BALE COUNT TOPS 59,000 IN SLATON AREA

Cotton Harvest Nears Peak

The Slaton area cotton harvest probably hit its peak this week, accompanied by ideal weather which caused production estimates to take another hike.

The bale count for 13 gins in Slaton and the trade area was tabbed at 59,052 bales Wednesday morning—more than 15,000 bales than last week's count. This total is actual bales ginned and does not include cotton weighed in at the yards.

With a backlog of cotton on most gin yards, observers predicted a peak late this week. The December estimate of the Plains Cotton Growers and Lubbock Cotton Exchange was tabbed at 2,273,000 bales in the 23-county area. This was up 55,000 bales from the November 1 estimate, and leaves the estimated output just 71,803 bales shy of the record crop in 1961.

Gross value of the crop at the farm level now is estimated at \$340 million, including \$295 million for the lint and \$45 million for the seed.

The bale count around the area Wednesday morning: Slaton Co-Op 11,300; Farmers Gin 1,755; Posey Gin 2,350; Union Co-Op 4,875; Acuff Co-Op 13,949; McClung 4,800; Campbell 1,367; Basinger 997; Hackberry 3,940; Wilson Co-Op 5,500; Wayside 4,400; Gatzki 1,500; Planter 2,019.

Cotton stripping operations increased this week and the Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa Classing Offices of the USDA received the largest number of samples received any week this season, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Office.

The three USDA Classing Offices classed 225,600 samples during the week ending Friday, Dec. 3.

Through Dec. 3 the Lubbock Office had classed a total of 520,500 samples, the Brownfield Office 42,400 and the Lamesa Office 57,600. This brought the total classed this season at the three offices to 620,500. Through December 3rd last year the three offices had classed a total of 591,100 samples of the 1964 crop.

Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Office were about the same as during the previous week. Seventy-one percent of the cotton was classed in the White Grades and 29 per cent in the Light Spotted (See COTTON, Page 10)

Board Cites Need Of New Buildings

Slaton School District needs a cafeteria at West Ward School, a gym and band hall at high school, a new elementary school in the southwest part of town, and a new football stadium.

These needed school improvements were listed by the school board in a regular meeting Tuesday night. Supt. Lee Vardy said the board had been studying facilities and school enrollment for some time.

Following is a statement of facts prepared by Dr. Vardy and approved by the board:

"The Slaton school, in cooperation with the Board of Education, is making a thorough study of the fiscal needs of the Slaton Independent School District. The last school building program was initiated in 1958. This program provided sufficient space for the enrollment of the Slaton schools at that particular time and also allowed for a slight increase in enrollment.

"The enrollment in 1958-59 at the end of the first week of school was 1,738 students. This enrollment through the year increased to about 1,850 students. The present enrollment at the end of the first

Adult Education Class Approved

Trustees of the Slaton Independent School District Tuesday night approved an adult education program, authorizing Supt. Lee Vardy to make application with the state for such a program.

The program will not involve a cash outlay for the local district, the funds coming from federal and state sources and administered by a state agency.

The adult education program is designed to teach reading, writing and citizenship to people who have less than an 8th grade education.

In other business, the school board granted an easement for an alley south of high school, approved the audit report, briefly discussed an improvements program on buildings, and approved bills.

If the adult education program gains state approval, it would probably begin shortly after the first of the year. At least 10 persons must be enrolled, and no more than 20 can be in one class. Dr. Vardy said he anticipated "at least two, possible three classes."

Teachers are not required to have teaching certificates, and it was pointed out that teachers in the local system would probably not be used. Classes would be held two or three nights a week with a total

of 120 hours instruction required.

Carroll Smith, attorney, appeared at the board meeting to request the alley easement between high school property and the new Plaza drive addition on Division street. The school granted a 10-foot easement, with Woody Rhodes, owner of the apartment project, also giving 10 feet. The alley is 166 feet in length.

