Both men received cuts and bruises and were taken to Olton Community Hospital by Parson's ambulance. They were treated and later released. —Olton Enterprise

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

In Kimble County, the Commissioners Court was cooperating in a countywide program to stamp out rabies in wildlife.

Poisoned fresh meat was to be distributed this week to ranchers at nominal cost to use against skunks, foxes, raccons and bobcats.


