JUNK CAR LAW IS PASSED

City Sidesteps Decision On Sunday Burial Policy

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, side-stepped a policy decision on Sunday burials in the city cemetery, then approved and discussed a number of other items on the agenda. These included: --Passage of an emergency ordinance concerning the removal of junk cars within the city limits; --Approved first reading of a voluntary annexation of 14.01 acres of land; --Authorized mayor to apply for federal grant on sewer project; --Discussed annexation of land in northwest Slaton and along US-84 bypass; --Approved second reading of electrical code amendment; --Accepted recommendation on personnel changes in police department.

Voters in two city wards and in the Slaton Independent School District will have an opportunity Saturday and Tuesday to select representatives in city commission and school trustee offices, respectively. Contested races will face voters in the Ward 2 city election and in the school board balloting. Incumbent Earl Reasoner faces Walter Mosser in the election for commissioner of Ward 2. In the school board race, three men are vying for the two positions up for election. Incumbents Joe Miles and Willie Heinrich will be joined by Don Sikes, with the two top vote-getters winning seats.

City Candidate Sketches

'WORSE PART IS SEEING A FRIEND KILLED, WAITING'

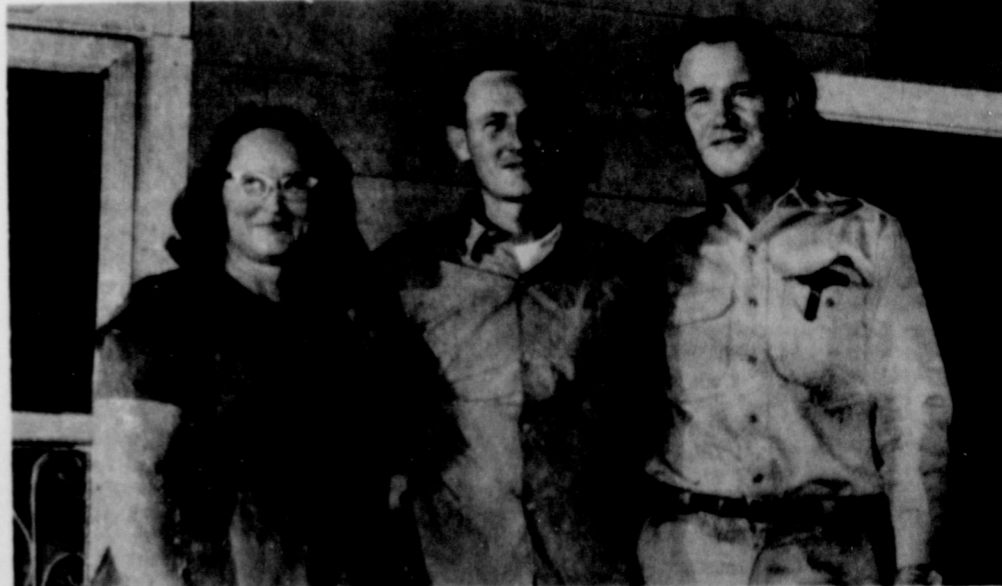
Slaton Soldier Home From Viet Nam

"It's a dirty war...the worst part is to see a friend go out on patrol and never return...you never realize what a wonderful country you live in until you go to a place like that and are lucky enough to come back..."

Incidents in the past and, of course, there were questions fired at Bobby about his experiences in Viet Nam. As Mr. and Mrs. Wilcox posed for a picture with their son, you could sense the pride they had for his country when the call came. Most of all, however, you could see the thankfulness in their eyes that their son was home safe.

Bobby, who was in the 166th Transportation Detachment, didn't get into actual combat while in Viet Nam. His job was connected with cargo and maintenance work with helicopters, and he flew on several copter missions to transport troops or cargo into battle areas. What was the toughest part of his stay? "The worst thing is to watch

some of your friends leave on patrol and never see them again. The next worst thing was after I received my orders to come back and had to wait at a camp eight days for transportation," related Wilcox. "We take so many things here for granted...you can't imagine the fifth and living conditions over there. Most

