A national railroad shutdown, which idled most of the 847 workers in the Santa Fe's Slaton division for two days, ended Tuesday with all but a few of the major rail carriers resuming full operations.

Picketing at Slaton and Lubbock Santa Fe yards ended about noon Tuesday. President Johnson signed a law Monday night ending the two-day general rail walkout, and he appointed a special mediation board Tuesday to find a permanent solution to the long wage dispute between shopcraft unions and the nation's railroads.

P.M. Wheatley of Slaton, general chairman of the Firemen & Oilers Shop Laborers Union, said he notified local workers of back-to-work orders shortly before noon Tuesday "immediately after receiving notification to do so." Some delays were reported in Southern and Southwestern areas, apparently resulting from slow communications from national union officials.

P.R. Buchanan, trainmaster, reported that Slaton and Lubbock yards were fortunate in that all trains cleared here before things shut down. He indicated there wouldn't be much of a backlog of work once things started rolling again.

The last train movement through Slaton before the shutdown was Sunday night when a Houston-bound passenger train was allowed to return to its terminal, as did all passenger trains.

Rail officials saw no major problems arising from the strike, since it was not a prolonged shutdown. One official here said there "won't be much to move in Slaton or Lubbock until traffic arrives here from elsewhere."

President Johnson expressed hope at a White House news conference that the mediation board can get rail unions and management to agree voluntarily on a contract during a 90

School, City Eye Tax Values

Some members of the Slaton School Board and Slaton City Commission held an informal meeting Tuesday night at the school tax office to discuss tax revaluation proposals.

Members of both governing bodies agreed that equalization was the primary goal. The school district has announced a temporary 15 percent hike in valuations this year, with the deal of revaluating for next year.

Mayor Jonas Cain and Supt. Lee Vardy announced after the meeting that cost estimates are to be secured for each group to study before a decision is reached on whether or not a joint project will be undertaken.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Cain, and Hugo Mosser from the city; Dr. Lee Vardy, Joe Miles, Willie Heinrich, Tommy Davis and Ted Swanner, representing the school district, and O.C. Nieman, Slatonite editor.

Water Usage Up In May, June

Rainy weather in early June kept the water usage total from making another big jump over the previous month.

City residents used 34,58 million gallons in June, compared to 34.6 million gallons in May. Usage made a big jump from April to May, rising 10 million gallons.

Lower summer water rates started May 15 for a three-month period, another factor in the big increase for May.

Peak day usage in June occurred on the 19th when 1.7 million gallons poured through city water taps. Minimum usage for the month was on June 5 when only 435,000 gallons were used. The high and low came close together in May when 631,000 gallons was recorded on the 14th and 1,67 million on the 18th.

Damaging Hail In Some Areas

A three to four-inch rain drenched most of the Slaton area Tuesday night, resulting mostly in beneficial moisture to cotton and grain crops, but damaging hail and winds struck some sections.

A devastating hailstorm battered the Idalou area, moving southeast near the edge of Slaton and on to some areas southeast of Slaton to Southland. Hardest hit around Slaton were some farms southeast of town and across the canyon in the Acuff community.

Slaton recorded 3.5 inches of rainfall in a heavy downpour which began about 10:30 p.m. Tuesday and continued in lesser intensity early Wednesday morning. Skies were still over-

cast around noon Wednesday with a light drizzle falling.

Clarence Kitten, west of Slaton, and Glen Akin, southwest about 4 to 5 miles, both reported more than 4 inches of rain Tuesday night. Kitten reported some hail but apparently not enough to damage the crops. Wilfred Kitten, who farms south of brother Clarence, reported some hail damage on his farm.

C.J. Melcher, two miles south of Midway, reported about 90 acres of cotton hailed out by the monstrous hailstorm. Dick Cade reported some damaging hail near Union, and Herman Schneider had hail on his farm south of Union, but it was not thought to be too bad.

