

# Building Activity on Increase in City

The railroad city is receiving an economical shot in the arm, experiencing its largest building boom in recent years.

Building projects totalling more than \$500,000 are underway at four construction sites inside the city limits. And it's conceivable that the total figure could push past the \$1 million mark before the boom is completed.

Current projects total \$613,620 -- including facilities for two automobile dealers, a church, and an apartment complex. Nearing completion are the Plaza Duplexes which are estimated at a total project cost of \$180,000.

The 12 duplexes, or 24 rental units, are fully carpeted and

are all electric. An open house is scheduled here Sunday.

The latest addition to the building list is a new home for Smith Ford Inc. Construction site is on W. Division at the U. S. 84 bypass.

Don Crow Chevrolet Co. started its new building last November. It is located at the intersection of the US-84 bypass and FM-41. Project cost of each plant is expected to be approximately \$175,000.

Crow Chevrolet Co. is shooting for a completion date around April 1. The structure will have some 19,536 square feet. It is being built of steel and masonry walls.

Construction of the Smith Ford facility is underway and

the firm is looking for a completion date around May 1. The building will have approximately 20,000 square feet.

The First Christian Church will be located across from the Ford plant. The new sanctuary, education unit and fellowship hall will cost approximately \$83,620.

Church officials are hoping for a completion date during the first half of April. The new building is designed for a 300-member congregation. The Rev. Johnnie Moore said membership is now 110.

The new brick structure includes some 6,800 square feet. The congregation has been

meeting in its present site since 1923.

Southwestern Public Service has plans for a new office building in Slaton. Contract for the construction of the building, which will include a community meeting room, is expected to be let soon. It is hoped construction can be started in March.

Other potential building includes a \$500,000 bond issue which will be voted on Monday by school district residents. Included in the issue are plans for a new elementary school for southwest Slaton, a gym, football stadium, cafeteria and band hall.

Just outside the city limits, the community's only industrial

operation--Triangle Manufacturing Co.--is nearing completion on a shop designed to give the firm implement firm more flexibility. The building and new equipment represents a capital outlay of \$100,000.

The city government has a progressive outlook for the community, as is reflected by the 1966 program of work. In the spring, the city plans to complete 15 blocks, or one mile, of paving. A sewer improvement project is also on the agenda.

Also, through the financial assistance of a private group of citizens and the Board of City Development, a new mun-

icipal golf course will soon be ready for recreation.

During the summer and fall of 1965, the city paved 80 blocks, or five miles, of streets. Also during that period, 90 blocks of repairs and seal coating were applied.

Three miles of six-inch water lines, two and one half miles of eight-inch water main, and 55 fire plugs were installed to assure all area of the community adequate fire protection.

Two miles of 12-inch water lines were laid by the city to the new water field developed in 1965, furnishing citizens water prior to receiving water from the Canadian River Authority.

### \$500,000 IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM AT STAKE

# School Bond Vote Set

Slaton Independent School District voters troop to the polls Monday to decide the fate of a half million dollar bond election, the first held here since 1959.

Voting in the plant improvement election will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the school tax office at 300 S. 9th. Election judge is Charlie Whalen. Absentee balloting closes at 5 p.m. today.

Supr. Dr. P. L. Vardy said "I'm hoping for a representative turnout at the polls Monday." The election was called Feb. 7 by trustees at a special school board meeting.

The \$500,000 proposal includes proposed construction of a new cafeteria at West Ward, a gym and band hall at high school, and a football stadium at a site to be selected.

Tabbed for future construction would be a new elementary school in the southwest section of the city.

If voters approved the proposition, the projected maximum increase in taxes for next year would be 8.1 percent, according to the superintendent. The present rate is \$1.85 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The projected maximum would be \$2.

For example, a person paying \$10 in taxes would have his taxes raised to \$10.81 and a person now paying \$100

would pay \$108.10.

The school board called the election after studying the needs of the school system during the past four months. A petition with 43 names was presented to the school board in favor of the issue.

