HOFFMAN RE-APPOINTED TO CITY POST

City Okays Airport Lights, Reviews Cemetery Rules

A bid date on airport lighting was set. Howard Hoffman was reappointed as the city's Canadian River Municipal Water Authority director, a house on the airport property was sold, and a dedication plat was approved from First Christian Church in a regular session of the Slaton City Commission Monday evening.

The commission also discussed a curbing regulation at Englewood Cemetery and studied a request for extension of sewer service. The meeting, which started at 6:30 p.m., lasted only one hour.

Plans and specifications for the airport lighting were outlined by City Eng. Bennett Reeves. The FAA-approved plans were okayed by the commission and publication of bid notices were authorized. Bids will be opened at 2 p.m. on July 31.

Howard Hoffman, longtime director to the CRMWA, was reappointed by unanimous vote of the commission.

The bid on a farm house to be moved from the airport site was awarded to T.R. Dominguez for the sum of \$25. The city advertised for bids on the house and only one was received.

A plat on the First Christian Church property on 22nd street, between Division and Lynn, was presented by Commissioner Earl Reasoner. Dedication of the plat was approved by the commission. It includes seven city lots.

On the request of a citizen, the commission reviewed the city's policy on curbing at the cemetery. It was agreed that the regulation which prohibits curbing should be enforced, due to the cost of maintenance.

A request for sewer lines to the Bolinn house on Cemetery Road was taken under consideration. Sewer lines are soon to be extended to the new county barn site at the triangle intersection of old US-84 and Cemetery Rd.

Attending the session were Mayor Jonas Cain, Commissioners Earl Reasoner, Hugo Mosser, Henry Bollinger and Rudy Dominguez; City Admin. Buford Duff, City Sec. Gerald Kendrick, City Atty. Carroll Smith, Reeves, and Q.G. Nieman.

Little Britches Rodeo Planned

The first annual Little Britches Rodeo, sponsored by Slaton VFW and Auxiliary No. 6721, will be staged here Friday and Saturday with the event expected to draw young cowboys and cowgirls from all around the area.

Each performance is scheduled to start at 8 p.m. in the Slaton Rodeo Arena on W. Panhandle Street, just north of Tiger Stadium. Admission will be \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children.

Cecil Scott, director of publicity for the VFW event, said entry blanks had been mailed out to junior and senior-age Little Britches Rodeo participants in a wide area around Slaton. Stock will be provided by Rhodes and Skaggs of New Deal.

Entrants in the National Little Britches

Rodeo Assn. will make the events as part of the circuit, leading to the championships to be determined in Clovis, N.M. July 28-29. Junior division is for 8-13 year olds, and the senior division for 14-17 age group.

Events in the rodeo performances here include senior boys; bareback broncs, brahma bull riding and calf roping; girls; cloverleaf barrels, goat tying and pole bending. Junior boys will have a try at bareback broncs, steer riding, barrel race, goat tying, and flag race. Junior girls will have a go at the cloverleaf barrels, goat tying, pole bending and flag race. There will be one or two go-arounds as entries warrant. Deadline for entries is noon today.

Robison Named As Acting Chief

Dutch Robinson, veteran Slaton police officer, has been appointed as acting chief following the resignation of Robert Breedlove. It was announced this week by Mayor Jonas Cain.

The City Commission has taken no action to fill the position vacated by Breedlove last Friday. His resignation was originally effective July 15. Several applications for the post have been received at City Hall. The commission may call a special session before the next regular meeting.

TEMP AT 102

The mercury soared to a reading of 102 degrees in Slaton Monday, according to a report from the Pioneer Gas Co. office Wednesday.

The temperature had reached an even 100-degree reading on Sunday. High Tuesday was 98 with the maximum Wednesday also pegged at the 98 mark. Low for the past week was a 67-degree recording last Friday night.

No moisture was recorded during the past week. The hot, dry weather was welcomed by most farmers after good rains in June and early this month. The crop outlook brightened considerably during the past month.







TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

If you are worried about your heirs owing an estate tax on your property when you die, here are the rules: An estate tax return must be filed if the fair market value of your property is more than \$60,000 on the date of your death.

However, the community property laws usually allow the estate to be worth \$120,000 in community property since each spouse is entitled to a \$60,000 exemption. Remember these rules apply only to Federal estate tax and not to Texas State Inheritance Taxes.
