# Harvest Gains Momentum

Rain and hail storms swept over the South Plains Sunday, causing brief interruption to the cotton harvest just as activity began to gain momentum. Rains in the Slaton area measured less than an inch generally, and little damage was reported by high winds and hail. Approximately .6 of an inch of moisture was recorded.

It was enough moisture to impede the harvest until Tuesday afternoon. A bright and

warm sun popped out Monday and Tuesday, bringing more cotton out, and the harvest was expected to get underway again by Tuesday afternoon.

The thunderstorms accompanied a cool front into the area and temperatures dipped sharply. Several area cities reported tornadoes. The entire South Plains was placed under a severe weather alert.

As the harvest continues, the grade and average staple of the

cotton classed improved this week, according to the Lubbock office of the department of Agriculture.

The Lubbock and Lamesa classing offices of the USDA classed 9,400 samples during the week. This brought the total to 16,000.

This year's harvest continued to lag behind the harvest of last year because of less hand-picked cotton. Last year at this time, 27,700 samples had been classed.

Four-fifths of the cotton classed at the Lubbock office was in the white grades and the remaining fifth was in the light spotted and spotted grades.

In the white grades, middling was the predominant grade with 53 percent. Strict low middling was next at 12 percent. Strict middling made up 11 percent of the classed cotton. The predominant grade in the light spotted category was middling light spotted with 15 percent.

Average staple length improved greatly during the week and averaged slightly better than one inch. Two-thirds of all cotton classes was an inch or longer.

Micronaire readings continued to be good but they were not as high as previous weeks. Ninety percent "miked" 3.5 or better compared to 96 percent the previous week.

Prices paid farmers for cotton seed ranged from \$45 to \$50 per ton.

## Police Chief Cites Youth Council

# Slaton Takes Positive Approach On Juvenile Delinquency Problem

Many people talk about juvenile delinquency, but seldom do they do anything about it--they just resign themselves to a fast-drawn conclusion that today's youth are a bad lot.

True enough, there is enough publicity about the foul play of teenagers and too often the outstanding accomplishments of youth go without notice. Yet, to be realistic, juvenile crime does exist--even in Slaton.

However, the citizens of Slaton in general and the police department in particular, have taken a positive approach in combating youth crime.

The pilot program comes in the form of the Slaton Youth Council--a group of five dedicated Slaton citizens who volunteer their time with the idea of guiding--not punishing.

The youth council is not composed of professionals--at least not psychologists and sociologists. They are housewives, businessmen and executives.

Organized in early 1964, the council is composed of Mary Grace Privett, a housewife; Pete Williams, a car salesman; Bob Kern, insurance agent; Carroll McDonald, utility company district manager; and LaVon Nieman, housewife and woman's editor.

The idea of the Youth Council came from Chief of Police Robert Breedlove who had spent many hours pondering over a way to combat youth crime and help youngsters find the right path.

Approval of the organization came from the city commission. And in Slaton, Breedlove explains he has no trouble in getting people who are willing to serve.

The chief says the only qualifications are that the members be interested in the community, people and children.

All cases handled are confidential. The board actually has no authority. It merely makes recommendations to the parents and to the authorities.

as to the disposition of a juvenile.

Slaton is the only community with a volunteer council. Many larger cities use high-salaried professionals and Breedlove feels the local people are doing a better job.

The Youth Council has drawn wide acclaim from Lubbock County juvenile authorities. The idea is catching on in other towns too. Breedlove said many area officers ask him for information concerning the organization.

Cases that appear before the Youth Council are those selected by the chief of police. Most of them are first offenders or those who he feels can be helped by their appearing before the group.

Others are turned over to the

Lubbock juvenile department. Some of the cases are handled locally, in the corporation court. These are normally repeaters.

The offender appears before the council with his parents. A written report of the case is presented to the council. Members are free to ask questions of the youth and his parents.

Under the setup, no one prosecutes the case. The chief explains that the council makes a decision on the youth after the discussion. Breedlove said the embarrassment created by the child and his parent having to appear before fellow citizens is often the best punishment. "They won't be back," the chief said.

Does Slaton have a juvenile delinquency problem? The chief thinks so. "If you have one case, you have a problem. I take a youth crime more seriously than an adult case because there is still some hope for a child."

In 1964, the department handled 146 juveniles. Seventy-two were handled by the city, 29 went to Lubbock, 11 to other agencies, 34 to adult courts and 31 were handled by the youth council.

