Organized opposition to the new tax valuations appeared from some farmers this week, with petitions being circulated to present to the equalization board in protest of school district valuations. A crowd of some 75 persons gathered

at City Hall Monday morning, apparently to protest valuations to the equalization board. They were told the board hearings had been postponed and reset for Aug. 5-7 due to the large amount of paper work to be done.

There were reports from several business people that some of the petition bearers threatened a "farmer boycoit of city firms" if the businessman didn't sign the petition. This method of securing signatures was not endorsed by all those in protest, however.

There was no doubt, however, that

school board members and board of equalization members were feeling the backlash of resentment from some farm owners in the school district.

The school district sent out letters this week explaining the new study of values on irrigated land. Under the reappraisal, the farm land was given a basic 100 percent valuation of \$200 per acre for dryland and \$350 for irrigated. This would be an assessed value of

The valuation on irrigated land did not take into consideration the extent of the irrigation. A review of the situation is likely to wind up with an assessed valuation of \$100 per acre, plus differentials for the number of irrigated acres.

Prior to the reapprisal, farmland had an assessed value of about \$42 per acre, ranging to about \$50 for best irrigated land.

City and school officials, in securing an outside firm to make the appriasal, thought it necessary in order to prevent partiality and to arrive at equitable values for all. They realized there would be some errors, but depended on the board of equalization to take care of these

There seemed to be much misunderstanding about the tax program concerning the amount of new revenue to be raised by the school district, the total increase in valuations, and the tax rate being lowered.

The school board, in approving the total reappraisal figure, then determined school revenue needs and set an assessment percentage and tax rate that would produce the desired total. The school upped its assessed valuation total from about \$14 million to \$20 million.

assessed totals, there was some confusion about the amount of increase in valuations. Under the new assessed total, the school estimated revenue at \$350,000 compared to some \$288,000 last year. This amounts to a tax revenue increase of some \$62,000.

In studying school needs, trustees had anticipated rising costs of operation and teacher salary increases as major items in pushing the budget up. Should the state teacher pay raise be approved this year, it was pointed out the local district would be required to put some \$20,000 into the pot. Trustees had also been considering a local pay raise in order for Slaton to compete for qualified teachers.

City valuations increased slightly, from \$20.8 to \$21.5 million -- or a new assessed value of \$10.7. Based on the new schedules, the city would realize an increase of tax revenue from \$161,000 last year to some \$188,000 this year.

Trustees anticipate the additional revenue will be needed to take care of these needs and rising operational costs. If the state raise is not passed this year, trustees were hesitant about making the tax raise smaller and having to raise taxes again next year.

assessed values would be "out of line", but that was the purpose of the equalization board--to determine if the tax assessment was fair and equitable. City property owners, whose values had been closer to market values in previous

Some misunderstanding concerning assessed values and the new tax rate was a cause for some controversy, but the flame of discontent was fanned by some farmers who were unhappy with the big jump in farmland values.

One of the petitions being circulated by a group of farm owners called the appraisals "unreasonable, speculative and confiscatory." One such petition addressed to the board of equalization

"We, the undersigned owners of real estate situated in the Slaton Independent School District, having received notice of proposed appraisals of our respective properties, hereby protest the adoption of such appraisals for tax purposes.

"We would show that such appraisals are unreasonable, speculative and confiscatory, will result in destruction of the economy of the community from which action the school and community will eventually suffer irreparable

"The valuations as indicated in the notices indicate an effort to place a greater burden upon our real properties than upon other properties in the district, which is neither lawful nor just."

The City and school district had joined together recently on the first revaluation program undertaken since 1946. Contract on the project was awarded to the Ehrenborg Appraisal Co. of Dallas.

The reappraisal project was awarded to the company on a low bid of \$12,250. The school agreed to pay 60 percent of the cost and the city 40 percent in the joint program. The pro rata share of the cost was determined on the basis of taxing parcels on each unit's tax roll.

Both taxing units set their percentage of assessment at 50 percent, and both set a tax rate of \$1.75 per \$100 assessed value. Rates had previously been at \$2 on a 35 to 40 percent assessment of market value.