Reports trickling in Wednesday morning indicated much hail damage on the E.C. Smallwood and Pete Lancaster farms between Slaton and Southland, Joe Glass, who farms near the Slaton Municipal Golf Course northeast of town, reported about three-fourths of his cotton was battered by hail.

Glass said it was too soon to determine how much of the

Police Sergeant Resigns Job Here

Slaton Police Sgt. Gene Carpenter resigned last week, marking the second officer to quit the force and the third city employee to submit a resignation in recent weeks.

Carpenter, in a brief letter of resignation, stated he had enjoyed his employment with the city and asked that his resignation be effective July 15. He

turned in the letter of resignation the night of July 12 to Mayor Jonas Cain.

His decision to resign followed the appointment of Dutch Robinson as acting chief of police. Robinson was named following the resignation of Police Chief Robert Breedlove a week prior.

City Administrator Buford Duff also resigned last month, requesting his duties be terminated Aug. 1.

Building Permits Drop in June

Building permits for the first half of 1967 were estimated at \$152,231 according to monthly reports at Slaton Municipal Building.

June was one of the lighter months of the year for building permits issued, with only \$4,280 recorded. The May total was \$14,150.

More than half of the six-month total came back in March when permits totaled \$77,850. Big permit of the year was issued in March for the construction of a Shamrock Service Station at US-84 and Cemetery Road.

Building activity is slightly behind last year's total.

Bid Date Near on Low Income Housing Project

Housing for low-income families, a project on the drawing board in Slaton for about two years, is expected to be a reality toward the end of the year.

Earl F. Wilson, executive director of the Public Housing Authority of Slaton, announced that plans had been approved by the local board and the Public Housing Authority and plans and specifications for bidders should be ready in about three weeks.

Another member of the Slaton board said he thought bids would be let and construction started about mid September.

The PHA approved funds totaling \$903,560 in October, 1965. The project calls for construction of 70 low-rent homes in Slaton. Forty of the homes are to be designed for the elderly. Of these, plans call for 36 one-bedroom units and 4 two-bedroom units.

Of the 30 units for non-elderly families, 20 are to be two-bedroom units and 10 will

have three bedrooms. Duplexes in concrete blocks and brick are slated for the construction. Rent will be based on the number in the family and the income. Units will be available only to low-income families, the guideline anticipated is below the \$3,000 mark.

Tentative plans have been made for a community center building with the project, but a final decision is still forthcoming.

Sites of the homes are in southeast Slaton. A board member reported that 22 of the 24 parcels of land involved have been signed up. Two parcels are in litigation with money placed in escrow for the property. A number of old homes on the property have already been burned by the city.

H.E. Anderson is chairman of the Slaton housing board. Other members are T.A. Worley, Bruce Pember, Bo Becker, and Tommy Wallace.

Preserve Fruit For Future Use

If the price is right, or the home orchard produces abundantly, Lubbock homemakers will be looking for ways to preserve their fruits for future use. Dried fruit such as peaches, apricots, and plums will keep a year or so when stored in a dry, cool, dark place.

Here are some food preservation tips from Mildred Patterson, Lubbock County Home Demonstration Agent. Select about 6 pounds of fresh, ripe and firm fruit. Wash and drain and peel them if you wish. Then cut them in halves and remove pits.

To prevent discoloration, soak fruit 15 minutes in a solution of 3 1/2 tablespoons sodium sulfite to 1 gallon water. A druggist can supply this chemical.

Arrange fruit on trays and place in 150 degree oven with the bottom tray 3 inches from the oven floor. Don't use the top unit in an electric oven. Prop the oven door open 1/2-inch if your oven is electric or 8 inches if it is gas to let out moisture. Alternate the trays every 1 to 2 hours.

The fruit is dry when pliable and leathery. Usually about 6 hours is required. Pieces around the edges of the tray will dry first. Remove these as soon as they are dry.

Cool the fruit and package at once. Pack the dried fruit in glass jars, plastic, metal, or heavily waxed cardboard frozen food containers. Use a tight seal.

