HEAD OF FAMILY GETS \$2,000 EXEMPTION

Two Hundred Dollar Exemption Allowed for Dependents, Under 18, or Incapable of Self-Support.

Net Incomes of \$1,000 or Over if Single and \$2,000 or Over if Married Must Be Reported.

Single persons, though required to file a return if their net income for 1920 was \$1,000 or more, are, if they are the heads of families, granted a are the heads of families, granted a special exemption under the revenue laws. Such a person is defined by Treasury regulations as "a person who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for those dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation." Such persons are allowed the exemption of \$2,000 granted a married person. In addition, they are also allowed a credit of \$200 for each dependent under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

Husband and Wife.

Husband and Wife.

A married person living with husband and wife can not claim an additional \$2,000 exemption as the head of a family. His or her exemption is based upon the marital status, irrespective of the support of others living in the same household. The additional \$200 credit for dependents does not apply to the husband or wife of a taxpayer. For example, if a married man supports a father who is incapable of self-support, he is entitled to the \$200 credit for such person. If through force of circumstances he supports his wife away from home he is entitled to the \$2,000 exemption allowed a married person, but not to a \$200 credit for a dependent.

A son who has left home but who sends his mother more than one-half the sum required for her support is entitled to the \$200 credit, provided the mother can not support herself. Otherwise, the amount must be considered as a gift, and, therefore, the credit is not allowed. A son living at home and supporting his father, mother, or other relative may claim the \$2,000 exemption allowed the head of a family, but not the \$200 credit unless such relative is under 18 years of age or capable of self-support.

1. The King on His way to Jerusalem (vv. 17-19). This is His last journey to the beloved city. He took the twelve disciples aside from the group of traveling pilgrims to make known unto them what was before them. On the journey He went ahead of the disciples. The courage thus shown by the Lord amazed the disciples who were following in fear (Mark 10:32). "Christ, the conscious and certain sufferer, is courageous. His followers who had nothing to fear were afraid."

2. Betrayal and death foretold (vv. 18, 19). He went forward fully conscious of the awful tragedy of the cross. He for the third time since the transfiguration tells the disciples of His suffering and death, but they are so filled with their ambitious schemes that they do not understand Him. He spoke directly to the men, not to their mother, declaring that they knew not what they were asking. He showed them that the way to this position of glory was through suffering. The cup of which they were to drink was that of great suffering and agony. The positions which they craved were attainable, but in a very different way from what they apprehended. The way to the places of glory in the kingdom of Christ is through the path of lowly and selfforgetful service, even great suffer-

3. How to Be Truly Exalted (vv. 24-28).

1. The angry disciples (v. 24). When the ten heard of the request of James and John they were filled with indignation against them. Their displeasure did not arise from the fact that they were free from the same selfish spirit, but that these two had thrust themselves to the front; it was an admixture of indignation and jealousy.

2. Greatness among the heathen (v. 25). The rule of the world has always been by the strong hand. The standards have been not moral excellence, but wealth, station and power, Even today the reason one nation rules the other is that the one possesses sharper swords and heavier

clubs than the other. 3. Greatness among Christ's disciples (vv. 26, 27). Here the standard is in sharp contrast. The way to the places of prominence in Christ's kingdom is the way of self-abasement, It is not wrong to be ambitious to be great, but the basis of true greatness is that which human selfishness seeks to avoid. There will be degrees of rank in Christ's kingdom, but this rank will be character, not posi-

tion or authority. 4. Christ is the supreme example of greatness (v. 28). All who would be great should study and imitate Christ. Let them forget self and serve others, even to give their lives. This will eliminate all scrambling for place and power. The one grand test by which to know whether Christ's Spirit controls one is whether he is serving or seeking to be served.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN. (Copyrighted by W. T. Foster.)

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—During early part of week centering on Feb. 6 a great high temperature wave will come out of the extreme northwill come out of the extreme north-west and overspread all the northern Rockies and Pacific slope. It will ex-tend southeastward and by Feb. 6 will cover all of North America that lies east of meridian 90. This great warm wave will extend eastward and by Feb. 8 will reach the Atlantic coast. A great storm center will fol-low, one or two days behind the warm low, one or two days behind the warm wave, and will move in the direction of New Orleans. It will penetrate the cotton states and then move northeastward near the line of the Alleghaeastward near the line of the Allegna-nies and out on to the Atlantic not far from New York City. A cold wave, carrying blizzard attachments, will follow one or two days behind storm center. This will be an important storm, taking all its features; its temperatures will average much be-

One of the new and important dis-coveries is the cause that locates the points at which the storms enter Canada or America. Sometimes they en-ter east of and sometimes west of the Rockies. The storms of this Winter have been and will continue to enter from west of Rockies, some of them as far south as northern California. These are important facts because they control the location of rain, snow and temperatures. A storm that enters thru northern California carries rains, followed by colder than usual, into the cotton States, while Canada, east of Rockies, gets no warm wave but severe cold and little snow.

I continue to advise farmers not to sell cotton or grain. Europe is starving while the profiteers are getting possession of the grain and cotton. The time will come when the profit-eers' interests will be for grain and cotton to go up. The farmers' products are out of proportion below all other commodities. We, of the cities are paying war prices for farm products while the farmers are selling at half war prices. This cannot continue.

Our government seems unable to control the profiteers. But don't let despair knock you out, There is a better time coming. The future of agriculture holds its greatest success. I have full confidence in the farm and its future and wish that I could get back to it. I still advise not only to stay on the farm but to not change location.

February will have one more bad spell of weather when the great storm of the week centering on Feb. 24 comes in. Balance of the month will bring better than usual cropweather

for outside affairs.

March? That is the inauguration month. There is some doubt about Washington weather for the inauguration, but conditions seem to favor good weather. Very bad weather is expected in the middle northwest about this time, but probabilities seem to say that the bad weather will not reach Washington till after the Fourth. If I find that good weather may be expected at Washington for inauguration day I will make a prediction later, but if the doubt grows seriously I will be quiet about it.



Where has all the money gone? A country banker asked that question the other day. He was in Kansas City trying to borrow money to tide over his customers and offering a bushel of wheat as security for every 30 cents, He was turned down cold. Another banker replied to his question:

"The cities in the best financial shape," he said, "are Boston, Philadelphia and Cleveland. The rural districts in best financial shape are the great dairying districts."

"Time deposits in many rural districts have been looped in two. In the great dairy regions there's scarcely a decline in time deposits. They still have money and

It is significant that hidebound Boston, conservative Philadelphia and hard-working Cleveland are the flush towns; not New York with its Wall street gambling, Chicago with its slick Board of Trade or oily Tulsa.

Boston, of course, reaped a harvest through the shameless profiteering of the huge textile industries, which, with the sugar barons, can claim the notoriety of being about the biggest hogs that ever fattened on a people's wartime necessity. Philadelphia, too, has its horde of tailor profiteers; and Cleveland its share, but in all three the spirit has been to create, keep working, and, although they gouged, they kept creating. And they are on the top.

The same is true in agriculture. Before the war we all knew that the old cream check was the safest and surest way to accumulate. Through the war the dairy business lost heavily. Feed was high and help scarce. But just the same, in the face of these disadvantages, and without the profiteers' advantages that the cities had, the dairy districts seem to be on top in this time of tight money.-Capper's Farmer.