Dr. Vardy said the board has attempted to discuss the

bond issue with various citizens in the community to assist them in making a decision based upon the needs of the school and the feelings of the community.

He said trustees have also studied operational costs of Slaton schools in comparison with schools of comparable size in the area. Results of

the study revealed the local schools' per-pupil cost was as low or lower than schools in the survey.

The cafeteria, gym, band hall and football stadium would be built in 1966 if the bonds are approved. The new elementary school would be constructed when the community's

growth required it, he said.

Estimates on the proposed construction -- without plans and specifications -- are \$175,000 for the gym, \$60,000 for the cafeteria, \$50,000 for the band hall, \$30,000 or more for the stadium, and \$125,000 to \$150,000 for the elementary school.

Factors still to be determined include the site of the stadium--at its present site or at the high school property where the new high school gym could be used for dressing room facilities, and whether to build a new band hall or to convert the physical education gym at the high school into a bandhall.

The terms of Commissioners Robert Banks and Earl Reasoner expire this year. Neither commissioner has indicated their future political plans.

Reasoner is commissioner of ward two and Banks represents ward four. The municipal election is slated April 5 and deadline for filing as a candidate is March 4.

Slaton's search for a chamber of commerce manager is on again following word this week that Bill Payne, C of C manager at Crane, had decided not to leave that city.

Payne had met with directors here more than two weeks ago, agreed to take the job and was to report for duty March 1. Last Friday night he called C of C President O. G. Nie-

man and "regretfully" declined the position.

The Crane man gave "personal reasons and action by my board" as his reasons for the decision to stay at Crane.

The Slatonite, in a telephone conversation with a Crane chamber official Wednesday, learned that the board there called a special meeting last week and asked Payne to reconsider.

"The board came to a realization on what a fine man we were losing," said the official.

### Little League Officers Named

Bob Kern was named president of the Slaton Little League at a recent organizational meeting for the 1966 season.

Paul Melton was chosen treasurer. Speedy Nieman will fill the post of secretary, and the Rev. Johnnie Moore will serve as player agent. Vice presidents will be named at a later date.

