Recipe Of The Week

With cooking as one of Mrs. Edgar Moseley's favorite past-times, she enjoyed cooking a birthday dinner for a friend of hers that she hadn't seen in 39 years. Mr. and Mrs. Ebb Wilson of Greenville spent several days visiting with the Moseleys last week, after Mrs. Moseley had traced Mrs. Wilson's address down and invited her and her husband to Slaton for a visit. Mrs. Moseley said she had wondered for several years what ever happened to her friend of 39 years ago, so she got busy and started writing some letters. She wrote a cousin in Hillsboro who knew Mrs. Wilson's brother and found her through him. Last February she finally made contact with her.

The two women were reared in Hillsboro which is in Hill County and were good friends when they were teenagers. Their husbands had never met, but last week found they too enjoyed the visit as they both enjoy a game of dominoes. Mrs. Wilson said they had sure enjoyed all the good food and visiting while here. Preparing delicious dishes is nothing new to Mrs. Moseley. Too, with a "truck garden" in her yard, she has plenty of food on hand at all times.

Out of her garden this year, she has gathered over 200 pounds of tomatoes. She has shelves full of fresh vegetables she has canned including 50

quarts of pickled okra. The Moseleys moved into town after living in the country many years, and she said she just had to have a garden.

Since many women are pickling okra now, Mrs. Moseley let us have her recipe to share with the readers. Also, another favorite of hers and many of her friends is cabbage salad, DILLED OKRA

3 lbs. young okra, uncut
1 T celery leaves or stalk of fresh celery, size of okra
1 bud of cloves garlic to the jar
1 t. dill seed
1 quart water
1 pint vinegar
1/2 c. salt

Pack scrubbed okra into hot, sterilized pint jars with a few celery leaves, 1 clove garlic and 1 teaspoon dill seed to each jar.

Make brine of water, vinegar and salt, heat to boiling. Pour over okra; seal at once. Let stand 3 to 4 weeks. Makes 6 pints.

CABBAGE SALAD
Salad dressing:
1/3 c. flour
1 c. sugar
2/3 c. vinegar
1/4 c. water
2 t. prepared mustard
pinch of salt
1 egg

Cook in double boiler until thick, set, allow to cool. Chop small head cabbage, 1 can pimientos and moisten with salad dressing above.

The policy provides three days per year for sickness, accumulative to 12, effective the beginning of this school year. A beginning teacher, under the clarified policy, would have three days this year. A second year teacher would have six, a third year nine days and a fourth year or above 12 days.

Doctor Vardy said teachers intended that the policy be retroactive, but they actually did not say it in the writing of the policy. The request to make the policy retroactive received unanimous approval.

Doctor Vardy reported that a total of 74 students enrolled in Slaton's summer head start program. He said the program "did a lot of good."

In general discussion, the board talked about general improvements needed to be made in the school plant. They discussed the time element in a need for a new elementary school. Also discussed briefly the need for a new stadium and gym. No action was taken.

Police Activity Shows Decrease

A sharp decrease in the total number of offenses investigated was reflected for the month of August, according to the activity report released by Chief of Police Robert Breedlove.

A total of 25 offenses were handled by the department, a decrease of 11 from last month. Eight of the incidents have been cleared and 17 are pending, the report revealed.

Petty theft led the list of offenses at eight. Three offenses for theft under five dollars and for destruction of private property.

Two cases of attempted burglary were reported and five offenses of burglary were committed during the month.