Additional information on all types of food preservation may be obtained from the home demonstration agent's office in the Old Courthouse building, Lubbock.

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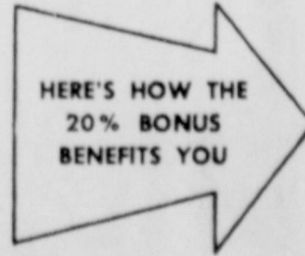

Stir and cook 15 minutes. Put in jars and seal while hot.

EGG CUSTARD

4 eggs
3/4 c. sugar
2-1/2 c. sweet milk
1 pinch salt
vanilla as desired
Slight tablespoon flour
Beat egg yolks and sugar; beat egg whites separate; stir all together and put in unbaked pie shell. Bake at 400 degrees about 45 minutes.

Writer Expresses Thanks On Completion of Articles

It takes a special kind of man to say "yes" to an impulsive, overambitious, headstrong college girl who approaches his desk with the words, "I want to write." Your editor never flinched! To him, I say thank you so very much for your encouragement and patient understanding.

To the many parents who allowed me to photograph and observe their children, I also say thank you, for without the experiences I gain from work-

ing with children I could accomplish very little.

To my college professors and advisors I say thank you, too, for your professional assistance and your enthusiastic belief in me, I needed the confidence that you displayed.

To the skeptical friends who jokingly laughed at my efforts and who jeered at the idea of making a career of child development, I also say thank you. Because in doing so you strengthened my faith in my work and spurred me into trying harder to make my point more convincing.

And finally, to you readers, I say thank you too. I hope that you have gained something of value from your readings, but if nothing else, I hope you found them enjoyable. (I don't mind your laughing, if you've got a smile on your face!)

Yes, it took all of these to get this series of articles in print, for without the approval of an editor, the cooperation of children and their parents, the confidence of my professors, and the doubtful grins of family and friends that said "Bet cha can't do it!" nothing would have been accomplished.

As a conclusion to this series, I would like to share with you two of my favorite thoughts concerning child development.

The first comes from a report made by the Mississippi Department of Public Welfare which can be interpreted as follows: If a child live with criticism, he learns to condemn.

If he lives with hostility, then he learns to fight. Children who live with shame learn to feel guilty; with ridicule, to be shy; with fear, to be apprehensive; with pity, to feel sorry for himself. And the child who lives with jealousy learns to feel resentment and suspicion.

But when a child lives with encouragement, he learns to be confident. When he lives with tolerance, he learns to be patient. With acceptance, he learns to love; with approval, to like himself; with praise, to be appreciative. Children who live with recognition, learn to have a goal. When they live in fairness, they learn what justice is; with honesty, what truth is.

The child who lives with security has faith in himself, and in living with sharing he learns about generosity. The children who live with friendliness learn that the world is a nice place in which to live. And if you, as a parent, live with serenity, then your child will live with peace of mind.

The second thought I leave with you comes from William Ward of the Texas Wesleyan

College. I believe it is the fewest possible philosophy on parenting. Have not completely taken responsibility as parents, we bequeath to our children a love of books, a thirst for knowledge, an awareness of a memory of kindness, a understanding of loyalty, of greatness, and peace.

As Dean Farrar says: "If we work upon the stone, it will crumble; but if we take a child in our arms, we rearment which time can face."

Children everywhere holding out their hands. They may be your neighbor's, a friend's, or a stranger's. His hands and help you did. The smile of the touch of his hand seeking security in your tenderness of his will be worth more than any experience you have before.

County Records 43 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 43 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sgt. C.C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in two deaths, 41 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$73,042.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1967 shows a total of 193 accidents resulting in nine persons killed, 171 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$200,769. The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1967 there have been 1,476 deaths compared to 1,396 traffic deaths for the first six months of 1966. This six per cent increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture. This alarming increase of accidents can be reduced by drivers knowing and obeying traffic laws, being a defensive driver and being a courteous driver. The sergeant stated: "Courtesy is contagious--try it."

