# City Renews Utility Franchise

City commissioners Monday night approved on first reading an ordinance to renew Southwestern Public Service's franchise for 20 years, thus paving the way for a new office building for Slaton.

The unanimous vote came on a motion by J. W. (Curly) Martindale and seconded by Earl Reasoner. Commissioners Jack Smith and Robert Banks were not present.

Commissioners spent more than an hour discussing the proposed 20-year contract which gives SWPS the right to operate as a public utility inside the city.

Commissioners went into an executive session for five minutes before emerging with their decision to renew the franchise. Commissioner Reasoner asked for the meeting which occurred behind closed doors in Mayor Jonas Cain's office.

A second reading is required at the regular Nov. 8 meeting before the new contract is officially adopted.

SWPS's present contract with the city does not terminate until 1970. However, the company asked for the new contract in order that a new building could be constructed.

Carroll McDonald, service company district manager, said his company has given approval for the new office which would include a community room which would be made available to Slaton's 32 civic and service organizations.

At the last meeting Oct. 11, McDonald had presented a proposal for a 30-year renewal and Reasoner had asked for the contract to be changed to 20 years.

McDonald showed preliminary plans of the future building to the commissioners Monday night. He said the company plans to furnish the building with all new fixtures.

Also, a local builder is negotiating with the city for the purchase of city property near the fire station for the location of the new structure.

McDonald pointed out that the city would benefit from the sale of the property and by the increase in franchise taxes paid by the company.

Last year, SWPS paid the city \$6,943.95 in ad valorem taxes and \$2,962 in personal property taxes.

Chief of Police Robert Breedlove recommended that the city purchase a speed radar unit. He said the department has been using one during past weeks and he explained that he would like a unit to be used permanently.

Mayor Cain said he was not in favor of buying the item, but rather lease the unit for a period. "In a month or two, people will find out you have it and they will slow down and start driving safe and you won't be giving out any tickets," Cain said.

Briefly, commissioners talked about annexation of property southwest of Slaton along US 84, owned by Harold Wilson. No action was taken.

Three street lights were approved by the commission. Lights will be erected at 14th and Jean, 11th and Division and 13th and Edwards.

