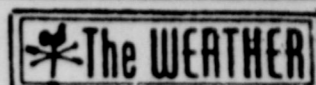

## City Budget Poses Revenue Problem

### Near 2,000 Slaton Students Expected in Classes Sept. 3

Slaton schools will open with a "unitary" system this year due to a Federal ruling. West Ward Elementary will house all 1st through 3rd graders; Austin will become the intermediate school for all 4th and 5th graders; Junior High will again have the 6th through 8th graders, and High School takes all 9th through 12th graders.

This does away with the Evans School in southeast Slaton, and erases the neighborhood school building pattern used so many years.

Slaton students in the first five grades will register Tuesday, the first day of school. High schoolers have already registered, and junior high students should register today (Thursday). Students should pick up registration cards in the school cafeteria, according to this schedule: 6th graders at 1 p.m., 7th grade at 2 p.m., and 8th grade at 3 p.m. New junior high students who have moved to Slaton this summer

should register Friday afternoon in the cafeteria. Slaton schools will operate all day, beginning Tuesday, except for first graders. They will attend school only a half day the first two weeks. Buses will operate on the same schedule as in the latter part of spring.

Classes are already underway for Slaton teachers. A pre-school workshop started Wednesday with emphasis on audio-visual teaching methods. This morning teachers were to hold meetings in their own buildings, and new teachers were to meet this afternoon. Reading programs will be stressed in a session Friday morning.

### Cooper Students Register Friday, Roosevelt Set

Classes start at Roosevelt and Cooper schools next Tuesday, but registration was underway this week.

Roosevelt held registration Monday through Wednesday. A Community-wide Ice Cream Supper is planned Monday, Sept. 2, to give citizens an opportunity to meet the teachers. All community residents are invited to the ice cream supper at the football field beginning at 8 p.m.

Registration at Cooper will be held Friday. Carl McMillan, new high school principal, will move into a new high school building and gym complex that is to be completed in April. A new water system and new agricultural building will also be constructed this year.

Junior and seniors will register at 10 a.m. Friday, with freshmen and sophomores signing up at 1 p.m., according to Supt. Harold Carpenter. Eighth graders register at 10 a.m., 7th graders at 11, and 6th graders at 1 p.m.

Slaton City Commission ran into a detour on a scheduled budget study Monday night. With tax rolls still to be approved, the commission had no figure to use for anticipated revenues.

However, a "rough draft" of expenditures presented by City Secretary Gerald Kendrick left little doubt that the commission will have to find a source for revenue beside the ad valorem tax money.

One source has been expected by citizens for some time. The city commission has put the word out on a number of occasions that water rates would have to be increased after Canadian River water came to the city.

And, Mayor Jonas Cain pointed out at the regular commission meeting Monday night that the city will have a \$90,000 bill on Canadian River water this year. This includes first payment on the CRMWA project and costs for treatment of water.

The commission has been studying several water-rate increase proposals, but none of them will provide all the additional revenue which apparently will be needed this year.

So, the stage is set for an all-important meeting at the next city commission session. Some definite tax totals and the (See CITY, Page 7)

### More Rainfall Boosts Crops

Hopes for fine cotton and grain sorghum crops continued to mount in the Slaton area this week following another round of heavy thundershowers over the weekend.

A shower Friday afternoon was followed with heavy amounts of rainfall Saturday night, with measurements of .50 of an inch to 3.5 inches reported around the area.

Slaton recorded about 1.5 inches Saturday night, while 3.5 inch readings were given around southland and southwest of the city.

Skies were partly cloudy and the humidity reading above normal for much of the period. Forecast Wednesday was for continued cloudiness and scattered thundershowers.

Some areas around Slaton have received more than 20 inches of moisture this year, well above the annual average. No high winds or hail were reported with the heavy showers here Saturday night.

However, wind-whipped rains and hail were reported in other areas of the South Plains--particularly around the Plains and Seminole areas. A tornado funnel was sighted near Lubbock Saturday evening, but it never touched ground. Lubbock had a 76 degree reading Saturday for the lowest maximum in the state.

## Slogan Contest Deadline Friday

## Tiger Coach Optimistic About Move to 3-AAA

"This season will be a great challenge to us and to the kids," Tiger Coach Ernie Davis told Slaton Lions Tuesday during the club's regular weekly luncheon meeting at Bruce's.

