

In other action by the commission, an ordinance was passed concerning the maintenance of the roadway and right-of-way on the highways near Slaton. The city will be in charge of the main nance





Rains measured from .50 of an inch all the way up to 4 inches Saturday night and Sunday morning. Additional showers came Monday morning and night. The only known hail damage in the immediate vicinity was reported on the edge of the canyon by Joe Glass and Robert Meeks.

Except for the apparently light amount of hail, the weather was just "what the doctor ordered" for most farmers. The moisture boosted producer hopes for good yields on both dryland and irrigated cotton crops.

Cotton observers had predicted earlier that a general rain across the South Plains area in mid-August would brighten the crop prospects considerably. One of the biggest problems for many farmers is in controlling weeds brought on by the heavy rains this season.

For others, however, the problem was hailed - out cotton crops -- some which were hit too late to plant anything else. Some with hail damage were still hoping the cotton would make.

Heaviest rainfall Saturday night was reported in the Posey area, with 3 to 4 inches of moisture recorded north of the community. A report of 1 to 1.5 inches was reported west of town, and about .80 to 1.5 inches in Slaton.

Light showers fell around the area Sunday and Monday mornings, and heavier showers drenched the area again Monday night. Heavy amounts of moisture were recorded across the cantoo, but the rain was of little benefit to many cotton crops in the area since they were hard hit by hail in recent weeks.

# For Phil Brewer

Phil Brewer, 41, a native Slaton resident and prominent businessman, died late Friday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Last rites were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Methodist Church, where he served on the board of trustees. The Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor, and the Rev. J. T. Bolding of Lubbock, officiated. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under direction of Englunds,

Brewer's parents were pioneer residents, moving here about 1915. He graduated from Slaton High School and Texas A&M. Brewer served with the U. S. Navy in World War II and had been in the insurance and real estate business here since 1951.

Brewer was active in many organizations and projects in Slaton. He served as a Chamber of Commerce director, precinct Democratic chairman, member of Retail Merchants Association, member of the board of equalization, a Mason, member of the American Legion and former Rotarian and Jaycee, chairman of the fund raising committee in Slaton for the Girl Scouts, director and sec-retary of the Slaton Golf Association.

Survivors include his wife, Winona; three daughters, Amy Lynn, Leslie Renee and Jo Michele, all of the home; two brothers, Joe Brewer of Garland and Dr. J. H. Brewer of Waco; one sister, Mrs. Bill McDavid of Waco.



# ax Roll Total

Slaton School Board, in regular session Tuesday night, approved election of several new teachers, approved bills, rejected bids on a press box addition, and -- of course -- discussed the district's tax program.

Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, said he expected to have a full teacher roster ready for announcement next week, Opening of school has been set for Sept. 3, and the school "calendar" is expected to be complete next week.

The trustees took no action on the tax revaluation program, but will study the issue further when the Board of Equalization completes its work and certifies the tax rolls. Just how much tax revenue the district can expect cannot be determined until the equalization board completes its hearings.

Dr. Vardy announced that two bids on the proposed press box addition at Tiger Stadium were

around \$11,000 and \$10,000 --far in excess of the \$2,750 okayed by the board for the project. The trustees decided to study the cost of remodeling the old press box on the east side of the football field. The addition was approved to accomodate visiting press,

radio, and camera men. While discussing the tax problems, trustees expressed concern about the possibility of

teacher pay raises this year. The board had previously considered a local pay increase this year, but doubts were expressed Tuesday night about the tax revenue total being sufficient to carry through on the plan.

Trustees were given preliminary figures to start a budget study for the new school year. Trustees present were Joe Miles, Willie Heinrich, Ted Swanner, Tommy Davis, Don Kendrick, and Jack Clark. Absent was Dr. M. J. McSween.

### Water District Sets Tax Rate

A tax rate of 6 cents per \$100 valuation -- the same as this year's -- was set by directors of the Lubbock County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 in a meeting at Buffalo Springs Lake last week. All directors were present,

the chairman V. G. Browning of Slaton presiding.

Administrator Jim Segrest said the only other business at the session was authorization to hire a company to audit the district's books for the period from Jan. 1 to June 30, and for him to trade two dump trucks in on later models.


