CITY OKAYS JOB AT TOTAL COST OF \$232,849

City Paving Project Accepted

The City of Slaton officially accepted completed construction on the 1965 paving program during a special meeting last Thursday, authorizing payment to the contractor and engineers.

The completed portion of the project covers approximately 80 blocks which were included in the original paving program. Some 15 additional blocks, added by petition later, still remain to be completed. Curbs and gutter will be laid, and the paving is anticipated for these blocks next spring.

Total contract on the paving amounted to \$232,849.42. After accepting the job, on the city engineer's recommendation, a balance of \$29,383 was paid to Pioneer Pavers, Inc. Also authorized was a payment of \$25,613 for engineering, and a payment in excess of \$3,000 as balance on seal coating of city streets. The seal coat work totaled about \$28,000.

The ordinance which authorized payment of the paving work also provided for issuance of paving certificates to Pioneer Pavers. These certificates, in turn, have been taken by Municipal Investment Corp. of Lubbock.

Property owners involved in the paving program will be receiving statements from Municipal Investment and will have 20 days to make payment or arrange terms of payment. The city will participate on payment of true hardship cases, which must be clearly established. A maximum of \$18,000 was set up for hardship cases.

The city and the contractor held a joint line on paving certificates up to the completion date; now the liens have been turned over to the investment corporation.

Attending the Thursday special session were all members of the city commission and representatives of the paving company and the investment corporation.

Chill Air Ups Harvest Hopes

Chill air moved into the Slaton area early Wednesday morning, bringing hopeful thoughts that the belated first freeze may be just around the

corner. However, the weather bureau forecast a low of 37 to 47 early Thursday.

While old Jack Frost is late in making his appearance this year, cotton farmers have benefited as more cotton matured on the stalks, but most of them are anxious to start the harvest.

Some have preferred to defoliate and get the precious fiber safely into a bale, and the harvest picked up again this week after damp, foggy weather interrupted work last week.

The three U.S.D.A. Cladding offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa classed only 37,000 samples during the week ending Friday, Nov. 12. A large part of this cotton was harvested during the previous week.

The harvest was resumed on Thursday and sample receipts at the three offices increased

