SCHOOL SELLS \$325,000 OF SCHOOL BONDS

Stadium to Stay at Same Site

Slaton School trustees, in a called meeting to open bids on \$325,000 in school bonds, approved the bond sale and also took up two other important issues Tuesday night.

By a 4-1 vote, trustees decided to leave the football stadium at its present site and, by a 3-2 vote, the board authorized Supt. Lee Vardy to "do whatever necessary to comply" with the desegregation speed-up ordered by the federal government.

The bonds were sold to Rowles, Winston & Co., Inc., of Houston at a net interest rate of 4.115 percent. The rate was considered good in view of current financial conditions, noted one of the board members.

Sale of the bonds will enable the school to start work on the \$500,000 school improvements bond election passed recently. The total figure on the bonds could not be sold at this time, due to the school's bonded indebtedness.

Included in the improvements were provisions for new football stadium facilities. The site had not been decided until Tuesday night, with some residents favoring relocation at the high school property and some preferring to leave the stadium at its present site.

After considerable discussion Tuesday night, the board's vote was 4-1 to leave the field where it is, Tommy Davis Jr. voted against the motion to

COLD DUST STORM HITS

A lusty, gusty, dusty norther blew into Slaton and the area Tuesday, making residents almost forget that the first day of Spring had arrived Sunday.

After beautiful days Sunday and Monday with temperatures climbing to 87 each day, the mercury skidded to a low of 24 here Tuesday night, according to the readings at Pioneer Gas.

The strong wind, gusting up to 60 miles an hour, caused some property damage around the area. In Slaton, a big plate glass window broke under the stress at Self Furniture about 9 p.m. Tuesday. A grass fire across the railroad tracks from the Oil Mill was brought under control by the Slaton Volunteer Fire Department fighting against the howling, arctic air.

Twin cold fronts came roaring into the Panhandle and South Plains from a blizzard on the Great Plains. Temperature reached a high of 78 Tuesday, but the cold front dropped the reading to a frigid 24 during the night.

If you are having trouble assisting your elementary through sixth grade children with their homework in math, or if you just want to see what it is all about, now is your chance.

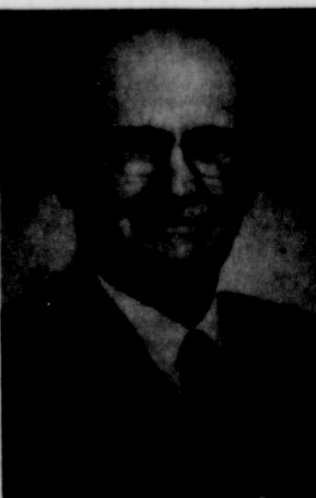

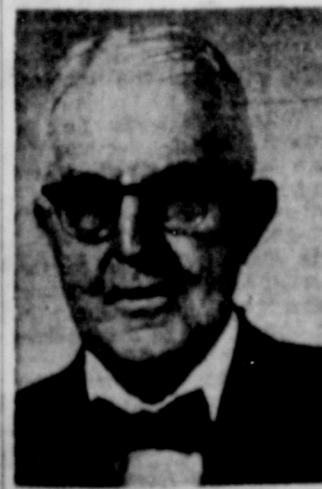

School Transfer Policy Outlined by Dr. Vardy

The Slaton Independent School District has set up regulations by which parents may transfer their child or children from one school to another, it was announced this week by Supt. Lee Vardy.

The following procedure was outlined by Dr. Vardy: Any parent may transfer their child from one school zone to another of the same grade level for the 1966-67 school year. The procedure will also be followed in subsequent years. The parent must transfer the child by Aug. 31, 1966, which is the last day of registration for the new term.

Late enrollees may make a transfer on the date of enrollment, but not after that date. All transfers will be accepted unless such transfers cause an overcrowded condition in one of the schools. In the event an overcrowded condition should occur, those students residing nearest to the involved school shall be given preference in transferring.

School zones will remain the same as has been outlined in the past. Transfers will be accepted either at the office of the Superintendent of Schools or at the business office, 300 S. 9th St. Transfer requests may be mailed to either address but must be postmarked prior to Aug. 30.