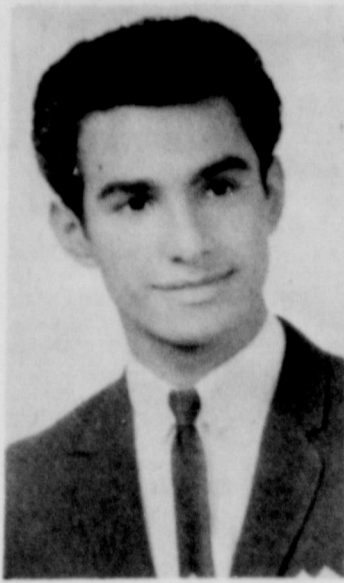

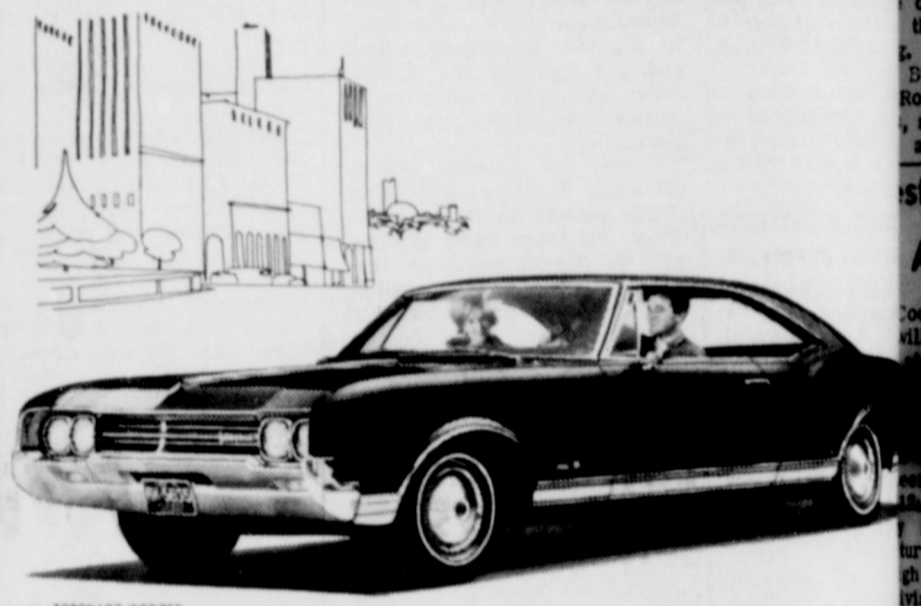

John G. Hutton, social security district manager in Lubbock, emphasized a very important point which concerns many of the millions of people 65 or older who are eligible for the new program of health insurance, popularly known as Medicare.

"Do not because of this new law cancel or drop any hospital insurance or medical insurance you may have. Hospital insurance and medical insurance under the Social Security Act do not begin until July 1, 1966," Hutton stated.

Medicare will help pay costs of hospitalization and related medical care services for people who have reached 65. However, it does not go into effect until July 1, 1966.

