As has been pointed out previously, funeral homes all a-cross the state and nation are withdrawing from the ambulance business, indicating they cannot operate within new Federal regulations. Englunds of Slaton published a statement last week concerning its position in the matter, and pointing out that it no longer has a state permit to operate an em-

ergency or transfer ambulance. Following discussion of the ambulance situation Monday night, the commission decided to determine the cost of a used ambulance and asked Police Chief Walter Head to determine

would be required. The commissioners also discussed the possibility of using volunteer aids on the ambulances.

Wallace D. Lawson, field consultant for the Texas State Department of Health, appeared at the meeting on the request of Chief Head to discuss regulations and the course pursued by other cities in connection with the emergency ambulance service.

Lawson explained that ambulance services are operated in a wide variety of ways -ranging from governmental units to volunteers with some being subsidized by city and county governments. He pointed out that about 70 to 80 perlabor.

As for state regulations, Lawson explained that permit holders must have two persons in the ambulance -- one with a standard Red Cross first aid certificate, and the vehicle must have at least 18 items of equipment specified by the State. The equipment required costs less than \$200, he added, Federal laws, at present, pertain only to wage and hour provisions in connection with the ambulance service.

Asked for his personal opinion. Lawson said that in a town the size of Slaton that the service might best be operated under the police department. In most towns where this system is used, the city secretary bills persons who use the ambulance service. Lawson said the collection experience has been good. One county, he noted, is setting up an annual \$2 tax per family to cover ambulance services.

Don Kendrick, local representative, appeared at the meeting with a Traveler's official to explain the company's insurance program which is currently used for city employees. Several other companies had requested to make presentations on their programs.

In discussing the proposals, it was pointed out that one firm -- Crown Insurance, represented by Tommy Davis, had proposed a program that would be \$700 per year less than the

present policies, and the firm claimed more coverage. Upon recommendation of several department heads that employees preferred to keep the present insurance program, the com-mission voted to retain the Traveler's insurance.

Mayor David Hughes out lined changes in the water department with S. H. Fleming and John Hudnall acting as department leaders. Cardenas recently resigned as water superintendent after working for the City of Slaton for about 12 years.

Chief Head reported that a major repair bill would be presented soon on the radio equipment at the station. In a recent thunderstorm, the radio base station was knocked out by lightning. Commissioners reported several complaints -including weeds on E. Geneva street, a water drainage pro-blem at 20th and Crosby, street signs in need of repair or adjustment, and street repairs needed on Railroad Avenue.

A manhole installation at Tom Sims Chevrolet was approved on request of the water and sewer department. Policy is for the property owner to pay for materials and the City to make installation, the mayor

In a called meeting on Tuesday, June 17, the Wilson School Board sold bonds for the new school building to Underwood Neuhause and Company from Houston, at an effective interest rate of 6.30. There were three bids and Underwood Neuhaus was the low bidder. Patrons of the School District approved the \$200,000,00 bond election on May 10 by a margin of 3-1,

Plans call for the new building to be located where the old gym now stands. The tearing down of the old gym is to begin this week.

All school board members were present for the meeting. Also present for the meeting Joe Smith who is the school's legal advisor and Superintendent Glen H. Mitchell. were approved by district taxpayers in that span, and no bond issues were rejected. The school enrollment was about 875 when Vardy came here in 1947; now it is slightly more than 2,000. The faculty has increased from 37 to 95 during the same period, School district valuation has jumped from about

\$4.5 million to \$18 million. During his tenure as school chief, the curriculum has expanded to include: music instruction throughout schools, the re-institution of a band, introduction of art in junior and high school, changing