The audit report, prepared by Hallmark, Hearn & Co. of Lubbock, was outlined by Dr. Vardy. The examination revealed that financial affairs ap-

The Slaton Tigers came out of a first quarter hibernation, found out here was a basketball game to be played, then waxed Lubbock Christian College High School, 69-50, on the home court Tuesday night.

Four Tigers hit in the double figures, overcoming a 12-7 deficit in the first stanza to give Coach Tommy Lacey's

quintet its sixth victory in seven starts.

The cage crew, along with Coach Gay Ivey's girls varsity and B-team travel to Tahoka tomorrow night. Slaton moves back on the home hardwoods Tuesday night as the varsity B-team and girls varsity play Crosbyton. Crosbyton handed Slaton its only loss of the season and it was last weekend in the Tahoka tournament.

Jack Mason was the big gun for the Tigers as he popped the nets for 16 points. His rebounding, along with that of Orin Smith and John Henry Johnson, was a deciding factor in the victory.

Johnson did his share of offensive work too as he sank 15 points while Smith and Doyle Etheridge, a transfer from the B-team this week, bucketed 11 points.

Victor Cristan, the playmaker for the Cats, was good for nine points while freshman Richard Washington dropped in seven.

Larry Paden scored 16 points for LCC, nine of them coming in the third period when the visitors attempted to frustrate the locals with a full court press.