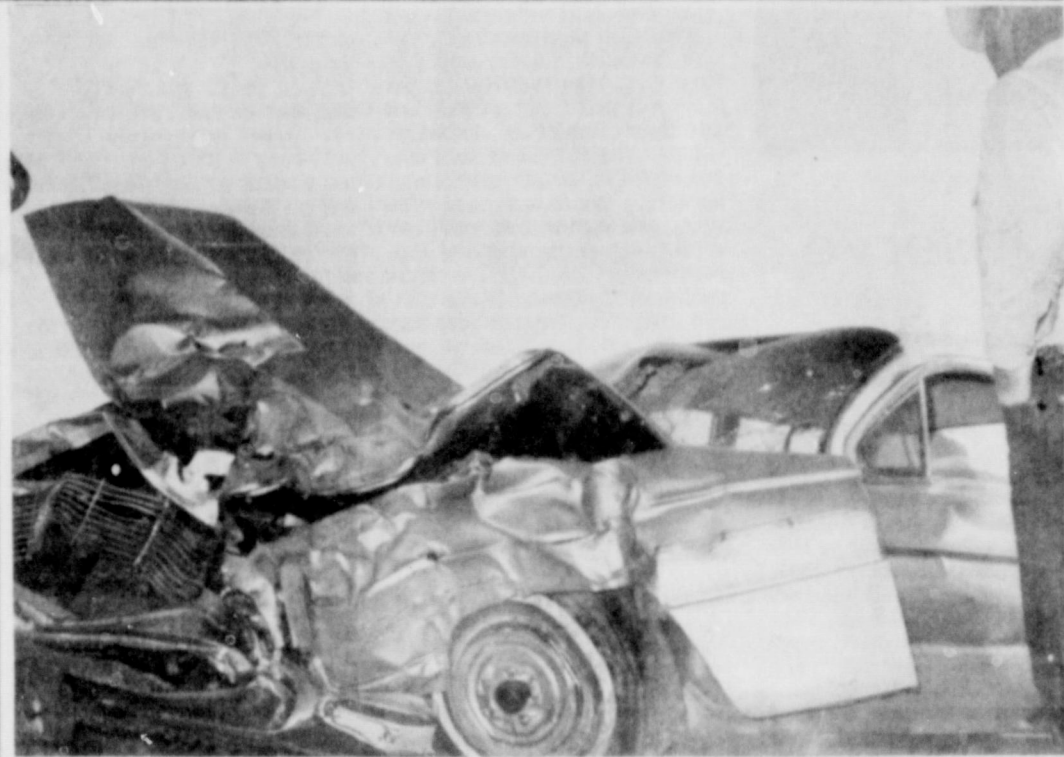
## Tiger Club In Special Meet

# Snyder Woman Killed In Car-Truck Crash Monday

A slate of traffic accidents on Slaton roads Sunday and Monday resulted in the death of one Snyder woman and injury to nine other persons.

Mrs. Sallie Thorn Corbell, 54, died about 6 p.m. Monday in Mercy Hospital as result of a car-truck collision about 45 minutes earlier.

The accident sent two passengers in Mrs. Corbell's vehicle to the hospital with multiple injuries. They were later transferred to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital where the women remained in serious condition.

The injured were Mrs. James Lola Wood, 65, of Hermligh near Snyder, and her daughter, Mrs. Opal Eades, 48, of Snyder. Mrs. Wood suffered multiple facial lacerations and fractures. Mrs. Eades was reported to have suffered scalp

wounds and internal injuries. The driver of the truck, Kenneth Lee Brindle 23, of Lubbock, escaped injury. He was operating a loaded gravel truck owned by Lubbock Cement and Supply Co.

The accident occurred about 5:15 p.m. at the intersection of U.S. 84 and FM 2150, southeast of Slaton just at the city limits. Investigating Patrolman Gene Carpenter said the truck was traveling west, entering US 84 and the car was entering the bypass from the farm road. The collision crashed the late model car into road signs in the media.

The women were rushed to the Slaton hospital by a Williams Funeral Home ambulance and by an emergency unit of the Slaton fire department.

Mrs. Corbell's body was transferred to Bell-Seale Funeral Home in Snyder.

The fatality was prefaced by two accidents occurring within three hours apart Sunday. The first mishap was at 5:07 p.m. at US 84 and FM 41.

A truck driven by George R. Woffenden of Galveston was in

collision with a pickup driven by A. D. Robertson of Lubbock. Robertson was taken to Mercy Hospital where he was treated and released. Woffenden was not injured. No citations were issued, according to the Slaton police department.

Five Latin Americans were hospitalized following a one-car mishap at FM 41 and U.S. 84. Witnesses told officers the car was traveling at a high

## CROW REVEALS NEW BUILDING PLANS HERE

A groundbreaking ceremony for one of Slaton's "largest retail establishments ever built" is scheduled here next Wednesday morning, according to an announcement this week from Don Crow Chevrolet Co.

In revealing plans for the construction of the new facility, Don Crow said a number of special guests have been invited to participate in the groundbreaking ceremonies beginning at 11 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 3.

On hand for the event will be several Chevrolet executives, Mayor Jonas Cain, chamber of commerce officials, and other community leaders and interested persons.

Site of the new Crow Chevrolet plant will be at the intersection of US-84 bypass and FM Road 41 west of town. The building will be on the northwest corner of the intersection, with almost three acres of land to be developed.

When completed, said Crow, "it will be one of the most modern, up-to-date automobile facilities on the entire South Plains." Cost of the project is in excess of \$150,000, he added.

The new building will be of steel framework and masonry walls and will cover some 18,536 square feet of space. Completion is slated for February, 1966. General contractor is Norman Igo of Lubbock.

## STREET SIGN PLAN AIRED

An appeal to community organizations to participate in a street marker project was issued by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce this week.