"We think we have a good team, and the boys think so. We're going out to win," Davis said of the team's chances in the new Class AAA district. "The big difference between AA and AAA ball is depth," Davis added. "We think our first 11 will be as good as the others."

Davis told Lions the Tigers would travel to Abertamy Friday afternoon for a scrimmage session. He said the staff has been experimenting on different combinations in the backfield and line, and the scrimmage would "determine which place people belong."

One of the most notable "experiments" has veteran quarterback Jimmy Williams running from a halfback post. This combo also has Hobby Chapple at quarterback, Morris Dixon or Nicky Farrell at halfback,

and Richard Washington at fullback.

When Williams is the man under, the rest of the backfield is composed of Washington, Dixon or Farrell, and Larry Moore, big 195-pounder who was a junior varsity tackle last season.

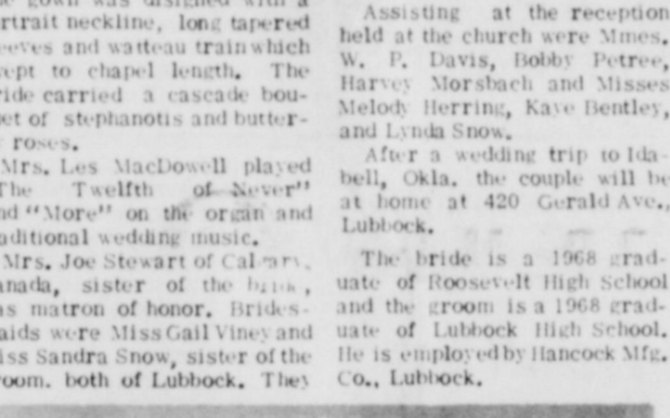



But, the experts also agreed, the rural leadership represented in their Dallas audience is needed now to develop additional opportunities to assure a prosperous future for rural Texas. And each expert described the professional and organizational assistance available from his development agency or firm.

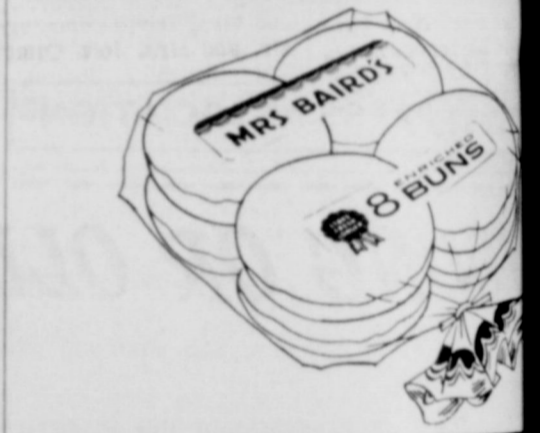

Horse Disease Warning Issued The Texas Veterinary Medical Association, citing findings by a veterinarian in West Texas, reports that equine (horse) encephalomyelitis has been discovered. The cases were reported in West Texas near Seminole by Dr. A.J. Mabry, a large animal practitioner in that area.

The disease, sometimes called sleeping sickness and Blind Stagers, is a virus perpetuated by small birds that carry a high concentration of the virus in their blood. The culex mosquito transmits the disease from the birds to horses and can also transmit it to man. Horses do not transmit the disease the Veterinary Medical Association says.

Encephalomyelitis is often fatal and may cause permanent brain damage to surviving animals. The T.V.M.A. said horse owners should vaccinate their animals and take mosquito control measures. August and September are especially critical months for the disease in all of Texas since high mosquito population are found during these months. Vaccination of horses now and immediate mosquito control measures will help keep the disease from reaching epidemic proportions as was the case in 1967, the Veterinary Medical Association said.

Work Scheduled On Highways In Lubbock The Texas Highway Commission recently approved the expenditure of \$433,900 for highway safety and betterment for Farm to Market Road improvement in Lubbock County during 1969.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 27.7 miles in Lubbock County will be involved in the annual program.

Work will be under the supervision of James W. King, District Maintenance Engineer, Lubbock, for the seal coat; H. C. Weaver, Plainview, for reconstruction work in Abernathy; and Elmer Wright, Lubbock, for reconstruction work in Lubbock.

The work is part of the highway commission's combined Farm to Market road improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment program for 1969.

The safety and betterment portion of the program will cover 13.7 highway miles in the county at an estimated cost of \$402,800. The farm to market road improvement program will cost an estimated \$31,100 for 14 miles of FM roads.