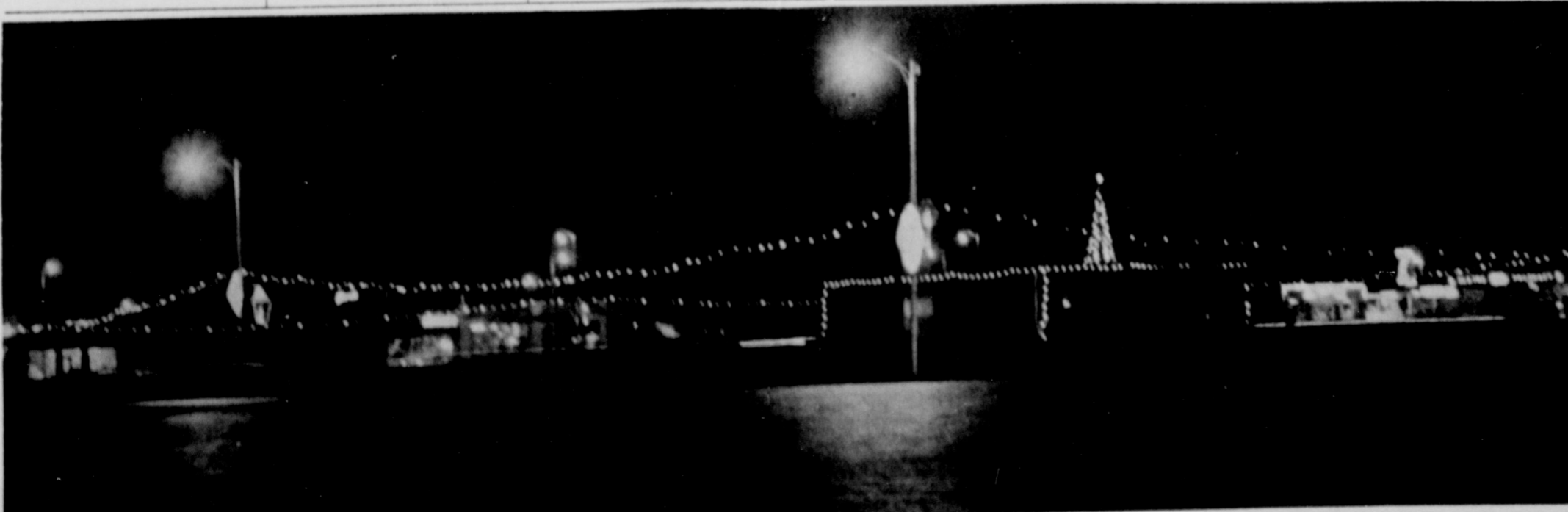

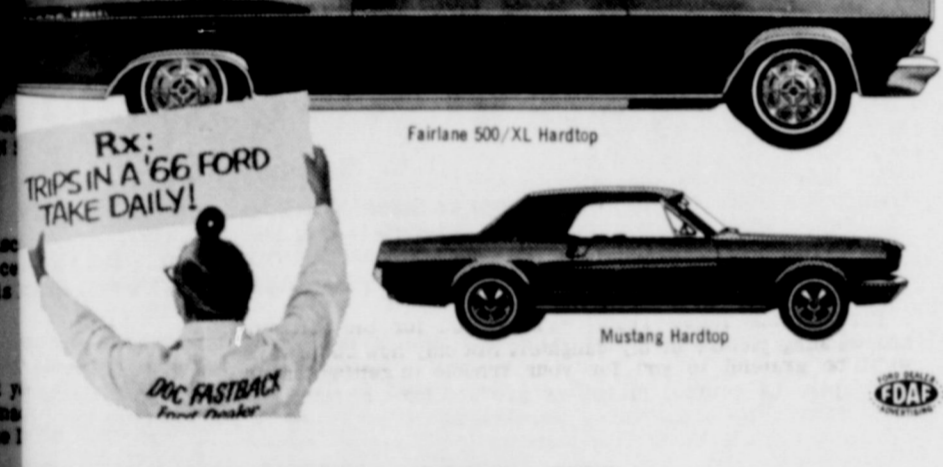

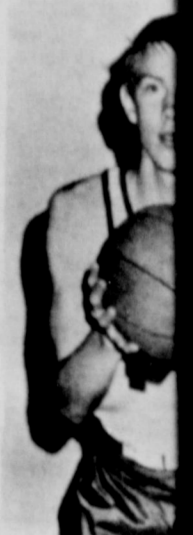

Data-Phone Is Topic At Rotary Club Meeting

One of the latest uses is installation of data phones for credit checks. Customers can be issued punched cards which, when inserted in a data-phone, would be "approved" or "rejected" by the electronic processor.

Hunters Urged To Shoot Game, Not Markers

AUSTIN--Highway signs are erected for the safety and convenience of the motoring public -- not to provide gun-toting punks with a handy target for plinking.

Yet, a major share of the \$450 thousand vandalism to Texas highway signs annually is caused by gunfire, according to D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer.

Bullet-riddled roadside markers accounted for 85 per cent of all signs which had to be replaced in one Texas Highway Department District in West Texas in one year.

Even a small highway sign costs about \$10 to replace. Larger, more elaborate signs costing hundreds of dollars have been targets for wanton vandalism too, Greer said.

If apprehended, vandals can be made to pay for the destruction they cause. But the person who operates a motor vehicle in Texas foots the greater portion of the bill for replacement through his motor fuel taxes and licensing fees, Greer said.

More important, destruction of signs causes inconvenience -- and many times deadly peril -- to motorists using the highways.

"So be a good sport during this hunting season," Greer said. "Point your gun only at game, not our highway signs."