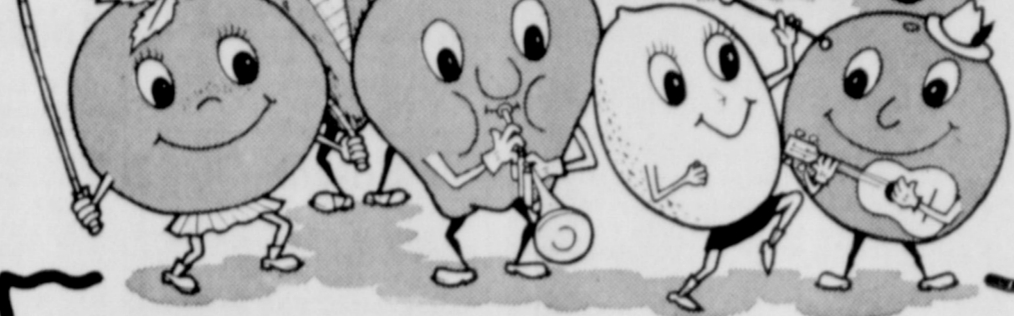

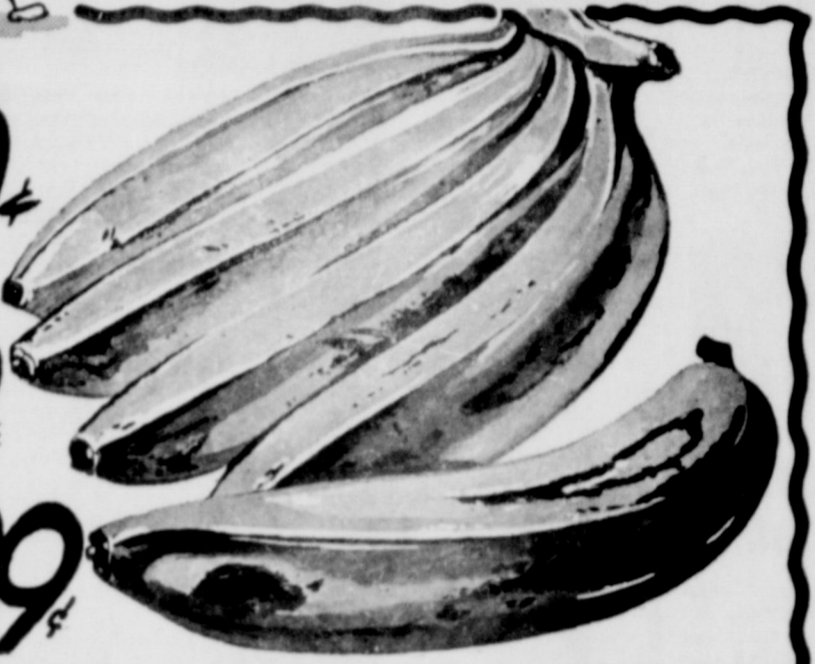

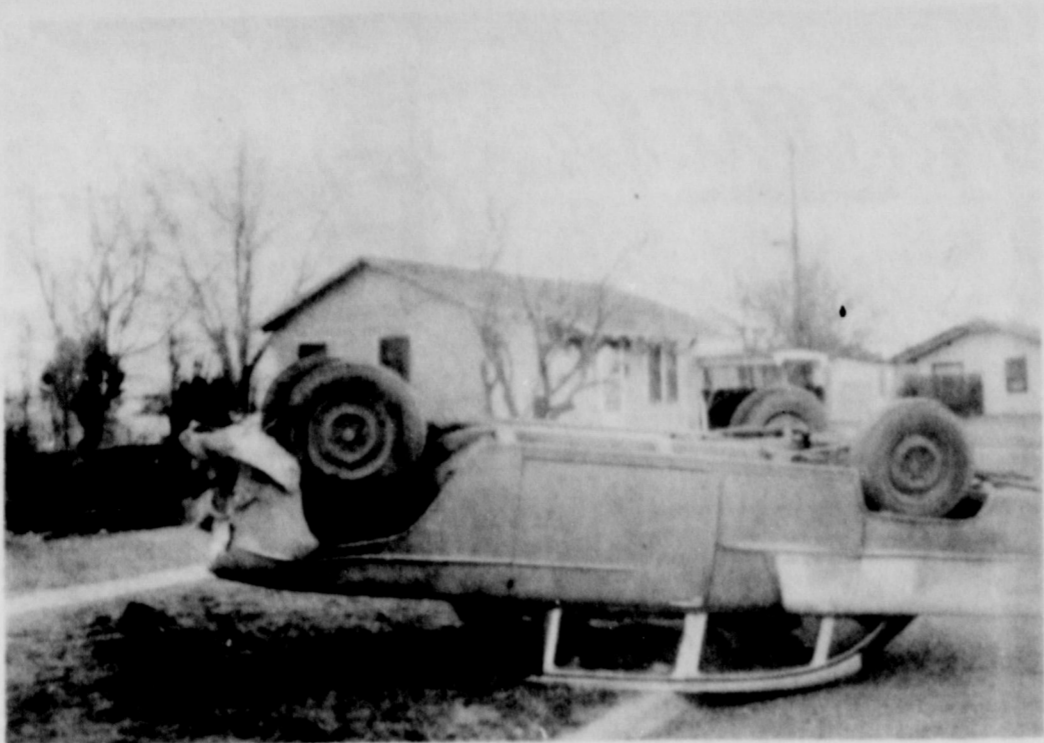

Few, if any, will argue the fact that our facilities are inadequate. The question is how much and where will it go?

It appears trustees have adopted a sound plan. They are not asking for funds to give Slaton a "rich man's" plant. Surveys show Slaton is lower than most schools on cost per student.

Trustees have taken a long look at the overall physical plant. They have recommended better facilities for studying, eating and

playing. Whether some like it or not, physical education is as important as some other factors.

Sports and school pride should not be emphasized over scholastics, neither should it be neglected. A school with Class B facilities is handicapped in striving for Class AA pride.

Every qualified voter, if unsure as to whether he will favor or oppose the proposed \$500,000 bond issue, should be informed as to what is involved. Contact a school board member or a school administrator.

We strongly urge that you give careful consideration to the proposal, be informed, then go to the polls and vote your conviction.

## A Good School Board Member...

A good school board member has a strong belief in public education - its importance to the individual and its importance to the nation.

He should be sincerely interested in children, never forgetting that's the reason we keep school.

He should understand the difference between policy and administration - should confine himself to policy matters - and should keep his cotton-picking hands out of the superintendent's business.

He should never forget that the public schools belong to the public - not to the school board and not to the superintendent.

He and his fellow board members should be a cross-section of the community.

He should represent all the people of a community - not a geographical area or some vested interest.

He should be knowledgeable about - and interested in - the curriculum.

He should have an open mind and should suspend judgment until all the facts are in.

He should be able to recognize school

problems before they get out of hand.

He should be willing to work with fellow board members in spite of personal differences, and he should support board decisions once they are made.

