

Water Now City Lines

Canadian River water is in Slaton's municipal water system. The water was made about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday and two men from the Bureau watched the proceedings. The Canadian River Municipal water system had been scheduled to be put into operation at 9 a.m. Tuesday, but after the water flowing into Slaton's system, Commissioner Henry Cain, superintendent Joe Cardenas, Gerald Kendrick were on hand to open. Two Bureau of Reclamation men were also present to check the water. A ceremony took place at the end of N. 22nd Street, Slaton has been allotted 100 c.f.s. of the CR water for the year. The CR water will be used as a primary source, and city wells as a standby basis. The city allotment, since it must be going to present city wells, is treated at a Lubbock plant, giving its share of treatment.

Tornado Alert Signal Given

A reminder on tornado warnings was issued to Slaton schools, and the general public as well, this week by Don Kendrick, director of civil defense for the City of Slaton. Kendrick mailed tornado warning instructions to all school principals, and asked that general information be published for the general public. Citizens are reminded that a long, wavering tone on the city's fire sirens will serve as a tornado warning. In the event a tornado is sighted in the Slaton area, or if danger is imminent, the siren blast will emit the wavering sound for about 3 minutes at a time. Take cover instructions have been presented to the schools, and it is advised that no children be allowed to leave unless parents come for them.

Wilson Schools To Dismiss On May 24

During the Wilson School Board meeting Tuesday, March 26, the members approved a revision in this year's school calendar. Due to the Wilson schools being dismissed five days during the year due to bad weather, the board voted to dismiss the schools on Friday, May 24 instead of May 17. Baccalaureate services were set for Sunday, May 19 with graduation set for Friday, May 24. Items of business included the election of teachers for another year as recommended by the principals. The board heard a report on an accident involving a school bus and a pickup driven by A. E. Edwards. The board voted to pay Edwards \$231.54 for the damages to his pickup. It was reported that no one was injured in the accident.

Chamber Salutes Local Industry

Slaton Chamber of Commerce directors, wearing their familiar blue blazers, made a tour of local manufacturers' firms Wednesday to salute the busi-

nesses during Texas Industrial Week.

Slaton Chamber of Commerce and BCD this week mailed out special greetings to local manufacturers on the occasion of Texas Industrial Week, April 1-7.

The salute went to 14 local industries who provide about 540 jobs and an annual payroll total in excess of \$3 million dollars. Santa Fe Railway, as could be expected, led the list with some 306 employees and a payroll around \$2 million. Mayor Jonas Cain also joined in the salute, proclaiming "Industrial Week" in Slaton and urging citizens to "work for a

favorable climate in which new and established industry may invest in the economic growth of our community, and to show appreciation and give due recognition to local industries for their contributions to our economy."

Leisa Rea Wins First In Advanced Solo

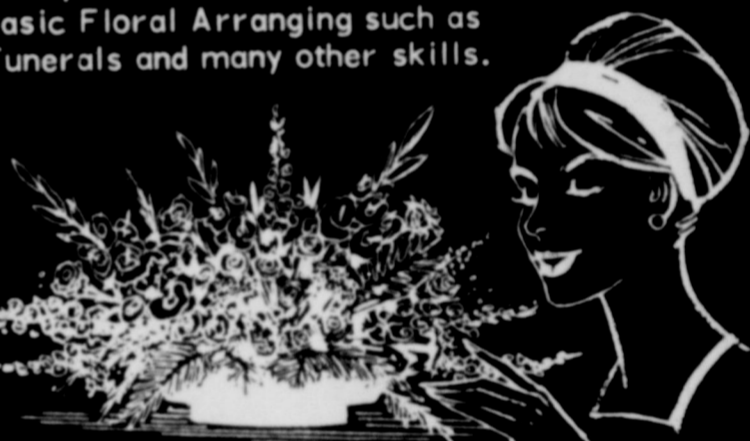

Journalism Class Field Trip

Hurrah! We got out of school! Yes, that is just what happened when Mrs. Duff's journalism class went on a combination field trip and party Wednesday, March 27. The class left at one o'clock and went to Lubbock.

