ing boom in recent years. Building projects totalling more than \$500,000 are underway at four construction sites inside the city limits. And it's conceivable that the total figure could push past the \$1 million mark before the boom is completed.

Current projects total \$613, 620 -- including facilities for two automobile dealers, a church, and an apartment complex. Nearing completion are the Plaza Duplexes which are estimated at a total project cost of \$180,000.

\$500,000 IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM AT STAKE

School Bond Vote Set

Slaton Independent School District voters troop to the polls Monday to decide the fate of a half million dollar bond election, the first held here since 1959.

Voting in the plant improvement election will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the school tax office at 300 S. 9th. Election judge is Charlie Whalen. Absentee balloting closes at 5 p. m. today.

Supt. Dr. P. L. Vardy said "I'm hoping for a representative turnout at the polls Monday." The election was called Feb. 7 by trustees at a special school board meeting.

The \$500,000 proposal includes proposed construction of a new cafetorium at West vard, a gym and band hall at high school, and a football stadium at a site to be selected.

Tabbed for future construction would be a new elementary school in the southwest section

If voters approved the proposition, the projected maximum increase in taxes for next year would be 8.1 percent, according to the superintendent. The present rate is \$1.85 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The projected maximum would be

For example, a person paying \$10 in taxes would have his taxes raised to \$10,81 and a person now paying \$100





Living in Slaton are two members of that exclusive group of persons who celebrate a birthday only once every four years, namely Feb. 29.

Missing their birthdays again this year are Barney Wilson, owner of Slaton Bakery, and F. S. Sollinger of 1350 S. 10th. Sollinger was born near Salem, Pa., in 1876, and al-

though he will be 90 years old, he has celebrated only

22 birthdays. He came to Slaton in February, 1950 from Holdridge, Neb. Wilson was born at Copperas Cove in 1908, and has had only 14 birthdays, However, in 1968 on his 15th birthday, he will actually be 60. Wilson moved to Slaton

with his family in 1940, and has been operating Slaton Bakery since 1943. It is estimated that one out of every 1,461 persons is born on Feb. 29, and today there are about 10,000 living Americans who were born on that day.



Medicare Not Effective Til July 1, 1966

urity district manager in Lubbock, emphasized a very important point which concerns many of the millions of people 65 or older who are eligible for the new program of health insurance, popularly known as Medicare.

"Do not because of this new law cancel or drop any hospital insurance or medical insurance you may have. Hospital insurance and medical insurance under the Social Security Act do not begin until July 1, 1966," Hutton stated.

Medicare will help pay costs of hospitalization and related medical care services for people who have reached 65. However, it does not go into effect until July 1, 1966.

Soil Testing Value Shown

cotton recently reported here by County Agent J. K. Adams illustrates how crop profits can be increased by following soil test plant food recommen-

According to Adams, the demonstration was conducted on a plot where fertilizer responses are unpredictable because of the unusual characteristics of the Portales high lime

Conducted on the Pat Childress farm, the test was set up to show if new fertilizer mixes containing sulfur would



Soil test recommendations from the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, called for appli-

cations of nitrogen alone at the rate of 60 pounds per acre. Rates applied per acre in the demonstration were as follows: One, 60-0-0; two, 55-100-0t55s (sulfur); three, 55-0-0t52s; four, untreated.

Sixty pounds of nitrogen alone produced 654 pounds of lint. This was 63 pounds more than produced with the next best application.

More important, says Adams, the best yield was produced with only \$5 worth of fertilizer while the next best yield was produced with \$25 worth of fertilizer. Yield on the untreated plot

was 400 pounds per acre. Cotton was planted in the plots May 3. The nitrogenalone application was made June 23 and the other applications were made in late May. Adams said the demonstration also indicates that late square and early bloom stage may be the most ideal time to apply nitrogen to the Portales

Mason, who missed three of the 25 games with a leg injury, scored 384 points, averaging 17.9 markers per game. Sixty-four of those points came

Richard Washington gained the runner-up position as he scored 297 points in 24 games. He hit 67 free-throws. Orin Smith, who participated in all of the games, was third in scoring with 247 points for a 9.9 average. Smith netted 57 charity tosses.

Victor Cristan, playmaker of the Tigers, was next in line as he canned 220 points, averaging 8.8 markers a game. Cristan scored on 36 free throws. Henry Johnson, the other starter for Slaton, bucketed 219 points in 24 games for a 9.1 scoring average. Johnson hit only 27 of his free throws.

Mason was also tops in the free throw percentages. His 64 free tosses out of 81 attempts for 75.3 percent edged Victor Cristan's 36 of 51 for 70.6 percent.

The Tigers as a team scored 1,600 points during the entire season, averaging 63.9 points per game. They held their opponents to 1,306 points, which averages 52,2 markers a game.



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