Of the 31 heard by the council, only four ended up as repeaters. Compared to the 146 cases last year, a considerable drop has been experienced through the first nine months of 1965.

This year the department has handled only 47 cases and Breedlove likes to think the youth council has been a big factor in the substantial decrease.

In 1964, 44 of the youths were

## Tigers Hope To Rebound Against Frenship Friday

Mustangs Still Wear AA Saddle, Stanton Added

The road to the District 4-AA grid crown still leads through Denver City.

Football fans around the district were happy over the prospects of Denver City graduating to Class AAA next season, but it didn't happen.

The University Interscholastic League announced this week that enrollments governing the classifications have been boosted. The only change slated for District 4-AA is the addition of Stanton, moving up from 5-A.

The only other re-alignment affecting area schools will be moving New Deal from 2-B to 4-A, and this makes for a crowded loop. District 4-A now includes Crosbyton, Halls, Idalou, Petersburg, Lorenzo, Roosevelt and Spur.

AAA classification was boosted to 450, instead of the average 400 enrollment required previously. Class AA figures were 200 to 400, now it will be 225 to 450.

In another area change, Littlefield was moved from 3-AAA back to 1-AAA, and the school has appealed to stay in District 3.

Unless enrollment figures change again, both Slaton and Denver City may go up two years from now when districts are re-aligned again.

Hoping to hit the comeback trail after a pair of resounding defeats, the Slaton Tigers travel to Wolfforth Friday night for a District 4-AA encounter with the Frenship Tigers.

Still aiming for a winning season after three wins and four losses, the Tigers also hope to even their district record at 1-1 when they tangle with another squad of Tigers at 7:30 tomorrow night.

Coach Neal Chastain, hinting of new faces in the lineup this week, reported Wednesday that the crippled Tigers would be in "better physical condition than last week."

A trio of gridders -- Roy Green, Doug Williams and Joe Clague--were casualties in the Denver City game, but all were back at full speed Tuesday afternoon.

Two regular backs who sat out last week's game may be back in action this week. Billy Gass, who was sidelined with a broken bone in his right hand, got an okay for action with a well-padded hand.

Quarterback Larry Pickens was still hobbling with an ankle

injury from the Lockney tilt, but may be able to go by Friday. Halfback Steve Harlan and Allen Miles are also working at the man-under post.

Chastain said Friday night's starters would depend on the outcome of Wednesday afternoon's workout. In Tuesday's drills, two players up from the B-team won praise from the Tiger mentor.

Charles Fisher was ripping off good gains from a half-back position, and soph Wayne Ritter was a defensive standout. With several other players already called up from the junior varsity, this week's B-game was cancelled.

Slaton's offensive hopes apparently will hinge on the running efforts of Henry Johnson, Gass, Harlan, and perhaps Fisher. Johnson has been the big gainer for the Tigers, cranking for 677 yards on 112 trips in seven games--a 6-yard per carry average.

Gass is a distant second with 278 yards in 58 rushing attempts. The Tiger passing game has never clicked, with four quarterbacks hitting only 15 of 51 passes through the seven games.

Frenship, with a 1-9 record last season, has an improved team this year with a 2-3-1 record before taking an open date last week. Frenship holds victories over O'Donnell (39-8) and Sudan (8-6), and tied a tough Tahoka team by 6-6. Slaton edged Tahoka by 8-0 but scored a one-sided 52-0 triumph over O'Donnell. Frenship has lost to Abernathy, Seagraves and Farwell.

# Absentee Vote Now Underway

Week remains to vote on the Nov. 2 special election which will determine the 10 Texas Constitutional amendments proposed by the legislature.

The voting began last Thursday, and will continue through Saturday, Oct. 23, at county clerk's offices.

Answers will answer yes or no to 10 questions which change the state constitution. The amendments are a group of 27 amendments to be passed during 1965 and 1966. Proposals represent the number passed by any amendment since the Constitution adopted in 1876. One was voted down by the Sept. 7. This amendment have increased the

size of the state senate from 31 to 39.