First we toured the Lubbock Avalanche Journal. There we saw the various departments and exactly how a paper is printed. We saw where retail ads and classified ads are placed. We also got to view two artists as they designed advertisements.

Then we actually got to see an evening paper printed, cut, folded, bundled, tied and sent out for delivery. We got to see how pages of a newspaper were set up in type and then transferred onto cardboard mats from which lead printing plates are made. We saw how color is put into pictures and ads and how it takes a different printing plate for each color in the picture or ad.

Also on our tour we were taken to the room where the reporters work. There we found out that one crew of reporters works during the day to get out

the evening paper and one crew of reporters works all night getting the morning paper out.

The class also got to visit the newspaper morgue where a copy of every Lubbock Avalanche paper is on file starting with 1909 up to present date. The morgue is opened to the public and clerks are there to help you look up anything you want to.

It was also explained to the students that it takes seven and one half rolls of paper to print one edition of the newspaper. Each roll contains six and one half miles of paper and weighs around one ton each.

The ink used to print the paper is a combination of carbon and oil and is fed to the press automatically. When colored ink is needed it has to be fed to the press by hand.

Members of the class and Mrs. Duff were given photographic plates which are used to print pictures in the paper. The tour showed that there is much more to putting out a paper than anyone gives credit to.

From the Avalanche Journal the class went to the Lindsey theater to see the premier showing of "For Pete's Sake" which is a World Wide picture made possible by the Billy Graham Association.

From there, the class proceeded to Ko Ko Korner where we got to eat at any of the restaurants located there. However, barbecue, fried chicken and Mexican food received top billing among the class.

The journalism class would like to thank Mr. and Mrs. Duff for taking the time to sponsor the trip.

Girls Hear Fashion Designer

Fourth and sixth period Homemaking classes were given a treat Tuesday, March 26, when Martha Schmit presented a demonstration on skills of sewing and how to make a home-made garment look professional.

Mrs. Schmit is a fashion designer and representative of the Armo Company. She is a Home Ec graduate of Texas Tech. She demonstrated the Hong Kong finish which is a way of hemming an item without having any stitches show on the outside of the garment. She explained how interfacing is being used in hems to give weight to the garment and give it a rolled edge around the bottom instead of a creased edge. She also showed how to do a window pane button hole and how to cover snaps to keep them from showing.

Mrs. Schmit also showed some decorator ideas. One was a shade made from cloth with iron on interfacing on the back to make it more sturdy. She also showed some curtains made of siltone and explained that the material known as siltone is very versatile and comes in seventy beautiful colors.

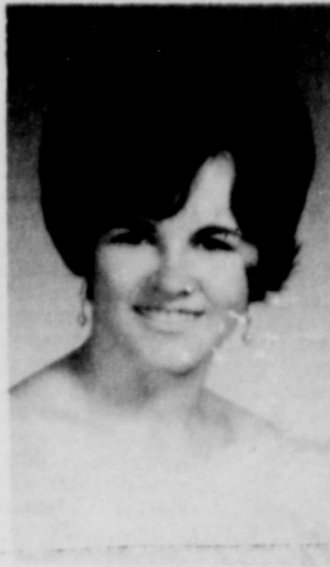

SAN ANTONIO -- The entertainment menu for HemisFair '68 covers all areas of show business, from the top comedians to serious opera.

