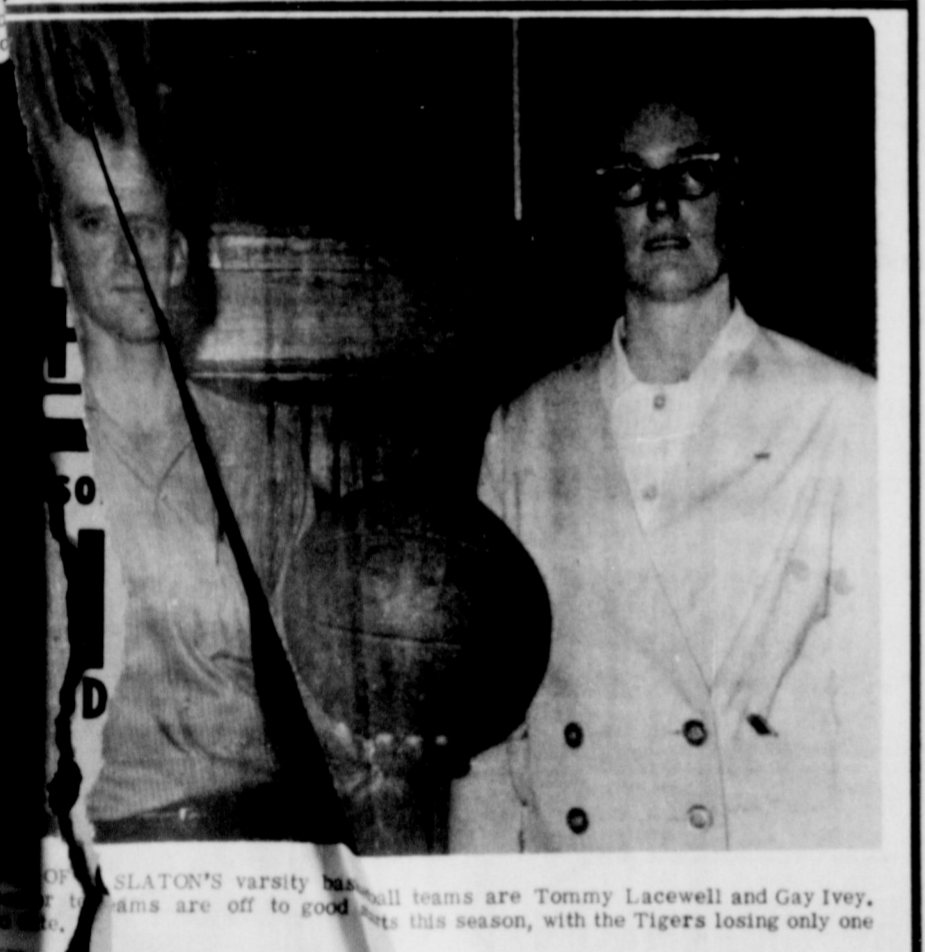

# Public Service Plans \$19 Million In Improvements

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strength and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designed for the construction and improvement of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X, in Lamb County, and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, N.M., are the three generation stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than we are able to now transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone', or main line, is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system in other

words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols Station, Northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will in-

crease the capability of the plant to 534,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

"The continued installation of major electric generating units is, of course, the best kind of evidence of our confidence in the future of our service area. There are many opportunities to attract small industries to this region, and a number of communities are actively engaged in well-planned industrial development programs. The advantages of this area are obvious, with our excellent climate, the optimism of our people, and good local governments. All of these will lead to new progress for the region," Watson said.

Electric power's role in meeting the municipal water needs of the region are a part of the 1966 improvement program. A 115,000 volt transmission line will be completed during the year to provide the power to pump the water from Lake Meredith to a storage reservoir near Amarillo. The Lake Meredith water is scheduled to be distributed to the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, beginning in late 1967.

"1965 was another year in which the average cost of our service to all of our customers was lower than the previous year. As a matter of fact, it was the 13th consecutive year for a decline in the average cost of electricity used in our customer's homes. Our customers have helped make this possible by using more of our service.

This enables us to install new and more efficient equipment, the type that will go into service as a result of this 19-million dollar improvement program in 1966. Reddy Kilowatt is still the servant who charges less for each hour the more hours you work him," Watson concluded.

