor. A similar requirement set by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles and the Slaton Youth Council is that at least one parent accompany a teenager to the council hearing. In Connecticut, unless there is a serious reason for the parent's absence, the hearing officer will not proceed with the case but reassign it for another day.

In Slaton, if a parent is not interested enough to bring his child before the Slaton Youth Council, the Chief of Police sends him to the Lubbock juvenile department.

While serving on this board for over a year, I feel very unqualified, and other members of the board say they feel

the same way. But we try to do our best. I never shall forget the first time I met with the board, a little 9-year-old boy (the same age of one of ours) was arrested for stealing from a local merchant on his way home from school.

We explained to him what a jaillooks like and how miserable it could be, but if he wanted a jail for a home, that just might be what he would get if he ever stole anything else. And as far as we know, he never has. His mother was glad he got caught, because she wanted him to do right.

But after they left, I just had to shed a few tears. For that, I was jokingly called a few nicknames and later called "preacher" because I recommended a family go to the church of their choice.

tmergency rarm Loans in County

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has authorized the Farmers Home Administration to make emergency loans to eligible farmers in Lubbock ounty, U. S. Rep. George Mahon's Washington office announced Tuesday.

Mahon said the loans will be available until next June 30 through the local FHA office. The loans are for "essential farm operating and living expenses only."

Ralph E. Griffitts, Lubbock County FHA supervisor, said the emergency loan status was brought on primarily because of adverse weather conditions, including an early freeze, which reduced income from 1966 crops.

Griffitts said emergency loans in most cases carry a 3 per cent interest rate and are repayable at the end of the crop year. They are restricted to farmers who are unable to obtain credit from other sources. There are no restrictions regarding size of the farming operation that can qualify for the loans,

Most counties in the Lubbock area except Hockley have been designated for emergency FHA loans, Griffitts said. He said Hockley County also has applied for emergency loan status. Emergency loans cannot be



PERRYTON --- The December Panhandle pheasant season found hunters reporting only average hunting success because of dry, blustery weather, according to Roger Hensley, state game warden.

people and children. All cases handled are confidential. The board actually has no authority. It merely makes recommendations to the parents and to the authorities as to the disposition of juveniles.

County juvenile authorities. The idea is catching on in other towns, too. Breedlove said many area officers ask him for information concerning the organization.

Cases that appear before the Youth Council are those selected by the chief of police. They are first offenders and if they never get in trouble again, their record will be left in the Slaton files and never really registered as an offense against the child. But should he get in trouble again, he is turned over to the Lubbock juvenile department. Some repeaters are handled by the local corporation court.

Under the setup, no one prosecutes the case. The council makes a decision on the youth after the discussion. The offender appears before the council and the council also meets with the parents of the youth. In 1964, 31 youths met with ended up as repeaters.

In 1965, the department made 88 juvenile arrests. Of these, 26 were handled by the youth council, and four were reported

as repeaters. During 1965, 20 arrests were made for burglary, 13 for shoplifting, 10 for possession by minor, 10 for breaking the curfew, 9 for runaway, 8 for vandalism and 8 for being drunk, These led

the list for reasons of arrest. In 1966, 16 juveniles were arrested for shoplifiting and 16 for possession by minor. Eleven were arrested for being The Youth Council has drawn drunk, 8 for simple assault, 8 wide acclaim from Lubbock for burglary, 5 for traffic violations, and the remainder for a number of other offenses. During this year, there have been 90 juvenile arrests and 25 were counseled by the youth council. Five were reported as repeaters after appearing

before the council. In a report by the police department, it was noted that during 1965 and 1966 53 curfew violators were issued curfew tickets, and of the 53 there were only seven repeaters. Fe's mechanical division, who affectionately call him 'Pappy", presented Mr. Wendel with an overcoat as a retirement gift.