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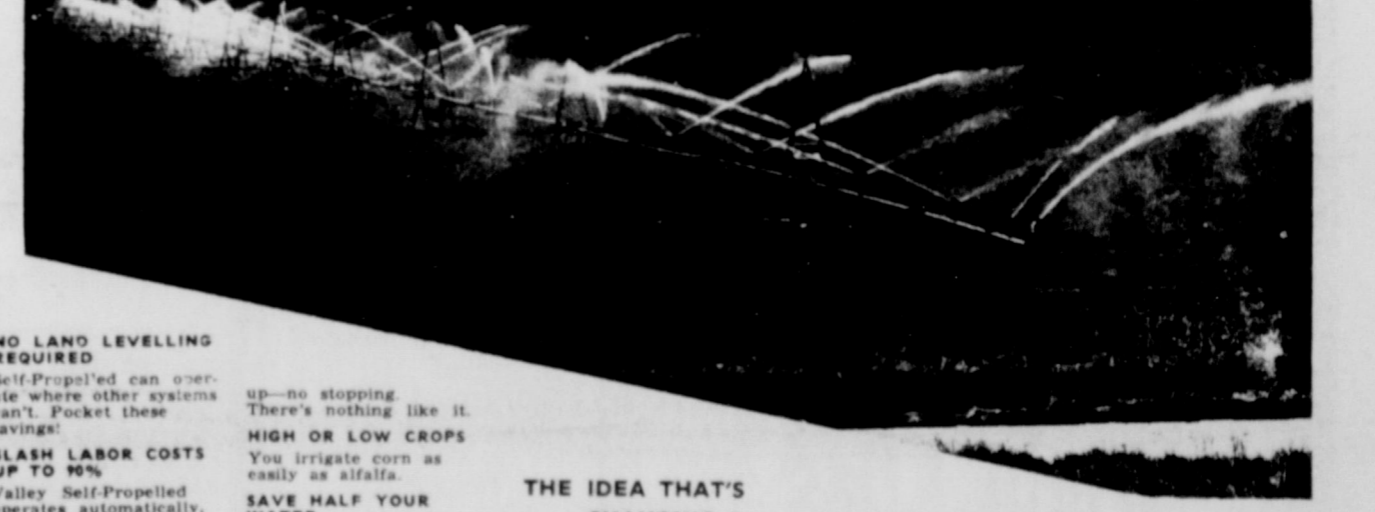

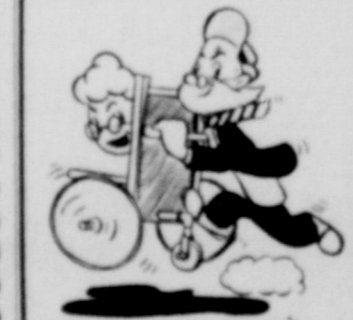

Industrial Week, Gov. John Connally urged every Texan to work toward the establishment of new industry and the expansion of local industry to maintain the state's economic growth.

He pointed out that Texas' manufacturing industries created more than 20,000 new jobs in 1967, the result of 296 plants locating in the state and the expansion of 370 existing firms.

Manufacturing is the most rapidly expanding source of income in Texas. In the past five years, 1,460 new plants have been established and 1,976 existing facilities have been enlarged. This growth was the basis for an additional 128,000 new jobs in Texas.

In his proclamation, the governor pointed out that industry spends an estimated \$35,000 in capital outlay per employee for tools and facilities for employment. Using this average, the private enterprise system invested \$700 million in the state's industrial growth in 1967.

EDITORIALS

An item on Page 1 informs that a hearing is scheduled in Lubbock Monday morning concerning Santa Fe's application to discontinue passenger service through here and Lubbock.

First reaction to many citizens might be, "so what?" Those who never use the service are not too concerned about the situation. But, civic leaders and interested citizens should get concerned if they want their community to have this form of transportation available for those who desire the service.

There are two sides to the question. The rail companies, including Santa Fe, claim the public is "deserting them", and the added factor of dwindling mail contracts on trains is making passenger service unprofitable.

Critics say the railroads have been deliberately trying in recent years to get out of serving the traveling public. The demand for passenger service would be greater, they add, if railroads had not discouraged the business by poor service and sloppy conditions just to provide arguments for killing the service.

The Avalanche Journal, in a recent editorial, called for the city, chamber of commerce, and all business and civic groups to use "every ounce of effort" to forestall Santa Fe's announced plan to cut out its passenger service.

Local opponents to the discontinuance of passenger service are urging interested civic leaders and citizens to attend the hearing in Lubbock Monday. If you want passenger service continued through Slaton, your attendance at the hearing might make a difference.
