Graduation Set For Slaton, Area Seniors

Honor Grads Named At Area Schools

Its "Cap and Gown" time for more than 180 senior high students in the Slaton area, and honor graduates were named this week at Slaton, Roosevelt, Cooper, Wilson and Southland.

The list of candidates for graduation at Slaton and area schools shows 84 at Slaton, 38 at Roosevelt, 34 at Cooper, 28 at Wilson and 7 at Southland.

The valedictorians and salutatorians at the schools are: Slaton -- Laura Childers and Rita Payne; Roosevelt -- Carla Crumley and Wendy Woolley; Cooper -- Linda Alexander and Ann Dorsett; Wilson -- Kathy Christopher and Mac Young; Southland--Darrell Wilke and Dayneen Dunn.

At Roosevelt, baccalaureate services are set for 8 p.m. on Sunday, May 25 in the RHS Auditorium, and commencement exercises will be held in the auditorium at 8 p.m. Monday, May 26. Dr. Roy McClung, Wayland Baptist College, will deliver the baccalaureate address, and Lubbock Mayor Dub Rogers is the commencement speaker.

Cooper's baccalaureate is also set for 8 p.m. Sunday, May 25, and graduation exercises are set for 8 p.m. on Thursday, May 29--both in the Cooper High School auditorium. Rev. Weldon Tucker, pastor of Cooper Methodist Church, is the baccalaureate speaker, and the Rev. Claude Cone, Calvary Baptist Church of Lubbock, is the commencement speaker.

Commencement is Friday night, May 23, at Wilson. The graduation exercise is set for 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Baccalaureate was held last Sunday evening.

Southland High School is also scheduled to hold graduation exercises tomorrow night at 8 in the high school auditorium. Baccalaureate services were held Sunday with the Rev. Bill Dodd, Southland Baptist Church, as speaker.

Some 84 Slaton High School seniors take the big step on stage to receive diplomas Monday night, and at the head of the class will be Laura Childers and Rita Payne.

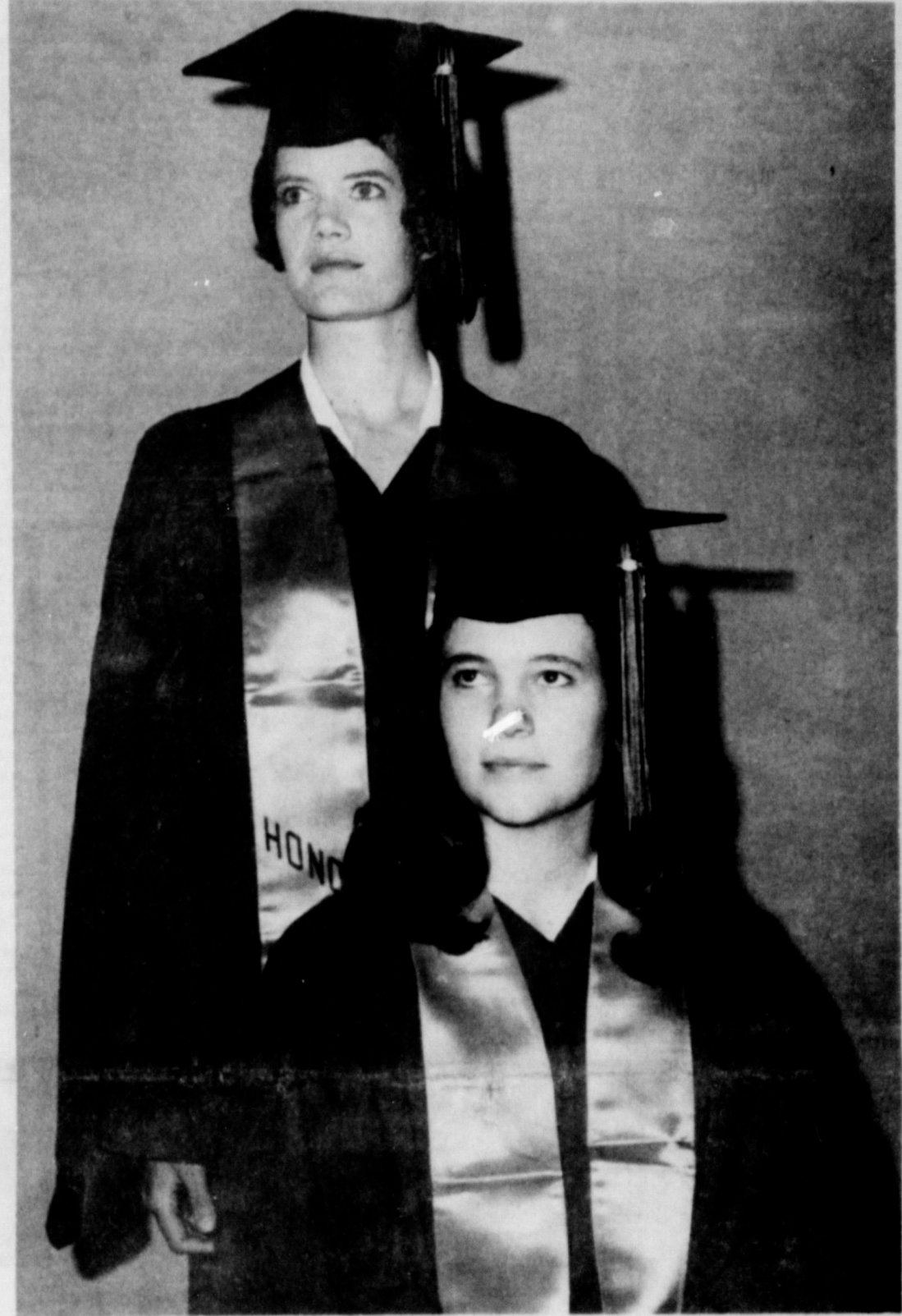
Laura was named as valedictorian of the 1969 graduating class this week with a 96.52 average. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Childers. Scant percentage points back with a 96.31 average was Rita, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Glenn Payne.

