

MAY BE READY FOR PLAY IN AUGUST

City Golf Course Taking Shape

When will Slaton's municipal golf course be ready for play? Maybe by the latter part of August.

This was the answer City Administrator Wayne Baker gave to Slaton Lions Tuesday when he appeared on the program during the clubs' regular weekly luncheon meeting.

Baker was asked to bring a progress report to the club, and he announced that all greens have been seeded and part of the fairway. Carl Lewis is in charge of the groundwork on the course.

Baker was in on the beginning of the project and directed the installation of the automatic watering system. The course is on city land near the water disposal ponds northeast of town, and water will be no

problem. If all goes well, commented Baker, the golf association hopes to have the course ready for play in August and to hold tournament for the formal opening on the Labor Day weekend. This, of course, depends on the growth of the grass, the weather, and other factors.

The automatic sprinkler system is now in operation, and the nine-hole-links--designed by Bill Ball--is beginning to take shape, Baker pointed out that there is enough land in the canyon to expand to a regulation 18-hole course in the future.

However, installation cost would be higher in the canyon--some estimates running around the \$90,000 figure. The estimated \$50,000 cost for the pre-

sent 9-hole course includes about \$25,000 for the watering system. No clubhouse is included in this figure, and no definite plans have been formulated along this line as yet.

The course will be a municipal links, with golfers simply paying a green fee to play, no membership required. The association also plans to offer monthly and yearly green fees at reduced rates for the avid golfer.

Not only does the golf course have plenty of water for greens and fairways, but excess water has been leased for \$1,600 a year to a nearby farmer, Baker pointed out that the city, as agreed from the start, helped in the construction by providing equipment and machines in working the course. The association paid labor costs, however, using some city employees during their free time.

Dr. Lee Vardy, Bill Ball, Baker and others helped the committee in the planning stages.

Edwards headed the finance committee, which works to underwrite the cost of putting in the course. The city was not in a financial position to do the job, so some 28 men pledged the \$50,000 it was estimated would take to install the links.

The Slaton C of C and Board of City Development donated \$5,000 to launch the project, and a golf association was formed to lease the land from the city and build the course. The association, in return, pledged to return the land--golf course and all--to the city when the course is free of debt.

Boys State is sponsored each year by the American Legion, Department of Texas. The Slaton Legion Post is sponsoring two of the boys going from here while the Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring one through the legion.

A record breaking enrollment has flooded Department Headquarters as the previous record of 718 boys in 1964 was broken.

The 1965 Boys State will be in session from June 5 to June 12 on the Campus of the University of Texas, Lewis E. Emerich, Department Commander, announced.

The American Legion in 49 states will sponsor Boys State throughout the nation where boys have just completed their junior year in high school will study the organization, operation, and political processes of state government. Youths

from all parts of Texas will participate in the organization of political parties, campaigns, elections, and the enactment and enforcement of their own laws within a mythical 51st state.

"Boys State is one of the outstanding youth training programs of the Americanism Commission of the American Legion," Commander Emerich stated. "Not only do the youths learn more about the functions of government but also they see the importance of the role played by each good citizen in discharging his basic citizenship responsibilities. They soon discover how the quality of government is related directly to the active interest of each citizen."

Slaton's Third Priest To Be Ordained Monday

The Rev. Marvin C. Kitten son of Mr. and Mrs. August Kitten of Slaton, is to be ordained to the Roman Catholic priesthood Monday at St. Joseph's Church in Mobile, Ala.

The Slaton native will return with his parents to celebrate his First Solemn Mass the following Sunday, June 13, at 4 p.m. in St. Joseph's Church. Relatives and friends are invited to attend the mass.

Mr. and Mrs. Kitten and other relatives will leave Friday to attend the ordination service in Mobile. Those planning to attend include his parents; Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Kitten, Claude and Linda, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Kitten, Bradley, Karla and Angela; and Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Kitten.

Father Kitten will be the third Slaton man to be ordained into the priesthood in a period of two weeks. Father Clarence R. Buxkemper and Timothy Schwertner were ordained in St. Joseph's Church here last Sunday--marking the first ordination ever held in Slaton and the first local man to enter the priesthood.

