WEEK PROGRAM UNDERWAY

Project Head Start Draws 50

HEAD START for the youngsters in Slaton was launched last week at the Slaton School, with 50 youngsters in the program.

The program is a week-long summer program of health, social and eye care, field trips and other activities.

The program is for all pre-school children, regardless of their economic status, who will be entering school in September. The program is financed by the federal government and the Slaton School District.

Children are given a physical examination, dental check-up, eye examination, and a hearing test. They also receive a vision screening and a tuberculin test.

The program is directed by Mrs. C. B. Allen, school nurse.

The project and has the assistance of volunteer teachers and helpers. The Federal Government finances the greater part of the program—90 percent, with the remaining 10 percent paid by the community. The latter constitutes furnishing the place and buildings for conducting classes, this being furnished by the Slaton Schools as their part of the program.

Teachers who are instructing the project took part in two weeks of intensive orientation in child development at the trainee center in the Home Economics building at Texas Tech before the program opened.

All children who are enrolled for this program are given DPT, polio vaccine (oral) and small-pox shots; they are measured and weighed so that their growth and development may be compared to that of a normal child; they receive the Heaf Tuberculin test and a Maco Audiometer hearing test. These two will be given by Mrs. Grace Dodson, RN, school nurse.

In addition, children are given a vision screening test by the Keystone Tebinocular vision testing apparatus, furnished through the courtesy of the Lubbock County Optometric Society. Each one will receive a

physical from one of the local doctors, including a test of heart, lungs, etc. A dental examination of each child will be made through the courtesy of the local dentists, and glasses will be furnished to all who need them. Any other abnormalities will be taken care of, such as orthopedic handicaps and the like. A complete history will be recorded of each child.

A mid-morning snack is served, and everyone receives a free lunch at noon.

Teachers at the Evans School project include Mrs. Q. B. Allen, Mrs. Ethel Daniels, Mrs. Lajoyce Flanagan, and Mrs. Creola Freeman Nelise Secrett is serving as custodian.

Mrs. Hester Moore, county health nurse, representing the City-County Health Department, is in charge of the immunization program, assisted by Mrs. Dodson.

More Than 300 Exes In Slaton For Homecoming

More than 300 ex-students of Slaton High School met Saturday for their 1965 homecoming and reunion, and to hear an address by the guest speaker, Gen. Ben A. Schriever, commander of the Air Force Systems Command, Washington, D.C., and a former student in the Slaton Schools.

In comparing the years 1911 and 1965, he said, "Speed has multiplied many times. As a result," he added, "the world had grown smaller." Defense responsibilities, he said, go beyond national boundaries, and we need both "will and determination."

"We're living in a new world now," he said, "and we

need the spirit of positive patriotism. I'd like to see more of Texas patriotism all over this country."

Bill Klattenhoff, president of the Ex-Students Association, was in charge of the program, and was presented a trophy "in appreciation of service" by Louie Welch, Houston mayor and master of ceremonies.

Special recognition was given of teachers, superintendents and school trustees who served in the Slaton Schools between 1911 and 1920.

Rev. Milton Jochetz gave the invocation and the welcome was given by Clark Self, Sr. Singing was directed by Wayne Liles with Frances Harlan Wright, pianist, as accompanist, Dana Heaton presented a vocal solo.

During the business meeting which was held following the program, new officers for the association were elected. They include Clark Self, Sr., president; Bill Ball, vice-president; and Mrs. Bob Kern, secretary-treasurer.

A proposal for the establishment of a scholarship fund was approved by the association, and Howard Hoffman was appointed as chairman of a committee to study the project.

AT LIONS CLUB MEET City Administrator Discusses Paving

Club Tuesday at noon. Baker defended the commission's action in including some blocks in the paving program despite opposition by a number of property owners.

Referring to Dayton and Geneva streets, Baker said engineers felt the streets were very vital in the paving program because of drainage problems. "This will be beneficial to the entire city," he added.

While some oppose the paving program, Baker pointed out that the city had picked up 12 to 15 blocks not originally included. Property owners have since requested the streets be added.

Baker also pointed out that the city cannot obtain a valid lien against homestead property. If the homestead owner does not want the paving, the city might not receive payment until the property changes hands. The city guaranteed the contractor \$10,000 on homestead property, assuming liens up to that amount if necessary.

The paving program is expected to be complete by Sept. 1, Baker told the Lions.

