Slaton School Bell Rings Monday

Area Students Begin Studies

More than 4,600 school children will answer the first bell of the 1965-66 school year Monday as summer fades into history.

Classes get underway Monday morning at Slaton, Cooper, Roosevelt, Wilson, Southland and St. Joseph's. A record enrollment in the Slaton trade area is expected.

In Slaton, all students except first graders will attend classes all day Monday, beginning at 9 a.m. For two weeks, beginners will attend school from 9-11:30 a.m.

Students should report to their respective buildings, according to Dr. P.L. Vardy, superintendent.

A total of 166 students are expected to report Monday at St. Joseph's, Sister Mary Angelita, principal said pupils should report at 8 a.m. for mass with classes following the service.

Students at Southland have been instructed to report at 8:45 a.m. Supt. F.W. Callaway said approximately 200 students are anticipated.

Pre-registration will be held tomorrow at Cooper Rural Schools and classes start at 8:45 a.m. Monday. Registration for freshmen and sophomores will start Friday at 10 a.m. while juniors and seniors should report at 1 p.m. Friday, for registration.

Classes at Wilson start at 8:45 a.m. according to Supt. Leroy Scott. A faculty of 18 will greet the expected enrollment of 425.

At Roosevelt, Supt. Marvin Williams said students should report at 8:45 a.m. A faculty of 34 awaits the enrollment which is expected to exceed 1,000 pupils.

LUBBOCK FIRM IS LOW BIDDER

Boswell and Crafton Construction Co. of Lubbock was low bidder on construction of the US 84 overpass at US 84 and FM 400 south of Slaton.

Bids were opened in Austin Aug. 18, according to the Texas Highway Commission. Construction is expected to get underway in 30-45 days.

Estimated cost of the project is \$340,000. The total of the low bid was not announced. It is expected to be revealed when the contract is officially let by the commission.

The overpass is the second in a series of four to be constructed on the bypass. One interchange is complete but dates are still indefinite on two others at FM 41 and Cemetery Road.

Estimated cost of the four grade separations on the bypass around Slaton is \$1,285,000.

Work on the interchange will mark more than a year of work and hope by local citizens that the overpass would be built. Approval of the interchange came in September of last year after a delegation of local citizens appeared before the state commission asking that the overpass be erected.

Several traffic mishaps, including two fatalities, occurred at the FM 400 crossing on US 84. An appeal by citizens to correct the traffic hazard resulted in the installation of a signal light at the intersection.

At that time, the commission had given Slatonites hope that the construction on the interchange would be started early this year.

The final paving of US 84 has been delayed until completion of the overpass. The high type final surface will be laid when the interchange is completed.

AFTER LENGTHY DEBATE BY COMMISSION

Speed Limits Rejected

The Slaton city commission rejected—for the third consecutive time—a recommendation by the state highway department to increase the maximum speed limits on 9th and Division streets.

The action came during a marathon three and one-half hour meeting which boiled to a climax several times during heated discussions.

Commissioners spent an hour and 55 minutes discussing the proposed speed rate changes. Meeting with the commission was Paul Mills, district highway engineer from Lubbock.

Commissioner J.W. (Curly) Martindale moved that the state's recommendation be approved and the motion died for lack of a second.

For 45 minutes, Mills explained the procedure used by the department in establishing speed limits. Commissioners had voiced approval of the method and of the recommended

change from the original proposal when Commissioner Earl Reasoner appeared late for the meeting.

Mills had told the group that changes and limits are based on what the motoring public is actually driving in that area. However, he agreed the 35 mph speed limit should be moved back a block west because of the numerous public facilities on Division street.

Reasoner joined into the discussion and shot heated questions at the highway engineer.

Miles Elected Tiger Club Head

Joe Miles was elected president of the Slaton High School booster organization, the Tiger Club, Tuesday night in an organizational meeting in the high school auditorium.

Miles moves up to the position from the post of vice-president. He replaced retiring president, J.W. (Curly) Martindale.

Gordon Gass was named vice-president for the coming year and Larry Crabtree was selected to the position of secretary. Mrs. Roxie Meeks was re-elected treasurer. Mrs. Nell Brake is retiring secretary.

The group also agreed to purchase walkie-talkies for use by grid coaches during games. The units would permit the coaches to talk from the field to a coach in the press box.

The annual membership drive was also launched and tickets were passed out to those present. Membership for one year is \$1 per family.