While Fathers Buxkemper and Schwertner were ordained as secular priests, Rev. Kitten will be ordained as an order priest. He is a member of the Society of Jesus--an order devoted to work in schools, parishes, retreat houses and seminaries. Thirteen other Southern Jesuits are to be ordained along with Rev. Kitten next week.

Father Kitten is a native of Slaton, having been born here May 13, 1931. He attended St. Joseph's Elementary School and graduated from Cooper High School. He earned his B.S. degree in mathematics from Texas Tech in 1952.

The following year he entered the Jesuit Novitiate at Grand Coteau, La. From 1956 to 1959 he studied philosophy at Spring Hill College in Mobile, Ala., receiving his M.A. in philosophy in 1959.

After that he taught three years at Jesuit High School in New Orleans, before beginning his theological studies at St. Mary's College, St. Marys, Kan., in 1962. He will be a staff member of an Institute for Teachers of high school math this summer in Mobile, and in the fall, will return to his theological studies at St. Mary's College.

Full-Time Dog Catcher Hired

The City of Slaton this week hired a full-time animal warden, hoping to enforce a relatively new dog ordinance and solve a canine problem that has brought numerous complaints from citizens.

Ricky Brush, 20, is the newly-appointed animal warden, according to an announcement from City Administrator Wayne Baker. His appointment was effective Tuesday.

At the same time, City Judge W.H. Legate called for citizens to cooperate in complying with the city ordinance on stray dogs. "They must be penned or on a leash, and not allowed to run wild," the judge pointed out.

Legate also announced that his decision last week on the removal of a dog from the city limits had been changed. On checking with the county attorney, the judge found that Slaton's ordinance was not worded so that a dog could be "removed" from the city.

A dog can be ordered killed but not removed, said the judge. A dog owned by Mickey Swinburn had been ordered removed from the city after a corporation court hearing last week. The dog reportedly had bitten a small boy. Judge Legate said he now has ordered the dog to be caged in an "escape-proof" pen.

The animal warden will operate out of the police department, so any complaints on animals should be called into the police dispatcher. Judge Legate said he thought the employment of the animal warden should aid greatly in the city's dog problems.

MORE RAIN SOAKS AREA

Another beneficial rain fell over most of the Slaton area Sunday night, bringing the May rainfall total to about 2 1/2 inches in the city itself.

Other reports from around the vicinity found most areas recording from 1 to 2.5 inches during the month. An unofficial .60 of an inch was measured in Slaton Sunday night.

The latest moisture came in a slow, gentle fashion amid weather forecasts for turbulent weather, however.

Many Slaton area farmers were ready for some hot, dry weather this week.

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Girls' Summer Program Starts Here Monday

Slaton's Girls' Summer Recreation Program will start next Monday and continue through July 2, it was announced this week by M.W. Kerr, director.

The program is open to all girls 9 through 15 years of age, with May 1 as the determining date on ages. The program will be conducted from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. during the first week, and from 9 a.m. to 12 a.m. the following weeks.

The summer program will be held in the junior high school gymnasium.

There is a \$3 registration fee for each girl. It should be paid at the time of registration, but not later than the time the girl starts in the program. If more than one girl from the same family is registered, the fee is \$2 for each additional girl after the first.

FINANCIAL STUDY REVEALS

Slaton Spends Less Per Pupil

In a recent review and summary of the financial status of the Slaton School District, Supt. Lee Vardy says two important factors show up very clearly: (1) Since 1958-59 the State has increased local requirements by \$41,000; (2) Slaton's expenditure per pupil is less than any other Class AA school in the area.

Dr. Vardy feels that an increase in expenditures of \$25 per pupil, costing an additional \$45,000, should be considered in order that Slaton schools might maintain the type of educational system which the community needs.

The superintendent's study revealed that the majority of like-sized schools in the area spend from \$50 to \$100 per child more than Slaton. One

school district, located in an oil field, spends twice as much per pupil as does Slaton. In only one instance was there a school which spends approximately the same as Slaton.

In explaining the review, Dr. Vardy pointed out that the state establishes the amount of money for the maintenance of the local school. The state, he added, contributes \$41,000 less on the overall budget than it did in 1954-59.

This assignment to the local district is based upon five factors: number of pupils, number of scholastics, state and county evaluation, and production of new products.