Baccalaureate services are set Sunday at 8:15 p.m. in the high school auditorium with the Rev. Clinton Eastman, Westview Baptist Church, to give the address. Commencement is set Monday at 8:15 p.m. in the SHS Gym.

A mixed choir, an ensemble and a solo by Billy Fenley are on the baccalaureate program. Also participating in the Sunday program will be Rev. J. L. Carrito, Rev. H. E. Summar, Rev. John Pratt, and pianist Mrs. Charlene Davis.

The graduation exercises will include addresses by the valedictorian and salutatorian, musical selections, presentation of diplomas by school board president Ted Swanner, presentation of the class by principal M. W. Kerr, and presentation of awards. D. D. Tucker will present the American Legion scholarship award, and J. W. Martindale will present the Legion's Americanism awards.

Head Start Training Meet Here Saturday

"HEAD START AFTER FOUR YEARS IS WHAT?" delivered by Mrs. Jeanette Jenkins, Texas Technological College, will kick off the day-long session of Head Start workers of this area. Teachers, teachers aides and other employees of Cluster III, New Deal, Shallowater, Roosevelt, and Slaton Schools, will be involved in this session.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday at Evans High School with all participants being present for the day long activities. Floyd Honey, representative of the Community Action Board of Lubbock, will bring a greeting from this organization. Dr. Lee Vardy, Supt. of Slaton Schools, will bring the welcome. Rev. M. A. Brown, minister of the Triumph Baptist Church of Slaton, will give the invocation.

Also appearing on the program during the day will be Dr. C. Jones of Texas Technological College, who will speak on "How to Prepare a Child to Obey Rules." Several panels will also help make the program which will be centered around "What A Parent Sees In The Program and Some of Its Shortcomings."

Mayor David Hughes was master of ceremonies for the event, and Tommy Wallace, Citizens State Bank president, was guest speaker. Both lauded the Slaton police force for outstanding dedication to duty.

Swimming Pool Manager Named, Repairs Approved by Chamber

Directors of Slaton Chamber of Commerce held a regular monthly board meeting last Thursday night in the Municipal Building. Clark Self Jr. presided at the session.

Directors approved the employment of Noel Dickson as manager of the Slaton Swimming Pool this summer, approved repairs and painting for the pool facilities, discussed the

possibility of extended area phone service to Lubbock, approved support of a hog production program in the area, and heard committee reports.