In the event a transfer is not made, a student shall be assigned to the school in the zone in which he resides, except all students in the ninth grade who must make a choice of the school to which they wish to attend. This choice can be made prior to or on the date of enrollment.

140 Counted Here In Free Vote Sign Up

Free voter registration figures received this week indicated 500,000 new voters were added to the rolls in the free 15-day registration period. More Texans are eligible to vote this year than in any other non-presidential election year -- 2.7 million.

Mrs. F. A. Drewry, deputy tax assessor, said 140 residents registered in her office for the free voting privilege.

It is difficult to determine how many registered voters there are in Slaton, as some Slatonites could have registered or paid their poll taxes in Lubbock. There are a total of 43,290 registered voters in Lubbock County.

The registrants will be able to join poll tax holders in casting ballots in all elections after March 25, the last day of a 30-day stay in the effective date of a federal court decision outlawing the poll tax.

The sale of automobile license plates for 1966 are down approximately 300 from the number of plates sold during the same period in 1965.

Wednesday morning a total of 2000 1966 plates had been sold at the Drewry Insurance office, according to Mrs. F. A. Drewry, deputy Lubbock County tax assessor.

The deadline for purchasing new plates is March 31. Citizens are urged to purchase their tags now rather than wait in line closer to the March 31 deadline.

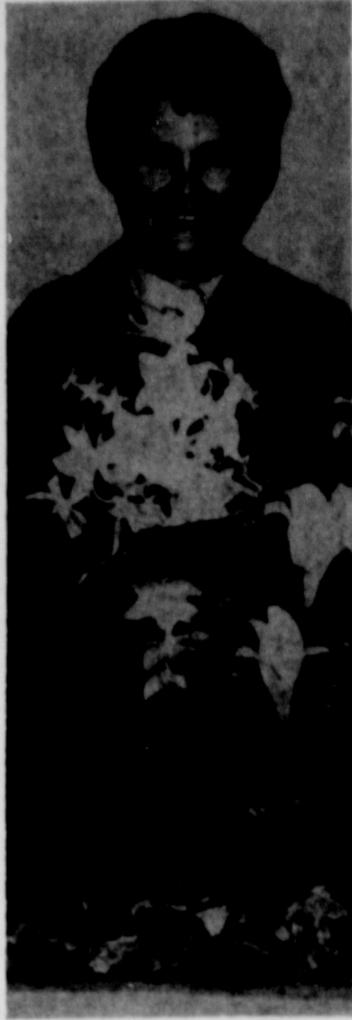

transfers be made as early as possible in order that plans can be made to adequately care for the pupil load in each zone. There is only one school that teaches grades 10 through 12, and no transfer is needed for pupils in this grade level.

Maps of school zones are available in all public schools and at the administrative offices of the Slaton Independent School District. Every effort will be made to assist you in obtaining data relative to your decision in transferring your child or children, said Dr. Vardy. No one connected officially with the Slaton Independent School District is allowed to attempt to influence your decision in any manner in the placement of your child or children in the public schools of Slaton.

Letters of instruction will be sent to the parents or guardians of children in the Slaton Public Schools stating the school in which their children will attend. Ninth grade students must make a choice of schools: either Slaton High School or Evans Junior High School. Parents will receive letters of instructions and forms upon which to let their decision be known to school officials.

An Open Letter To The Citizens Of Slaton

I am Earl Reasoner, and I reside at 1015 West Lubbock. I am presently City Commissioner of Ward 2 of Slaton, with my term expiring next month.

When I was, two years ago, elected to this position in the City government, a position which I consider to be important in that I feel it calls for good judgement and responsibility, my only decision was to do my very best to carry on the business of the City with the same whole-hearted interest as I have my own business. I believe I have done this.

After my election to the Commission, the very first problem we were confronted with was that of finance. The Mayor and entire Commission unanimously expressed the feeling and conviction that too much of the city's business was being financed through the increased water rates, but we were still confronted with the need to find another solution.

In an effort to accomplish this, we sought the advice of engineers and professional men in this field for their opinions on the most equitable and economical way to increase the revenue of the city. After a great many regular and called meetings, it was decided to ask you, the property owners to give your approval to a tax increase instead of going into a property revaluation. This, you approved by almost a 3 to 1 margin.

