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
AUSTIN--Number of registered voters in Texas dropp ed nearly a million from last year's record breaking number, according to figures released by Comptroller Ro-

bert S. Calvert. Most of the decrease apparently came in the 50,000 to 150, 000 cities, with the largest metropolitan areas and the rural counties holding fairly steady. Number of issued poll tax receipts and exemptions dropped from 2,892.670 for voting in the 1964 presidential elec tions to 1,970,381 for this offyear.

The five most populous counties --- Harris, Dallas, Bexar. Tarrant and El Paso-actually increased their percentage of the registered vote by three points. They hold 44 percent of this year's poll tax receipts.

However, this is not a specific indicator of their dominance over rural areas, since in cities of less than 10,000 , elderly voters do not have to claim their exemption.

This year only 3,314 signed up for "free" poll tax receipts qualifying them to vote in elections for federal officials, But there are no federal elections slated for ballots this year. A total of 84,297 of these "poll tax-not paid" certificates were issued in 1964, first year they vices will bring the total of the

Artificial Recharge Boon To Irrigation

ver 37,000 playa(buffalo) lakes which collect approximately 1. 4 to 2.5 million feet of runoff water annually. Over 90 percent of all this water could evaporate if left in the lake. During a time when rain is

falling and the lakes are full, this "waste" water can be economically and effectively store ed and put to use at the time when it is needed.

The High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas, has pioneered in what is known as "artificial recharge". This practice is putting the lake water back underground either through gravity flow or by pump-

In the Underground strata found on the Plains, there is very little lateral (side) movement of recharge water. During the hot dry summer when more water is needed, the recharge water will still be in the area of influence of the multiple-purpose well for irrigation.

Valliant states he does not

know of any properly installed and properly maintained multiple-purpose well that has been clogged or rilled. The average rainfall for the


Plains of Texas is 20 inches per year. With this little rain, it will take 10 years to put one of water back underinch ground by natural means. It takes 20 inches to put 1/10 of an inch into the underground formation

The Foundation has developed successful methods of installation and maintenance of multiple-purpose wells and now a program is umderway to develope a better method of clearing water for artificial recharge. The Foundation is test ing grasses that can be planted in the bottom of the lakes to serve as a filter and also for grazing of cattle.

Rainfall is not the only water that can be used in a recharge program. Many farmers are using their tailwater to recharge. This program can also take care of the neighbors who lets his tailwater run across a farmer's field.

Several farmers have planned with the Foundation's help, a tailwater return system to bring all of their own tailwater back to where the multiple-purpose well is located thus not wasting any of the water.

In most cases where a farmer has put in a multiple-purpose well, the lake bottom was modified for drainage. In