Tax notices went out two weeks ago to property owners whose valuations had been increased. For some -- whose valuation increase was slight, the tax bill was actually less. A few complaints came from this area before taxpayers discovered their taxes were actually lower under the new rate.

Man Killed In **Shooting Here**

Frank B. Dobbins, a 33 yearold Negro was shot to death outside an east Slaton cafe early

Friday morning. A 53-year-old man was arrested in connection with the shooting, but he was released after questioning and charges were dropped. Witnesses said the shooting was in self de-

fense. The shooting took place at approximately 1:40 a.m. Dobbins was pronounced dead at Mercy Hospital twenty minutes later.

Just after midnight Friday morning, Robert Moore of Lubbock was stabbed twice. Moore and his wife were sitting in their car at the intersection of New Mexico and Dayton when two Latin Americans came by and stabbed him. Moore was released after treatment at Mercy Hospital.

About twenty - four hours earlier, on the morning of July 4th, a man was seen trying to enter Howard's Gulf Station. When the man spotted an approaching patrol car, he broke and ran west in an alley. Officer Blackerby ordered the man to stop and when he did not, Blackerby fired two shots. possibly hitting the man in the right side. Slaton and the vicinity had been visited by a thunderstorm and high winds a week previously on a Monday night, Wind gusts were reported at 50 mph by the Lubbock Weather Bureau, but they apparently reached higher speeds here. Many tree limbs were ripped from trees, and some trees toppled by the strong wind.

Other areas of the South Plains were raked by the rain and hail, and a tornado alert existed for a time in western Lubbock County and areas west



Texas Travel Trail Folders Now Available

AUSTIN -- Governor John Connally today announced the publication of detailed folders for two of the Statewide system of Texas Travel Trails.

The folders, published by the Texas Highway Department, will serve as guides and detail numerous points of interest along the Texas Mountain Trail in far West Texas, and the Texas Forest Trail in deep East Texas.

The folders will lead travelers through picturesque landscapes, by historic sites and to colorful cities and towns on the two official State trails.

Connally announced the new Statewide system of trails last January. Each county erected special Travel Trail signs along the 10 official trail routes.

The Mountain Trail folder guides travelers through the tallest region of Texas, where 90 peaks thrust above a mile high. The route goes past the nation's newest national park, to be developed in the Guada. lupe Mountains, and to Davis Mountains State Park.

Those following the Mountain Trail will visit Big Bend National Park, the scenic El Camino del Rio from Big Bend to Presidio, and through the cities of Van Horn, Fort Davis, Marfa, Alpine and El Paso.

The Texas Forest Trail explores a 790-mile loop through the vast Piney Woods region. It goes through four national forests and past scores of federal, State and county recreational areas.

Other spots of interest include the East Texas oil field, the State's only Indian reservation, the Big Thicket and such popular water sport areas as Lake O' the Pines, Caddo Lake and Sam Rayburn Reservoir.

Travel Trail literature is available from the Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus and district offices, and at chambers of commerce along the Travel Trail routes.

Individual folders for the reaining eight Travel Trails will be released during the next few weeks as soon as printing is completed.

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

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

ORDINANCE NUMBER 314 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, ENTIT-LED "AIR POLLUTION CON-

SAME BEING A NEW OR -DINANCE, PROVIDING FOR AIR POLLUTION CONTROL TO BE VESTEDIN THE DIRECTOR OF THE LUBBOCK CITY -COUNTY HEALTH DEPART-MENT; PROVIDING DEFIN-PROVIDING FOR POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE DIRECTOR; PROVIDING FOR OPERATING CERTIFICATES; ESTABLISHING AMBIENT AIR AND EMISSION STANDARDS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCE -MENT; PROVIDING A PEN-ALTY; PROVIDING FOR SEV-ERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Slaton, finds that emissions of smoke, of suspended particulate matter and of gaseous air contaminates present a source of danger to the health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Slaton, and the City Commission is of the opinion that an air pollution control ordinance should be enacted to protect the inthereof; NOW habitants THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON:

SECTION 1. That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Slaton shall provide for a new ordinance which shall read as follows:

ARTICLE L. Air Pollution Control. Section 1. Short Title. This

Article is known as the Air Pollution Control Ordinance of the City of Slaton.

