## 's First Welcomed

The area got its first real moisture last week, with a general 1-inch rain around the community last night (Feb. 13).

Farmers couldn't receive a better gift, it had been a long, dry spell with measurable rain, and farmers the sub-soil moisture.

The system was moving into the week, and Wednesday's forecast in snow and sleet over the Panhandle South Plains region by night.

Ice covered trees and shrubs Sunday and Monday.

Forecasters had issued a definite rain or snow Wednesday. The forecast at Lubbock called for a 60 percent chance of rain Wednesday, with a possibility of sleet or snow also.

Temperatures in Slaton were cool for the week, from a low of 27 degrees Sunday to a high of 47 recorded Saturday, with a low in the 30's to mid 40's last week.

Plants quickly absorbed the rainfall last night. Rain reports ranged from more than an inch around the area, measuring about an inch, Lubbock by .25 of an inch at the Weather Bureau radio station there gauged at .1 inch. Up to 1.5 inches was reported in some areas, including a section west of Lynn County.

## Winners in Junior Stock Show Named

### Guelker Files As City Candidate

H. Floyd Guelker, a Santa Fe employee, filed as a candidate for Ward 3 commissioner Wednesday as the city commission race picked up its second candidate.

Jonas Cain, incumbent mayor, had filed last week in his bid for re-election. No other candidates had formally filed at press time Wednesday, and no candidates were reported for the Slaton School Board election.

Guelker will be seeking the Ward 3 post now held by Henry Bollinger, whose term expires in April. Bollinger has not announced his intentions as yet.

The term of the Ward 1 commissioner, Hugo Mosser, also expires in April. Mosser had not announced for re-election, and no other candidate has filed in that ward.

Deadline for filing as a city candidate will be at 5 p.m. on Feb. 28. The city election will be held Tuesday, April 1. Absentee voting will start March 10.

The school district election is scheduled April 5, with two trustee positions to be determined. The terms of Joe Miles and Willie Heinrich expire in April. Filing deadline is Mar. 7.

## FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR PROMINENT CITIZEN

Ray Hickman, 73, a longtime Slaton resident, died at 8:20 p.m. Friday in Mercy Hospital after an illness of about two years. He moved to Slaton from Sweetwater in February of 1929.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Frank D. Travis of Buffalo Lakes and the Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under the direction of Englands.

He was born in Brown County, Tex. May 15, 1895 and attended Daniel Baker College in Brownwood. During World War I, he served aboard the U.S.S. George Washington, making five trips overseas.


Hickman had been a Methodist since a youth, and then united with the Presbyterian Church at the age of 23. He was an elder and deacon of the Presbyterian Church here, had served two terms on the school board, was vice-president of the Red Cross for several years, was a member of the chamber of commerce, the retail merchants association and the Masonic Lodge.

Hickman operated a bakery in Slaton from 1929 to 1941 when he went into the insurance business with Otis Neill. They were

partners for about 25 years until Neill sold to Chester Williams. At the time of his death, he was a partner in the Hickman-Williams Insurance Agency.

Survivors include his wife, Nina of Slaton; two daughters, Mrs. Alton Kenney of Slaton and Mrs. Jack Nesbitt of Snyder; and three grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Bob Kern, Pete Halburton, B. N. Ball, Joe Teague III, Joe Van Ness and R. G. Copeland.

## Slaton Farmer Named As Top Conservationist

H. R. Schwertner of Slaton was presented a plaque at the Slaton Lions Club meeting Tuesday after being named "Outstanding Conservation Farmer of 1968" by the directors of the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Finas Griffin, SCD board member from this part of the county, made the presentation to Schwertner on behalf of the district. Bill Reece, district conservationist, was also present for the presentation.

Schwertner's name will be entered in the state contest sponsored by The Fort Worth Press. Lion Clubs throughout the state sponsor plaques for district winners. Schwertner was the first conservation winner from the Slaton area in several years. He was selected from some 1,250 cooperators in the district.

Griffin, himself a former plaque winner, cited Schwertner's many conservation practices. Schwertner farms about three miles west of Slaton on the Cooper road. Most of the 320 acres is listed under conservation cropping and crop resi-

due systems. He also applied 36,182 feet of parallel terraces. Other practices as a cooperator in the district include contour farming, pasture planning and management, and irrigation water planning and management. Schwertner has farmed west of Slaton since 1946, moving here from Shallowater. He came to the area in 1931 from Williamson County.

Schwertner and his wife have five children--two in grade school, two in high school and one in college. His mother,

Mrs. R. Schwertner, resides on the edge of Slaton.

Clothes Could Be Deductible

The cost and maintenance of special clothing or equipment on the job may be deducted on Federal income tax returns, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue.  
 To qualify, the clothing and equipment must be required as a condition for employment. Mr. Campbell said the cost of uniforms worn by nurses, bus drivers, firemen and policemen may be deducted.  
 If a worker is required to supply his own tools and equipment their cost may also be deducted.

This provision also covers the cost of membership dues in professional societies and subscriptions to professional and trade journals.

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 40th year in Texas. There are over 48,000 members studying vocational agriculture in 968 high schools in Texas. ## County Has Only One-Third Of Cars Inspected

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 33 per cent of the registered vehicles in Lubbock County have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson said.

"Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating in violation of the law," Johnson said.

Capt. Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 15% to 3%.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."


He is a veteran of World War II. He is the author of a newspaper column, "The Empty Pew", carried in several states. He has also written several articles for magazines.