This increase in the past seven years has also been due to the increase in school operational costs and the general

rise in the cost of living. The formula is to determine local cost is established by law.

Since the Slaton district has not increased its tax base during this period, said Dr. Vardy, these several factors have developed a reduction in available money for school purposes.

Without a change in the tax base, however, new construction has brought in additional revenue, reducing the \$41,000 difference to \$22,000. On the other hand, increased enrollment and facilities have also developed a drain on local revenue.

School trustees have been studying the financial status of the district for some time. Dr. Vardy's review and report on the situation are presented as a matter of public information.

SLATON MAN NAMED HEAD OF WEST TEXAS MUSEUM

Dr. Francis Earl Green, a Slaton native, will become director of the West Texas Museum at Texas Tech Sept. 1.

The 40-year-old archaeologist will succeed Dr. W.C. Holden, who has been Museum director since its establishment 36 years ago. Dr. Holden has resigned, effective Aug. 31, to devote full time to teaching and research on the Tech history faculty.

Dr. Green is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Green of Slaton. Mr. Green is county commissioner of Green and Precinct 2.

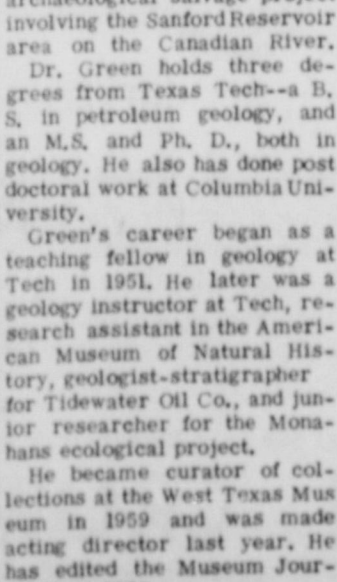
Dr. Green's appointment was announced jointly by Dr. R.C. Goodwin, Tech president, and Robert Snyder, chairman of the Museum Board.

The Slaton man is an authority on the geology, paleontology, and archaeology of the Southern High Plains, with emphasis on the past 50,000 years. In addition to his duties as acting director of the Museum, Dr. Green is carrying on an archaeological salvage project involving the Sanford Reservoir area on the Canadian River.

Dr. Green holds three degrees from Texas Tech--a B.S. in petroleum geology, and an M.S. and Ph. D., both in geology. He also has done post doctoral work at Columbia University.

Green's career began as a teaching fellow in geology at Tech in 1951. He later was a geology instructor at Tech, research assistant in the American Museum of Natural History, geologist-stratigrapher for Tidewater Oil Co., and junior researcher for the Monahans ecological project.

He became curator of collections at the West Texas Museum in 1959 and was made acting director last year. He has edited the Museum Journal since 1963.

SUCH AS 'PEP' PILLS Any Medicine Can Be Abused

Any medicine can be abused. Many medicines if misused or grossly overused can cause serious problems. Abuse of medicine is behind the nationwide problem of goof balls and pep pills. Goof balls are known medically as barbiturates. Pep pills are called amphetamines. These are non-narcotic drugs which serve important purposes in medical treatment. It's their abuse that caused a serious public problem. Amphetamines are abused by those who want to stay awake longer than the body can stand, and by youngsters looking for a lift or kick. The normal feelings of exhaustion and drowsiness are masked. Barbiturates produce an effect of drowsiness and drunkenness, and often a quarrel-

some, hostile disposition. Both types of drugs can be obtained legally only on a doctor's prescription. Most persons who misuse them get their supply through illicit channels. The amphetamines are taken by millions of people under physician's supervision with no improper effects. They are often a part of a weight-control program. One of the astronauts took an amphetamine tablet during his orbit around the earth, an order radioed by a doctor. The barbiturates are depressants, used medically in sleeping pills and to relieve nervous tension and other health problems. There is little risk in either family of drugs in proper amounts under doctor's orders.

The American Medical Association this year testified before a congressional committee support of legislation that would tighten federal controls over manufacture and distribution of barbiturates and amphetamines. At the same time the AMA pointed out that legislation alone may not be the answer. Much misuse is founded on lack of understanding of the serious consequences which may result from abuse of these drugs. The medical organization recommended a widespread program of education among the

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youth of this nation. Goof balls and pep pills are valuable tools in the doctor's armamentarium to deal with a variety of physical ills. Under doctor's orders, there need to be no hesitation in using these medications as prescribed. Used improperly, or abused, these medications can cause very serious health problems, sometimes even death.