Several applicants were presented for the swimming pool job. Dickson's credentials included swimming instruction at a Lubbock swim school. Extensive repairs, a new paint job, and a shade for spectators were among the improvements approved at the pool.

A representative from Southwestern Bell Telephone, Jerry Martin, appeared at the meeting to discuss extended area phone service. Directors told the representative that they thought the proposed rates to tie Slaton into Lubbock lines were too high. The proposal had been discussed in Slaton several years ago, but the rates apparently kept the project from gaining local interest.

Directors requested that Martin bring a more detailed proposal of the rate structure so that the project might be studied further.

Robert H. Davis reported on an agricultural committee study into the possibility of some type of hog production program in the area. Directors agreed that the matter should be pursued as far as possible.

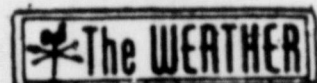

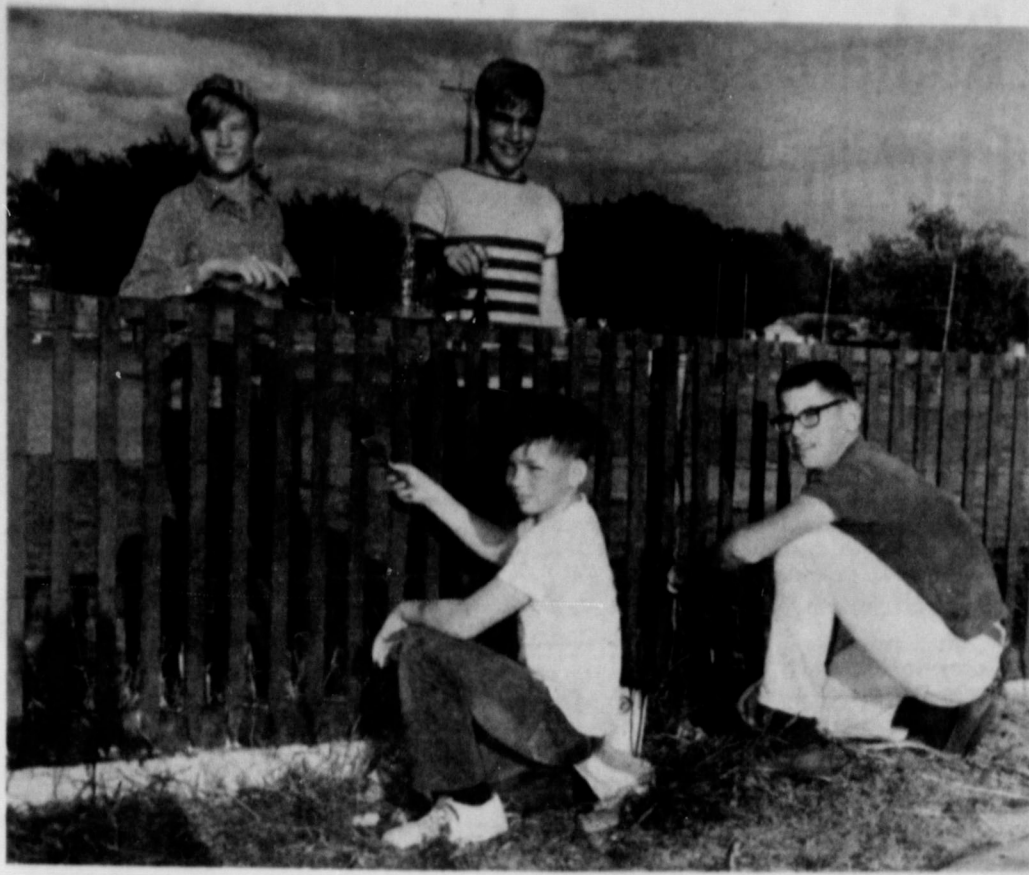

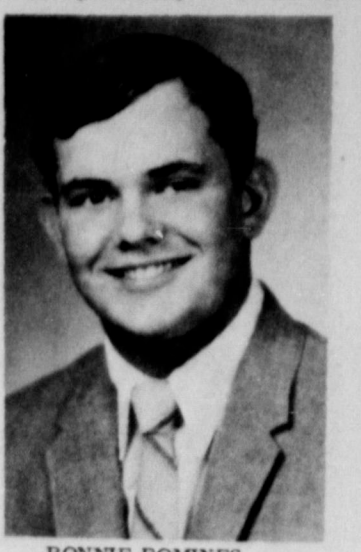

Slaton Junior Discusses Questions About College

A college education, which was once available to only the socially elite, is a necessity in this day.