Directors agreed there was a definite need for more street markers in the city, and they recently decided to contact civic, service and ladies organizations to determine if there was enough interest for a community-wide project.

Letters have now been mailed to club leaders to ask their consideration in such a program. The city is expected to furnish pipe-stands for the street signs and to do the installation work. Cost of the markers is estimated at \$12,500 each.

## Two New Foes On '66 Slate

With three disappointing defeats behind them, Slaton's Tigers take a breather this week, but two other high school squads will be in action tonight.

The Tiger freshmen play Post here in a game set for 6:30 p.m., while the Tiger junior varsity travels to Crosbyton for a B-team game starting at 7 p.m.

Coach Neal Chastain's crew won't be getting a big rest since they'll be regrouping forces in an effort to get mentally and physically ready for the big Homecoming battle with Post here Nov. 5.

With a 3-5 season mark, the Tigers also hope to win their last two outings and gain at least an even break for the year. The Tigers travel to Morton Nov. 12 for the final game of the season.

Coach Chastain reported a spirited drill Tuesday. Two players -- Tommy Donaldson and Roy Green -- missed the workouts early this week due to injuries. Halfback Victor Cristan was also slowed by an aggravated ankle injury.

In another announcement at the Tiger Club meeting Monday night, Chastain reported the 1966 grid schedule had been set following a District 4-AA session last week. Slaton will

pick up two new foes next season. Springlake, a Class A grid power, and Stanton--a new district member, are the new opponents. They will replace Lockney and O'Donnell from this year's slate of games. Stanton, located about 45 miles south of Lamesa, was added to District 4-AA in the recent realignment by the University Interscholastic League.

Another change by the UIL sets the AA starting date a week later, leaving no room for an open date. The changes make it hard for some teams to schedule games, according to Chastain.

In order to keep Crosbyton on the Tiger slate, it was necessary to arrange a switch in dates with them and Tahoka. Next year, Slaton will play Crosbyton in the third game and Tahoka in the fourth contest.

Slaton will have a 5-5 home and away schedule next season. The schedule appears set this way: Sept. 9--Petersburg there, Sept. 16--Idaleu there, Sept. 23 --Crosbyton here, Sept. 30--Tahoka here, Oct. 7--Springlake here, Oct. 14--Denver City there, Oct. 21--Frenship here, Oct. 28--Stanton there, Nov. 4--Post there, Nov. 11--Morton here.

# Amendment Vote Slated Tuesday

Texas electorate decide the fate of 10 constitutional amendments Tuesday when they go to the polls in what is predicted to be an average turnout.

The proposals represent the largest number of amendments to face Texas voters on one ballot since the Constitution was adopted in 1876. Today is the last day to vote absentee.

The 10 questions are a group of 27 proposals to be voted on this year and next. The measures were presented by the 59th Legislature. The first proposal to increase the size of the state senate to 39 from 31 was defeated Sept. 7.

In Slaton, three polling places have been established for local voting. Generally, voters in northwest Slaton will vote at the Slaton Clubhouse, box 36

with Phil Brewer as election judge. Box 37 is for persons in East Slaton and the box is located at Stephen F. Austin School. Election judge is Charlie Whalen.

Wayne Liles is election judge at box 38, located at West Ward Elementary School. Proposals to be determined are:

1. Increasing state ad valorem by five cents on \$100 valuation for building construction for state colleges and universities;
2. Authorizing an increase of \$200 million in bonds for loans to veterans to buy land and extending program for eight years;
3. Granting authority to the

The West Ward carnival starts at 5:30 p.m. Friday when the cafeteria opens for business. The games and other excitement starts at 6 p.m. and continues until 9.

