accepted completed construction on the 1965 paving program during a special meeting last Thursday, authorizing payment to the contractor and engineers.

The completed portion of the project covers approximately 80 blocks which were included in the original paving program. Some 15 additional blocks, added by petition later, still remain to be completed. Curbs and gutter will be laid, and the paving is anticipated for these blocks next spring.

Total contract on the paving amounted to \$232,849,42. After accepting the job, on the city engineer's recommendation, a balance of \$29,383 was paid to Pioneer Pavers, Inc. Also authorized was a payment of \$25,613 for engineering, and a payment in excess of \$3,000 as balance on seal coating of city streets. The seal coat work totaled about \$28,000.

The ordinance which authorized payment of the paving work also provided for issuance of paving certificates to Pioneer Pavers. These certificates, in turn, have been taken by Municipal Investment Corp. of Lub-

Property owners involved in the paving program will be receiving statements from Municipal Investment and will have 20 days to make payment or arrange terms of payment. The city will participate on payment of true hardship cases, which must be clearly established, A maximum of \$18,-000 was set up for hardship

(Pretty fast restaurant service compared to nowadays) Five minutes to receive and deliver mails, and to take in wood and water ..

The fare for the 72 mile run was \$5.25, with children under 12 and colored persons, one half price. This was the Louisville, Cincinnati and Charleston Railroad.

In that same issue, it listed the governor's salary as \$2000, and the secretary of state was paid a big fat salary of \$800 per year. How about that, politicians?

These dated almanacs and other papers have been in the family of Mrs. J. B. Young for many many years, and they have just recently come into her possession. Her mother, Mrs. R. D. Freeman of San Angelo, gave them to her and she will keep them to pass on to the next generation.


In Mrs. Young's possession, she has a land grant dated in 1765 given to the family by George III in South Carolina.

## Help Annual The Texas Highway Patrol Livestock Count

Rural mail carriers from the Slaton Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 20.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms, "Postmaster Rush Wheeler explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," Wheeler said, "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Jack Clark, Route

1; and Paul Mosser, Route 2. Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and invertories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and tel-



AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY, ITS SUC-CESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO CONSTURCT, MAINTAIN, EQUIP AND OPER-ATE IN THE CITY OF SLA-TON, TEXAS, SYSTEMS TO USE, STORE, SELL, DISTRI-BUTE AND SUPPLY ELEC-TRIC ENERGY FOR LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER AND OTHER PURPOSES TO SAID CITY, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHERS, AND TO USE THE STREETS, AVENUES, AL-HIGHWAYS, SIDE-WALKS, BRIDGES AND OTHER PUBLIC GROUNDS OF SAID CITY FOR SAID PURPOSES FOR A TERM OF TWENTY YEARS, LEVYING A STREET RENTAL, AND PRESCRIBING OTHER TERMS AND CONDI-TIONS THEREFOR: AND RE-PEALING ORDINANCE NO. 19 AND ORDINANCE NO. 97

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS: ARTICLE I

There is hereby granted to Southwestern Public Service 1965. Company, a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of New Mexico, having a permit to do business in the State of Texas, and to its successors and assigns, a franchise authorizing it to construct, equip, maintain and operate in the City of Slaton, Texas, systems to use, store, sell, distribute and otherwise serve, supply and furnish said City and its inhabitants and others with electric energy for light, heat and power and other purposes and to use the streets. alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of said City, both above and below the surface of same, upon the terms and conditions of this ordinance.

ARTICLE II The franchise rights and powers herein granted shall exist and be in force from and after the passage of this ordinance for a term of twenty

ARTICLE III Upon this Ordinance becoming effective, Ordinance No. 19 and Ordinance No. 97 are hereby repealed.

ARTICLE IV Southwestern Public Service Company is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this franchise, provided that all work done in said streets, alley highways or other grounds

se done with the utmost gence and least inconvenience to the public or individuals, that said Company shall, within a reasonable time, restore streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to their original condition as nearly as and that said work shall be done subject to the approval of the City. The Company shall assume all liability or risk of damage to persons or property which may arise from the construction or operation of any or all of said system and shall save the City of Slaton, Texas, its officers and agents, harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of the same.

ARTICLE V Southwestern Public Service Company, its successors and assigns, for and in consideration of the granting of this franchise and as rental for the occupation and use of the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of the City of Slaton, shall pay the aggregate sum of 2% of the gross receipts, as hereinafter defined, of the Company for electric energy used within the city limits of the City of Slaton, "Gross receipts" shall consist of the total amount billed users of electric energy for light, heat and power within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton under the Company's lighting and power rates in existance at the time of payment, excepting thereform the gross receipts for electric service furnished the City of Slaton, Texas, and all municipal, County and State agencies and institutions, public schools and Federal governmental agencies

Such payments, shall be payable for each quarter period of each year, said periods to begin on the first days of the months of January, April, July and October of each year. The payments covering each prior period shall be made within a reasonable time immediately after each period. Such payments shall be in lieu of any and all other taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements) upon the business, revenue or property of the Company or any part thereof in said City during the term of this franchise, and they shall continue only so long as said Company is not prohibited from making them by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises and so long as the City does not charge, levy or collect or at-