Any good student in good health who is in the top third of his class and maintains a "B" average can expect acceptance in any college or university. However, there are no

rejections made because of academic deficiencies.

There are 3,262 colleges and universities in the United States. They include state and municipal colleges supported by taxes; private, independent, and endowed colleges for men and women or co-educational; denominational colleges; colleges for teachers; independent professional institutes offering specialized training; independent theology and Bible institutes; post-high school junior, terminal, and community colleges; and technical institutes.

A student who plans to attend college should consider these questions:

1. Does this college offer training for my chosen career? Could I receive better training elsewhere?
2. Will this college suit me academically?
3. What will it cost?
4. What are the scholarship, loan, and job opportunities?
5. Will it offer the social activities I am interested in?
6. What size college should I attend?

Career training is the most important factor to consider when choosing a college. The equipment and facilities must be considered, in order to be the very best in your field, you must have the very best training offered.

Perhaps you should plan to get technical training. In some fields, this type of training

offers much more.

The cost of college is greatly varied. At a small school, the expense of one year may be \$1,200. At private schools it is usually \$2,600 to \$3,500 and at the "name" universities it may range up to \$10,000. The cost of tuition alone at the average college is \$750.

The burdens of expense can be lightened by obtaining a scholarship. Many scholarships are available if you can meet the requirements.

About 90 per cent of all college students prefer co-educational colleges. Most students agree that these social aspects are important in order to obtain the "social graces."

All high school students must begin planning their higher educations. Seniors will be attending college, working, or planning a home in the short span of a few months. This requires preparation.

St. Joseph Students Like Program on Teletraining

"I never enjoyed English class so much."

Anything that can bring an accolade like that from a fifth grade student has to be great. That anything is the teletraining program.

The accolade was from a young lady named Becky in St. Joseph School in Slaton.

Her letter was one of several received by Mrs. Johnie Burleson, school consultant for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, after the St. Joseph fifth graders completed a unit in proper telephone usage utilizing the telephone company's teletraining program.

The letters are representative of many received during each school year by Mrs. Burleson, a Lubbock resident who coordinates teletraining activities throughout the West Texas.

Another St. Joseph student, Annette, said she "never looked forward to English class so much."

And in the words of the teacher, Sister Isabelle Marie, "The teletraining course was a smash hit. The children never seemed to get enough English periods!"

Unheard of! Cassie, another student, had a different thought. "... it was also nice skipping the work from our English book."

But regardless of what the students thought about English, they were unanimous in praising teletraining.

Said Wade, "Just before you let us use the teletrainer I would use the telephone wrong. Now I know how to answer the telephone right and use it correctly."

And Travis had a story to tell: "The telephone helped me because when I was sick January the 30, 1969, my mother and father left to look at a place. I was the oldest one home and I got two calls."

Linda was emphatic: "Now I know how to use the telephone." But Darrell wasn't so sure. He said, "I hope I can answer the telephone correctly."

Ricky was especially complimentary to Mrs. Burleson. "It takes a pretty, nice lady to do this (provide teletraining)."

Mark wrote, "Thank you for all your trouble!" and Bonnie closed out her letter, "I don't know how to repay you, but I'm working on it."

However, it's "no trouble" to Mrs. Burleson. She's wrapped up in her work as school consultant.

Annually, thousands of students in hundreds of schools use the teletraining program. Although most usage is in the

elementary schools, there are specially designed English programs for junior high and high school, and a business unit for senior highs.

Mrs. Burleson doesn't actually teach teletraining to a class. She makes contacts with school administrators concerning the program, and conducts teacher training sessions on teletraining when a school requests.

Then she makes sure the teletraining equipment and associated materials get to the teachers when they want them.