Tickets On Sale For 8th Annual Farmer-Merchant Fete Sept. 7

Chamber officials were pushing ticket sales this week for the annual Farmer-Merchant barbecue scheduled Sept. 7.

The 8th annual affair is expected to attract more than 850 area residents. The huge event is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Farmers are guests of merchants and area winners. Other persons attending the barbecue must purchase a ticket from the chamber. Admission is \$6.12. Farmers may obtain tickets from a ginner.

A total of \$300 in cash prizes will be awarded during the annual celebration. Recipients of the cash prizes will be producers of the first three bales of cotton ginned in the Slaton trade area.

First place producer will receive \$150 and \$100 will go to the producer of the second bale. A prize of \$50 will be awarded for the third bale. Door prizes

A \$298,000 damage suit has been filed in Lubbock's 99th District Court as a result of fatal car-train accident July 16 southeast of Slaton.

The suit was filed by Walter Rox, individually and on behalf of Patrick and Natalie Rox and as survivor of the estate of his wife, against Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Co.

The plaintiffs' wife, Irma Jeanne Rox, died of injuries suffered in the accident. Two children, Pat, 14 and Natalie, 6, were also injured in the smash-up.

A suit was also filed in county court-at-law in Lubbock this week. Slaton Consolidated Independent School District filed a tax suit against Keith Price.

Slaton Schools Teacher Clinic Starts Today

A faculty of 99 teachers reports today for Slaton school's pre-school teachers workshop.

The three-day clinic concludes at noon Saturday, according to Supt. P.L. Vardy. The workshop is slated for all system teachers beginning at 9:30 a.m.

A general assembly will be held at that time in the high school auditorium. Doctor Vardy and other administrators will present general school information including policies, operations, insurance programs, salary schedules and professional memberships.

Thursday afternoon, local teachers will report to their respective buildings where individual building procedures will be explained.

Class schedules and room assignments will also be presented to teachers, the superintendent explained. Friday, all teachers will meet the entire day in the junior high school cafeteria where a program on the changes in elementary math will be presented.

Saturday morning will be devoted to a meeting of all new teaching personnel. At this meeting, Doctor Vardy will further explain school operations to the new faculty members.

Again Mills attempted to compromise with Reasoner by offering to move the 35 mph limit a block west. He also offered to recheck the speed limits after school is in session.

Following the offer, Martindale then made his motion to accept the compromise suggestion. Reasoner and Mills continued with considerable discussion before Mayor Jonas Cain called for a second to the motion.

The mayor then declared the motion dead due to the lack of a second.

Commissioner Robert Banks did not orally oppose the recommendation but questioned the practice of setting speed limits "just because people are driving that fast." Commissioner Jack Smith, also late to the meeting, did not join into the discussion.

Cattle Raising Added To Farm



WHAT IS IT? — Just looking you might not think these two little misses are holding a 12 pound cantaloupe. But sure enough, Susie, 7, and Brenda, 9, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Crowson, found it on their farm one mile south of Wilson.

An outstanding farmer in Dawson County believes beef cattle could be a profitable addition to many cotton farms on the South Plains.

Alton Youngblood has been raising registered Hereford cattle as a sideline to his farming operation since 1937. He has increased his herd while most of his neighbors have completely removed their fences because "I didn't believe in a one-crop economy."

Today, Youngblood and his son, Arlan, own and lease about 550 acres of cotton, half of which is irrigated, and 600 acres of dryland grain sorghum. He has about 120 registered cows and 75 registered heifers are soon to be added to the herd.

County Agent Leroy Colgan says Youngblood started out in 1937 "with borrowed money, 20 cows and a section of dryland that was divided by the Caprock."

The cattle operation has been particularly profitable lately thanks to a top bull named AY Real Domino the 8th, Youngblood recently sold a half-interest in a son of the bull for \$5,000 and eight other bull calves from him brought \$1,000 a piece before they were weaned.

County Agent Colgan says that Youngblood is able to handle twice as many cattle because of the extra feed available as residue from his cropping operation.

"The cotton situation has changed in recent years," Colgan said, "and beef cattle production is one of the best ways for South Plains farmers to increase their incomes. They provide a good alternative for marketing labor, crop residue, poor farm land and grain sorghum."

Colgan said because beef cattle make income of otherwise wasted resources on crop farms, the farmer can usually produce beef at lower cost than most ranchers.