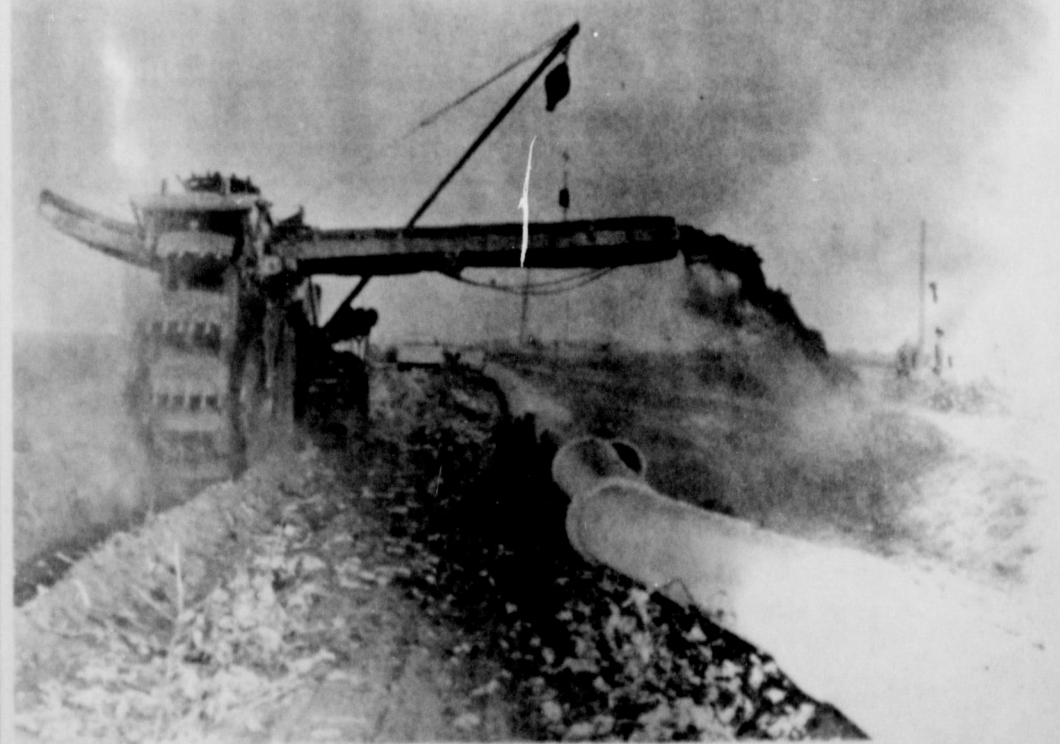
Slatonite To Publish Early

The Slatonite will publish early next week because of the Thanksgiving holiday, it was announced this week by publisher O. G. Nieman.

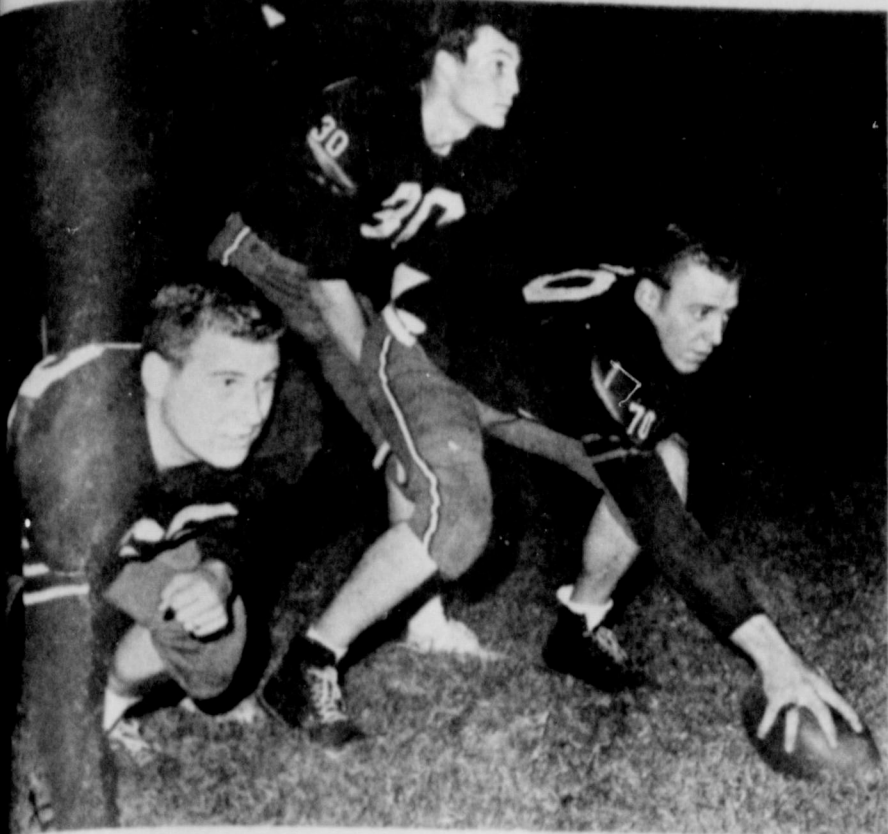
The issue, which will be mailed out early Tuesday morning, will also include a special "Cotton Harvest" section with tribute being paid to farmers of the Slaton trade area.

Slaton, Post Exes Clash Benefit Grid Battle

The locals had only 14 players last week at Post, and several had aches and pains on occasions. Post had about 35 suited up last week.

Despite the small crew, Slaton's exes played a stout defensive game and broke for three scores sparked by the passing and running of Bruce Pember and Paul Dubbs.

Slaton jumped to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and increased it to 22-0 in the third period. Post managed its tally early in the final stanza on a pass play.

Dubbs, 230-pound fullback, romped 26 yards for the first Slaton score. Sammy Crowson took a pitchout from Pember

and raced 65 yards for the second tally. Pember passed to Leslie Brown for extra points after one score.