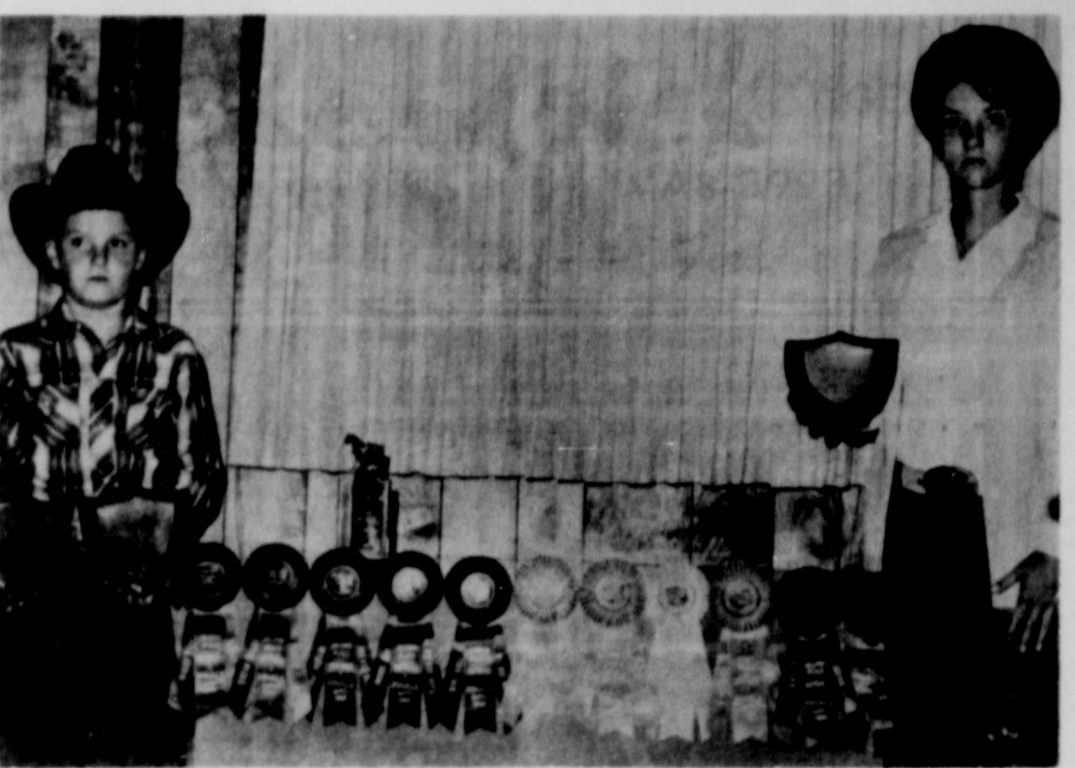

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Tigers Taste First Defeat, Fumbles Aid Idalou Victory

Slaton's offensive attack was more of a liability than an asset here Friday night at Tiger Stadium, and Idalou's visiting Wildcats cashed in on the mistakes to score a 13-0 victory in the non-conference grid contest.

The Tigers fumbled the ball on their first series of downs, and Idalou moved 49 yards for an early score. Early in the second stanza, Slaton's third fumble gave the Wildcats possession on the Tiger 20, and the hustling Idalou team pushed across another score.

Slaton fumbled away two scoring opportunities in the first half, was held for downs another time, and ran out of time at the Idalou 11 as the second period ended.

The Tigers fumbled about eight times and the alert Wildcats pounced on five of them. Idalou also intercepted one Tiger pass and held for downs twice.

The only real scoring threat of the second half was put on

by Idalou, the Wildcats driving to the Tiger 8-yard line after recovering a fumble on the Slaton 44. However, the Tigers held and took over on the 9 after Idalou had posted a first-and-goal on the 8.

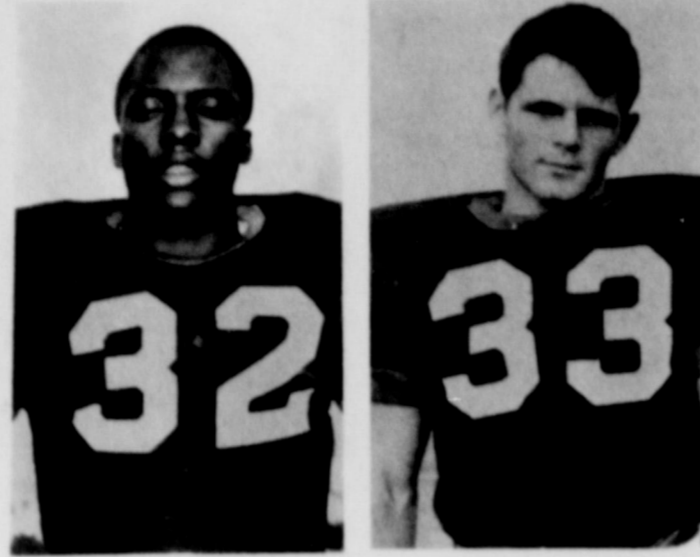
The loss was Slaton's first against one triumph, and the decision also gave Idalou a 1-1 mark.