Red Cross Lets Services Plea

The Lubbock County chapter and other Red Cross chapters and overseas units have been told to prepare for even heavier responsibility toward men in the armed forces and their families as a result of the Viet Nam conflict.

The announcement was made by Mrs. Bobbie L. Jennings, director of service to military families of the Lubbock unit.

The call for increased service was made in a letter signed by both E. Roland Harriman, national chairman, and General James F. Collins, the organization's president.

Mrs. Jennings said the organization must plan for a growing need for emergency services to the armed forces and their families.

It must increase continuing services to military families, especially if members of the reserves and National Guard, are called to active duty. The unit also needs to plan for the production of needed comfort items.

Accent on Health

Summer offers its own brand of fun - outdoor recreation, cookouts, get-togethers and the like.

But summer enjoyments, like others, have their hazards or pitfalls.

Take sunning for example. It's practically an all-American sport. For those who participate, a beautiful tan is a status symbol well worth basking for. Too much roasting, however, results in a burn.

Everyone reacts differently to the sun. But, no matter how easily you tan, follow the rules for even basking.

First, take it easy. Ten minutes on a side is enough for the first day. Increase the time by about five minutes on each successive day. And, don't be fooled by a cloudy or hazy sky. You can burn on cloudy days, too.

Be choosy about where you sun. If you are near reflections from aluminum, water or sand, the sun's rays are intensified.

Keep your defenses up while you sun. Suntan creams and lotions contain chemical sunscreens which help prevent sunburn by absorbing ultraviolet rays. One coat of lotion is not enough for a day at the beach. Apply it as directed after each swim and whenever it seems to have rubbed off. Since eyes and hair need protection, too, wear dark glasses and don a hat.

And, don't forget that continual exposure ages skin prematurely. Year-round exposure or excessive summer tanning can cause a permanent leathery

look. The correlation between continual exposure and skin cancer indicates additional danger.

The back yard barbecue is another traditional part of summer fun. But barbecuers would do well to restrict all cooking over charcoal to the outdoors. Bringing a grill full of coals into the garage, basement, back porch or kitchen-in case a sudden rain comes up-can be deadly. Charcoal briquets can produce the deadly, odorless carbon monoxide as long as they are giving off heat.

Campers have been asphyxiated by trying to heat cabins, tents and even cars with charcoal briquets. Carbon monoxide is especially treacherous since its presence cannot be detected by the senses.

Have fun your own way this summer, but have it with care.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Kill the Lawyers!"

"The first thing we do," cries a Shakespearean character in *King Henry II*. "let's kill all the lawyers."

That cry has echoed, not always so bloodthirstily, throughout history. One of the first measures of the French Revolution was to abolish the legal profession. The same thing happened in the Russian Revolution. In early American days, many colonies tried to do away with the practice of law. Roscoe Pound, the eminent legal scholar, once said:

"Every Utopia has been designed to dispense with lawyers."

Yet, somehow, abolition doesn't take. In France, only a few years after being "abolished," lawyers were playing a key role in formulating the Code Napoleon—one of the mightiest social documents of all time. Attorney John Hazard, an expert on Soviet affairs, has thus reported that revolution's effect on the legal profession:

"When its ranks had been purged, the empty chairs filled up with new men to perform the centuries-old functions of the bar."

Why this persistence? Why is there a legal profession today in every civilized country on earth?

Consider the experience of the colonial Quakers. For 70 years after they settled in Pennsylvania, there were almost no lawyers at all

in the community. William Penn's laws were supposed to be so simple that any layman could understand them. Points in dispute would be cleared up with the help of friendly neighbors.

But if the laws were simple, life was not. Complexities arose, too numerous to be foreseen by the wisest of men. Disagreements arose, too stubborn to yield to the arbitration of amateurs. And when those disagreements touched vital issues in the affairs of mankind, the special talents of the lawyer came into demand. The man whose freedom, money, good name, or life was at stake wanted an expert to speak for him.

But besides settling—or forestalling—disputes, lawyers serve a loftier purpose. They symbolize, however imperfectly, the Rule of Law in society. That quotation from Shakespeare, often used to taunt lawyers, is actually a subtle compliment. For the character who was so eager to kill lawyers was no well-meaning champion of the common man. He was a power hungry demagogue, scheming to set himself up as the absolute ruler of England. Thus Shakespeare was depicting the legal profession not as a burden on society but as the first barrier on the road to dictatorship.
