



Sanford Dam has been com pleted; the pipeline installation is nearing Slaton, and Wilson is scheduled to get some of the Canadian River water.

These were important news announcements this week concerning the Canadian River pro ject.

Sen Ralph Yarborough announced this week that he had been informed by Sec. of the Interior Stewart L. Udall that construction has been completed on Sanford Dam, key feature of the Bureau of Reclam ation's Canadian River project about 40 miles northeast of Amarillo.

In addition, the Interior Department revealed that savings on two items have resulted in a \$14 million reduction from the original cost extimate.

The Lamesa city council has gone on record as being in favor of a proposal to grant permission for Wilson to tie on to the Canadian River line. The proposal provides that Wilson use part of Lamesa's quota Apparently final approval must come from the CRMWA. Officials at Wilson say the proposal calls for a line 3 1/2 to 4 miles west of town with a six-inch line delivering water into Wilson. Construction savings on two items have resulted in a \$14 million curtailment from the original cost, according to an announcement made this week by the Interior Department.

These wrecks accounted for 13 injuries and an estimated property damage in the amount of \$28,940.


