Report Shows 20% of Cotton In Long Staples

Long staple cotton, in the Acala and Del Cerro varieties, represents about 20 percent of the cotton planted in Lubbock County, according to a report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture this

Of all the cotton varieties planted on the South Plains, the long staples represented only about 7 percent of the total. According to the survey in Lubbock County, the leading variety was Lankart 57 with 39 percent shown, Next was Acala 1517-BR2 which represented 11

percent, and PM-111 for a 9 percent total. These were followed by Del Cerro, 7 percent; Lankart 611, 6 percent; Stripper 31, 5 per-cent; PM-202 and LSM, 3 percent each; and Acala 1517-V. Gregg 35, PM-101A, Lockett 4789, and Sweatt 75, all at 2

percent each, Miscellaneous

accounted for the other 7 percent. For Lynn County, the report showed Lankart 57 tops with 37 percent of the total, followed by Lankart 611 with 14 percent. The long staples represented only 5 percent in Lynn plantings.

The South Plains area percentages, covering 20 counties, showed Lankart 57 accounting for 22 percent and PM-111 a close second at 21 percent.



1 cup warm water (105-115 2 packages or cakes yeast (Fleischmann's) active dry



gar, salt and margarine. Cool lukewarm. Measure warm water into large bow. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm water mixture, egg and half the flour; beat until smooth, Stir in enough remaining flour to make soft dough . Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, turning to grease top, Cover tightly with waxed paper or

aluminum foil. Store in refrigerator until doubled in bulk, or until needed, Dough may be kept 4-5 days in refrigerator (about 40-45 de-

To make Pan Rolls, divide dough into thirds. From each third, form 9 smooth balls of size (27 balls total). Place in 3 greased 8 inch round cake pans; cover, let rise in warm place free from draft until doubled in bulk (about 30 minutes). Brush lightly with melted margarine. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees F. about 15-20 minutes.

You may yse this same basic dough for other roll shapes.

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





Three Firemen Attend School

Three Slaton firemen participated in the 38th annual Texas Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M University July 16-

They were Don Kendrick, Pete Williams and James Downey, Kendrick is fire marshal for Slaton and Williams is assistant.

The trio was among 2,200 firemen who attended, repre-senting 565 cities and 29 states in the U.S. and several foreign

Texas towns sending firemen to the school receive key rate credit for their insurance rates according to the number of firemen participating. Cities sponsoring one qualified fireman who completes the work successfully receive three percent credit. Those who sponsor a fireman and fire marshal receive four percent credit, and cities with two or more fireman and the marshal get a five percent credit.

Henry D. Smith, school director, emphasized the greatest benefit gained from the school is the reduction in fire losses through more efficient methods of fire fighting learned during the training.

Instruction included 16 separate 30-hour courses in firefighting, fire marshal training, fire department officer training, instructor training, pump maintenance and pump opera-

He wasn't breathing when I pulled him out of the pool, His heart was still beating, I checked that, I gave him mouthto-mouth resuscitation and he started breathing heavy. Then police arrived,"

Benson was admitted to Memorial Medical Center and placed under intensive care.






