MEXICAN CORN BREAD

- 2 eggs
- 1 t. salt
- 1 t. soda
- 1 c. corn meal
- 1 small can creamed corn
- 1 small can Ortega chili peppers, chopped
- 1 c. grated longhorn cheese

Mix all ingredients except cheese. Pour 1/2 of batter in well greased iron (heavy) skillet. Sprinkle on the grated cheese; then pour on the rest of the batter. Bake 25 minutes at 400 degrees.

IMITATION APPLE PIE

- 1 1/2 c. sugar
 - 1 1/2 c. water
 - 1 1/2 t. cream tartar
 - 2 T. lemon juice
 - About 18 crackers
- Boll sugar, water, cream tartar and lemon juice for about 3 minutes. Crumble crackers in unbaked pie crust. Pour sugar mixture over; dot with butter and sprinkle with cinnamon. Cover with top crust. Bake at 350 degrees until brown.

New Cotton Bill Provisions Defined

LUBBOCK--Latest reports from Washington on the new cotton program proposed in the omnibus farm bill by Congressman Harold Cooley (D--N.C.) and his House Agriculture Committee still indicate the possibility of its reaching the House floor sometime in August, according to a release from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

And while it is thought that most Congressmen from cotton states will vote against the measure, prevailing opinion holds that the Administration either has or can muster the necessary votes in the House to pass it. Primarily, cotton belt Congressmen oppose the bill as a result of producer opposition to the low loan, direct payments provisions and the virtual certainty it would reduce U.S. cotton production by 30 per cent or more.

A projected analysis of the bill's cotton provisions, contained in Title IV of the omnibus (H.R. 9811), has been made by John Seibert, area extension farm management specialist.

Aimed at defining probable effect on net income to the owner-operator of a High Plains irrigated cotton farm, the analysis assumes:

1. A loan price of 18 cents per pound (based on "average" High Plains grades and staple length);

2. Base cotton allotment of 100 acres;

3. Projected farm yield of 625 pounds lint per acre;

4. A "market price" of 18 cents per pound;

5. Specific production costs of \$80 per acre, and

6. Land retirement costs of \$5 per acre.

Under these conditions, Seibert's figures show a return above specific expenses of \$32.50 per acre for the farmer who elects to disregard the government program and plant all of his land to cotton, as he is permitted to do under the current writing of the bill. He emphasizes, however, that this is based purely on the assumption that cotton produced outside the program would sell for the loan value. It could sell for less; it could be more, depending on many unpredictable factors.

The other three choices which would be open to a cotton producer show a return above specific expenses of (a) \$86.20 per acre of cotton if the farmer planted 85 per cent of his 100 acre allotment, (b) \$101.46 per acre of cotton if he plants only 75 per cent, and (c) \$121.40 per

acre if he plants only his domestic allotment, 65 per cent.

Seibert points out that this projection is based on proposals in the "Cooley Bill" as it was reported from committee, and that any change of its provisions could render the figures obsolete.

To make the complete analysis available to farmers in the area, Seibert has mailed a copy to all County Agents.

County Logs 36 June Accidents

The Highway Patrol investigated 36 rural traffic accidents in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sgt. C.C. Guthrie, patrol supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for 13 injuries and an estimated property damage in the amount of \$28,940.

The rural traffic accident summary in Lubbock County for the first six months of 1965 shows a total of 189 crashes resulting in 6 persons killed, 128 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$154,270.

"As of the first of this month, there had been a total of 1,040 fatal crashes in Texas taking lives of 1,261 persons," the sergeant stated. This is approximately two percent less than for the same period of 1964; however, if past trends continue we will in all probability exceed the all time record high of 3,006 persons killed in traffic crashes experienced in Texas last year, added the sergeant. Texas was fortunate over the 4th of July weekend in that the predicted number of persons were not killed, but we cannot brag, as 25 persons were killed over the holiday while in the rest of the nation we experienced a great increase over last year, and set a new all time record for deaths over the 4th of July holiday just as we did during the previous Memorial Day holiday.

The veteran patrol supervisor concluded that with the vacation season well underway more vehicles will be traveling streets and highways, and he called on all motorists to become more thoughtful in regard to complying with traffic laws in an effort to reduce the rising trend of traffic crashes.

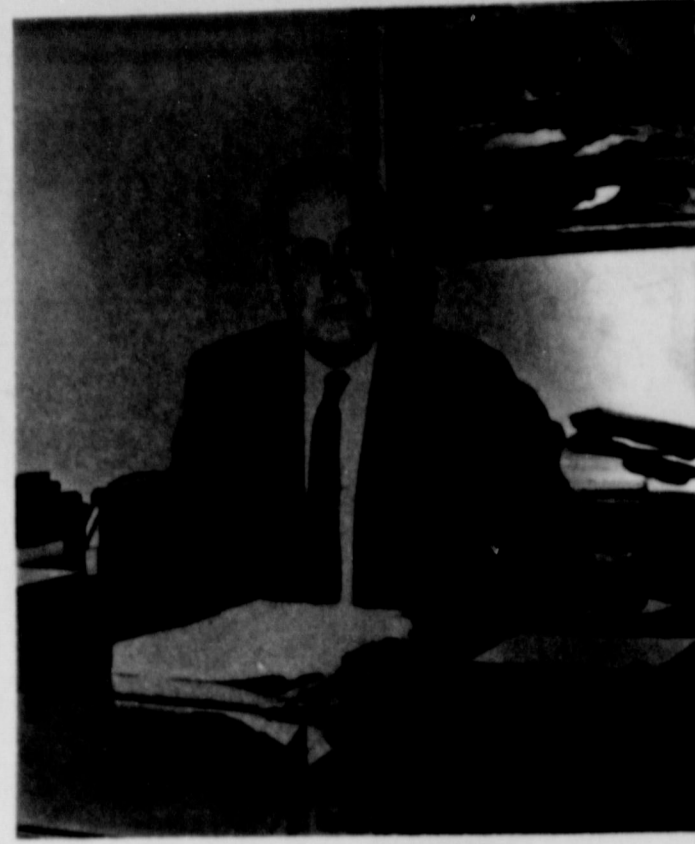

All students residing in the Slaton Public attending grade 9 this year must choose Slaton High School or the Evans School. No student is permitted to attend school in this grade area a choice.

This choice is granted to you and your principal or other school official is permitted to, or make recommendations or other your decision. No child will be favored because of the choice made. The right to be granted every year to all students in this grade. No choice will be denied for any reason.

Bus transportation will be provided on basis to the school you choose. There will be no charge for transportation based on race, color, or national origin or in the assignment of teachers and other members.

Forms for indicating a choice of school grade have already been distributed to all pupils. Any pupil whether or not he has already submitted a choice form may obtain a new choice form. Forms will be available at the Superintendent of Schools or at any school on any weekday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. the period July 20 to August 30, 1965. Forms may be returned by mail or otherwise to the Superintendent of Schools or to the office of the Superintendent at any time prior to August 30, 1965. Any choice on that date will be deemed acceptable.

Any pupil assigned to any school grades be transferred to any other school in the grade he is eligible to enter in the year signed by his parent or guardian, and available at the office of the Superintendent of Schools or at any school office between July 20 and August 30, 1965. The request for transfer may be submitted by mail or otherwise to the Superintendent of Schools or to the office of the Superintendent at any time prior to August 30, 1965. No request for transfer is refused except where the number of pupils in overcrowding. In that event preference to those requesting transfer who live in the school chosen.