The Tiger offense came to life in spurts, with Henry Johnson and Gary Brush chalking up good gains, but neither quarterback Steve Harlan or Billy Gass could keep the drives going.

Johnson was the top ground gainer of the night, rushing for 133 yards in 19 trips. Idalou's Ray Cannon led the Wildcats with 96 yards on 20 carries. Brush wound up with 33 yards in eight rushing attempts.

Slaton netted only 133 yards rushing, however, with a minus 49 coming off the 182 total. Both quarterbacks ended up with minus yardage because of fumbles and being trapped for losses while trying to spot pass receivers.

The Tiger defense probably

performed better than the score indicated, what with the offensive team giving up the ball on five fumbles and a pass interception. Linebackers Joe Olague and Larry Pickens, tackles Danny Scott and Billy Martin, and defensive end Henry Johnson led the way in a tackles and assists chart kept on the game.

Doug Williams was credited with many assists, and Roy Green performed well in the first half. Green missed the second half after getting sick. Harlan also performed well as a corner linebacker.

After taking the opening kickoff to their own 42 Slaton posted a first down on the Idalou 46 before Harlan fumbled and Wildcat end Ronald DeBuck

recovered on the Tiger 49. Idalou scored in nine plays with Cannon sparking the attack. He swept left end for gains of 20 and 10 yards in the drive. Halfback Ken Burford bumped over left tackle the final yard, and Idalou took a 6-0 lead with 6:34 left in the opening quarter.

On the second play following the ensuing kickoff, Johnson broke loose over the left side, cut to the sideline and almost went the distance. He was stopped on the Wildcat 13 after a 46-yard run. Two plays netted only a yard, then a handoff went astray and Idalou's Jody Chance claimed it on the 16-yard line.

Two plays later, however, Idalou handed the ball back to Slaton on a fumble at the Wildcat 24. Harlan lost 8 while trying to get off a pass. Johnson got 2 and then was stopped for no gain on a draw play, and Harlan lost 8 again on a fourth-down play.

Idalou couldn't move and punted out as the first period came to an end. Slaton started from its own 30 and chalked up a first down to the 41. Holding penalty moved the Tigers back to the 28, then Gass fumbled a pitchout and Idalou recovered on the Slaton 20.

Cannon dashed around left end for 11 yards, then two plays netted just 4 to the Tiger 5-yard line. Quarterback Ray Ater fired a pass into the corner of the end zone on third down, and Cannon made a diving catch for the score. Ater booted the extra point and it was 13-0 with 7:32 left in the second quarter.

The teams exchanged punts and fumbles late in the period, with Slaton's Scott grabbing a loose Idalou bobble on the Wildcat 24 with just 20 seconds left. The Tigers got off four plays, including a first-down run of 10 yards by Johnson, but time ran out when Harlan overshot Byron Johnson on a pass play that found the Tiger end wide open.

Slaton fumbled again on its third play of the second half, and Idalou cranked up a serious scoring threat. The Tigers stopped the drive on the Slaton 8, however, then moved the ball out to the 32 before having to punt.

In their next drive, the Tigers missed a fourth-down pass attempt on the Idalou 40. The Wildcats chalked up one first down before kicking, then a Gass aerial was intercepted by Idalou on the Tiger 43. The Wildcats ran out the clock after taking the interception.