Baker said it was too early to determine if the summer irrigation rate would generate enough revenue to make the move feasible. It affects only those users whose bill is over the \$12.70 mark each month. The overall average monthly bill in Slaton is a little more than \$8, Baker said.

The city administrator explained that some 36 blocks are included in the street repair project now underway. He said the city hopes to budget street repair funds in coming years.

Lee Bednarz, 28, was the lucky winner of last week's final contest being held by the Slatonite and its staff.

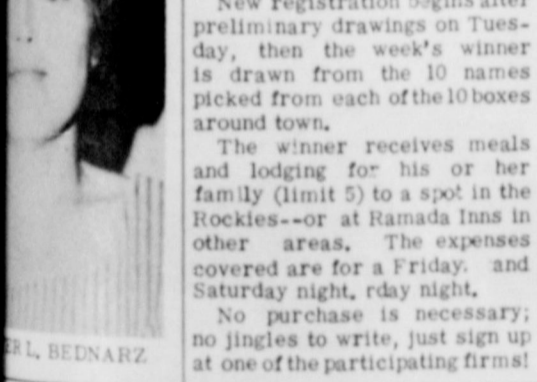

Voters in Slaton's Ward 1 will make a choice Monday between two men in a special election to fill the vacated seat of city commissioner from the southwest portion of the city.

Candidates for the post are J. W. (Curly) Martindale and W. G. (Jerry) McCook. They are seeking election for the commission post which was vacated by Clark Self Jr. Absentee voting ends today, and none had been cast up to noon Wednesday.

The special election, which is open only to qualified voters in the Ward 1 area, will be conducted from the junior high school building. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Ballots will be canvassed during a regular city commission meeting Monday night, according to Mayor Jonas Cain.

Self, elected to the Ward 1 seat in April, resigned June 14. In his letter of resignation, Self said the increasing amount of time required for the job and the decreasing amount of time he had for his business were prime reasons for the decision.

Martindale, the first to file, owns and operates a service station. He is presently serving on the school board and was an unsuccessful candidate for mayor last April. He and his wife have four daughters.

McCook, a division lineman for Santa Fe, is seeking political office for the first time. He and his wife, Marie, have two daughters and a son.

City Observes Safe Holiday Weekend

With the Fourth of July weekend behind, the Slaton Police Department was glad to report only one wreck over the weekend and no injuries.

The one wreck was Sunday afternoon on 9th St. and Highway 400 where the State Highway Park is located. Brenda Kaye Dunlap, 455 W. Edwards, who was driving a 1961 Chrysler, was involved in a collision when she made a turn into the road park. Approximate damage to her car was \$160.

Driving the other car was George David Dabbs, Rt. 2, Post. His 1964 Pontiac had damages estimated at \$675. Dabbs received a ticket for following too close, and Miss Dunlap received a ticket for improper right turn and driving without the proper driver's license.

But, believe me, the way Dixie does it, this is a full time job, and I can see why there is no time left for hobbies. With three sons at home, they keep her pretty busy.

The Bownds not only have three sons but also a lovely married daughter, Mrs. Wendell Brieger. Too, Dixie is quick to talk about a grandbaby that is on the way and expected sometime in October. The baby will be the first great grandchild on the Bownds side of the family.

The sons that take so much of their mother's time are Larry, 16-year-old who will be a senior at SHS this fall. His biggest interest seems to be football and girls (not that they go together). You can always spot Truett and Dixie somewhere in the stands during football season, even the out of town games. Larry is their 11-year-old who will be in the seventh grade in September. Listed below is the recipe Dixie is sharing with the readers this week.

BLUEBERRY COFFEE CAKE
1 cup milk
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup warm water (105 to 115°)
1 pkg. active dry yeast
4 eggs
5 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 cup fresh, canned or thawed frozen and drained blueberries

GLAZE
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
1 tablespoon milk

In small saucepan, heat milk until bubbles form around edge of pan. Remove from heat. Add granulated sugar, salt, and butter, stirring until butter is melted. Let cool to lukewarm. If possible, check temperature of warm water with thermometer. Sprinkle yeast over warm water in large bowl of electric mixer; stir to dissolve. Add milk mixture, eggs, and 4 cups flour. With mixer at medium speed, beat until smooth—about 2 minutes. Add the remaining flour; beat with wooden spoon until the batter is smooth.