Section 2. The Director of the Lubbock City - County Health Department acting through the Air Pollution Control Division thereof is hereby vested with all powers and duties of administration, control, enforcement and interpretations of this Ordinance, and the official acts, functions, powers, duties and control regulations and directions of said Department and said Director, are hereby adopted by the said City of Slaton, presently and in the future, for the administration and enforcement of this Ordin-

Section 3. Definitions. For the purpose of this Article, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein: (a) "Air Contaminant" means

particulate matter, dust, fumgas, mist, smoke, vapor odor, or any combination thereof produced by processes other than natural.

b) "Air Pollution" means the presence in the atmosphere of e or more air contaminants combinations thereof, in such concentration and of such duration as are or may tend to be injurious to or to adversely affect humans, animal life, vegetation or property, or as interfere with the normal use and enjoyment of animal life, vegetation or property. (c) "Person" is any individual, partnership, co - partnership company, corporation, association, joint stock company, trust, estate, political subdivision, or any other legal entity, or their legal representatives, agents or assigns. (d) "Control Director" shall be the person holding the position of Public Health Director of the Lubbock City - County

Health Department. (e) "State Board" means the Texas Air Control Board. (f) "Act" means the Clean Air Act of Texas, Chapter 727 g,

60th Legislature in regular session, 1967. (g) "Emission" means the release into the outdoor atmos-

phere of air contaminants. (h) "Ambient Air Standards" means the standards for the outdoor atmosphere established in Section 11 and Section 12

of this Article. (i) "Waste Material" means refuse; garbage; rubbish; other solid or liquid wastes and use-

carded materials. (i) "Source" is any and all points of orgin of the items defined in Section 3. (k) "Property" means any freehold interest in land. (1) "Conditional Operating Certificate" is:

(1) A temporary Operating Certificate issued to an owner, lessee, or operator of a property who is operating under a variance issued by the State Board, or (2) A temporary Operating Certificate issued by the Con-

trol Director to an owner. lessee, or operator of a property who is operating under a variance to those specific provisions of this ordinance not covered by the Act or the rules and regulations of the State Board. ection 4. Duties of the Control

Director. The Control Director shall perform or cause to be performed the following duties: (a) Administer and enforce all laws, ordinances, rules and regulations pertaining to air pollution as provided in this ordinance. (b) Request that necessary legal

proceedings be instituted to prosecute violations of this ordinance and compel the prevention and abatement of air pollution or of a nuisance arising therefrom.

(c) Examine and approve, or disapprove, the plans for

(1) equipment for the commercial burning of waste material or for the burning of waste material collected by the City waste material collection system;

(2) equipment designed for burning fuel in commercial and industrial activities; and (3) equipment installed, repaired, constructed, reconstructed, altered or added to, to control or reduce air pollution from commercial, industrial, manufacturing and municipally operated activitles, other than from motors and engines used in propelling land, water and air vehicles; and

(d) Make periodic inspections of equipment described in Section 4(c) to determine whether it is in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance. (e) Investigate complaints of violations of this ordinance, make inspections of sources and ambient air conditions, and maintain a record of the investigations, complaints, inspections and observations conducted.

(f) Promulgate such rules and regulations as may be reasonable and necessary to carry out the intent of this ordinance to insure all sources of air pollution within his jurisdiction comply with the standards in this ordinance. A copy of such rules and regulations shall be filed with the City Secretary and shall constitute a public record.

(g) Encourage voluntary cooperation by persons affected groups in the preservation and regulation of the purity of the outdoor atmosphere.

(h) Collect and disseminate information to the public on air pollution. (i) Work with planning and zon-

ing agencies for the purpose of coordinating activities under the provisions of this ordinance with planning and zoning activities, and foster the best possible management of the air resources of the City of Slaton. (j) Cooperate and work with Federal, State, County, municipal, and other agencies concerned with air pollution to insure that the air resources of the City of Slaton will be conserved and improved.