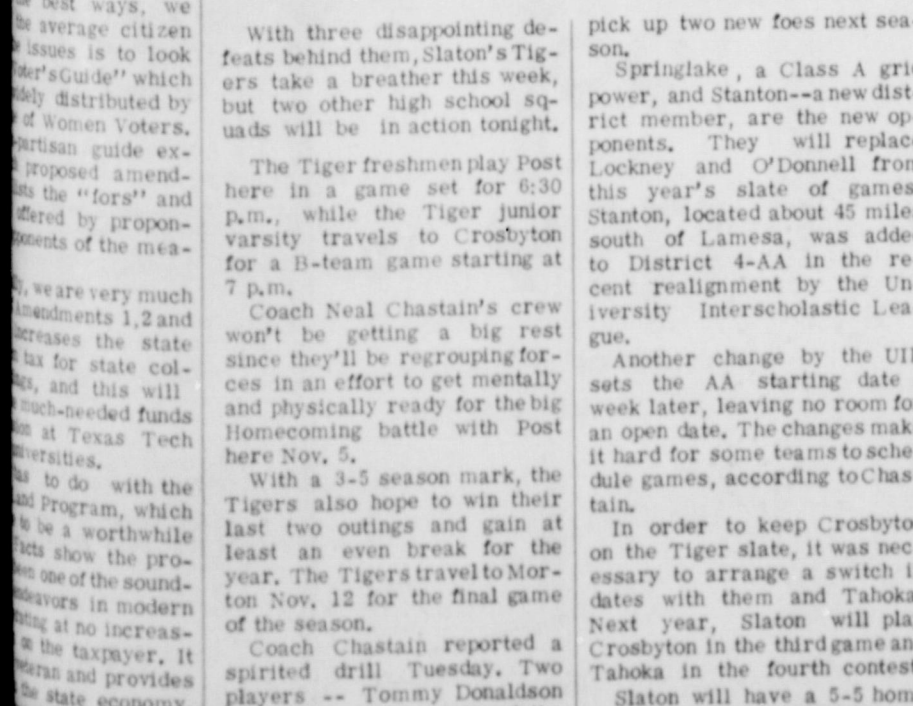

## Recipe Of The Week

Sharing her recipe for strawberry frosting with us this week is Mrs. James Walter of Rt. 2, Slaton. This frosting is good on a plain cake, or any cake of your choice.

Mrs. Walter is a member of the Roosevelt Young Homemakers and enjoys sewing, needlecrafts, and swimming. Her husband farms.

### STRAWBERRY FROSTING

- 2 egg whites, unbeaten
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- Dash of salt
- 5 tablespoons strawberry juice
- 1 1/2 teaspoons light corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 - 10 oz. carton frozen strawberries (defrosted)

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, strawberry juice, and corn syrup in top of double boiler, mixing thoroughly.

Place over rapidly boiling water, beat constantly with rotary egg beater (or at high speed of electric mixer), and cook until the frosting will stand up in peaks.

Remove from boiling water; add vanilla and 10 oz. carton strawberries with juice drained off and beat until thick enough to spread. Makes enough frosting to cover tops and sides of two 9-inch layers, or top and sides of 13x9x2-inch cake, or about 14 large or 2 dozen small cupcakes.

## Low Rent Housing Plan Outlined

Guest speaker for the Slaton Rotary Club Thursday was Ellis Schmid, president of the civic club, who is also chairman of the Slaton Public Housing Authority.

Schmid presented a report on the low-rent housing program which is in progress here, explaining the progress of the project from its inception about nine months ago.

Sen. John Tower and U. S. Rep. George Mahon both sent telegrams two weeks ago announcing that a federal loan of \$903,560 had been approved for construction of 70 low-rent

units here. Sites for the units have been recommended by the local board, and approval is pending with the Public Housing Authority in Fort Worth. Forty of the units have been tabbed for the elderly--persons over 62 years of age.

Schmid said the units would be constructed of masonry and brick veneer and probably be located in the southeast portion of town. He also pointed out

that an annual re-valuation of renters would be compulsory. Earl Wilson was appointed as executive director of the local housing program. After the appointment of the local housing authority, the city government is no longer in the picture, Schmid added.

Rent will be determined on the basis of income and number in the family. Housing will be available only to low income families -- under \$3,000 a year.