Following this, a bond election was called for \$300,000, divided: \$30,000 for sewer extensions; \$120,000 for street improvements; and \$150,000 for water system improvements. In like manner, you approved the bond election as called by a 3 to 1 margin.

I think it is important for you, the property owners, who voted these improvements and additions be undertaken, know the present status of these various projects. To date they are as follows:

Street Improvements: 95 blocks of paving is either completed or is in some stage of construction, 96 blocks have had extensive repairs and seal-coating, 90% of the original money voted has been either spent or obligated.

Water Improvements: The Rhoads Field was purchased on a per 1,000 gallon price, with two wells drilled, equipped and pipeline connections made to the existing water system. \$100,000 of the water improvements portion of the bond election have been sold with 70% of that amount spent or obligated. The remaining \$50,000 portion will not be sold until the Canadian River Authority is tied in with the City system.

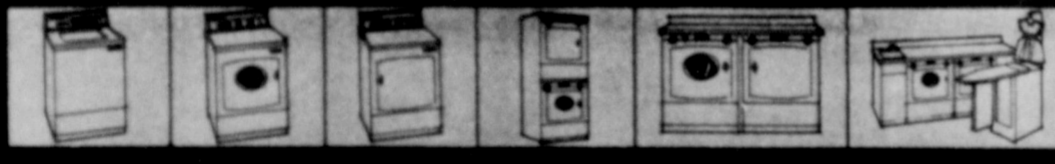
Sewer Extension: the money you voted for this is presently in the Citizens State Bank drawing interest and your City Commission is sparing no effort trying to secure the necessary right-of-ways to take this expanded service to all the citizens of Slaton.

Because of the many projects, and, I feel, the real progress made in making Slaton a better place to live in the past two years, and because I feel I now am better qualified because of having had this term to give me needed experience, I am again seeking to be permitted to serve you as your City Commissioner. I ask at least for your consideration in this matter and will again pledge to try to carry on the business of your City Government as if it were my own.