US 87, Avenue A, will receive a seal coat from spur 326 to 45th Street. This is a distance of 4.2 miles at a cost of \$25,300. From 45th Street to 60th Street, a distance of 1.2 miles, Avenue A will undergo reconstruction at an estimated cost of \$275,000.

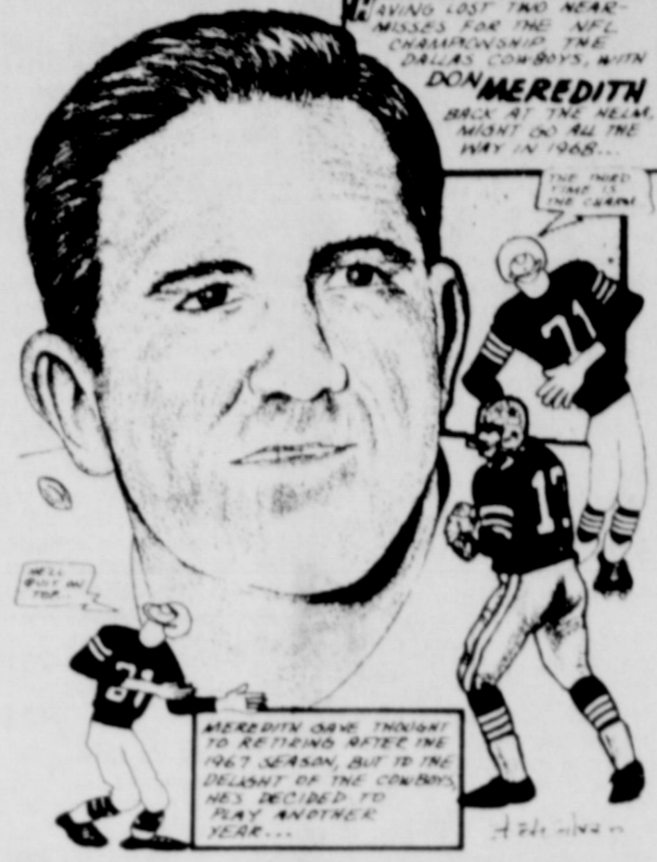
## Cal Farley's Boys Ranch Rodeo Sept. 1-2

## Wilson Seeks 3rd Title With New Coach, Slaton

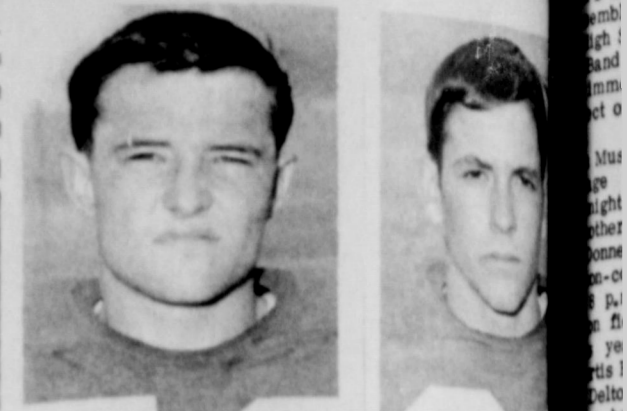
A new head coach and a new district schedule are in the football picture at Wilson, but the winning tradition is the same as the Mustangs shoot for their third district championship in a row.

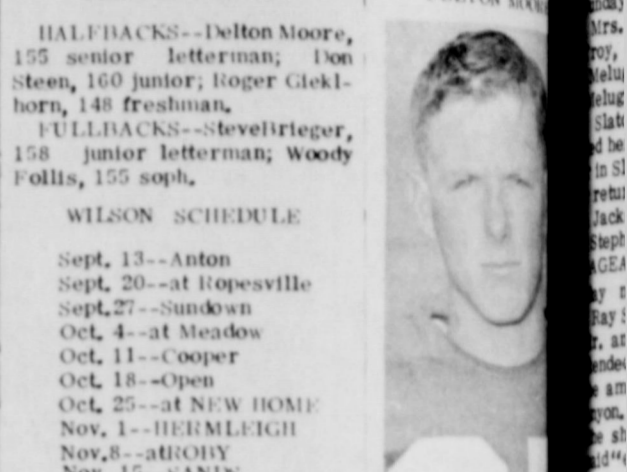

### TIPS FOR

SAFETY-PIN HOOK HOLDER You can keep small hooks organized in a tackle box by threading eyes through a slot or by sticking them on a good bar magnet.

