Examples are the aparthouse development, chamber of commerce, and the school is looking forward. I can already see a positive attitude. We are planning to expand city delivery. Rural routes have been extended. We want to expand our postal service as much as we can.

DEPOSITS AT RECORD HIGH

Record deposits totaling 10,819,623 were revealed week in year-end statements from Slaton's wo financial institutions. Citizens State Bank howed deposits of \$6,-025,492 while Slaton Savngs & Loan announced deosits of \$4,794,131. The ombined total of the two ast year was \$10,274,341. The CSB report shows deposits up about \$583,503 over the close of business n December 1964, Loans the close of business Dec. 31, 1965 were listed at \$4,478,196. Total assets were tabbed at \$6,633,626. Reflecting its healthy rowth, CSB also showed comparison of figures ith its first statement reeased in October, 1933. eposits have risen from 253,011 to more than \$6 nillion; loans have inreased from \$48,529 to lmost \$4.5 million, and capital and undivided proits are now \$598,133 comared to \$28,240 in the first report. Original investnent of shareholders has increased by \$573,000.

Slaton Featured In Publication

Slaton was featured in the December issue of "West Texas Today", an official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, for substantial increase in cons-

The report covered the period from Nov. 1, 1964 through November of last year. The was \$1,038,274. Many other cities the size of Slaton were only near the half million

Offices and buildings accounted for \$156,234 of the total while \$2,864 was atributed to industrial buildings and shops. Building for churches totaled \$116,620,

In residential buildings, one family dwellings accounted for \$186,346 of the total. Apartments totaled \$168,000, Public utilities amounted to \$404,760 while repairs netted \$3,450 of the total.

Construction hit a record high in November to shoot the month's figure to \$268,396.36. Three major projects were responsible for the increases. They included an apartment project, a commercial building and a church -- all located

in southwest Slaton. However, permits for December dropped to a new low. Permits issued for December by city hall totaled \$1,800 and two houses moved in accounted for the total.

Water District **Election Tuesday**

The High Plains Water District's annual election is slated Tuesday to decide three issues. Voting in Slaton will be at the community club house. Balloting at Wilson will occur at the city judge's office in the Wilson State Bank, All persons qualified to vote in Texas and who own property within the water district are

eligible to vote. Nominated for district director from Lynn and Lubbock counties is Russell Bean of Lubbock. He is chairman of the board and is unopposed on the ballot.

Voters will also vote for county committeemen. One each will be elected from Lubbock's commissioners precinct two and from Lynn County.

Lubbock County nominees are Edward C. Moseley and Joe Schramm of Slaton, On the ballot from Lynn County is Roy Lynn Kahlich and Don Smith of Wilson.

The third proposition to be considered is the annexation of eligible lands in Cochran County. In April of 1965, the Texas Water Commission issued an order redefining boundaries of subdivision one of the High Plains area Ogallala formation, south of the Canadian River.

The harvest of King Cotton was headed down the "homestretch" in the Slaton area this week, with the bale count at 93,511 and considered about 95 percent complete.

In the final bale count to be conducted by The Slatonite, ginners Wednesday morning reported a total of 93,511 bales ginned in a dozen area plants. The previous tabulation, made Dec. 20, showed a total of 78,778 bales.

With the weather see-sawing between misty and dry days, the harvest slowed down in the past few weeks, but the big assault on the cotton fields is about finished. Several gins reported only 200 to 300 bales to go; some anticipated they were 95 percent through the

ginning season, Over the South Plains in general, the harvest is expected to be the third best in history, insular as number of bales

are concerned. The tabulation Wednesday revealed these gin reports: Slaton Co-Op Gins 17,800; Farmers Gin 3,800; Campbell Gin 2,800; Posey Gin 3,844; Acuff Co-Op 20,638; McClung 6,150; Union Co-Op 7,500; Wilson Co-Op and Wayside 15,500; Basinger Gin 2,577; Hackberry Gin 7,052; Gatzki Gin 2,750; Planters Gin 3,100.