Issues to be decided in the Nov. 2 election are:

1. Increasing state ad valorem by five cents on \$100 valuation for building construction for state colleges and universities;
2. Authorizing an increase of \$200 million in bonds for loans to veterans to buy land and extending program for eight years;
3. Granting authority to the legislature to enact legislation to continue cooperation with the federal government in providing assistance and medical care to certain aged, needy and handicapped person, expanding age categories of those eligible for blind assistance and of needy children, and extending eligibility of program for both citizens and non-citizens who have resided in the U. S. 25 years;
4. Authorizing four - year terms of office for Governor, Attorney General, and other state officials elected in a state.

## ABE KESSEL DIES TUESDAY, RITES TODAY IN DALLAS

Abe Kessel, about 76, former Slaton resident and prominent businessman, died Tuesday morning in a Dallas hospital and funeral services are set for 2 p.m. today in the Welland-Merritt Live Oak Chapel of Dallas.

Mr. Kessel was recovering from major surgery, according to the widow, with death attributed to a blood clot.

Mr. Kessel came to Slaton in the early 1920's and was in business on the north side of the square before building a department store on Texas Avenue. He also owned a store in Lubbock at the time.

He moved to Dallas about 1949 but still owned substantial business and residential property here. Mr. Kessel was a frequent visitor here since moving to Dallas.

Mr. Kessel was born in Israel. Rabbi Norman Shapiro and Cantor Sol Sanders will officiate at last rites today in Dallas. Interment will be at Shearith Israel. Pallbearers are Willie Waldman, Arthur Goldberg, Stanley Kaufman, Sol Rothchild, Irving Shapiro, Sid Smiley and Glenn Batchler.

Survivors include the wife; three sons, Julian, Milton and Bertram, all of Dallas; and two sisters of Israel, and nine grandchildren.

Spuds, 10 lbs. for 15¢ ... Coffee, 20¢ lb. ... Bananas, 1¢ each. ... Pure lard, 8 lbs. for 79¢ ... Sliced bacon, 1 lb. 21¢. ... Pork Chops, 18¢ lb. ... Nelly Don dresses, ... \$3.85. ... Silk dresses, \$1. ... Men's work shirts, 39¢. ... No, these aren't prices in today's Slatonite, but we found them in ads in a Jan. 7, 1938 Lubbock Morning News that was found this week.

"My how times have change!" said Ray Dickie as he brought this worn issue by our office this week. The newspaper was found in a wall of the L. A. Hancock home at 1150 S. 10th when carpenters tore the wall out to build on a room. It had been used for insulation in the wall.

In an ad for Arlene's Beauty School, a plain shampoo was listed for 15¢, finger wave for 15¢, and curls for 25¢. The school offered free finger waves by senior students needing practice, and no extra charge for drying.

One article in the paper stated that Lubbock's population had grown from 4,000 in 1920 to 30,000 in 1937, Texas Tech then had a total enrollment of 3,154 students compared to approximately 16,300 today. Bank deposits in Lubbock were at an all time high in 1938 totaling \$10,000,000. A bank call this week showed deposits totaling more than \$280 million.

"Those were the good old days", I have heard my grandparents say, but were they? No doubt about it the prices were great!

We received a letter to the editor this week on the scouting program in Slaton. It seems if it weren't for Mrs. Bob Kern, that the Girl Scout program in Slaton would not be as active as it is. 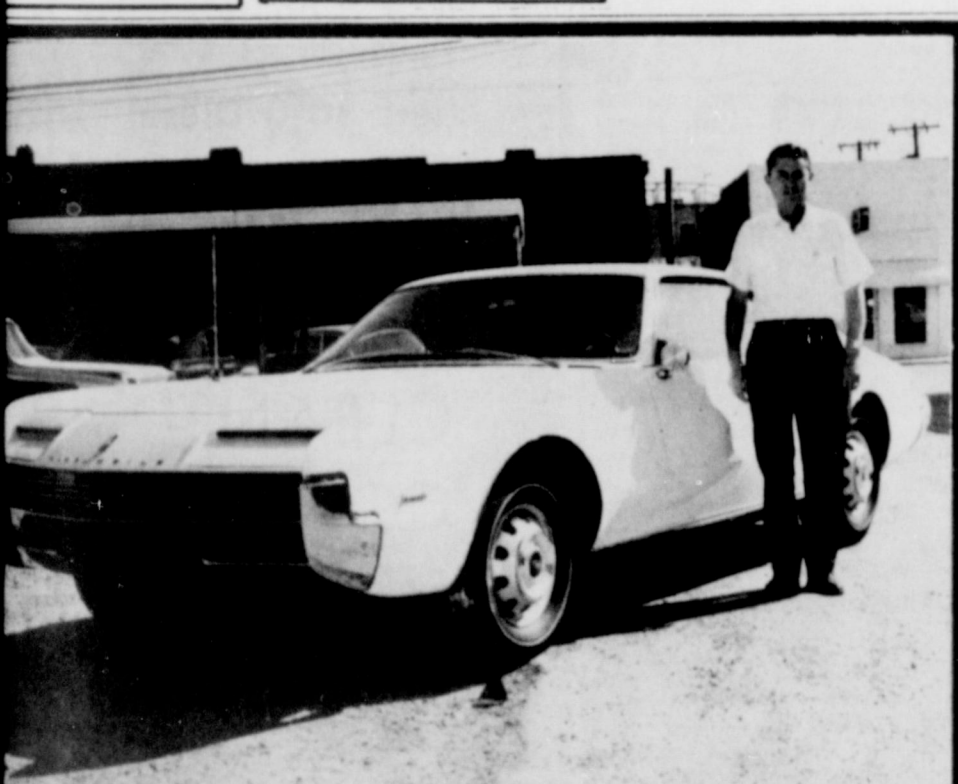

