

SALES TAX DISCUSSED City Okays Audit

Slaton City Commission, in On the latter subject regular session Monday night, approved the annual audit report, discussed the possibility of calling a city sales tax election, reappointed two men to the electrical board, approved bills and handled routine business.

After approving the audit, commissioners also voted to have a cash audit twice a year as a check on daily cash records. The action was recommended by auditors. The audit was prepared by Bolinger, Segars & Co. of Lubbock.

Mayor Jonas Cain introduced the topic of a city sales tax at the meeting, pointing out that the city would have to secure additional revenues from some source. He mentioned three possiblities -- city sales tax, increase in property taxes, or a big increase in water rates.

water rates, it has been generally accepted for some time that an increase in water rates would be necessary with the arrival of Canadian River water. The commission has apparently hoped to find additional revenues from some other source, however, in order to keep the water rate increase as

low as possible. In the audit report, it was pointed out that the city has contigent liabilities and commitments not appearing on the balance sheet. These included the construction repayment obligation with the Canadian River (See CITY, Page 4)

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



In case you haven't heard, Slaton is facing the possiblity of losing its Santa Fe passenger service, And Slaton is only one of many cities confronted with that situation.

A hearing is scheduled Jan. 25, at 9 a.m., at the Pioneer Hotel in Lubbock, at which time AT&SF Railway will present for consideration an application to discontinue passenger trains No. 66-75 and 76-65 -- meaning no passenger service through Slaton.

For years, people have ignored the passenger train, But now, according to editorial opinion expressed by editors all over the country, people are showing renewed interest at a time when they are about to hear the diminishing echo of the passenger trains. There are indications that people are becoming aware of the train's potential toward providing relief of crowded highways.

If we want to retain our passenger train through Slaton ... if railroad transportation here and elsewhere is important to us, a good turnout is needed at the Lubbock hearing Jan. 25.



No 'Rush' By Elderly People For Medicare

This time last year social security offices across the nation were carefully watching hospital admissions as 20 million people became eligible for Medicare. Contrary to predictions, there was no "rush" of elderly people seeking admission to hospitals. For the most part admissions and discharges went on as usual.

However, some changes were felt by hospital personnel in their business offices. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office, reports that new types of forms required, checking Medicare cards, etc., involved more of hospital personnel's time than had been customary.

Paper work accumulated and some claims were not submitted for several months. As hospitals, doctors, and beneficiaries developed an understanding of Medicare's procedures and became familiary with forms, a rush did develop.

The number of claims reached its peak in January 1967 but has rapidly diminished since be traveling to Wilson tonight

Over 12 million doctor and hospital bills were processed to completion during the first year of Medicare. True, there were some delays there still are some -- but by and large the greater number of Medicare claims are processed quickly. Less than one fourth of the claims being processed at the present time are more than one month old.







A. Yes. Numbers in the VA 8-4000 series will be changed to the corresponding 828-6000 number. For example, VA 8-4591 will become 828-6591.



Q. Is it really easier and faster to dial numbers only?

Vardy, superintendent of Slaton Public Schools. General session began Thurs-

day in the Terrace Motor Hotel Convention Center with J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education, presiding.

The Texas Education Agency annually sponsors this conference so delegates can discuss new education programs, and review and suggest improvements in procedures used by the Agency in its relations with local public schools.

Administrators discussed such topics as how to prepare teachers for change, how to decide what changes are needed in the organization of their respective schools, and how to develop a climate in a community that will be responsive to changes from the traditional methods of instruction and curriculum.