## Voter Guides Distributed

Distribution of 5,000 voters guides for the November 2 election is underway this week as a service to Lubbock county citizens by the League of Women Voters of Lubbock. The guides, which have been published by the League of Women Voters of Texas, will contain arguments for and against the proposed 10 amendments to be submitted to the voters in keeping with the non-partisan policy of the League.

The guides will also contain a full explanation of the amendments in order to help voters to become informed before registering their vote.

"We are concerned about the low voter turnout for the September amendment election, where only a handful of Texas voters made the decision," said Mrs. R. J. Burbridge, president of the Lubbock League. "Leagues throughout Texas are redoubling their efforts to encourage citizen participation in the affairs of state government and to remind Texas voters of

the danger of having government by default when so few voters make their wishes known at the polls."

Copies of the guides are available free from the League to voters in the Slaton area and may be picked up at various business places and offices in Slaton.

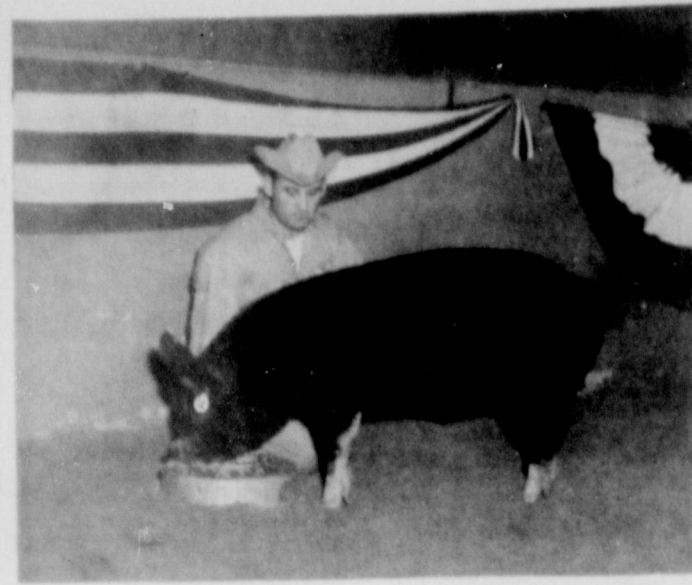

The issuance of bonds to provide loans to college students, and--with the federal loan program--we simply think there are ample means for students to obtain loans. No. 10 provides for 4-year terms for state representatives instead of the present 2-year terms.

We put a question mark on amendment 4, which provides for 4-year terms for the governor and several other high stat. officials. Those who are for the proposal have a good argument in that a longer term is needed for the governor to plan and carry out his policies. Too, he is almost constantly running for office under the 2-year system.

Another question mark in our minds is on amendment 9. This amendment is on disability;

9. Authorizing legislature to set salaries of Lt. Gov. and Speaker of the House, and increasing per diem pay of members of the Legislature from \$12 for 120 days to \$20 for 140 days during regular session and 30 days each special session;

10. Providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives.

**Weather Lowers Cotton Quality**

The rain of Sunday, Oct. 17, slowed cotton harvesting operations the early part of last week and lowered the quality of the cotton classed at the South Plains USDA Classing Offices, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A.

Samples received at the three U.S.D.A. Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa declined sharply last week but were expected to increase over the week-end as stripping operations increase.

The three South Plains Classing Offices classed 10,400 samples during the week ending Friday, October 22nd. This brought the season's total for the three offices to 27,200. At this date last year the three offices had classed 55,100 samples.

Approximately three-fourths of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office last week was in the white grades and the remaining one-fourth in the Light Spotted and Spotted grades.

Strict Middling made up 13 per cent of all cotton classed last week, Middling 46 per cent, Strict Low Middling 9 per cent, Strict Middling Light Spotted 6 per cent and Middling Light Spotted 18 per cent.

Average staple length declined slightly during the week but continued to average slightly better than 1 inch. Sixty-three per cent averaged .1 inch and better compared to 67 per cent the previous week.

