COMMISSION POSTPONES REGULAR MONDAY MEETING

Police Department Issue Still in Doubt

A "wait-and-see" attitude seems to have settled over the controversy between several city commissioners and the police chief.

Mayor Jonas Cain announced Wednesday that the regular commission meeting next Monday night has been postponed. "The only thing we had on the agenda was a discussion on the airport manager, and the necessary information is not available yet," he explained. There had been speculation

that a number of citizens might attend the meeting to ask about the police situation.

The controversy arose in the last city commission meeting when the police chief's wife was fired as a dispatcher on a split vote of the council. Rudy Dominguez and Henry Bollinger --the two councilmen voting for dismissal -- said they didn't think it was a good policy to have a husband and wife working in the same department.

Commissioner David Hughes, voting against the action, charged the move was made as "a slap in the face' of Police Chief Glen Farmer, adding that the dismissal of Mrs. Farmer was not the real issue involved.

Mayor Cain said that the chief had been advised more than a month ago that several commissioners thought his wife should be replaced. Farmer told the commission at the last meeting that it would be difficult for him to stay as chief without his wife working.

With the possibility the chief might resign, or that some citizens wanted to protest the commission's action, the mayor was asked about the status of the situation this week.

Cain said he'd had no further word from the chief, and that no citizens had requested to meet with the commission, "1 guess we'll just wait and see what develops," said the mayor. Slaton was not alone with its police departs

The candles rose higher, until they became stars in the sky; then one of them fell.


"Oh !" she said to herself, "that falling star means someone is dying."