Pember hit Eddie Gravel on a 5-yard pass for the third-period touchdown. The ex-Tiger quarterback hit 7 passes for 117 yards. Two tosses were intercepted.

The Slaton crew intercepted five Post aeriels, with Steve Ball grabbing several from his linebacker's post, Banks, Ball, Howard Linmer, C. L. Cowan, Jim Bob Christman and the Dubbs brothers spearheaded the defensive play.

Post's touchdown came on a

Roundball Season Opens Here Friday

With only four workouts under their belts and football still in their blood, the Slaton Tigers open the 1965-66 cage season here Friday night with the Floydada Whirlwinds.

Proceeding the varsity contest will be the girls game which starts at 7 p.m. Both games will be in the high gym.

The basketball season in Slaton officially kicks off tonight when the freshmen squad, coached by Neal Chastain, host the Idalou freshman at 6 p.m. The faculty takes on the exes at 8 tonight in a donkey basketball game in the junior high gym.

Tuesday the varsity and girls A and B squads travel to Lockney for tilts which get underway at 6 p.m.

Varsity Coach Tommy Laceywell said 39 boys reported for cage workouts Monday. The total represents one of the largest turnouts for the round ball sport in the history of the school.

Laceywell said the squad is working on fundamentals at this point in the season. "We will be looking for the top five boys when we play Floydada." He said approximately 12 boys

would suit up for the varsity tilt.

He said the team roster is not definite and that it is too early to tell who will be playing for the Tigers. Six lettermen return from last year's squad which finished in a tie for second in the district.

The lettermen are 6-2 junior Byron Johnson, 6-2 junior Jack Mason, 5-5 senior Victor Christan, 5-11 senior Henry Johnson, 6-2 senior Orin Smith and 5-9 senior Steve Harlan.

Smith and Byron Johnson were starters last season. Twenty boys from last year's B-team are expected to fight it out for the 12-15 spots on the varsity roster.

Doug Duncan will coach the B-team while Neal Chastain will be in charge of the frosh cagers.

Denver City is defending champion of the district. Morton tied with Slaton for the runnerup spot. The Mustangs have four returning starters.

District 4-AA games get underway Jan. 14 when both boys and girls travel to Post. A highlight of the season is the Slaton cage tournament Jan. 6-8.

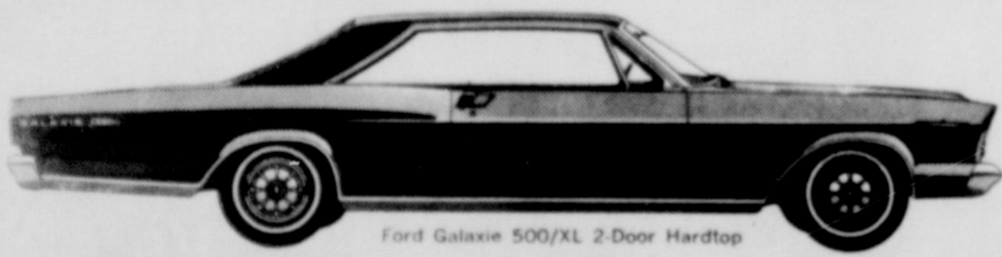

Mrs. Wier's recipe for Barbecues is as follows:

BARBECUES
 2 lb. ground beef
 3/4 c. onions, chopped or ground
 1 can tomato sauce
 3/4 c. catsup
 2 green peppers, chopped
 2 T. vinegar
 2 T. sugar
 2 T. Worcestershire sauce
 Salt and pepper to taste
 Mix onions and ground beef, brown in skillet. Add remaining ingredients and simmer one hour. Serve on warm hamburger buns. Makes 16 servings. Serve with beans and tossed salad.