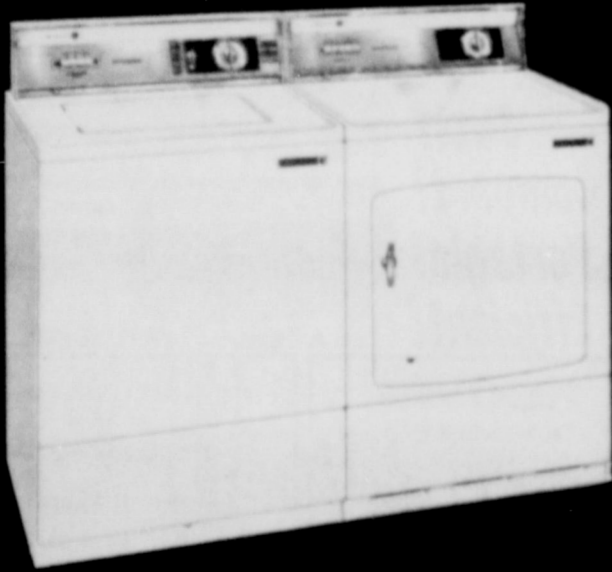

Proof of Age For SS Benefits

Effective immediately, the Social Security Administration has established new requirements for proof of age for entitlement to social security monthly benefits. Claimants must now submit the best proof of age available. "The very best proof of age," according to John G. Hutton, district manager, "would be a church or public record of birth made before the claimant's fifth birthday. Next best evidence of age would be any other record established before the person's 11th birthday." "There will be cases," Hutton explained, "where a person will not be able to present proof of age recorded before his 11th birthday. When this is true, the Social Security Administration will assist them in seeking other proofs. "Many sources are used for proof of age. They include public school, church and census records. Others that may be considered would include hospital birth records, physicians' or midwife's birth records, insurance policies, delayed birth certificates, marriage records and military records." Hutton emphasized that his office is ready to advise and assist applicants in obtaining evidence that meet the new requirements. 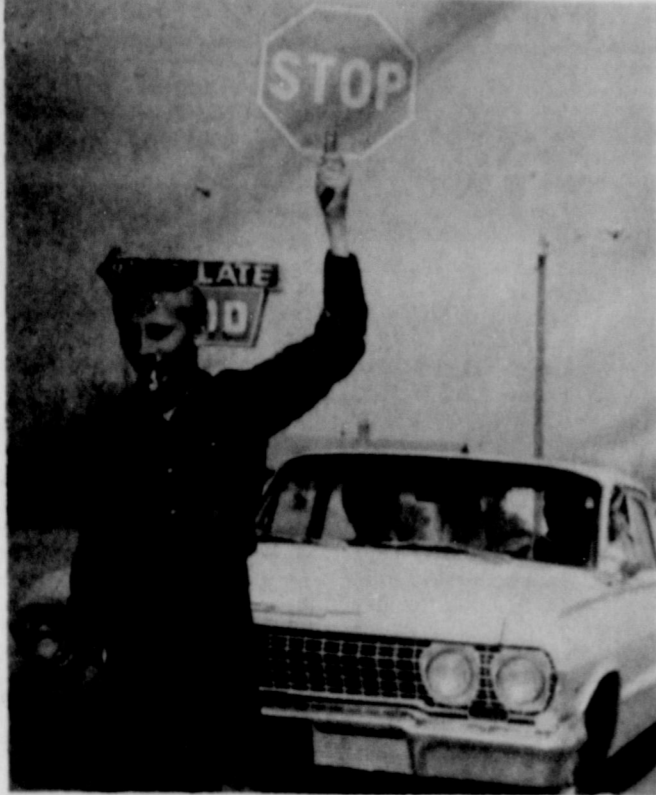
NOTICE OF SCHOOL DESEGREGATION PLAN UNDER TITLE VI OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1964 THIS PLAN APPLIES ONLY TO NINTH GRADE STUDENTS