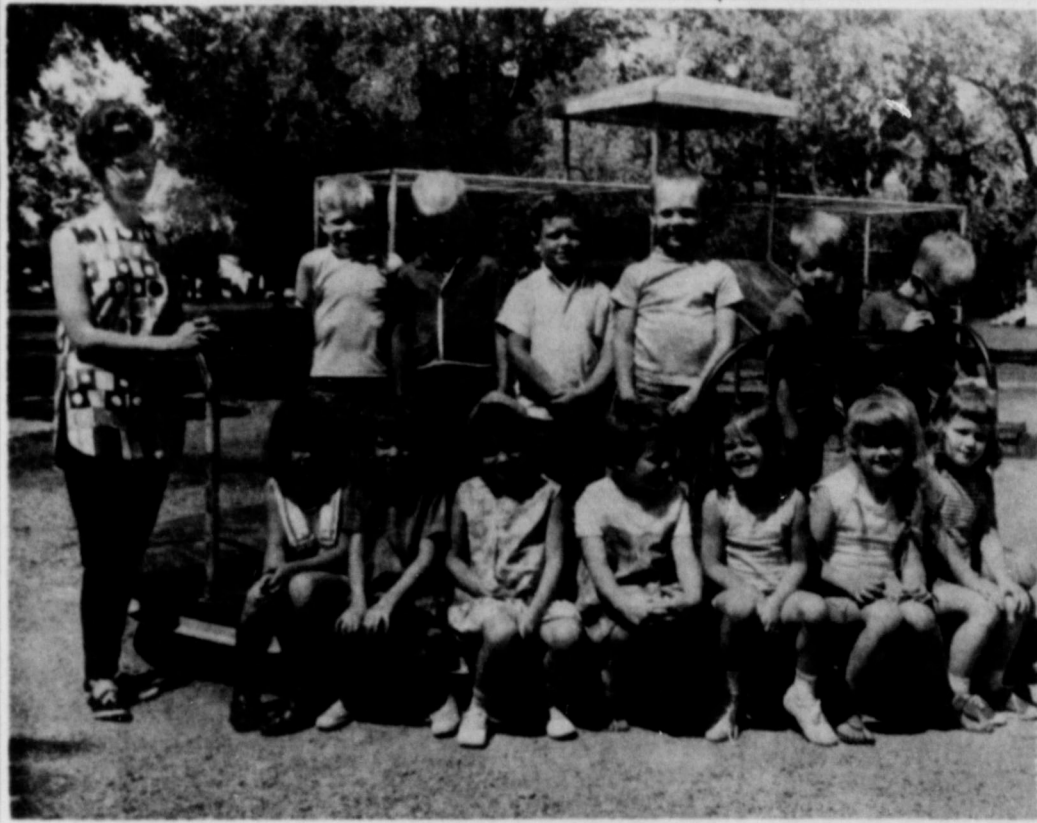
The equipment consists of two telephones, long cords, and an amplifier equipped with buttons to simulate dial tone and busy signal. Associated materials include filmstrips, a film, posters and booklets.

A TEACHER'S LAMENT !