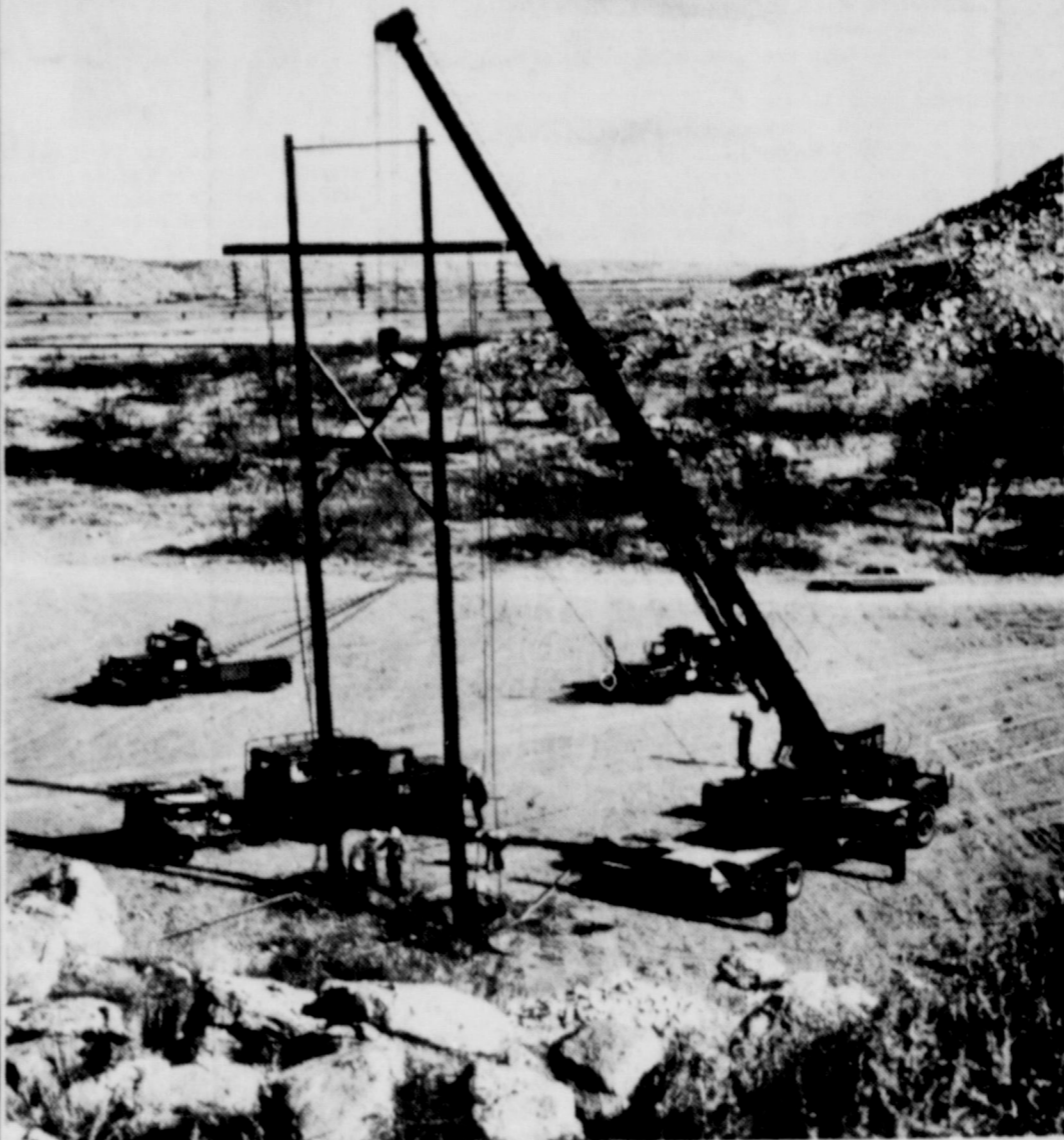
## Foster Speaks To Rotarians

A classification talk on the "Insurance Industry" was presented by Ronnie Foster during the regular meeting of the Slaton Rotary Club Dec. 30 at the County Clubhouse.

