

EQUALIZATION BOARD TO CONVENE AUG. 5, 6, 7

Tax Hearings Postponed; Farmer Protest Looms

School tax reappraisal program drew the ire of taxpayers the past week, as the board of equalization board postponed.

Organized opposition to the new tax valuations appeared from some farmers this week, with petitions being circulated to present to the equalization board in protest of school district valuations.

Because of 100 percent totals and assessed totals, there was some confusion about the amount of increase in valuations. Under the new assessed total, the school estimated revenue at \$350,000 compared to some \$288,000 last year.

Officials pointed out that some of the assessed values would be "out of line", but that was the purpose of the equalization board--to determine if the tax assessment was fair and equitable.

"The valuations as indicated in the notices indicate an effort to place a greater burden upon our real properties than upon other properties in the district, which is neither lawful nor just."

Both taxing units set their percentage of assessment at 50 percent, and both set a tax rate of \$1.75 per \$100 assessed value. Rates had previously been at \$2 on a 35 to 40 percent assessment of market value.

Man Killed In Shooting Here

Frank B. Dobbins, a 33-year-old Negro was shot to death outside an east Slaton cafe early Friday morning.

A 53-year-old man was arrested in connection with the shooting, but he was released after questioning and charges were dropped. Witnesses said the shooting was in self defense.

The shooting took place at approximately 1:40 a.m. Dobbins was pronounced dead at Mercy Hospital twenty minutes later.

Just after midnight Friday morning, Robert Moore of Lubbock was stabbed twice. Moore and his wife were sitting in their car at the intersection of New Mexico and Dayton when two Latin Americans came by and stabbed him. Moore was released after treatment at Mercy Hospital.

About twenty-four hours earlier, on the morning of July 4th, a man was seen trying to enter Howard's Gulf Station. When the man spotted an approaching patrol car, he broke and ran west in an alley. Officer Blackerby ordered the man to stop and when he did not, Blackerby fired two shots, one possibly hitting the man in the right side. The man lost Blackerby at the intersection of 10th and Dickens. After a two hour search of the area, the man could not be found.

For the second week in a row, a powerful thunderstorm ripped through the Slaton area, leaving large amounts of rain and some hail and wind damage.

Monday night's massive thunderstorm moved in shortly after 9 p.m., dumping 2 or more inches of rain in less than 30 minutes time, and leaving a trail of damage from a quick-striking wind and hailstorm.

The Slaton City Tennis Tournament, organized and being directed by high school coach Kenneth Housden, picked up a sponsor this week when Slaton Lions Club voted to provide awards for the winners.

Tourney action gets underway today (Thursday) with play scheduled in three divisions and champions to be determined Saturday.

The three-day tourney, open to any Slaton resident, will be conducted at the City-County Park with Housden as director of activities.

The three divisions of the tourney are junior, for 14-year-olds and under; senior--for ages 15-18, and open--any age over 18. Each division will include singles, doubles and mixed doubles if enough entries are received. Entry fee is \$1 per event.

Housden has scheduled the open division so that adults may play after working hours. Pairings were to be arranged Wednesday night after all entries were in.

Tennis balls will be furnished for the tourney, and trophies will be awarded in each event at the close of the tournament Saturday.

Several farmers south and southwest of town reported heavy hail damage, with Edgar Williams reporting golf-ball size hail on his farm. The hail "stripped" cotton stalks on about half a dozen farms.

Large store windows were blown out at Bland's Furniture and at the old Southwestern Public Service office on the south side of the square. Furniture was damaged in the furniture store window. The top of a brick front was blown off on an old Kessel building on Texas Avenue, breaking an awning-type covering over the sidewalk.


The hail and rain was spotty in and around Slaton. Only peaseized hail was reported by many city residents, and rain reports varied from showers west of town to upwards of 3 inches south and southwest.

Slaton and the vicinity had been visited by a thunderstorm and high winds a week previously on a Monday night. Wind gusts were reported at 50 mph by the Lubbock Weather Bureau, but they apparently reached higher speeds here. Many tree limbs were ripped from trees, and some trees toppled by the strong wind.

Other areas of the South Plains were raked by the rain and hail, and a tornado alert existed for a time in western Lubbock County and areas west and north.

Two Pioneers Reminisce In Get-Together Here

It isn't often that Mrs. W. I. Scudder, the oldest member of Slaton's Senior Citizens Club, has someone to reminisce over old times with someone older than she is.