ITEM: Latex paints do not blend with oil-based paints. Don't try to tint a latex with colors in oil. Use colors designed for latex paints. Or, ask your paint dealer — there are universal colors suitable for both latex and alkyl finishes.

ITEM: Store pesticides safely — away from the inquisitive eyes and hands of children (both yours and the neighbors). Keep the pesticides in their original containers, closed and well labeled.

ITEM: If a child's clothing shows up against the background in which he is playing, he will be more easily seen. Outer garments in attention-getting colors can give this protection.

Monthly Police Report Released

The monthly Slaton Police Department report showed 24 offenses recorded in May compared to 36 in April. Thirteen of the offenses were cleared during the month.

Jail arrests totaled 46 and drunk charges again topped the list with 18. A total of \$965 in fines was collected compared to \$1,107 for April. Fines amounting to \$200 were laid out in jail. Total deferred judgment bonds amounted to \$543.

Traffic arrest totaled 36 during May compared to 39 in April. A total of \$373 in fines were collected in city court.

City Police investigated four accidents in the month's period compared to nine the previous month. Damages were estimated at \$2,210 in mishaps.

The department logged 5,137 miles while patrolling in two vehicles.

Reports were made on 180 phone calls and incidents that came through the police department for the month. At least this many more were taken, but no report made after the incident being checked out.

Over the holiday weekend, 14 jail arrests were made, including drunk in car, drunk and simple assault. This was the biggest weekend of jail arrests in some time.

ITEM: When selecting infant's wear, choose garments on the basis of comfort and ease of care. Wrappers, kimonos and shirts should be open down the front or back so they don't have to be pulled over the baby's head.

ITEM: Two varieties of palms — the Kentia and the Chamaedorea — are available as seedlings in small clay pots. Kept in the shade under temperatures of about 55 degrees, they make attractive additions to plant collections.

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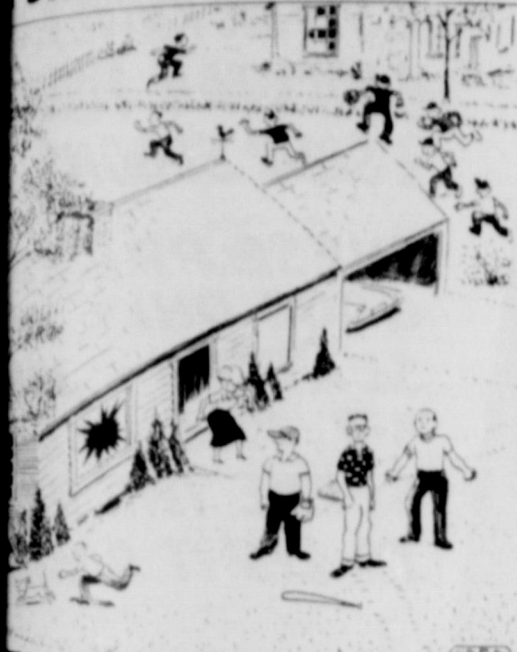

Wholesale Business Is Up 57 Percent In Area

a report published recently by the U.S. Commerce Department's Bureau of Census. Leading the way in the whopping 57 percent increase in wholesale business was the farm products and raw materials field--accounting for \$170.8 million of the total \$502 million. And, the farm products business increased 65 percent over the five-year period.

The machinery, equipment and supplies wholesale business ranked second with \$48.1 million in sales, while motor vehicles and automotive equipment was next with sales amounting to \$31.8 million.

The figures for the Lubbock metropolitan area are included in the final report on wholesale trade from the 1963 and 1958 Censuses of Business.

Total payroll for the entire year 1963 of wholesale establishments in the area amounted to \$24 million, an increase of 51 percent over 1958. The report shows there were 4,705 employees at work during the week of Nov. 15, 1963 with a payroll of \$513,000.

Ranked back of farm products, machinery, and automotive businesses were: hardware, plumbing, heating equipment and supplies; electrical goods; petroleum bulk stations; drugs, chemicals and allied products; dry goods and apparel.