Micronaire readings continued to be very good. Eighty-nine per cent of all cotton "miked" in the Lubbock Office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 90 per cent was in this category.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported continued light trading in the new crop cotton. Average prices for the most predominant qualities were: Strict Middling 1-1/32 - 29.45, Strict Middling 1-1/32 - 30.35, Middling 31/32 - 28.30, Middling 1 inch - 29.15, Middling 1-1/32 - 30.00, Middling 1-1/16 - 30.70, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 26.70, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 27.

The wrecks accounted for the death of two persons. Eleven were injured and property damage totaled \$23,935.

The accident summary for the county from January through September of 1965 shows a total of 301 crashes. As a result of these mishaps, nine persons have been killed and 179 injured. Estimated property damage has amounted to \$223,235.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$50 per ton.

Mahon will be in Washington early next week to join Texas Tech officials in conferences with federal officials.

**Railroads Pay Big Tax Share**

Current annual taxes paid by Railroads to the various government agencies in Lubbock County totaled \$124,537, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

pair of Roosevelt 4-H club cousins, came away with Blue Ribbons--the highest award given in the Market Steer classes. The first shipment of auto-
mobiles to Santa Fe Railway's
new \$250,000 automobile un-
loading and storage facility at
Amarillo rolled down the prob-
able unloading ramp Oct. 18.

Following a luncheon at the
Holiday Inn West, Mayor F.
V. Wallace, Ford Motor Com-
pany executives from Michigan,
and Santa Fe officials from
Chicago and Amarillo formally
dedicated the new facility locat-
ed on an eight-acre tract of
Santa Fe industrial property
south of 34th street.

According to F. N. Stupp,
Santa Fe general manager at
Amarillo, the facility is for
public use although a portion of
it has been leased by AutoCon-
voy Co. of Dallas. Auto Convoy
is the contract trucking firm
used by the Ford Motor Com-
pany.

"These facilities, which are
the finest and most modern in
the nation, are the first to be
constructed in Amarillo for
loading and unloading vehicles
moving by rail into the city on
multi-level flat cars," he de-
clared. "It is new business for
Santa Fe and marks the be-
ginning of Amarillo as a distri-
bution center by rail for new
automobiles and other vehi-
cles."

Construction of the public
automobile unloading and stor-
age facility included the reloca-
tion of 3,600 feet of existing
railroad serving the King Elev-
ator on the south; the construc-
tion of 3,660 feet of new
trackage to serve the unloading
docks; installation of 3,280 feet
of power line, 1,305 feet of two
inch gas line, and 1,730 feet of
sewer and water line. Approxi-
mately 33,000 square yards of
the area have been paved, in-
cluding access streets. The en-
tire area is lighted for work
at night and surrounded by a
six foot high chain link secur-
ity fence with gates.

A 20' x 20' prefabricated of-
fice building is located at the
back of the lot. The area also
includes the installation of one
auto loading ramp and two com-
bination bi-level movable un-
loading ramps.

