

Allen Co. of Dallas -- an ambulance firm, for a price of \$5,135. Bids were also taken from Smith Ford, Inc., and Bill Adams Olds Pontiac of Slaton. It is estimated that an additional \$400 will be required for equipment in the vehicle.

Although the ambulance will be stationed at the police department and manned by city personnel, the decision on attendant personnel is still being studied. The possibility of securing volunteer aides has been mentioned,

Fees were set at \$25 for emergency trips and for body pickups, Sick "runs" will be charged at \$15 a trip. Calls outside the city limits will draw an additional 35 cents per mile over these fees. The am bulance will not be used for transfers. The service is scheduled for the city and an approximate 10-mile radius. A "waiting charge" of \$5 per hour is also included in the fee schedule.

Before setting the tax rate at the same figure, trustees accepted and closed the tax rolls which totalled some \$18,770,900 in assessed valuations. Based on 93 percent collections, and with delinquent collections, tax revenues of some \$326,000 are anticiapted. The board also reviewed a list of delinquent taxpayers and autorized tax attorneys to proceed with suits.

Trustees approved school's participation in the regional media center at Lubbock again this year. The center provides teaching aids and facilities at a cost of \$1 per student on average daily at-

A review of the financial statement showed the school district would need additional funds before tax revenues start coming in. The board authorized a \$14,000 loan to cover operations and payment of bills. It was pointed out that a loan of \$25,000 was necessary at

this time last year. The board studied a proposed school calendar and approved the start of school on Sept. 2.

Trustees decided to act on the remainder of the calendar later, after school officials decide about Easter vacation days.

Two milk bids were con sidered by the trustees. Both Borden and Bell companies bid 7 cents for half-pints of milk. Since Borden had the contract

last year, the board awarded the new contract to Bell Dairies.





REFUSED HELP **Gaylon Barkley Robbed**, Beaten In Lubbock

A Western Union messenger boy who summoned help when he was beaten and robbed of \$5 here Monday afternoon was ignored by a Lubbock resident who told him he didn't have the time to help him.

Gaylon Barkley, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Barkley, of Slaton, told police he was robbed by a 18 or 19-yearold Negro male as he was walking down an alley in the 100block between Broadway and 13th Street about 5:10 p.m. Barkley had just been paid

for the week and had \$15 in his hand when the Negro accosted him. The man threw Barkley to the ground as he was attempting to run to his car and told him to give him his money.

Young Barkley told the man to throw down his knife and he'd give him the money. The man did and Barkley gave him \$5 and started walking toward the sidewalk. The Negro turned and started down the alley, Barkley said.

A man Barkley described as well dressed was walking down the street and Barkley asked him to help him. The man refused.

"I don't have the time and besides, it would take half a day to find a policeman," Barkley quoted the man as saying.

Later young Barkley told his father, manager of the Western Union office, he had seen the Negro who robbed him. Lee Barkley notified police and helped patrolman Lawrence Bunting chase the youth.

"Two employes followed the youth down alleys for three blocks until Gaylon and I drove up in the police car," Barkley said,

"Officer Bunting andI chased him around alleys and through businesses," Barkley said, "He went all the way through Lubbock Sash and Door, I think it was."

The suspect, Wilson Carl Nash of Lubbock was named in a robbery by assult complaint filed Tuesday afternoon, Nash was in county jail under \$2,500 bond.

According to Barkley, some man with a gun, but not known to the patrolman, jumped out of a car and grabbed the suspect and shoved him up against a wall near the post office at 16th and Avenue F.