Facts About Social Security

Recently a man who was earning \$2400 per year reached age 65 and filed a Claim with the Social Security Administration so that he could establish his entitlement to medicare. He had no intention of retiring because he enjoyed his work and felt he had many good years left. Consequently, he was surprised when he started receiving social security checks about the middle of the year. What he did not realize was that he did not lose all of his social security checks because his earnings were over \$1500 per year. The law provides that one dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1500 and \$2700 is deducted from the total social security payable each year. An additional one dollar for every dollar earned is deducted for any earnings over \$2700. Thus, the man who earned \$2400 would have only \$450 deducted from the total social security benefits payable to him for the year. Even if a person's earnings exceed the limit for possible payment for the year, he can still draw a check for any month he does not earn more than \$125 or, if self-employed, does not render substantial services in a business.

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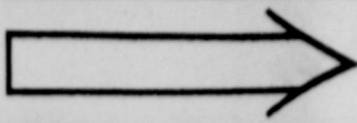

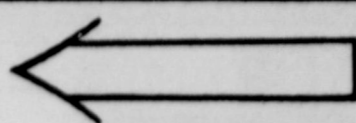

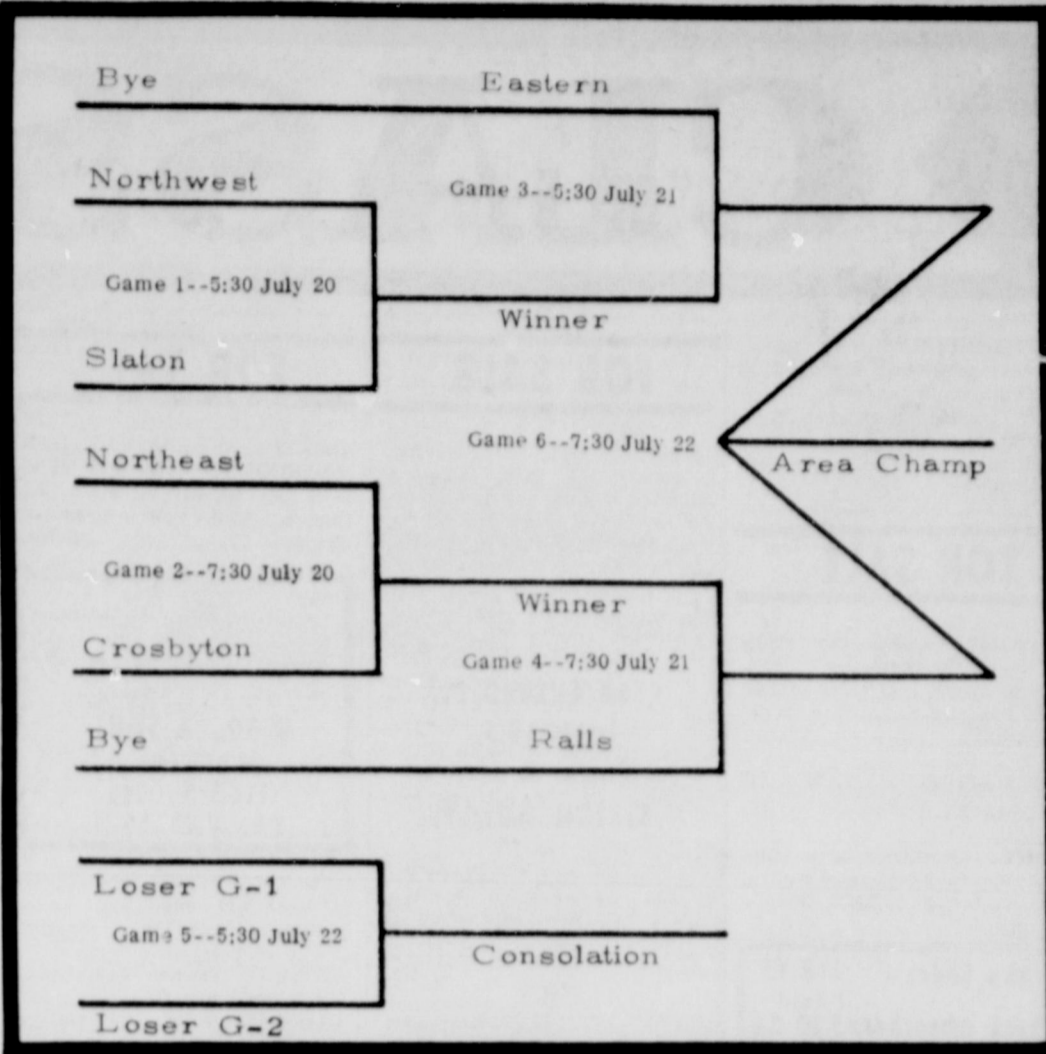

To Little League Parents...

By the time this appears in the Slatonite, our local Tournament Team will be about to play the first game of this year's Area Tournament on the Northeast League field in Lubbock. This means simply that the local playing of Little League Baseball is over for another year, and we'll all have to be finding something else to do with our evenings for the rest of the summer. I would like to take this opportunity, as League President, to thank each person who has had a part in the program this summer, as it has been a fairly trouble-free season, not too many complaints, not too many rhabarbs. In all seriousness, it takes the cooperation of a great many volunteer adults to make a project such as this possible at all. One item, however, which seems to rear its head every year has just been clarified by the National Little League Training Department. This is an item which seems almost perennial, and I suppose, naturally so, since we as parents are sometimes just a little prejudiced in favor of our own children. The clarification has to do with parent complaints about lack