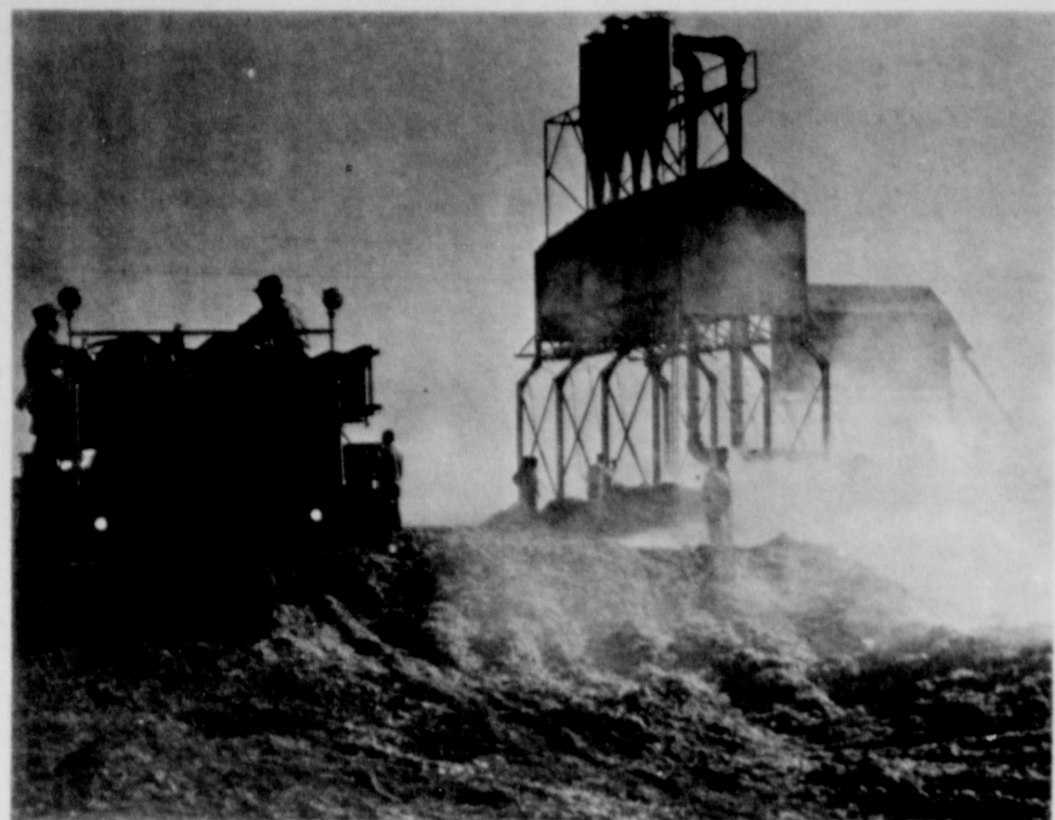



Grades. Middling made up 18 per cent of the total classed at Lubbock last week, Strict Low Middling 48 per cent, Middling Light Spotted 20 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 8 per cent.

Staple length remained about the same last week and continued to average approximately 15/16 of an inch. Eighty-two per cent of all cotton classed at Lubbock last week was 15/16 of an inch and shorter and 65 per cent was 15/16.

Micronaire continued to decline. Thirty-three per cent of all cotton "miked" in the Lubbock Office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 44 per cent was in this category. Fifteen per cent "mike" 3.3 and 3.4, 31 per cent was 3.0 through 3.2, 17 per cent 2.7 through 2.9 and 4 per cent was in the 2.6 and below, or Wasty, category.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported steady trading in the new crop cotton at slightly lower prices. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Middling 15/16-27.65, Middling 31/32 - 28.25, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 26.45, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 25.95, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 26.50 and Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 27.00.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$55 per ton.

industry in the area and a further possibility that a large government installation may be established near the city of Slaton.

"The board feels that these buildings are needed at this particular time or will be needed in the very near future:

1. A cafetorium at West Ward school.
2. A gymnasium and band hall at the high school. (There is no playing gymnasium in the high school, and the band has outgrown the present facility.) The present high school enrollment is 472, the largest in the history of the school.
3. A new elementary school to be established in the southwest part of town with approximately 10 classrooms and a cafetorium, and
4. A new football stadium to seat at least 1,200 or more people.

"In the event the area is further industrialized, it is very probable that more classrooms will have to be built in addition to those listed above.

"The latest information indicates that Slaton will continue to grow as fast as it has in the past and could possibly increase at a more rapid pace. In order that the Slaton community might be in a more convenient position to attract industry, it is essential that the Slaton school be in position to provide facilities for an increased enrollment.

"It is a well-known fact that industry brings wealth to a community. This community must decide whether it shall provide adequate facilities for its school children.


