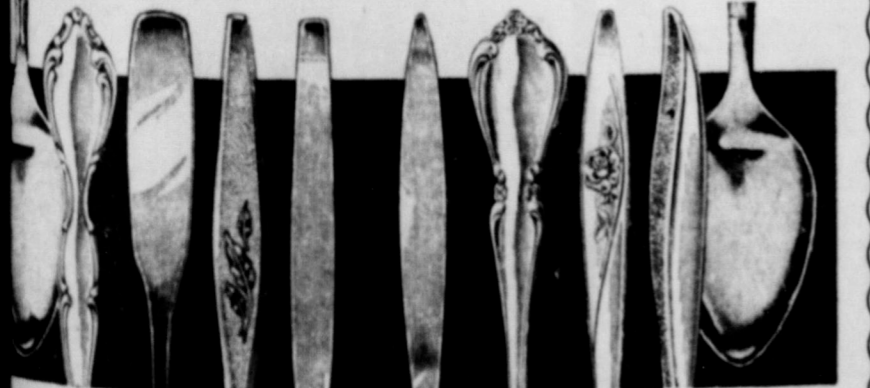

Sister Mercedes Returns

Sister Mary Amadeus Leaves for Mississippi

After serving as Administrator of Slaton's Mercy Hospital for three years, Sister Mary Amadeus R.S.M. left Wednesday for Vicksburg, Miss., her "home," as she called it. She worked there nineteen years before coming to Slaton in August, 1966. She found Slaton to be a friendly town. Sister Amadeus remarked how much she had enjoyed working here and how nice everyone has been to her. With a slight Mississippian drawl she solemnly reminisced, "The people have just been lovely to me."

The three years Sister Amadeus has been at Slaton have been progressive ones. A new X-ray machine was added. The new machine has a shorter exposure time and thus, allowing less radiation, is less dangerous. A carbon dioxide analyzer was added to the hospital lab. The heating system was changed and was connected to the air conditioning duct system. A doctor's lounge was provided and furnished with new carpeting and furniture. The Candy Stripper program was started under Sister Amadeus' administration. New flooring, paint, furniture and office equipment were added, as well as the addition of new offices on the first floor of Mercy.

The hospital was re-accredited by the Joint Commission of Hospital Accreditation. Sister Amadeus felt this was the largest accomplishment, as this rating made the hospital eligible for Medicare and Medicaid patients. She went on to say how much the patients have helped the hospital. These patients receive the best care, as eight new high-low beds have been added to the hospital to accommodate them. The accreditation is the same as any hospital in the area. Sister Amadeus revealed, "It is the same as even the larger hospitals, like Methodist in Lubbock." Renewal of the accreditation will come up again next year.

Mrs. Sherrill Poer, an employee of the hospital, related how well Sister Amadeus got along with everyone. "She was very pleasant and very ambitious," she remarked, and added, "we feel as if she has done all she could while she was here." Before coming to Slaton, Sis-

stated, "Sister was tremendous for all of us. She especially helped the older sisters keep happy. She gave us the spirit to keep going."

"In a hospital of this size one is never certain of the future," Sister Robin added. "But Sister Amadeus updated the hospital and kept everyone on his toes."

Sister Amadeus, realizing the plight of the small hospital, explained, "This hospital has a great part to play in the community. There is a vital need for the hospital here."