of game participation on the part of their boys. I quote as follows: "From time to time, we receive complaints from parents about the lack of participation in games by their sons. This is a natural reaction, but Little League is not a recreation program which guarantees equal participation for every player on the squad. "Certainly managers and coaches must use common sense in the handling of their players and must have a plan for constructive development of the skills and attitudes of all of their players. This development program should be explained to all of the players and their parents in order to build and maintain their morale and support. "It must be recognized that younger boys should expect to serve an apprenticeship and that managers be given leeway to use their best judgement in utilizing the services of their players. The pattern in athletics calls for boys to begin as substitutes in junior high school and move up to starting positions as they gain experience and maturity. When they move to high school and college, the pattern is repeated as they serve apprenticeships and work up to starting assignments. "Successful managers and coaches in all levels of baseball have developed patterns of operation in which they not only give their substitutes special attention and participation in practice sessions and pre-game drills, but also expose them to game competition when ever they find situations in which such participation will not place undue pressure on the player or place him in a situation he is not equipped to handle. "When managers use good judgement in exposing their substitutes to game competition, they prepare them for participation when they are needed. The history of baseball shows that successful teams have 'bench strength,' which means that they have players on the bench who are physically and mentally ready for action when the manager requires their services. Leagues should make effort to set local provisions for Minor League wherein every boy is used for some period in game participation whenever Minor League games are played." (End quote)

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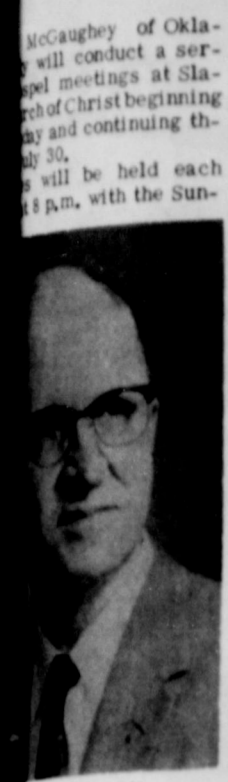
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Gospel Meeting Announced Here

Those who profess Christianity are expected to be virtuous and moral. Yet, we expect too much if we believe that Christianity offers us a life without temptation.