THIS NOTICE IS MADE AVAILABLE TO INFORM YOU ABOUT THE DESEGREGATION OF OUR SCHOOLS, KEEP A COPY OF THIS NOTICE, IT WILL ANSWER MANY QUESTIONS ABOUT SCHOOL DESEGREGATION. 1. DESEGREGATION PLAN IN EFFECT The Slaton public school system is being desegregated under a plan adopted in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The purpose of the desegregation plan is to eliminate from our school system the racial segregation of students and all other forms of discrimination based on race, color, or national origin. 2. THIRTY-DAY SPRING CHOICE PERIOD Each student or his parent, or other adult person acting as parent, is required to choose the school the student will attend next school year. The choice period will begin on March 28, 1966 and close April 28, 1966. 3. EXPLANATORY LETTERS AND SCHOOL CHOICE FORMS On the first day of the choice period, an explanatory letter and this notice will be sent by first-class mail to the parent, or other adult person acting as parent, of each student then in the schools who is expected to attend school the following school year. A school choice form will be sent with each letter, together with a return envelope addressed to the Superintendent. Additional copies of the letter, this notice and the choice form are freely available to the public at any school and at the Superintendent's office. 4. RETURNING THE CHOICE FORMS Parents and students, at their option, may return the completed choice forms by hand to any school or by mail to the Superintendent's office, at any time during the 30-day choice period. No preference will be given for choosing early during the choice period. A choice is required for each student. No assignment to a school can be made unless a choice is made first. 5. CHOICE FORM INFORMATION The school choice form lists the names, locations and grades offered for each school. The reasons for any choice made are not to be stated. The form asks for the name, address and age of the student, the school and grade currently or last attended, the school chosen for the following year, the appropriate signature, and whether the form has been signed by the student or his parent. Any letter or other written communication which identifies the student and the school he wishes to attend will be deemed just as valid as if submitted on the choice form supplied by the school system. The names of students and the schools they choose or are assigned to under the plan will not be made public by school officials. 6. COURSE AND PROGRAM INFORMATION To guide students and parents in making a choice of school, listed below, by schools, are the courses and programs which are not given at every school in this school system, SLATON HIGH SCHOOL 1. Vocational Agriculture 7. SIGNING THE CHOICE FORM A choice form may be signed by a parent or other adult person acting as parent. A student who has reached the age of 15 at the time of choice, or will next enter the ninth or any higher grade, may sign his own choice form. The student's choice shall be controlling unless a different choice is exercised by his parent before the end of the period during which the student exercises his choice. 8. PROCESSING OF CHOICES No choice will be denied for any reason other than overcrowding. In cases where granting all choices for any school would cause overcrowding, the students choosing the school who live closest to it will be assigned to that school. Whenever a choice is to be denied, overcrowding will be determined by a uniform standard applicable to all schools in the system. 9. NOTICE OF ASSIGNMENT, SECOND CHOICE All students and their parents will be promptly notified in writing of their school assignments. Should any student be denied his choice because of overcrowding he will be promptly notified and given a choice among all other schools in the system where space is available. 10. STUDENTS MOVING INTO THE COMMUNITY A choice of school for any student who will be new to the school system may be made during the spring 30-day choice period or at any other time before he enrolls in school. An explanatory letter, this notice and the school choice form will be given out for each new student as soon as the school system knows about the student. At least seven days will be allowed for the return of the choice form when a choice is made after the spring 30-day choice period. A choice must be made for each student. No assignment to any school can be made unless a choice is made first. 11. STUDENTS ENTERING FIRST GRADE The parent, or other adult person acting as parent, of a child entering the first grade, is required to choose the school his child will attend. Choices will be made under a free choice process used for students new to the system in other grades, as provided in paragraph 12. 12. PRIORITY OF LATE CHOICES No choice made after the end of the spring 30-day period may be denied for any reason other than overcrowding. In the event of overcrowding, choices made during the choice period will have first priority. Overcrowding determined by the standard provided for in paragraph 8. Any parent or student whose first choice is denied because of overcrowding will be given a second choice as provided for in paragraph 9. 13. TESTS, HEALTH RECORDS AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS Any academic tests or other procedures used in students to schools, grades, classrooms, sections of study or for any other purpose, will be applied to all students without regard to race, color, or national origin. No choice of school will be denied because at the time of choice to provide any health record certificate, or other document. The student will be assigned in accordance with the plan and the choice and given ample time to obtain any required Curriculum, credit, and promotion procedures applied in such a way as to hamper freedom of any student. 14. CHOICES ONCE MADE CANNOT BE ALTERED Once a choice has been submitted, it may not be altered even though the choice period has not ended. This is binding for the entire school year to which it applies except in the case of (1) compelling hardship, (2) residence to a place where another school is not available, (3) the availability of a school designed to fit the needs of a physically handicapped student, (4) the availability of another school of a course of study required by which is not available at the school chosen. 15. ALL OTHER ASPECTS OF SCHOOLS DESEGREGATED All school-connected services, facilities, athletic and programs are open to all on a desegregated basis. A student attending school for the first time on a desegregated basis may not be subject to any disqualification period for participation in activities and programs. Athletics, which might otherwise apply because he is a transfer student, all transportation furnished by the school will also operate on a desegregated basis. Facilities will be desegregated, and no staff member will lose his position because of race, color, or national origin. This includes any case where less staff is needed because schools are closed or enrollment is reduced. 16. ATTENDANCE ACROSS SCHOOL SYSTEM LINES No arrangement will be made, or permission granted by this school system for any students living in the community who serve to attend school in another school where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color, or national origin. No arrangement made, or permission granted, by this school system for students living in another school system to attend school in this system, where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color, or national origin. 17. VIOLATIONS TO BE REPORTED It is a violation of our desegregation plan for any official or teacher to influence or coerce any person making of a choice or to threaten any person with or promise favors for any choice made. It is also a violation of Federal regulations for any person to intimidate, coerce, retaliate or discriminate against any person making of a choice, or to interfere with the free making of choice of school. Any person having any knowledge of any of these prohibitions should report the facts immediately by mail or phone to the Equal Educational Opportunities Program, U. S. Office of Education, Washington, D. C. 20202 (telephone 202-962-0333). The name of any person reporting any violation will not be disclosed without his consent. Any other violation of the desegregation plan or other discrimination based on race, color, or national origin in the school system is also a violation of Federal requirements and should likewise be reported. Anyone with a complaint to report should bring it to the attention of local school officials, unless he feels it would not be helpful to do so, if local officials do not correct the violation promptly, any person familiar with the facts of the violation should report them immediately to the U. S. Office of Education at the above address or phone number.