Mrs. Morren's recipe is as follows:

DATE LOAF PUDDING CAKE
 Make the following sauce in pan you are going to bake in:
 1 large cup brown sugar
 2 T. butter
 2 c. boiling water
 1 t. vanilla
 Make following batter and pour over.
 3/4 c. white sugar
 1 egg
 1 c. nuts
 1 c. chopped dates
 3/4 c. sweet milk
 2 t. baking powder
 1 c. flour
 Bake in slow oven 40 minutes (300 to 325 degrees)

I just finished looking through an almanac that listed James Monroe as president of the U. S. Back then I suppose the almanac was more or less their means of a newspaper. In this issue printed in 1819, it gave the reason for drinking. This is what it said, "Good wine--good friends--being dry--Or lest we should be by and by, Or, any other reason why."

In a Carolina and Georgia almanac dated in 1841, I found an interesting item about the S. C. Railroad. The train ran from Charleston to Hamburg, S. C. Slaton being a railroad town, I thought some readers might be interested. The article said the speed of the train was not over 20 miles per hour and would remain 20 minutes each for breakfast and dinner. (Pretty fast restaurant service compared to nowadays) Five minutes to receive and deliver mails, and to take in wood and water.

The fare for the 72 mile run was \$5.25, with children under 12 and colored persons, one half price. This was the Louisville, Cincinnati and Charleston Railroad.

In that same issue, it listed the governor's salary as \$2000, and the secretary of state was paid a big fat salary of \$800 per year. How about that, politicians?

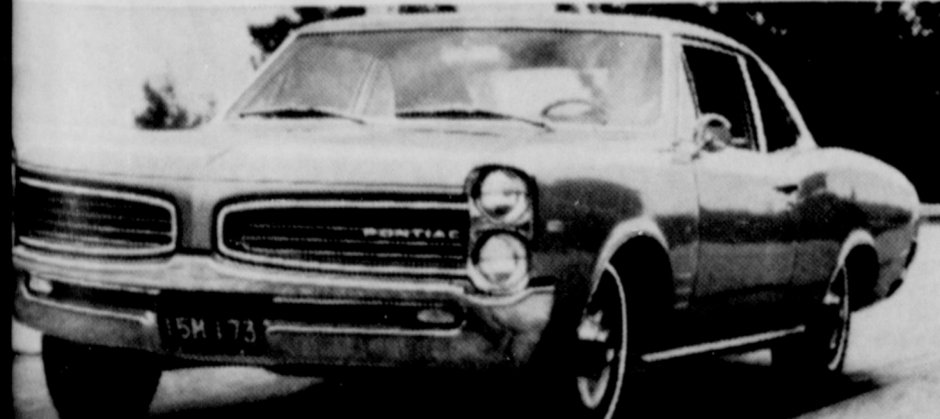

on Friday. Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock office were better than those of the previous week. Sixty-three per cent of the cotton was in the White grades and 37 per cent in the Light Spotted grades. The previous week 55 per cent of the cotton was classed in the White grades and 45 per cent in the Light Spotted grades. Middling made up 20 per cent of the total classed at Lubbock last week. Strict Low Middling 34 per cent, Middling Light Spotted 26 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 10 per cent. Average staple was also better than that of the previous week. The staple average was 31/32 of an inch compared to an average of slightly better than 15/16 of an inch the previous week. Forty per cent of all cotton classed at Lubbock during the week was 31/32 of an inch and 27 per cent was 1 inch and longer. Micronaire continued to decline. Seventy-three per cent of all cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 79 per cent was in this category. The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U. S. D. A. reported increased trading in the new crop cotton at slightly lower prices. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Middling 15/16 - 27.65, Middling 31/32 - 28.25, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 26.45, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 26.95, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 26.65, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 27.15, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 25.90 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 26.30. Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$50 per ton.