KEEPS THE WALLET DRY Before going out in a boat or fishing, slip a wallet in a sealed plastic bag and replace the pocket. You may get wet but your billfold won't.

KEEP MINNOW BUCKET CLEAN Clean your minnow bucket periodically. Baking soda and your bait will live longer.

AMMONIA STOPS STING Creatures like wasps, yellow jackets and ants are a hazard in camp. Carry along a small amount of ammonia. A quick dab on a sting neutralizes the acid and cuts down on the pain.

DRYING THE TACKLE BOX Next time you get the inside of your tackle box wet and you don't want to completely clean it, prevent rust by using your vacuum cleaner to reverse on it that blows air instead of suction. Blow air inside the tackle box for a few days and watch the moisture dry up.

PLASTIC PREVENTS DAMPNESS A small square sheet of plastic doesn't take much room in your tackle box, but it's handy when you want a dry seat on a wet stream bank.

PILL BOXES FOR HOOKS Small plastic pill bottles, available by mail at the drugstore, make handy storage containers for things like hooks, swivels and line cutters.

KID RATTLE WITH RUBBER Glue some strips of inertible rubber to the bottom of your tackle box and it won't rattle in your boat.

DUAL PURPOSE FOR ROBBIE Thread a small fishing bobber on your line. Then should you accidentally drop the bobber the bobber will float. This enables you to retrieve the key.