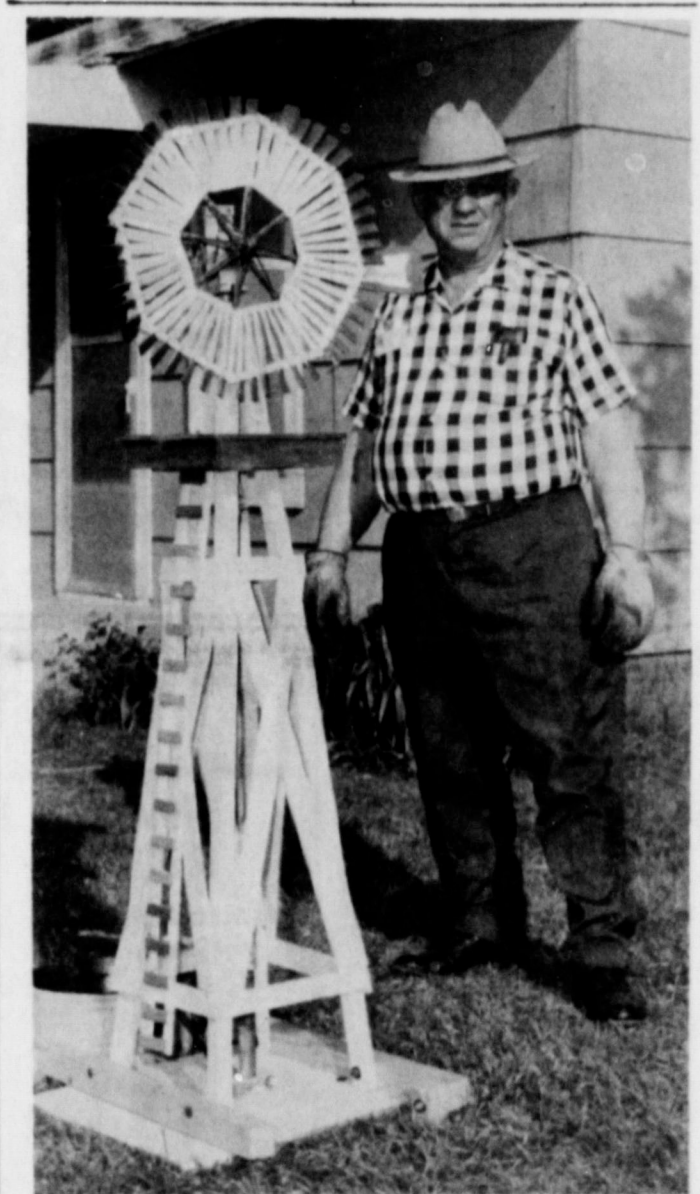

People who are deliberately indifferent to their personal hygiene are scarce in today's close-living society, but some do exist. Nature has endowed most of us with an acute sense of pride about such things as daily bathing, brushing teeth, clean fingernails and good grooming. We would go to practically any length to avoid being offensive to others. Most people resent even the slightest suggestion that there are times when their PH (personal hygiene) quotient slips a little. Personal cleanliness is a vital necessity in the competitive life we lead and contributes to acceptance by others, as we see and hear often on radio and television. Having a high PH quotient is a habit, a way of life -- and a very pleasant one. Here are its main ingredients:

- Bathing:** Daily bathing is as refreshing as it is healthful. Besides making you more agreeable to be around, you are less vulnerable to disease when you wash off the 24-hour accumulation of perspiration and soil. Most people find it practical to wash their hair at least once a week. What brand of soap you use isn't important -- but using it regularly is.
- Dental health:** Regular trips to your dentist is an essential part of a high level of personal hygiene. Television commercials may extoll the virtues of certain tooth pastes or powders, but it's the brushing that counts.

All Library Books Near Readers

Anyone need a book? Any library in the United States is as close as the home town library. The Telex hookup with Texas State Library in Austin and 10 libraries in major cities throughout Texas, enables the Slaton librarian to locate any materials not available in the

local library. This material may consist of books, government documents, magazine articles and answers to reference questions. The Slaton Branch Library is one of the libraries in the 26-county area served by Lubbock City-County Libraries. Requests are telephoned to

the Lubbock library and filled, if possible-if impossible, the request is relayed to other libraries, including university and special libraries throughout the United States.

When the material is located, the library housing it sends it to the library originating the request and it is checked out in a regular manner.

Many of the books are received by requesting libraries within six days.

In making a request for books unavailable in the Slaton Library, Mrs. Hugh Forehand, librarian, explained that the patron should give the author's name, book title, publisher and copyright date, if some of the mentioned information is not complete, the librarian will take available information and try to locate the material.

The patron is asked to pay the postage of the book, or the cost of photocopying if the information desired is found in books or magazines which are not circulating.

The Telex system of inter-library loan is provided for under Title III of the Federal Libraries Services Act.

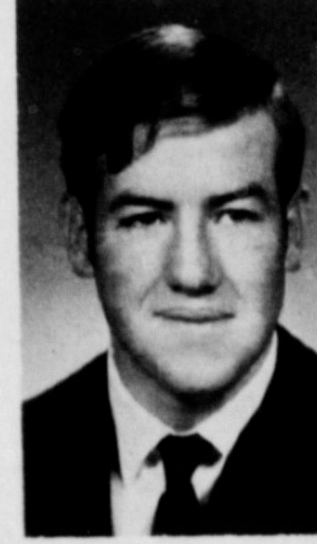
"Any book being circulated by major libraries is available to any patron, even by a telephone request," the librarian said.