Cover bowl with waxed paper and damp towel. Let rise in warm place (85°), free from drafts, to within 1 inch of top of bowl—about 1 hour. Meanwhile, grease well a 10-by-4 inch tube pan.

Beat batter vigorously with wooden spoon 30 seconds. Add blueberries, mix until well combined. Turn batter into pre-

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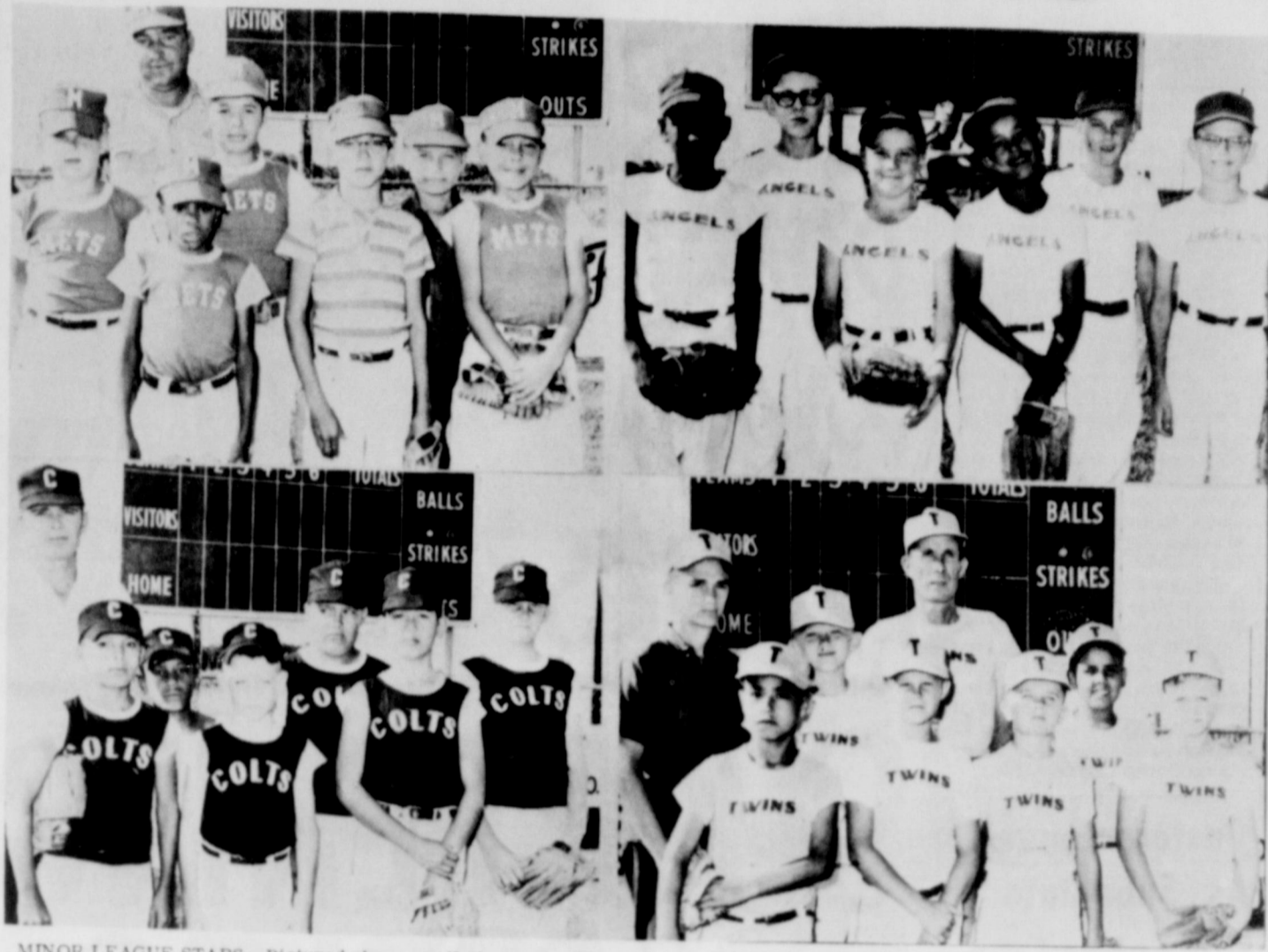

Insect Survey Teams At Work In Area Counties

LUBBOCK--Cotton farmers who have noticed two or three strangers wandering through their fields are probably seeing insect survey teams checking for boll weevil infestations.

