Easy-To-Make Hot Rolls Are Summer Treats

SPECIAL—Summertime—when the livin' is easy—calls for easy meals. Not skimp; but easy to prepare and full of extra energy.

What is more tantalizing than a plate of hot oven-fresh rolls served with a cool delicious salad. Or barbecue chicken enhanced by a basketful of hot rolls and sweet honey?

These treats are easy to make, as any 4-H girl engaged in a bread project will agree. Rolls are quick to prepare, and dough can be stored in a refrigerator for several days and used when desired. (See recipe.)

Nearly a half million 4-H members in all 50 states are enrolled in the national 4-H Bread program, according to the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises 4-H.

Standard Brands Incorporated, the program sponsor, makes available to 4-H Clubs lesson plans, films, recipe booklets and other educational aids. Also provided are awards for individual members.

The young cooks soon learn the importance of "the staff of life" in the daily diet through the study of nutrition. They also learn some of the scientific aspects of bread making by experimenting with the basic ingredients in yeast dough.

When a bread project is completed, the member fills in a detailed report form which charts her progress. Members who have devoted three or more years to 4-H and are 14 years or older, can compete for state and national awards given by Standard Brands.

Expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago await the state winners. Scholarships of \$500 each will be presented to six national

champions during the congress held the last week in November.

Medals of honor may be earned by the top four members in each county.

REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

- 3/4 cup hot water
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon salt
 - 3 tablespoons Margarine
 - 1 cup warm water (105-115 degrees F.)
 - 2 packages or cakes yeast (Fleischmann's) active dry or compressed
 - 1 egg, beaten
 - 5 1/4 cups unsifted flour (about)
- Mix together hot water, sugar, salt and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm water mixture, egg and half the flour; beat until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to make soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover tightly with waxed paper or aluminum foil.

Store in refrigerator until doubled in bulk, or until needed. Dough may be kept 4-5 days in refrigerator (about 40-45 degrees F.)

To make Pan Rolls, divide dough into thirds. From each third, form 9 smooth balls of equal size (27 balls total). Place in 3 greased 8 inch round cake pans; cover, let rise in warm place free from draft until doubled in bulk (about 30 minutes). Brush lightly with melted margarine. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees F. about 15-20 minutes.

You may use this same basic dough for other roll shapes.

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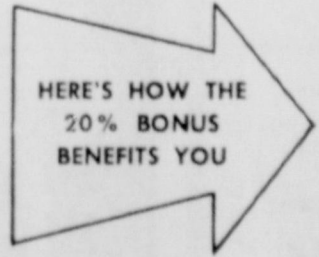

Three Firemen Attend School

Three Slaton firemen participated in the 38th annual Texas Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M University July 16-21.

They were Don Kendrick, Pete Williams and James Downey. Kendrick is fire marshal for Slaton and Williams is assistant.

The trio was among 2,200 firemen who attended, representing 565 cities and 29 states in the U.S. and several foreign countries.

Texas towns sending firemen to the school receive fire rates credit for their insurance rates according to the number of firemen participating. Cities sponsoring one qualified fireman who completes the work successfully receive three percent credit. Those who sponsor a fireman and fire marshal receive four percent credit, and cities with two or more firemen and the marshal get a five percent credit.

Henry D. Smith, school director, emphasized the greatest benefit gained from the school is the reduction in fire losses through more efficient methods of fire fighting learned during the training.

Instruction included 16 separate 30-hour courses in fire-fighting, fire marshal training, fire department officer training, instructor training, pump maintenance and pump operation.

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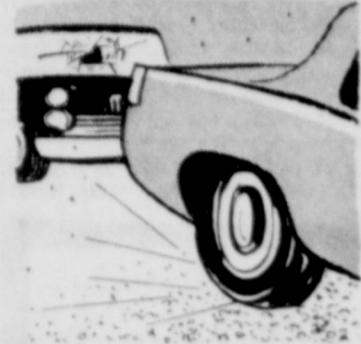

"Shrapnel" From Tires

Speeding along a gravel road, a motorist drove over a little pile of loose stones. One of the stones squirmed sideways, crashed through the windshield of an oncoming car, and injured the other driver.

After litigation, the first motorist was held liable for the mishap. The court said that, in view of his speed and the condition of the road, he should have foreseen the likelihood of hurling "shrapnel" from his tires.

The case illustrates an important principle: a motorist must be alert not only to the general danger of collisions but also to the special dangers that arise from the speed, weight, and make-up of the car. Here is how legal liability resulted when a car became:

1) A Booby Trap—A man left his old jalopy, with gasoline still in the tank, on a vacant lot where children often played. One day a boy crashed two rocks together near the opening of the tank, causing a spark that set off an explosion. For the resulting injury to the boy, the car owner had to pay damages.

2) A Battering Ram—A man parked his automobile on a slope, pulling his brakes only half tight. In his absence the car began rolling downhill, and finally crashed through the plate glass window of a store. Here too the motorist was held responsible.

3) A Bone Crusher—Picking up a neighbor's small son, a motorist slammed the door shut without

warning—and without giving the child enough time to get his hand out of the door's way. Result: broken bones, and legal liability imposed on the motorist.

4) A Heart Stopper—Rounding a corner, a man drove straight at a woman pedestrian crossing the street. Although he did manage to stop just in time, the woman fell down in sheer panic, suffering painful injuries. Again, liability for the motorist. As one judge warned, in describing the rights of the pedestrian:

"His right-of-way is not to be measured in fractions of an inch nor tested by split seconds. He is entitled not to just as much space as his body, clothes and buttons

require, but to as much as will afford him a safe passage. The pedestrian's heart, as well as his body, should be free from attack."

In short, today's automobile can play many roles in inflicting harm. The car owner bears a responsibility that is not only heavy but diversified as well. It is the law's way of facing up to the less pleasant realities of the automobile age.

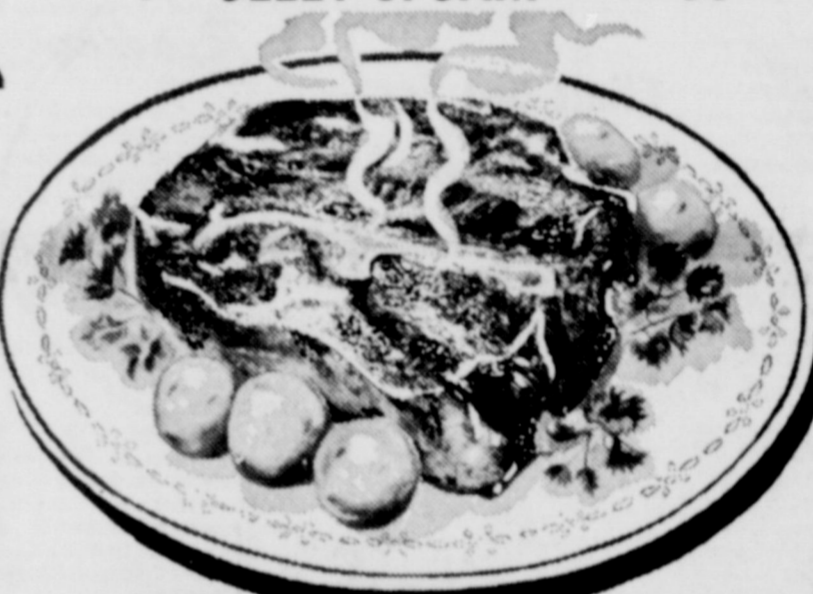