St. Mary Of Plains Hospital Plan Announced

A new St. Mary of the Plains Hospital which will cost in excess of three million dollars is tentatively scheduled to be ready for occupancy by 1967.

Information regarding plans for building the new hospital was presented to approximately 200 Lubbock civic and business leaders at a dinner in Lubbock recently.

The new 125-bed, six-story hospital will feature all modern medical facilities and will be located on 10 acres at Nashville Avenue and 22nd Place in Lubbock.

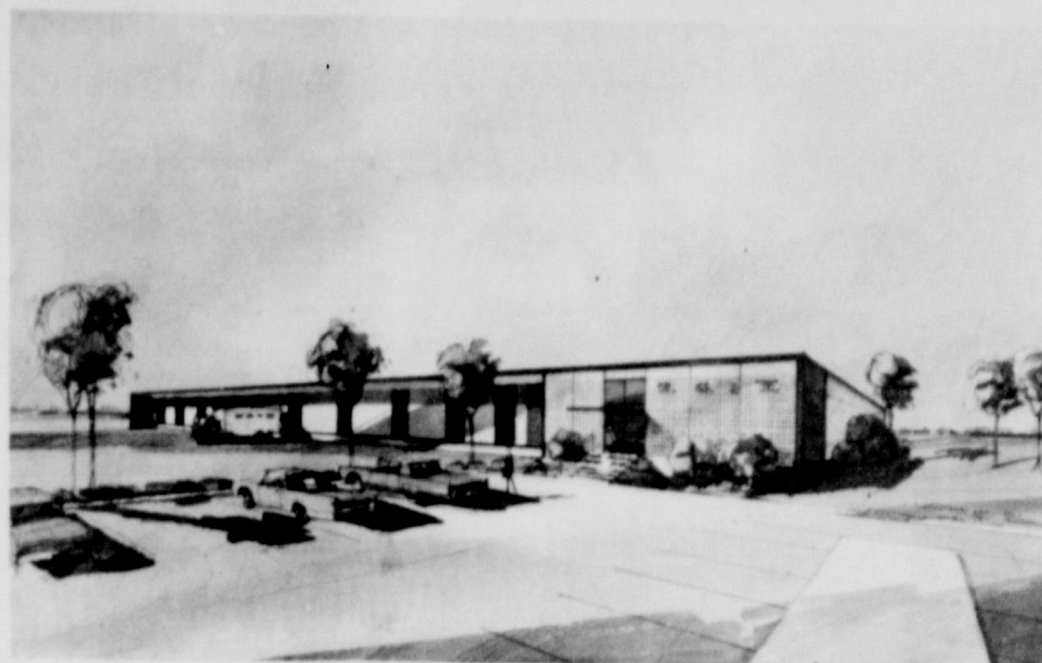

The new hospital will replace the present St. Mary of the Plains facilities which have been operated for the past 25 years at 2605 19th St., by the sisters of St. Joseph of Texas.

will be available from a well-trained central staff in all merit badge fields with emphasis on outdoor activities.

Meals are prepared by excellent camp cooks in a completely remodeled kitchen. A scout is always hungry, and Camp Post campers will receive the finest meals possible served in the spacious Dining Hall. Campers will also be given an opportunity to cook for themselves while camping at Camp Post.

At Tres Ritos Camp, which is located in the Sangre De Cristo Mountains in New Mexico halfway between Taos and Las Vegas, each unit will camp on a mountain campsite surrounded by forest and mountain streams. Campfire programs, and various inter-unit activities will add to the full program for units at Tres Ritos. When evening approaches in the mountains, scouts seem to welcome the opportunity to 'hit the hay' after a day filled with various scouting activities.

Outpost type camping will be offered, where units may operate from Tres Ritos as their base camp, get all necessary supplies, and camp up in the mountain areas. This will be a rugged challenge to test the camping skills of those involved.

Tres Ritos offers jamboree type cooking where all meals will be cooked outdoors, and will be cooked by patrols. Food will be issued from the Camp Commissary Building. Paper plates, paper cups will be furnished, along with all the necessary items of food for the week. Each unit should bring their own cooking gear, and mess equipment.

