MAKE MORE MONEY.

E. V. Hairston can well boast of the success he has made the past year from his eggs, chickens and cream. He told us a few days ago that he has made about \$800.00 from this source alone, and it is well worth the while as the mouse is well worth the while alone, and it is well worth the white as the money is coming in all the year. Mr. Hairston cultivates a large farm, and his dairy and poultry products are only a side line.

Did you ever stop to figure how much extra money can be brought into a community if more people would devote a little time to raising a few chickens and keeping a few hens? The United States is a great gold-

producing country; yet, according to Dr. Larson, head of the U. S. Dairy Division, it would require all the gold produced in the country since 1885 up to the present time, to pay for the farm value of one year's dairy prod-ucts alone. It would have required the entire wheat, cotton, potato, oat and tobacco crops to pay the same bill, according to this same authority; and all of the beef cattle, sheep and swine in the country, if marketed at that time, would not have paid for 1921 milk crop.

Yet in spite of this enormous pro-duction, dairying has not been overdone. Dairy products are higher in price than a year ago; there are less in storage, and consumption is steadi-

Shortest Month Brings New Sales Record. Acute Situation Certain as 6,000 Cars a Day Production Fails to Meet Demand.

According to H. G. Stokes, manager of the Slaton Motor Company, local Ford dealer, 116,080 Ford cars were sold at retail in February, a new rec-ord for the shortest month in the year having hear established February having been established. February sales exceeded those of January by more than 15,000 and marked the eleventh month in which Ford sales have topped the 100,000 line. This sales record bears out predic-

This sales record bears out predic-This sales record bears out predic-tions made at the opening of the year that an acute shortage in Ford cars is certain and this shortage is ex-pected to be felt within the next two months with the increased volume of car buying, which is always attend-ant upon the spring months. Even the high production schedule set at the Ford Motor Company's factory, which will reach 6,000 cars a day about April 1, will be unable to meet the apparent demand for Ford products.

February sales of 116,080 cars were made in the face of unfavorable weather conditions in many sections of the country, which tied up freight traffic and prevented many deliveries This was particularly true through-out the Northwest, the northern tier of states and in New England. In California, too cold weather during a part of the month had its effect upon \*\*\*\*\*\* ar sales

Yet with even these unfavorable conditions, the February sales topped those of January by 15 per cent and set a new high record for mid-winter

selling. With February the eleventh month in which Ford car sales have gone over the 100,000, the total for this pe-riod is close to 1,250,000 cars. Péak car sales usually are reached during the summary sales which

during the summer months which drops in the fall and winter.