(k) Perform such other functions as may be necessary to carry out effectively the duties

Section 5. Variance by Control Director - Revocation.

(a) Whenever it is found by the Control Director, upon presentation of adequate proof, that known address. compliance with any provision Section 10. Appeal from Denial of this ordinance, will result in an arbitrary or unreason- (a) Any person denied an operable taking of property or in ating certificate or whose opthe practical closing or elimination of any lawful business, occupation or activity, in either case without corresponding benefit or advantage to the owner, lessee or operator of such business, occupation, or activity, the Control Director may grant individual variances beyond the limits provided in this ordinance with such variances pertaining only to air contaminants which are not regulated by the Act or rules, regulations or orders of the State Board.

(b) Any variance granted pursuant to this section shall be granted for such period of time as shall be specified by the Control Director at the time of the grant and may be revoked by the Control Director upon the failure of the holder of such variance to abide by and operate in accordance with the terms and conditions of such variance.

Section 6. Jurisdiction of the Control Director. For purposes of enforcing the standards prescribed in this ordinance, the Control Director has jurisdiction within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton hereinafter referred to as the "base area" and within 5,000 feet beyond the corporate limits of said City to abate any nuisance arising from the violation of this ordinance. Section 7. Required Data and

Date Control. (a) The Control Director may, from time to time, require the owner, lessee or operator of all sources and suspected sources in the City's base area to submit date on the sources for the purpose of evaluating the air pollution potential within the base area.

(b) Any data and information identified as confidential when submitted, relating to secret processes or methods of manufacture or production, shall not be disclosed without the written consent of the person submitting it.

Section 8. Operating Certificates.

(a) The owner, lessee or operator of every property within the base area of the City of Slaton on which a source is located who makes or continues to make emissions after the time of the adoption of this ordinance shall apply to the Control Director for an operating certificate.

(b) The application shall be signed by the holder, lessee or operator of the property or his agent and, in addition to any other information which the Control Director may reasonably require, shall contain:

(1) the name and address of the applicant; if the applicant is other than an individual, the application shall also give the name and address of the Chief Executive Officer of the organization and the name, address and title of the person in charge of, or responsible for, the property on which the source is loc-

(2) the address or location of the property on which the source is located;

(3) the nature of the process or activity which results or will result in the emissions;

(4) a general description of the quality, characteristics or nature of the air contaminants emitted or to be emitted.

(c) After receipt of the application, the Control Director shall, within a reasonable time, make or cause to be made an inspection to verify the conditions of the emissions covered in the application.

(d) The Control Director shall notify the applicant, in writing whether or not his application for an operating certificate has been Approved. If the source upon which application is based complies with the Act and this ordinance, the Control Director shall issue an operating certificate to the applicant, or if the applicant shall have received a variance under the Act and the rules and regulations of the State Board with regard to such source, the Control Director shall issue a conditional operating certificate to the extent authorized by the variance to the applicant, or if the applicant shall have received a variance to this ordinance under Section 5 hereof the Control Director shall issue a conditional operating certificate to the extent authorized by such variance. If the application is not approved, the Control Director shall described the deficiencies.

Section 9. Revocation of Certificate. The Control Director shall revoke or suspend an operating certificate or conditional operating certificate upor the failure of the holder of ti. certificate to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, The Control Director shall also remove or suspend the conditional operating certificate of a holder thereof, whose variance issued by the State Board or by the Control Director either expires, is suspended, revoked or herwise terminated.

No person may cause, suffer, allow or permit the emission of any air contaminant identified in Section 11 and 12 within the jurisdictional area of the City of Slaton, as defined in Section 5, except as provided in this ordinance. Section 15, Enforcement, (a) The City of Slaton hereby elects to exercise the authority

(b) The Control Director, his agents and employees are authorized to inspect the air and to go in and on public and private property within the area of his jurisdiction, as defined in Section 5, to determine whe-ther or not the level of any air contaminant in the area meets the level set for the air contaminant by the State Board or by this ordinance. The Director, his agents and employees may make inspections in the same manner and under the same provisions and restrictions as are applicable to the