A beautiful archery range located in the meadow affords fine opportunity for archery enthusiasts. Conservation, relative to water, soil, and trees gives much emphasis to this important phase of the program. Pioneering, axemanship, compass, astronomy, cooking, hiking, and many other outdoor skills await the campers.

Fishing is good, and every camper has this opportunity all during the week. Nature, and the identification of wild flowers, plants, and animals, and birds are also in store at Tres Ritos. Tours of real old fashioned saw mill on the banks of the river is available. Hiking up mountain sides and seeing the various handiworks of nature is always available.

At the present time there are 50 units signed up for Camp Post with approximately 825 boys and leaders. Tres Ritos has 42 units and 600 boys and leaders.

New TG&Y Warehouse Rising Near Slaton

Bob Graves, TG&Y manager in Slaton, seems very pleased that the TG&Y officials selected the Slaton Highway out of Lubbock for the location of the new area warehouse. He stated the location would be very handy for the Slaton store and also, he hopes that some of the employees at the warehouse will decide to reside in Slaton.

The warehouse, now under construction at Ash Avenue and Slaton Highway, is on schedule, according to district manager Dan S. Kelly of Amarillo.

Most of the walls are now complete, and steel will be on the job this week. The parking lot has been rough graded, water lines are in and most underground plumbing is installed. The warehouse is scheduled for completion in early August.

With the opening of a new TG&Y store in Houston recently, the number of TG&Y stores reached the 400 mark. C.A. Henderson, president of TG&Y reported 16 stores opened during the first quarter of the year, with around 85 scheduled for opening yet this year. This total will represent approximately a 25% increase in number of units for the firm in this calendar year, and volume is scheduled to jump approximately 20% to 25% to a

round \$105,000,000 for the year of 1965.

The new warehouse will contain approximately 1000,00 sq. ft. and will employ between 40 and 60 people at opening time. When the warehouse is operating at capacity, approximately 100 people will be employed, servicing about 60 stores in West Texas, New Mexico, and Arizona.

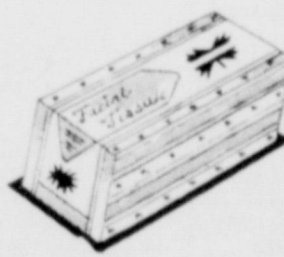

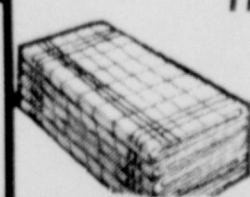

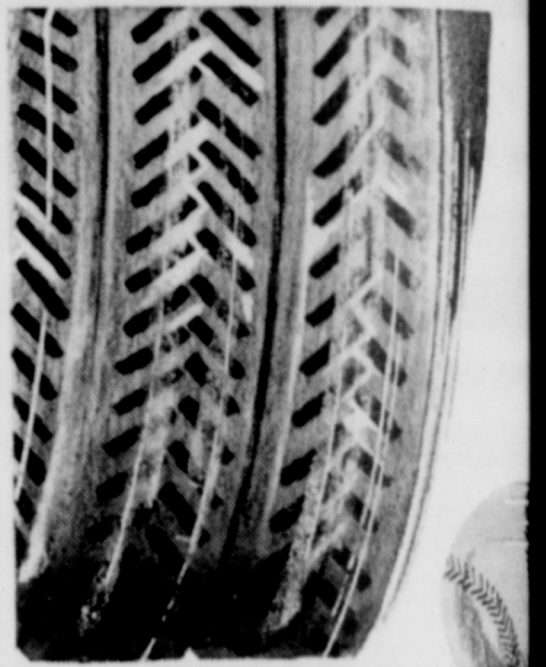

Six Flags To Open Daily; Big Year Seen

SIX FLAGS Over Texas will be open seven days a week throughout the summer months beginning Monday, May 31. Operating hours for the popular tourist attraction, located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, will be from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The 1965 season at SIX FLAGS, which began April 16, has already furnished Park officials with some healthy signs of attendance reports and license plate surveys taken over the past five weeks.

Despite the rainy weather that has plagued the area during this time, the worst in SIX FLAGS' four year history, attendance is still running higher, with 175,077 visitors to date as compared to 169,770 last year.

Arkansas is fourth, followed by California, Illinois, New Mexico, Missouri, Ohio, Michigan and Colorado.