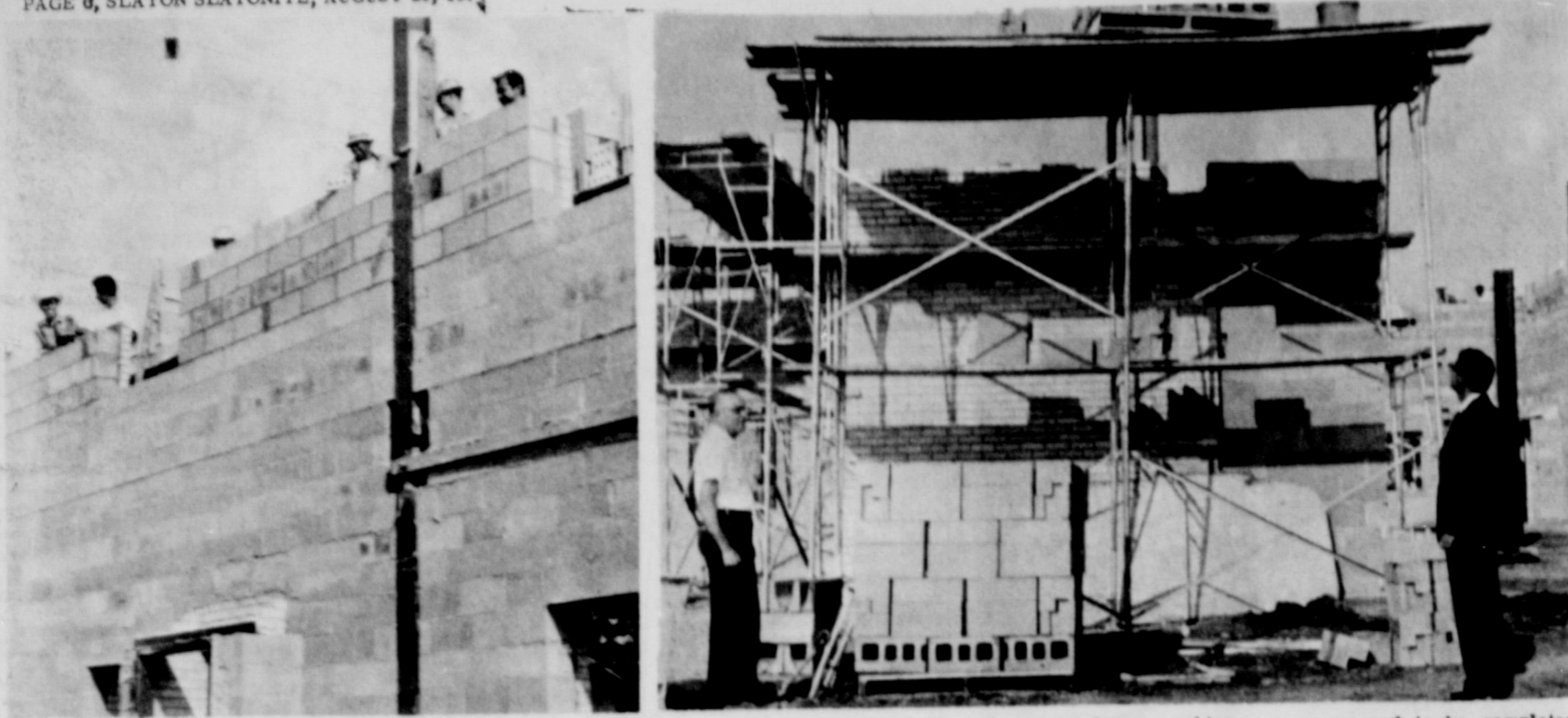

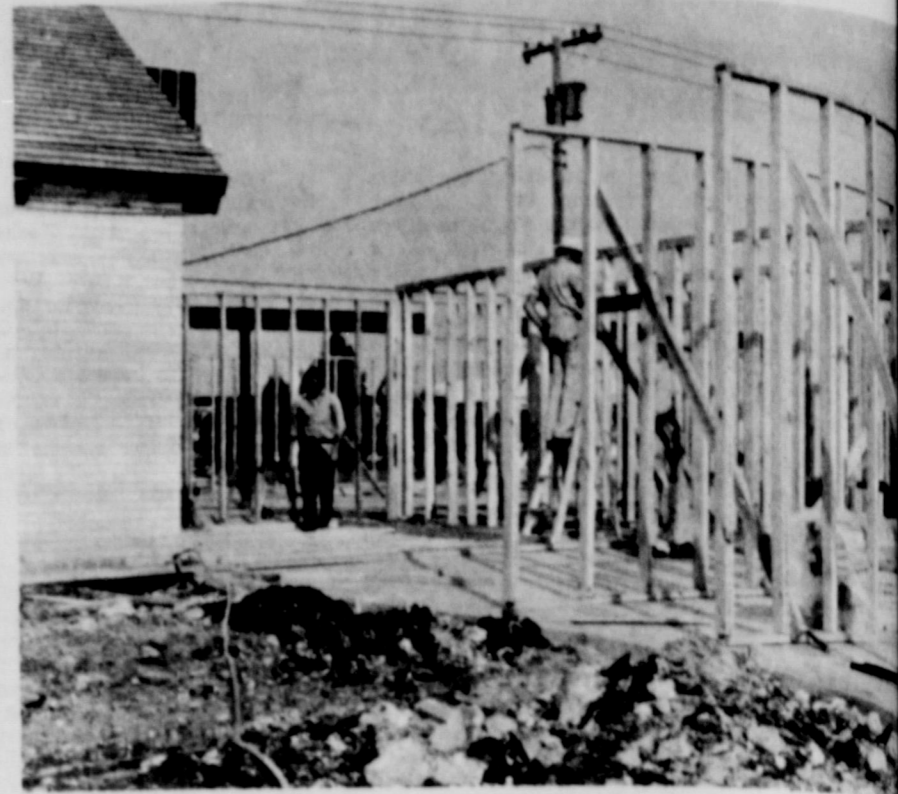

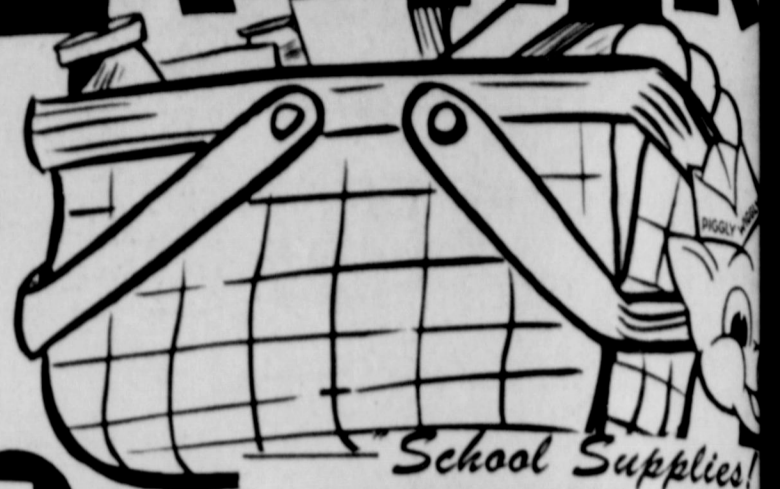