He should have some firm convictions and should be able to weather criticism.

He should be able to think independently, objectively and soundly.

He should be willing to give the necessary time to this important function of board membership.

He should be adaptable and forward looking, heeding Pope's admonition: "Be not the first by whom the new is tried, Nor yet; the last to lay the old aside."

He should have integrity; he should be moral; he should have initiative; he should have courage; he should have a castron stomach.

He should have an understanding wife (or she should have an understanding husband).

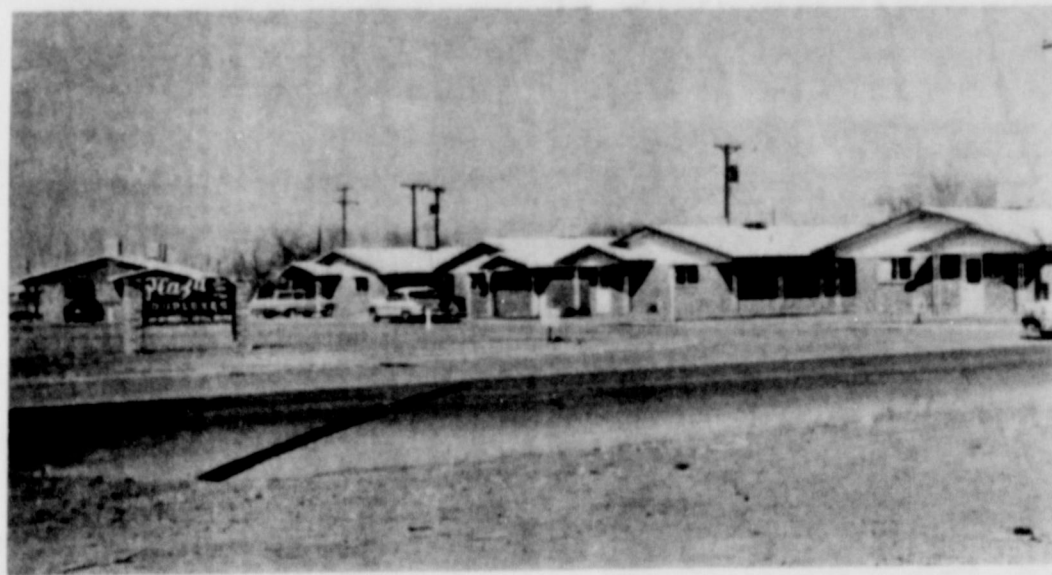

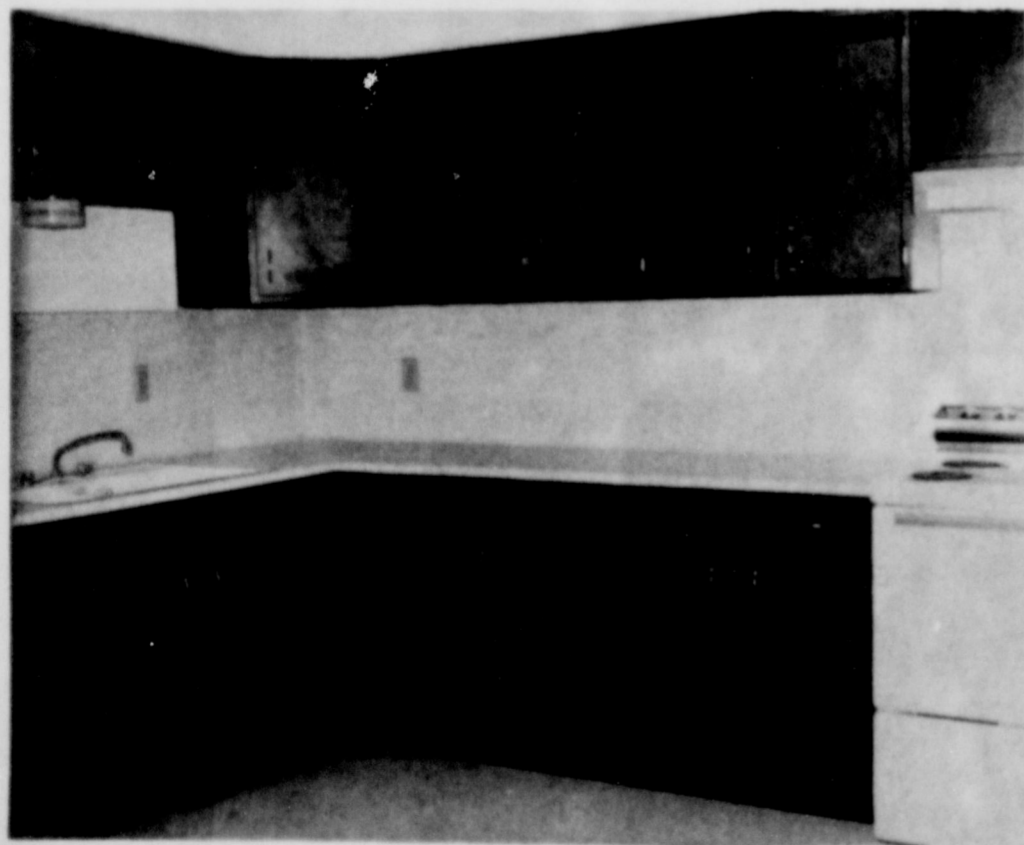

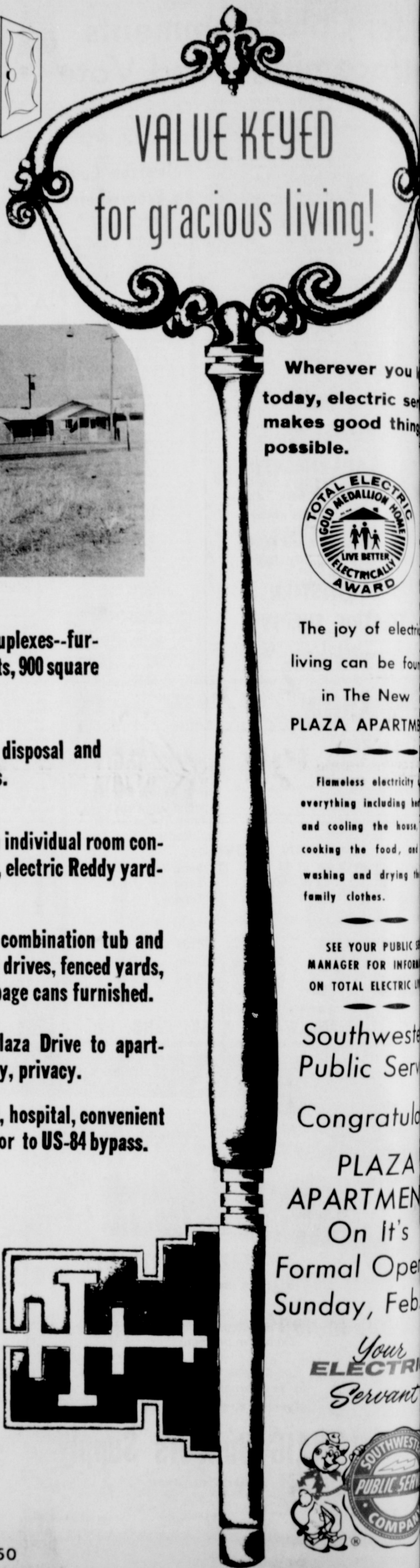

# Soil Testing Value Shown

A fertilizer demonstration on cotton recently reported here by County Agent J. K. Adams illustrates how crop profits can be increased by following soil test plant food recommendations.

According to Adams, the demonstration was conducted on a plot where fertilizer responses are unpredictable because of the unusual characteristics of the Portales high lime soil.

Conducted on the Pat Childress farm, the test was set up to show if new fertilizer mixes containing sulfur would

prove profitable on cotton.

Soil test recommendations from the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, called for applications of nitrogen alone at the rate of 60 pounds per acre.