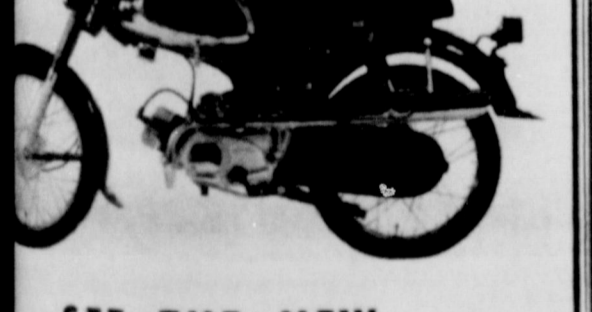

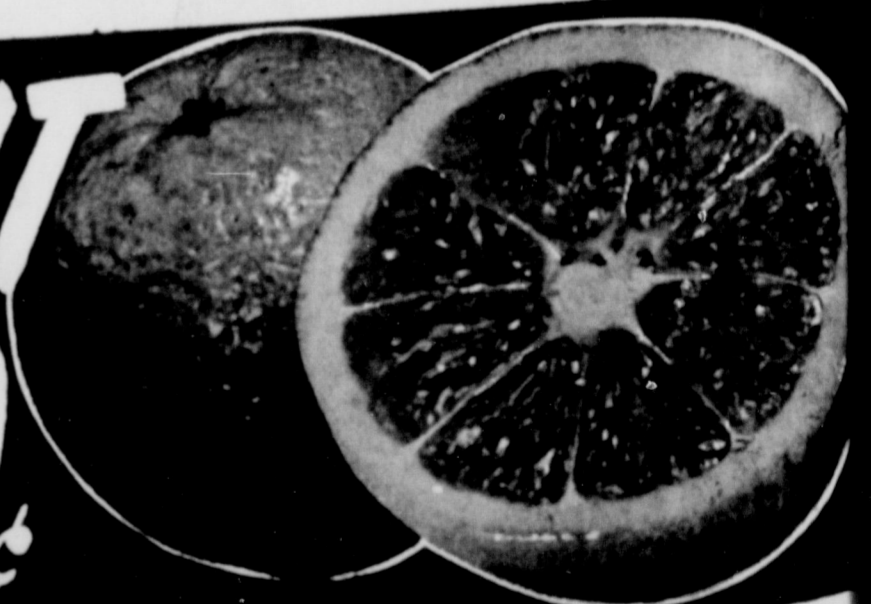

# Cooper Downs New Home, 22-6

Junior halfback Eddie Hickman stepped into the limelight Friday night to lead the Cooper Pirates past the New Home Leopards, 22-6, for a District 3-B opening game victory.

In a tremendous team effort, Hickman paced the pack with 125 yards rushing. It was the first time this season that the 195-pound junior had rushed past the century mark.

And when Hickman wasn't carrying the pigskin, he put on an outstanding blocking performance. Other standouts blocking were Frank Wolf, Gordon Kitten and Gary Wimmer.

Fullback Roy Peterson exploded in the second half to gain 109 yards total through the line. New Home defenders keyed off halfback David Kahlich and bottled him up for only 24 yards during the night.

Kahlich, a proven breakaway threat, is one of the leading rushers and scorers on the South Plains.

The first quarter went scoreless despite Cooper moving past the Leopards' 10-yard line two times. The first drive ended on the one-yard line and minutes later another drive ended on the 12 after Hickman was thrown for a loss.

Early in the second period, New Home quarterback David Turner's pass was intercepted by Larry Schneider who managed to get back to the 35.

It took 16 plays to move the ball 65 yards for the score with 47 seconds remaining in the half. The drive started as Hickman carried for six and Schneider was stopped on a keeper for no gain. Peterson added the first down with a four-yard carry up the middle.

Hickman went off tackle for five yards and Peterson chalked up another first with a six-

yard ramble. Hickman managed two and Peterson broke lose for 11 yards and another first. Hickman went off tackle for four yards and Peterson plowed up the middle for five. He added one more before Schneider scampered for four.

Hickman took a quick pitch and scampered 13 yards for the longest gain of the drive. Peterson went for four and another first and Hickman went off tackle for seven to place the ball on the one.

Hickman put six points on the board as he crashed into the endzone on a cross. He also ran the extra point for an, 8-0, lead.

On the first play after the kickoff, Gordon Kitten intercepted McClung's pass at the 29 and raced into the endzone as the quarter ended. Peterson's attempt for the extra point fell short.

Cooper scored again with 3:43 remaining in the third stanza. Peterson drove over center for the points. Hickman ran the conversion and the Pirates led, 22-0.

The touchdown climaxed a 32-yard drive. Cooper had gained good field position on a 29-yard punt return by Schneider.

In the final period, Cooper moved the ball to the 10-yard line before a penalty and two pass incompletions gave the Leopards the ball on the 15.

New Home scored its lone touchdown with nine seconds remaining in the third period. The tally was set up by a pass interception by Turner who returned the ball to the 17 before being caught by Gary Wimmer.

On a fourth and 10 try, Ronnie Unford dropped back to pass and found Turner alone in the endzone. McClung was stopped at the line in his attempt to run the conversion.