Mrs. Scudder, who will be 94 years old Oct. 2, visited with old friend, John Harrison Wood, last week. He will be 95 on Oct. 20.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood, who reside at Tahoma Park, Md., near Washington, D. C., came to Slaton by plane to attend the funeral of Mrs. Wood's sister, Mrs. G. W. Martin, most of the trip was by plane.

It had been about 73 years since they had seen each other and the visit would have probably never come about if Wood hadn't struck up a conversation with Bud Englund, owner of the local funeral home, over Englund's Masonic ring. Wood also wears a Masonic ring and when he was asked where his membership was, he replied "Seymour, Texas".

Englund's wife is the granddaughter of Mrs. Scudder and, knowing she had once lived in Seymour and was about the same age of Wood, things started falling in place. Sure enough, they had lived there at the same time and both families had previously lived in Palo Pinto County.

Englund arranged for the two to get together for a visit and they spent most of last Thursday morning recalling things back as far as the last century.

Wood recalled that his family raised wheat in Palo Pinto County and the Scudders raised cotton. He said he and his family spent six weeks in the Scudder home when they helped them pick cotton. He was 21 years old at the time and Mrs. Scudder was a young bride with a baby, Kirby. He said after work each day Mrs. Scudder and her husband would play "the sweetest music in the world". She played the dulcimer and he played the violin.

One thing the two have in common is that they each have two great - great - grandchildren. He boasts 25 great - grandchildren and 15 grandchildren.

Mrs. Scudder has 16 great - grandchildren and 12 grandchildren. He is the father of five children, all living, and five of Mrs. Scudder's 10 children are still living.

Mrs. Scudder came to Slaton 12 years ago after the death of her husband. Her daughter, Mrs. Webber Williams, lives in Slaton and a son, Kirby L., lives in Lubbock. She says she passes a lot of time knitting crib blankets for her great and great - great grandbabies.

A retired lawyer, school teacher and pharmacist, Wood has lived in West Texas. He once lived in Olney and practiced law there and in Amherst. He was hired by the government when he was 74 years old and moved to Washington, D. C. He lived there 22 years before moving to Tahoma Park, Md. His hobby is painting.

One of his daughters, Mrs. Jack Knox of McCamey, who was also in Slaton for Mrs. Martin's funeral, enjoyed the visit with her father, Mrs. Scudder remembered her mother, who has been deceased for many years. Mrs. Knox said she phoned her oldest brother to see if he could make the trip to Slaton. He reminded her he is 67 years old, retired, and was just unable to make the trip from Austin.

After Mr. Wood heard his message, he perked up and said he wasn't only in better health than some of his children but still has 19 of his "own teeth" and that's more than his oldest son has, he told us.

Mr. Wood said he tried to serve his country all his life, beginning with the Spanish -

American War, but never had the opportunity until the government hired him when he was 74 years old.

He volunteered for the Spanish - American War and was a member of the Weatherford Volunteers. Soon after joining he became ill, and they sent him home to recuperate. While he was home, the unit shipped out to Florida before they were able to get in touch with him. "So", he said, "I missed that war".

Then along came World War I. "They told me I wasn't only too old at age 44 but was too short". He is five feet, six inches tall.

Before talking with Mrs. Scudder and Mr. Wood, I kinda wondered what two people in their nineties would spend most of their time talking about. I believe it's about the same as all grandparents, except they have grandchildren, great - grandchildren and great-great grandchildren to tell about. . . . and that takes longer.

Texas Travel Trail Folders Now Available

AUSTIN -- Governor John Connally today announced the publication of detailed folders for two of the Statewide system of Texas Travel Trails.

The folders, published by the Texas Highway Department, will serve as guides and detail numerous points of interest along the Texas Mountain Trail in far West Texas, and the Texas Forest Trail in deep East Texas.

The folders will lead travelers through picturesque landscapes, by historic sites and to colorful cities and towns on the two official State trails.

Connally announced the new Statewide system of trails last January. Each county erected special Travel Trail signs along the 10 official trail routes.

The Mountain Trail folder guides travelers through the tallest region of Texas, where 90 peaks thrust above a mile high. The route goes past the nation's newest national park, to be developed in the Guadalupe Mountains, and to Davis Mountains State Park.

Those following the Mountain Trail will visit Big Bend National Park, the scenic El Camino del Rio from Big Bend to Presidio, and through the cities of Van Horn, Fort Davis, Marfa, Alpine and El Paso.