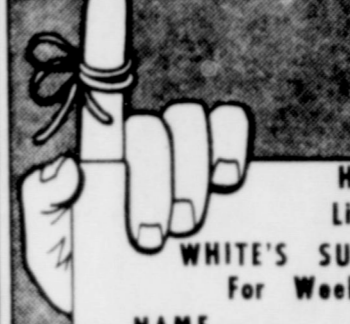

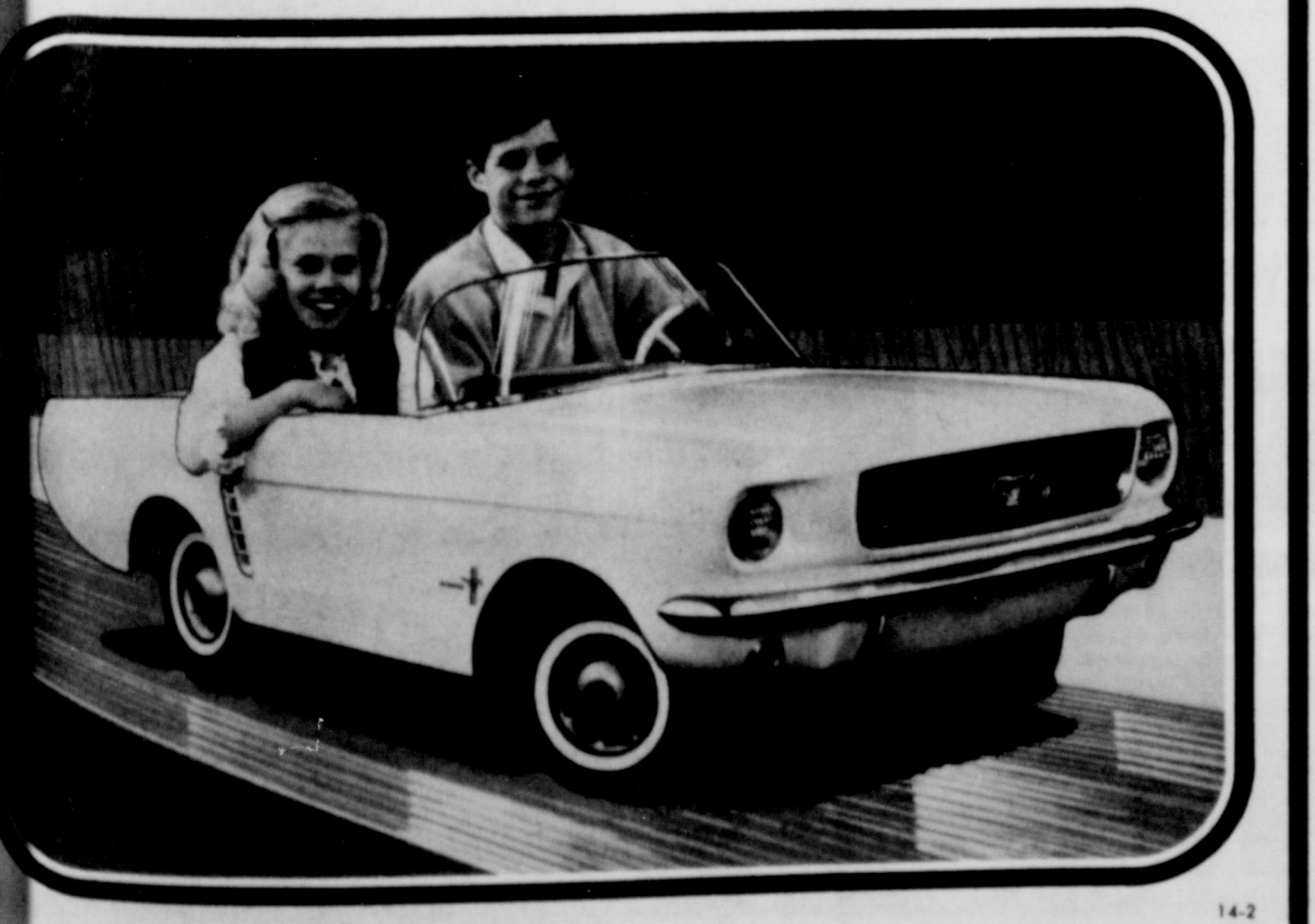

"making it unlawful for property owners, occupants or lessees to keep, store or place junk cars on lots or property in the City of Slaton." The new law provides exemptions from the act and provides for a fine up to \$200 for the violation.

Exempt are "bona fide automobile dealers, garages, or properly fenced wrecking yards which are properly operating within commercial zones within said City of Slaton."

The commission acted on the basis that junk cars constitute a safety and health hazard. The matter had been discussed before, as long as a year ago during a clean-up drive.

A voluntary annexation of land, some 14.01 acres, adjacent to and west of the new city cemetery was approved on first reading. The tract of land is located on the west side of West Englewood Cemetery.

A sewer project in south Slaton came in for considerable discussion, since two property owners declined to dedicate alleys for the project. 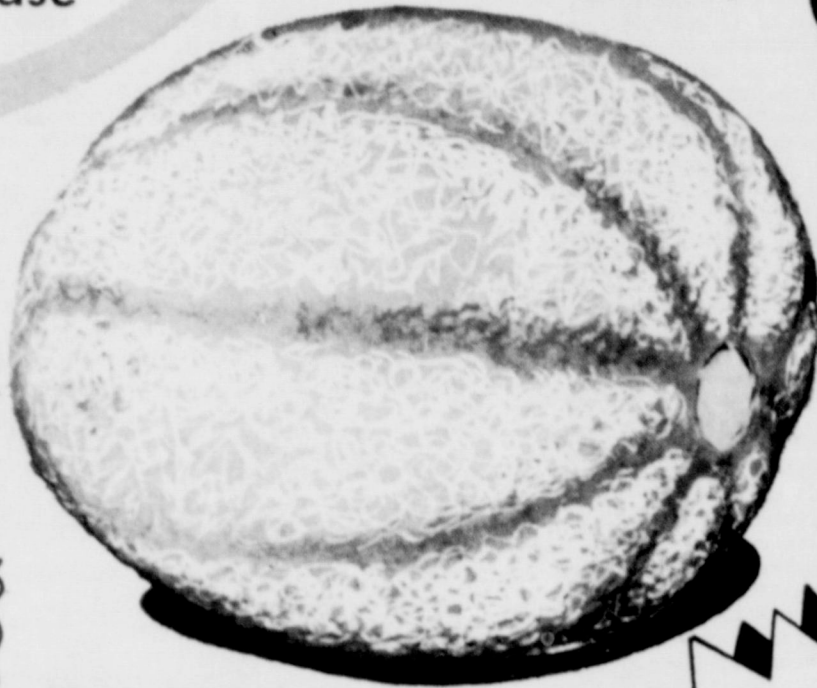