At ends will be Johnny Lackey and Truett Johnson while tackles will probably be Bobby Ball and George Quintero. Gayland Davis and Glenn Self will get the nod at guards while center will likely be Tommy Davis.

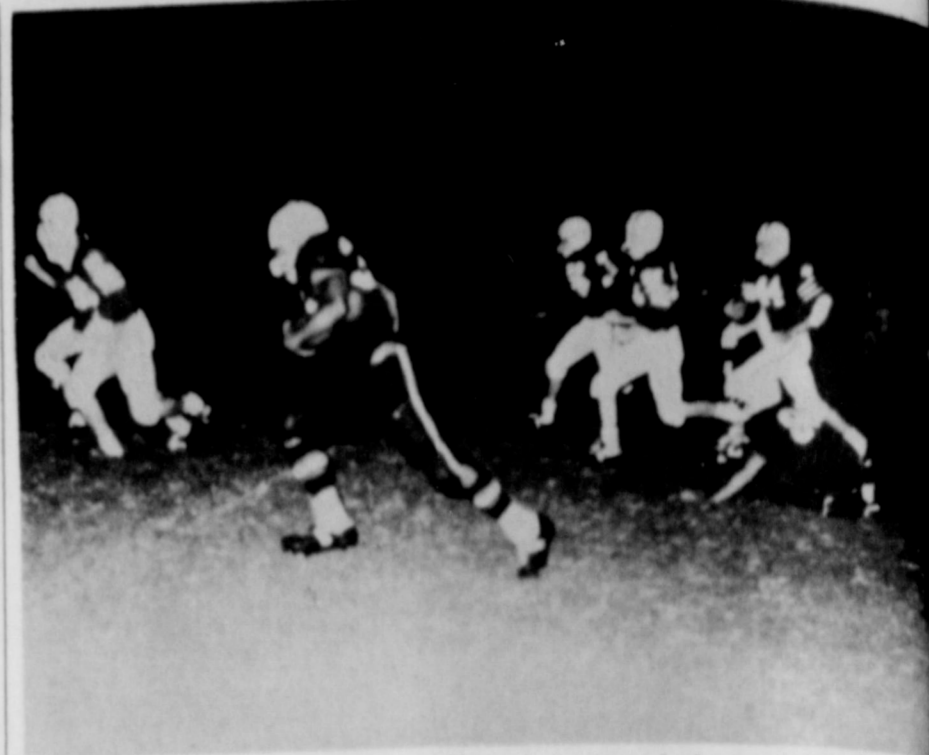

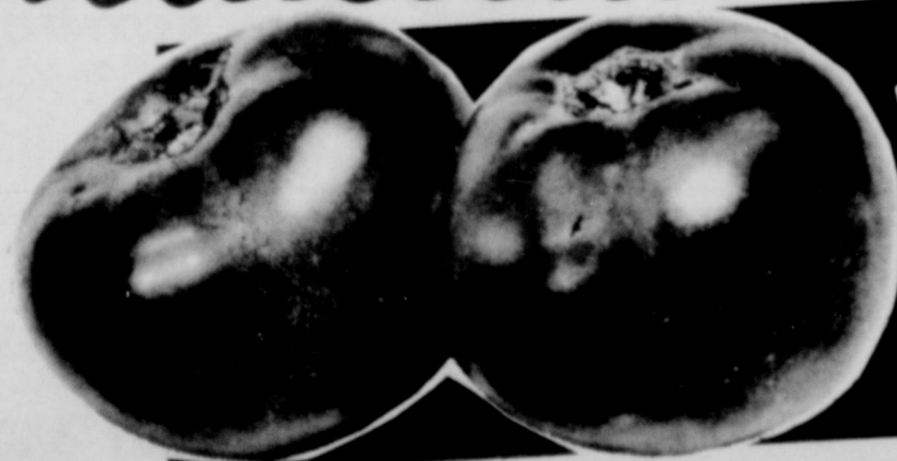