Foster, local agent for Massachusetts Mutual, reported that \$89.5 billion in life insurance was sold during 1965. Payments made on life insurance policies totaled more than \$10 billion at the same time.

The speaker also pointed out a little-known fact that some 400,000 persons were unable to qualify for life insurance during the year's period. Foster's company ranks as one of the 10 largest in the nation.

## Rural Housing Loan Program Outlined

Farmers Home Administration is now accepting loan applications from rural families who need to improve their housing.

Ralph E. Griffiths, the agency's County Supervisor for Lubbock and Crosby Counties, said today.

Funds may be used to finance homes, building sites, and essential farm service buildings. Under the new program private capital will provide the bulk of the funds with the Farmers Home Administration making the loans and guaranteeing the repayments of principal and interest to the investors.

Legislation implementing the new insured loan program was contained in the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965. The Act authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to insure loans totaling \$300 million each year for families in low or moderate income levels. These loans will bear interest at 5 percent.

Additionally, loans bearing 5-3/4 percent interest can be insured for families with incomes above the moderate level.

Mr. Griffiths said that loans are available to families living on farms and in rural areas including towns of 5,500 population to construct, improve, or repair rural homes and related facilities, or farm ser-

vice buildings, or to provide water for farmstead and household use.

Families needing credit to improve their present housing may use loan funds to add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens, and other home improvements, as well as to enlarge or remodel farm service buildings and put in related facilities such as yard fences, driveways and sidewalks.

A farmer may borrow funds to provide buildings for his use or for the use of his tenants

and laborers. A rural resident may use loan funds to buy a previously occupied house, or to buy a site on which to build his home, or to build or repair a home on land he owns.

Insured rural housing loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain the required credit from other sources.

Further information on insured rural housing loans may be obtained at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration located in Room 107, Federal Office Building, 1616 19th Street, Lubbock or in the basement of the Courthouse, Crosbyton.

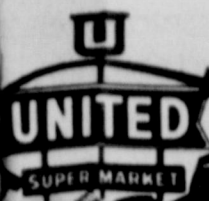

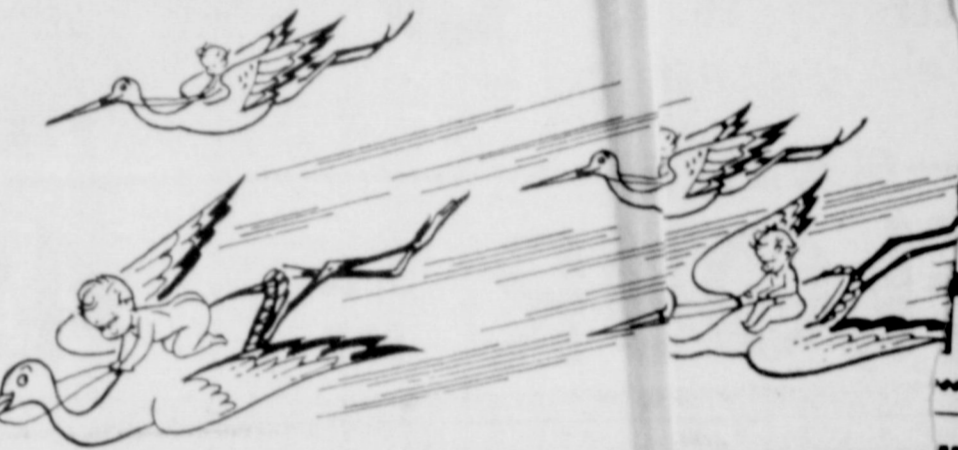

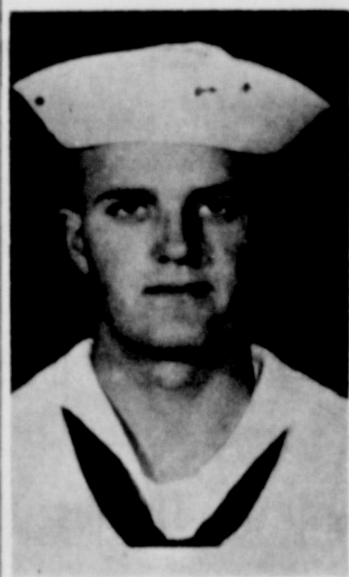