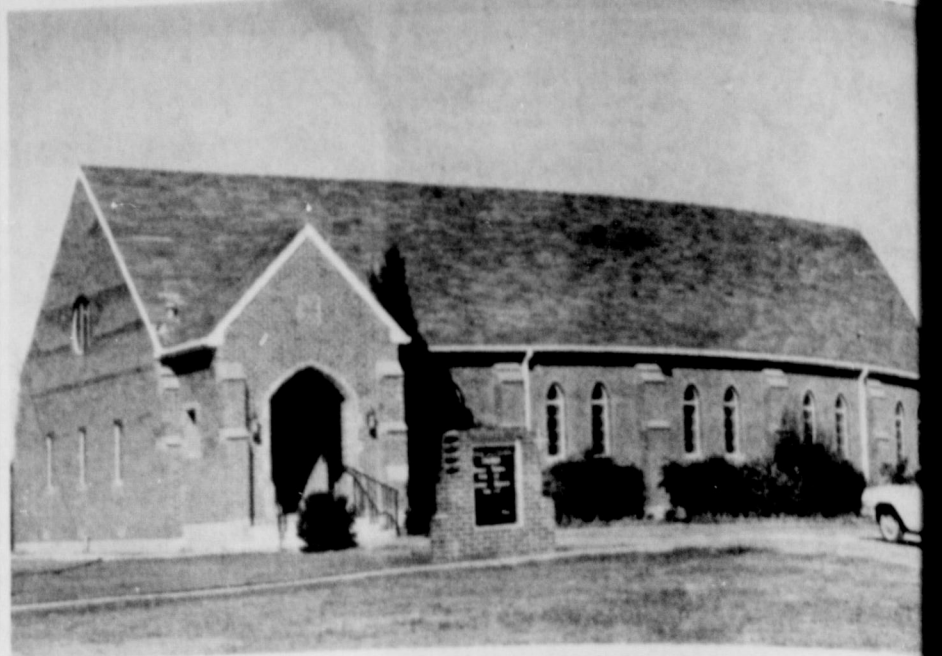

falling to connect on seven passing attempts.

Notable performances in the one-sided defeat were turned in by halfback Steve Harlan on offense and defense, and by linebacker Doyle Ethridge on defense. Ethridge and Claude Strickland were standout sophomore performers for the Tigers. Billy Martin, Larry Bownds and Joe Olague were in on many tackles on defense.

In chalking up 10 touchdowns, the Mustangs collected three in the first period and only one in the second stanza to take a 20-0 halftime lead. The Hosses tallied twice in the third, then romped to four more scores in the final period.

In running up the score, the Mustangs converted three Tiger fumbles into short touchdown drives. The fleet and hard-running Denver City backs divided scoring honors with quarterback David Mitchell and halfbacks Mike Sharp and Jimmy Young each ringing up a pair of touchdowns. Fullback Jim Comer got one; reserve back Keith Hill got two and Gary Hatfield one.