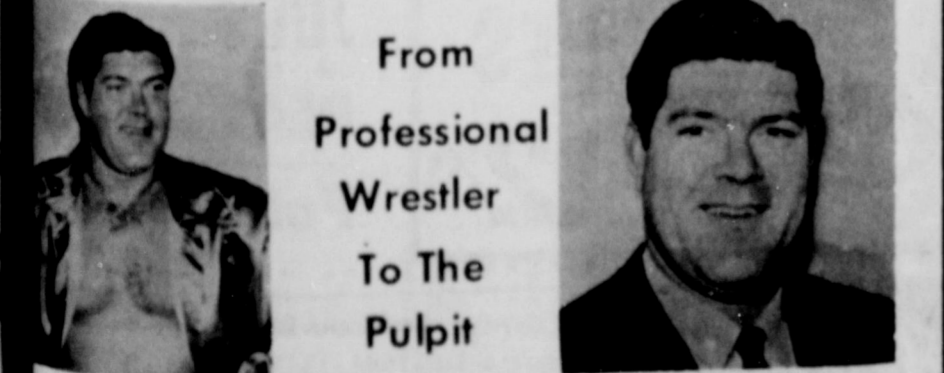
Temptation is as old as the history of man. We all know the story of temptation in the Garden of Eden. Jesus was tempted during his life upon earth.

Farm Safety Week July 23-29

President Johnson has proclaimed the week of July 23-29 as National Farm Safety Week. Agriculture remains America's first and most important industry. It supplies food for our people and for many millions throughout the world. Anything that impedes the efficiency and productivity of the farmer is detrimental to people everywhere.

Each year farm accidents kill thousands of farm people and displace nearly three quarters of a million more. The resultant economic loss borne by farm families approaches two billion dollars. This waste of economic resource, along with the tragic physical and psychological damage suffered by farm people should prompt us to regard the rural accident problem, as a matter of collective and

personal concern. Our farmers in this area utilize the most scientific methods of weed and insect control by use of insecticides and herbicides. These materials are poisonous and harmful to humans unless applied according to directions. Our farm machinery, although efficient is also a menace to life and limb if any rule of safety is flouted. Our play lakes when full of water appeal to the children on a hot day which often times result in a loss that can never be overcome. We are also living

in an area where severe wind storms occur. You will never be regarded as overly optimistic when you seek underground shelter prior to a severe thunder storm.

We all are aware of the dangers that surround daily activities. Some times we say, "That cannot happen to me," but it can. We must constantly be on guard and avoid any unsafe practices. We must recognize unsafe situations and take immediate corrective action.

Basic Ideas On Cotton Irrigation Given by Agent

Years of irrigation research and experience have led to the development of some basic principles for cotton irrigation, reports Jerry DeBord, Associate Lubbock County Agricultural Agent.

Water use for the cotton plant is greatest during the peak bloom season. Summer rains should help in reducing irrigation water needed in most parts of the county this season. If only one summer irrigation is made, it should ideally go on at early peak bloom for most eff-

icient use. With two summer irrigations, apply the first at first white bloom and the second during peak bloom. Additional irrigations usually increase yield but often not enough to pay the additional expense and also may lower the quality.

The farmer should be especially careful not to over-irrigate late planted and long staple cotton. Long staple varieties should not be watered before the first bloom to avoid excessive growth and delayed fruiting. Also, consider a cul-

off date about a week earlier than for short staple (August 20) varieties. With more emphasis on quality this year, proper timing of irrigations is most important. Even though the ideal irrigation situation seldom occurs, says DeBord, these basic ideas should be considered and used where applicable to produce a higher quality product with more profit per acre.

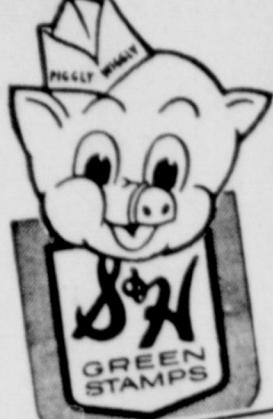