**FRENSHIP DOWNS SLATON BY 20-8 SCORE**

**Tigers Upset In District Opener**

Frenship took the game's opening kickoff and marched down the field to take an early 6-0 lead. Slaton bounced back with a 90-yard drive to take an 8-6 lead, but it was the only sustained offensive effort of the night for the red and black Tigers.

The gold and blue Tigers of Frenship took a 14-8 lead at halftime, then scored an insurance tally in the final period. Frenship had the ball for all except two plays in the fourth period, thanks to a roughing-the-kicker penalty and a recovered onside kick.

The questionable call against Slaton for roughing the kicker could well have been the turning point of the game. The Tigers had contained Frenship in the third period and, early in the final stanza, stopped the home town team on their own 45 with a 4th and 13 situation. The 15-yard penalty gave Frenship new life on the Slaton 40, and the winners marched in for the clinching touchdown with only 4:12 left in the game.

Sparked by the running of Van Grady, 170-pound Negro halfback, and the elusive dashes of quarterback Randy Curry, a 125-pound sophomore, Frenship took the opening kickoff and scored in 13 plays.

Curry picked up nine big yards when Frenship faced a 4th and 4 situation at the Slaton 14, then Grady crashed over right tackle from five yards away.

On the second play following the kickoff, quarterback Steve Harlan and center Doug Williams missed connections on a snapback, and the ball sailed back 11 yards before Harlan chased it down.

Disaster struck again on fourth down when Gass fumbled the snap and had to run instead of punting. He got only to the 30-yard line and Frenship took over. The Tigers got tough and held Frenship for downs at the 10-yard line, however.

Gass ripped off right tackle for 14 yards, then little Victor Cristan broke through left tackle and appeared headed all the way. Grady caught up with him and pulled him down on the Frenship 18 after Cristan had chucked up 58 steps.

Gass, Henry Johnson and Cristan managed only six yards in three plays, but Gass blasted for seven on a crucial 4th and 4 situation. With a first down on the 5, Johnson went for three, then Gass knifed over for the score with 9:15 left in the first half. Gass also scored the two-point conversion on a reverse to give Slaton an 8-6 lead.

The hustling Frenship team came fighting back, returning the kickoff to their own 41. Hitting for three to seven yards on each play, the Tigers moved for the 60-yard score in 12 plays. Grady blasted over from the 5 with just 3:07 left in the first half, and Dale Cook ran for two points.

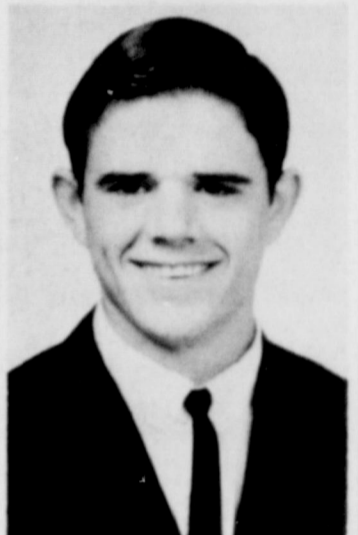

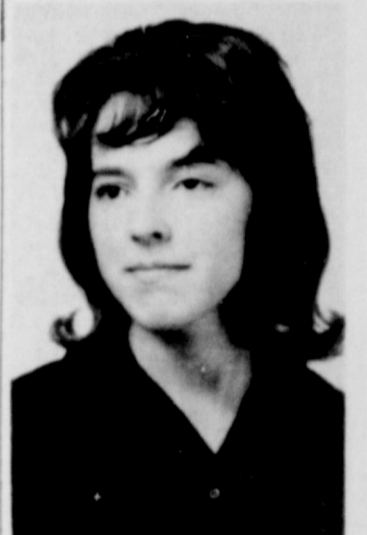

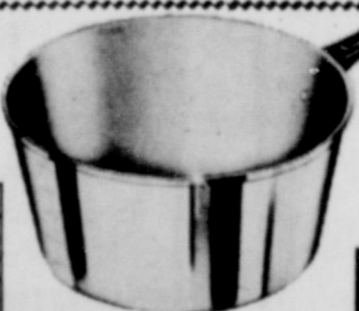