Slaton won the toss and chose to receive to start the game. However, a handoff between Harlan and Victor Cristan was fumbled and Gary Hatfield streaked down the field to cover the ball on the Tiger 8. Sharp raced around left end to cover the distance in one play; Mitchell passed to Sharp for two points

and it was 8-0 with just 17 seconds gone off the scoreboard clock.

Harlan took the next kickoff on the 10 and almost broke loose as he returned to the Mustang 48. Harlan got six yards, but two passes by Miles were incomplete. Denver City took over on its own 42 and scored again in just six plays.

A 30-yard gainer by Mitchell sparked the drive, and Comer slashed over from the one to climax the march. Mitchell was stopped on the run for bonus points, but it was 14-0 with 7:59 left in the first period.

The Tigers recovered a Mustang fumble on the next D. C. drive, but couldn't move the ball. Mitchell returned a Brush punt 19 yards to the Slaton 26, and three plays later the Mustangs tacked on another score as Young went five yards. Young carried for two points and it was 22-0 with 2:30 left in the period.

With Henry Johnson and Harlan carrying the ball, the Tigers moved from their own 29 to the Mustang 40 after the next kickoff. The Hosses held, however, and Slaton had to punt. The Mustangs promptly moved 69 yards in five plays for another tally as the second period got underway.

Mitchell tallied from 28 yards out, then passed to end Harold Shannon for two points. With 8:23 left in the second stanza, it was 30-0.

Midway of the quarter, Byron Johnson separated Mitchell from the ball as he attempted to pass and Danny Scott recovered the fumble on the Tiger 49. The Tigers then cranked up their best offensive effort of the night.

Harlan started it with an 11-yard pickup to the Mustang 40. Harlan got 8 more, then Johnson hit 4 and a first down on the D. C. 25. Johnson and Harlan got 9 in three plays, then Johnson almost broke loose on a 10-yard gainer on fourth down. But, with a first down on the 9, the Tigers ran out of time as two passes by Miles fell incomplete before the half.

The Mustangs lost no time lighting up the scoreboard again in the second half, taking the kickoff and driving for a touchdown in six plays. A 22-yard pass from Mitchell to Young and good gains by Sharp highlighted the march. Sharp scored from 5 yards out and ran for two points to run the score to 38-0.

Slaton made one first down before punting again, and the Mustangs used a 44-yard scoring pass from Mitchell to Young to tally again minutes later. Mitchell got two points on a double reverse and lateral play for a 46-0 lead.

The Tigers held the Mustangs the next two times the visitors had possession, forcing a punt one time and putting up a goal-line stand to stop the Hosses on the Tiger 3-yard line on the second drive.

Wilson crossed the mid-field mark on a 31-yard pass play from Scott to end Ralph Valasquez which put the ball on the Lion 27. Verkamp added two on a cross and Corley crashed up the middle for nine yards and a first down at the 16.

Verkamp went off tackle for four and Wilson drew five yards for offside. Scott was caught behind the line of scrimmage for a loss of three before Verkamp picked up those same three on a quickie.

Verkamp drove hard for seven yards to place the ball on the three with a first down. Corley picked up one. The ball was moved the half-yard line after an eager New Deal Lion grabbed Scott's face mask.

On the next play, Corley rambled straight ahead for yardage. Scott passed to Verkamp in the endzone for the two points.

I know there are women in this town who have ample ability to be Scout Leaders but they can't do the job all by themselves.

The Girl and Boy Scouts in Slaton are in trouble. WHY? I don't think it's because we as parents don't care. I think it's because we leave it up to someone else to do the work, mostly because we don't feel adequate to become leaders, or perhaps we don't know of the need. There are children who want to be in scouts but there is no one who is willing to take the job of leader even though the training session is free.

All it takes to become a leader is to be a person who likes kids, and respects their feelings as individuals. You may not even be a mother or maybe

This was very important to me because it gave me a chance to be with girls my own age and to learn to play and work with girls who were different than I was.

As I grew older I became a Girl Scout, and what a feeling of accomplishment this was. I can still remember the lady who was our scout leader. Her name was Mrs. Leaper. She must have been a very exceptional leader, because we did everything. In the summer we took swimming lessons together, and we were always making things. Looking back I can remember about 30 things we did as a group, and I still have some of the things we made together.

I can recall a lot of the girl's names in our troop, but one stands out above the rest. Her name was Anna. She was a Jew. I didn't like her very much at first. She was different and her family life was so strange to me. However she became one of the truest friends I ever had.