Rates applied per acre in the demonstration were as follows: One, 60-0-0; two, 55-100-0555 (sulfur); three, 55-0-0525; four, untreated.

Sixty pounds of nitrogen alone produced 654 pounds of lint. This was 63 pounds more than produced with the next best application.

More important, says Adams, the best yield was produced with only \$5 worth of fertilizer while the next best yield was produced with \$25 worth of fertilizer.

Yield on the untreated plot was 400 pounds per acre. Cotton was planted in the plots May 3. The nitrogen-alone application was made June 23 and the other applications were made in late May.

Adams said the demonstration also indicates that late square and early bloom stage may be the most ideal time to apply nitrogen to the Portales high lime soils in this area.

## Judge Ellis Is Guest Speaker At Rotary Club

"Have You Checked Your Image Lately?" was the topic of a talk by Judge James Ellis at the Slaton Rotary Club meeting last Thursday.

Ellis, 137th District Court Judge, pointed out to Rotarians that individuals, cities, clubs, and businesses are much concerned about their "images" these days.

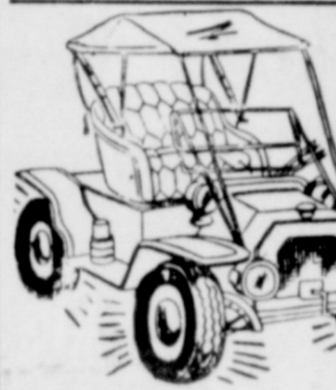

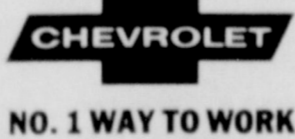

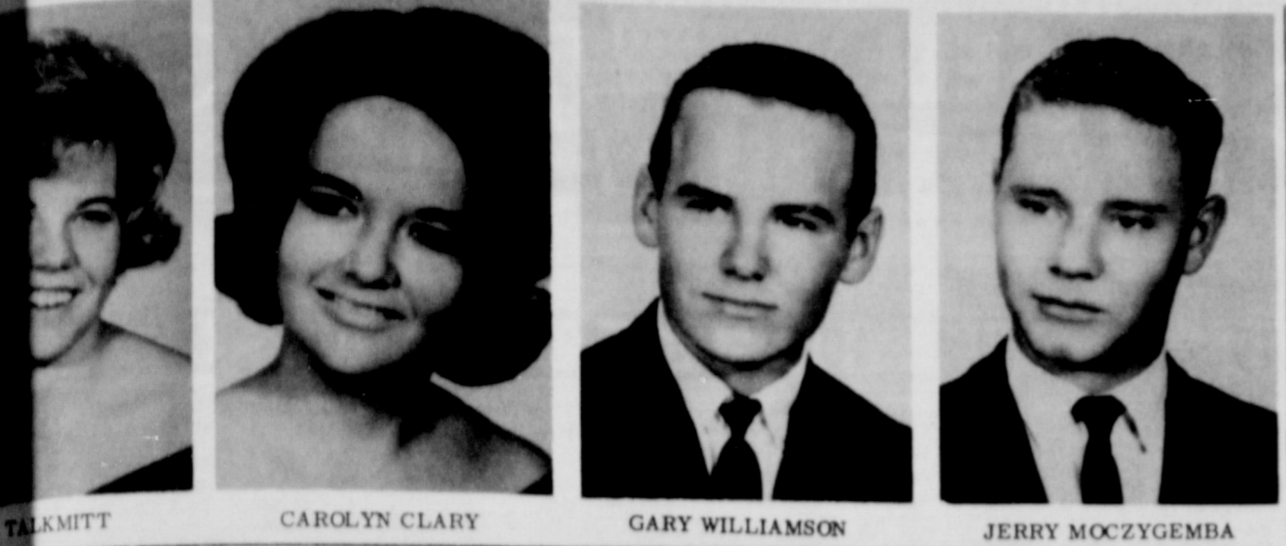

**FAMILY POT LUCK**

**Plan Pretty Pastries**  
There are more possibilities in pie-making than ever before! Although apple, cherry and lemon are all-time favorites, try some others for a treat.  
Three cups of sliced apple? It's not enough, but it can be teamed with two cups of cranberries to make one big, luscious pie.  
Two cups of fresh, diced pears make a good combination with a cup of rhubarb.  
Pineapple may also be used with rhubarb. Equal proportions make a good pie.  
Equal amounts of canned peaches and frozen blueberries