Water Management Is Critical Problem

Water management is the most critical problem facing the people on the South Plains today. Water management is the efficient use of water without excessive waste. This includes the management of irrigation water and natural rainfall.

Charles W. Wood, supervisor of the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District, is a firm believer in practicing what he preaches in applying soil and water conservation practices on his own land.

Wood has leveled 110 acres of sloping land on a 160 acre farm and installed 7,487 feet of underground irrigation pipeline. This enables him to make maximum use of the rainfall as well as his irrigation water. This work was finished in 1962 on the wood farm and an excellent job is being done on maintenance.

Wood stated the greatest benefit from installing this type of irrigation system was the savings in both irrigation water and rainfall. He said he figured it required a third less irrigation water to meet the need of his crops.

This saving in irrigation water is due to no losses in runoff and the saving of all the rainfall. Wood also stated another benefit was about a 20 to 25 percent increase in crop yields on this land after the conservation work had been done.

What is water worth? Shelby Newman, agronomist on the staff of the Agricultural Research Extension Center north of Lubbock, states we receive about 18 inches of natural rainfall each year. We save only about one quarter of this crop production.

Newman also said, for each acre inch of total water we save, we can expect about a 30 pound increase in lint and about 200 pound increase in grain sorghum yield per acre. Mr. Newman stated under normal irrigation conditions of applying two timely summer irrigations of four acre inches each we can expect to increase our cotton yield by about 50 pounds per acre and our grain sorghum yields by about 300 pounds per acre for each acre inch of water applied.

Substantial savings in irrigation water and natural rainfall benefit not only farmers but urban populations as well. For further information contact your local technicians in the Soil Conservation Service.

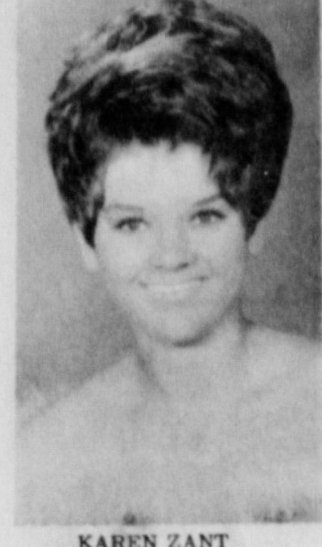

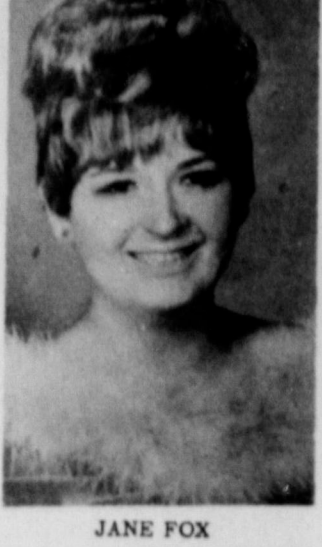

ident of the junior class.

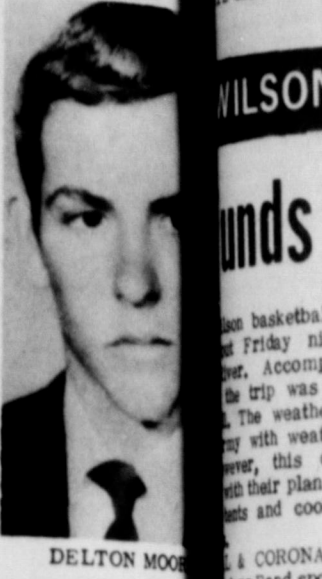

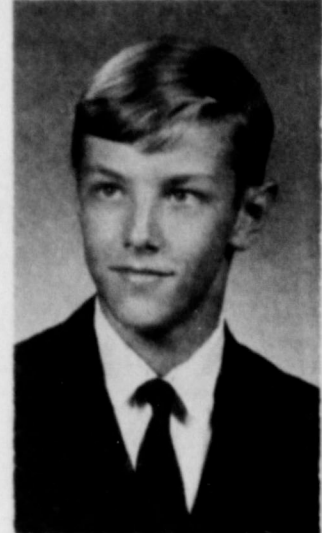
Wade will graduate from high school in May and will enter Angelo State College in September. He plans to major in journalism and history.