The Texas Forest Trail explores a 790-mile loop through the vast Piney Woods region. It goes through four national forests and past scores of federal, State and county recreational areas.

Other spots of interest include the East Texas oil field, the State's only Indian reservation, the Big Thicket and such popular water sport areas as Lake O' the Pines, Caddo Lake and Sam Rayburn Reservoir.

Travel Trail literature is available from the Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus and district offices, and at chambers of commerce along the Travel Trail routes.

Individual folders for the remaining eight Travel Trails will be released during the next few weeks as soon as printing is completed.

They had gone to Muleshoe to spend the weekend with one of Mrs. Baugh's sisters only to come back to Slaton and find that almost everything they owned had been demolished in an early morning fire. George Pool, who is their next door neighbor, said he thought he smelled smoke and discovered the Baugh house a-fire. He reported the fire approximately at 4:45 a.m., Sunday morning. Other neighbors also called in the alarm. Although the Slaton Fire Department fought the fire over three hours, the home and a 1968 Chevrolet pickup were a total loss. The Baugh's business, Baugh Electric, at the rear of the house was only damaged by smoke. Fire Chief Don Kendrick, said the fire apparently started in the sofa located in the den of the home. He said it probably smoldered for several hours and when the tremendous amount of heat in the house built up, pressure blew a window out and the fire ignited and was shooting out through the roof when the firemen arrived. Some neighbors made an effort to get the pickup out of the carport but when a tire exploded they thought the gas tank might explode any minute, so they decided it would be unwise to take the chance. Baugh says it is hard to find a furnished house in Slaton large enough for a family of seven, but he is looking. Until one can be obtained, the family is living with Mrs. Baugh's sister and family Mrs. Pete Rhoads, 935 So. 22nd St. All that is left of the Baugh home, which was located at 1050 So. 14th St., are the bare brick walls. The beautiful Mediterranean home was built only three years ago and the Baughs held open house for the public. The Baughs not only have the job of seeing that all is cleaned up, but must list everything that was lost for insurance purposes. And while making the lists, they are most likely thinking about all the memorable things they would like to have had the opportunity of saving.

Veteran Retires After 42 Years

A veteran railroad "bull" turned in his badge June 30, as his 42 year career as a policeman for the Santa Fe Railway ended in retirement that day. Zeke Bates, 65, a widely-known law enforcement officer, was honored by friends and associates at a reception June 28, in the auditorium of the general office building at Amarillo. A native of Reliance, Tenn., Bates started as a patrolman pounding a beat in the railroad's yards at Borger, Tex., in 1927. He has served as special agent at Belen, N.M., and at Slaton and San Angelo, Tex., prior to being transferred to Amarillo, June, 1940. He was appointed superintendent of special service for the Western Lines in 1947, and was named assistant superintendent of better freight handling and special service in 1966. Most of a railroad detective's work involves hard, old-fashioned leg work, Bates says. However, the old day of the railroad "bull" who cracked hobo's skulls with a billy club is gone forever. According to Bates, the old-fashioned railroad "gumshoe" has been replaced by a new breed of men, skilled in many techniques. The modern day railroad policeman also knows the railroad business inside out and has a general knowledge of how a lot of other businesses work, too. He knows, for example, how junk is bought and sold and how the "fences" are; how stolen food and clothing are disposed of, and how commodities are packaged. He also knows the law, how to distinguish various classifications of evidence and how to present his case in court. In his long years of law enforcement along the right-of-way, Bates has sluthed his way through an infinite variety of difficult cases. Notable among them were food and clothing thefts at San Angelo during the Depression Thirties, in which three men were eventually convicted and sentenced to prison; the theft of more than \$10,000 worth of cigarettes at Belen, in 1956, resulting in the imprisonment of four men in a federal penitentiary; and the theft of large quantities of liquor from box cars over a period of several months at Slaton. Bates and his men spent an entire year investigating the case before they brought the culprits to justice. Federal laws are violated in nearly all cases in which railroad investigators work, Bates said, which accounts for the railroad detectives' close work with the FBI, state and local law enforcement agencies. Bates said today's recruits to railroad detective work are schooled at the National Railroad Police Academy at Chicago which is staffed by key law enforcement officers as instructors. Bates, who was president of his class, was graduated from the third class in 1953. As a railroad special agent Bates is armed and carries a deputy sheriff's commission, and as a supervisory officer he is also commissioned in the Texas Rangers. In 1956, Bates served as chairman of the Protective Section of the Association of American Railroads, and for more than a decade has been a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.