offer real eating pleasure in pie. Maybe you'd prefer them as a cobbler combination for a change.  
Canned apricot halves and cherries are a colorful pastry combo. Make certain the fruit is drained so it can be thickened properly.  
**Time to Economize**  
Watch for sales on seasonal foods, frozen vegetables and certain cuts of meat. Buy and use them to save food dollars.  
Don't forget about leftover magic and what it can do! That pot-roast can be sliced and reheated in barbecue sauce to be served over hard rolls as a complete disguise the second time.  
When opening cans of fruit for salad, use them as they come out of the can the first time, but save those left for a gelatin salad. The last of the celery, carrots,

tomatoes and potatoes make excellent vegetables for soup made from a bone. Or, flake the remainder of the broiled or baked fish and use a cream sauce as a base for chowder with these vegetables.  
Leftover potatoes? Hash them with butter and cream in the skillet. Mashed potatoes can be made into panfried cakes.  
Use sponge or angel food cake with pudding and fruit as a dessert base.  
For different potato chips, sprinkle with onion salt or grated cheese, heat and eat!  
Wrap sticks of American cheese in dried beef, fasten with a wooden pick and broil until cheese melts slightly. Serve hot on the picks.

2 cups dried Lima Beans  
1/4 pound bacon, diced  
1 medium onion, sliced  
1/4 cup light molasses  
2 tablespoons chili sauce  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 teaspoon mustard  
1 cup tomato juice  
Wash beans and soak overnight in 1 quart cold water. Simmer in same water 30 minutes. Drain, reserving liquor. Place beans, bacon and onion in layers in casserole or bean pot. Combine remaining ingredients, pour over beans with enough reserved liquor to cover beans. Cover and bake in a very low (250° F.) oven 4 to 6 hours. Uncover last 30 minutes to brown.

## Mason Captures Scoring Honors

Jack Mason, a two-year junior letterman, walked away with scoring honors of the Slaton Tiger basketball team for the 65-66 season. Mason, who missed three of the 25 games with a leg injury, scored 384 points, averaging 17.9 markers per game. Sixty-four of those points came

via the free-throw line. Richard Washington gained the runner-up position as he scored 297 points in 24 games. He hit 67 free-throws. Orin Smith, who participated in all of the games, was third in scoring with 247 points for a 9.9 average. Smith netted 57 charity tosses.

Victor Cristan, playmaker of the Tigers, was next in line as he canned 220 points, averaging 8.8 markers a game. Cristan scored on 36 free throws. Henry Johnson, the other starter for Slaton, bucketed 219 points in 24 games for a 9.1 scoring average. Johnson hit only 27 of his free throws.

Mason was also tops in the free throw percentages. His 64 free tosses out of 81 attempts for 75.3 percent edged Victor Cristan's 36 of 51 for 70.6 percent.

The Tigers as a team scored 1,600 points during the entire season, averaging 63.9 points per game. They held their opponents to 1,306 points, which averages 52.2 markers a game.

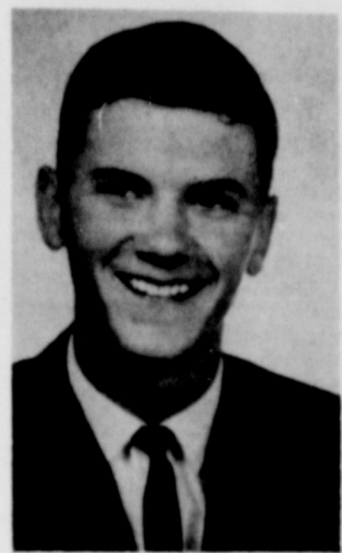
