Gaylon Barkley Robbed, Beaten In Lubbock

A Western Union messenger boy who summoned help when he was beaten and robbed of \$5 here Monday afternoon was ignored by a Lubbock resident who told him he didn't have the time to help him.

Gaylon Barkley, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Barkley, of Slaton, told police he was robbed by a 18 or 19-year-old Negro male as he was walking down an alley in the 100-block between Broadway and 13th Street about 5:10 p.m. Barkley had just been paid for the week and had \$15 in his hand when the Negro accosted him. The man threw Barkley to the ground as he was attempting to run to his car and told him to give him his money.

Young Barkley told the man to throw down his knife and he'd give him the money. The man did and Barkley gave him \$5 and started walking toward the sidewalk. The Negro turned and started down the alley, Barkley said.

A man Barkley described as well dressed was walking down the street and Barkley asked him to help him. The man refused.

"I don't have the time and besides, it would take half a day to find a policeman," Barkley quoted the man as saying.

Later young Barkley told his father, manager of the Western Union office, he had seen the Negro who robbed him. Lee Barkley notified police and helped patrolman Lawrence Bunting chase the youth.

"Two employes followed the youth down alleys for three blocks until Gaylon and I drove up in the police car," Barkley said.

Shop Rite Buys Humpty Dumpty Chain Stores

It was announced jointly this week by J. S. Reinhart, president of Shop Rite Foods, Inc. and J. R. White, president of White's Humpty Dumpty Stores, that Shop Rite Foods, Inc. had purchased the eight Humpty Dumpty Food Stores in the Dallas area for an undisclosed amount.

These eight stores produce an annual volume in excess of \$10 million. This acquisition increases to 180 the number of supermarkets operated by Shop Rite in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. Shop Rite additionally operates a total of 53 Jif-E-Mart convenience stores primarily in the San Antonio, El Paso, Beaumont, Port Arthur and Brownsville areas.

General Offices for Shop Rite Foods, Inc. are located in Albuquerque, N.M. Besides its Grand Prairie and Lubbock distribution centers, the company also operates produce subsidiaries in Albuquerque, El Paso and San Antonio, and institutional wholesale houses in El Paso and Albuquerque.

Among seven new supermarkets which will be constructed by Shop Rite during the balance of this calendar year are one in Albuquerque, two in Fort Worth and one in Dallas. Leases for three additional units in the Dallas-Fort Worth area are currently under negotiation. Present plans call for the completion, during the balance of the year, of an additional 34 Jif-E-Mart convenience stores, to bring the projected year-end total of such stores to 87.

The 1968 volume of the Company was \$213 million. With the purchase of the eight White's Humpty Dumpty Stores, and completion of new stores under construction, it is estimated that the total volume for the Company will be in excess of \$230 million for 1969.

The first White Food Store was opened by J. R. White in 1951. The stores have operated under the name of "Humpty Dumpty" since 1962. White will join the Shop Rite organization as Assistant North Texas Regional Manager in charge of the Dallas stores.