The USDA's Plant Pest Control office here says teams are currently working off the caprock in Briscoe, Hall, Motley, Dickens, Kent, Garza and Crosby counties.

In early July the teams will begin surveys above the caprock and Floyd County will be included in the survey.

The survey teams mark fields with small white flags and then report the infestation to either the farm operator or the county agent.

Extension Entomologist Don Rummel says purpose of the surveys is to keep a close check on infestations so farmers can carry out adequate control measures.

The surveys will also be used to establish boundaries for the fall diapause control program. Survey teams, in another project, are working in 30 counties of the Rolling Plains area. They operate through a joint project of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Castors Serve As Substitute For Cotton Crop

LUBBOCK-- Castors can serve as a substitute crop when it gets late in the planting season and the farmer still does not have a cotton crop.

That is a comment from Dr. Raymond Brigham, USDA agronomist in charge of Castor studies at the South Plains Research and Extension Center here.

Brigham suggests the Lynn variety for late plantings. However, the Hale variety will probably give good yields when planted as late as June 22 or 23, he said.

Tests at the research center indicate Lynn will out perform most later maturing varieties when they are both planted after mid-June and the first killing frost date is average.

In 1963, the Lynn variety planted on June 18 produced 2,000 pounds per acre. And in 1964, a Lynn test planted June 16 produced 2,400 pounds per acre. Other popular medium-late maturity varieties planted in mid-June in 1964 produced only an average of 1,600 pounds per acre, Brigham said.

Contract price of Castors at local delivery points in recent years has been 5-cents per pound on a clean seed basis, Brigham said plenty of seed should be available through processors.

HOUSING CREDIT AVAILABLE TO RURAL SENIOR CITIZENS

Elderly people, if they live in rural areas, need not give up the idea of building, buying or repairing their homes on credit.

This word comes from Ralph E. Griffiths, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, serving Lubbock and Crosby Counties.

Griffiths said citizens who are 62-years and over, living in a rural community of 2,500 or less, may be eligible for a 33-year loan bearing 4 percent interest to buy an older home or build a new one.

The FHA supervisor said elderly residents may also be eligible for smaller loans for home repairs.

He pointed out the increasing demand in small towns for rental units designed to meet the housing needs of older folks.

The Farmers Home Administration can loan direct funds to non-profit organization for construction of senior citizen rental housing units designed for independent living.

Funds for construction of senior citizen rental housing units may also be provided by private investors with FHA guaranteeing repayment.

This fiscal year through April 30 Farmers Home Administration has advanced \$5,586,876 to senior citizens for construction, buying and repairing of individual homes. The total loaned is up 17 percent over a

similar period last fiscal year. Over 1,200 elderly people in the 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands were able to get loans for new or improved housing through the senior citizen rural housing program of Farmers Home Administration.

Another \$1,248,510 was advanced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture agency for the construction of rental housing units for senior citizens during the same period, July 1, 1964 through April 30, 1965.

"Farmers Home Administration's senior citizens housing loan program offers citizens, 62-years and older, an opportunity to have housing suited to their needs in the community in which they have spent their working years," Griffiths said. "This program also stimulates the local economy by providing jobs for workers engaged in the construction industry and customers for local trades and services."

In 1962 Congress authorized Farmers Home Administration to make direct loans and insured loans to individuals and corporations to finance rental housing for the elderly.

FHA direct loans for senior citizen rental housing in rural communities bear 3.75 percent interest, with up to 50 years for repayment.

But loans insured by the agency for rental housing cur-

Research Aid To Irrigation

LUBBOCK-- Cotton Irrigation research at the South Plains Research and Extension Center here gives clues to the most effective use of limited irrigation water.

Shelby Newman, who heads cotton irrigation studies at the center, says their work substantiates the theory that "timing is more important than the total amount of water."

"Wait until the first white blooms appear before making the first irrigation," Newman says. "The only exception to this rule is with early maturing cotton. It sometimes pays to water early maturing cotton slightly before the first white bloom stage."

Research shows that the most profitable irrigation schedule for the High Plains is a combination of one four-to-six inch preplant application, one four-inch application when the first white blooms appear and another four-inch application a bout the time of peak blooming. If one summer irrigation is