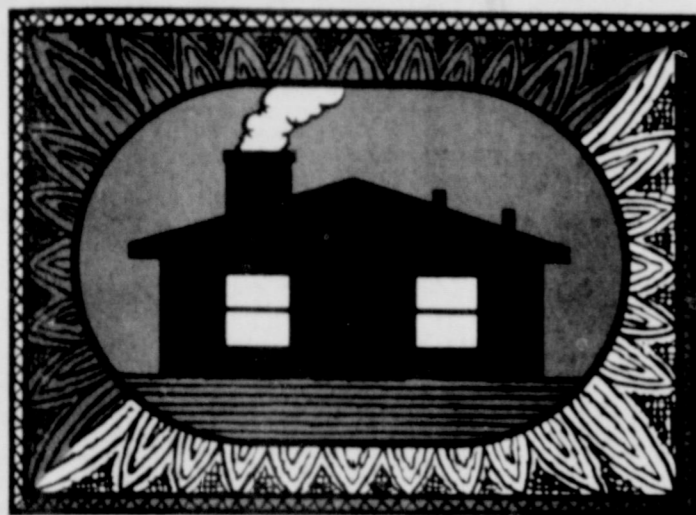

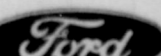

County Records 49 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 49 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of October, according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for 5 persons killed, 27 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$38,330.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through October of 1965 shows a total of 350 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 14 persons killed and 206 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$261,565.

November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. During the last two months of 1964 in Texas there were 80 pedestrians killed and 726 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. There are many reasons for this: longer hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of driver's and pedestrian's concentration.

Post Office To Help Annual Livestock Count

Rural mail carriers from the Slaton Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 20.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Rush Wheeler explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," Wheeler said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Jack Clark, Route 1; and Paul Mosser, Route 2. Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

The Wilson Mustang backfield is much like Cooper. The sparkplug is 145-pound senior Dennis Verkamp. He's a strong runner with breakaway ability.

The fullback is junior Kenneth Corley. He bulldozes his way for those must yards. Quarterback Johnny Scott can run with the best of them and he is equally as good in the air. The other halfback is sophomore Gary Crews.

Line strength includes Jimmy Koenig, Ralph Valasquez, David Koslan, Gary Williamson, David Tucker and Lenro Brieger.

Last week, Wilson beat Ropesville, 15-6 when Ralph Valasquez picked off a third quarter pass and ran 90 yards for the touchdown that sewed up the victory.

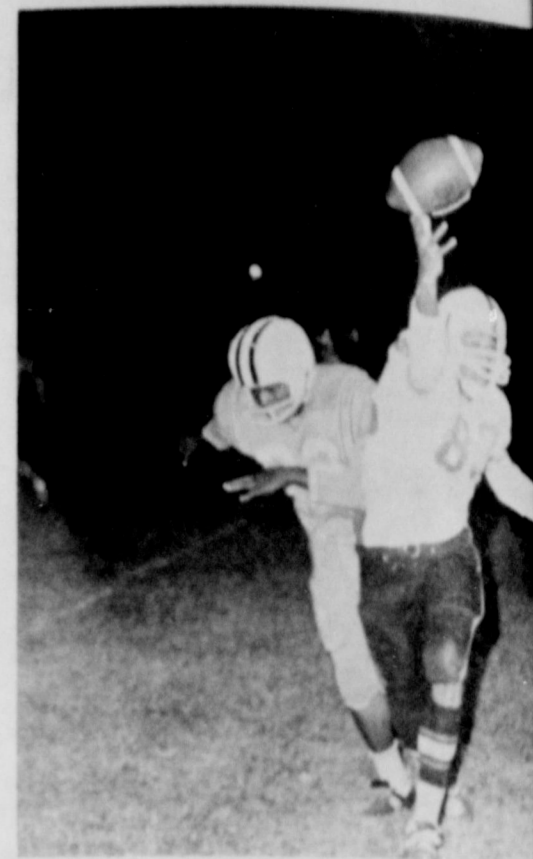
Klondike Sweeps Past Southland

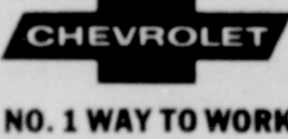

This insurance is being offered those veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict who either failed to take out the insurance originally or allowed it to lapse in whole or in part.

Deadline for the sale of the new GI policies is midnight, May 2, 1966.

The eligible veteran must have a service-connected disability or a non-service-connected disability so severe that he cannot purchase commercial insurance at the highest rates, Coker said.
