room and five office rooms above. Another building for Texas Avenue is in sight. This will be built by Kes-sel and Kolodzie, and will have sixty foot frontage with one hundred foot depth. The north building will be occupied by Kessel with his Empo-rium, while the south building will be rented by Mr. Kolodzie. There are numerous applicants for this location but as yet decision has not been made as to the tenant. In addition to the undergroundd storage of more than 150,000 barrels fuel oil now being constructed by the Santa Fe, it is rumored that a sur-face tank of huge proportions will be erected on the acreage north of the shops for the further storage of sup-ply. The capacity is as yet undeter-mined, but will probably be in ex-cess of a million barrels.

The Secretary, together with Com-missioner H. D. Talley and Mr. Johnson, the postal inspector over the proposed route of the mail delivery across the canyon last week, and it is hoped that Route No. 3 from Slaton office will be functioning in that ter-ritory in the future. More than twen-ty lots of improvements have been put as land along this route these go-ing over it in the fall. The mork of the hard surfaced these astimuctionily and within the next two months this should be up to grade and ready for travel.

Quite a force of men are now em-ployed making improvements to the freight office of the Santa Fe, made necessary by the ever increasing vol-ume of freight coming into Slaton and also transferring here for other points. The car loads of in-bound shipments to Slaton for the present month will be in excess of 175, an eight hundred per cent increase over the same month in 1921. Thus we progress. progress.
