Girl Suffers Head Injuries

Gayle Guthrie, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Guthrie, 425 N. 7th St., was seriously injured Wednesday, April 16 at 6:21 p.m. when a heavy trailer frame made of steel fell on her head.

Suffering severe head injuries, Gayle is a patient in the intensive care unit at Methodist Hospital.

She is a sixth grade student at Slaton Junior High School and her father is employed by Santa Fe Railways.

Donald Stokes Injured In Vietnam War

L/Cpl. Donald Frank Stokes, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emery Stokes Sr. of Slaton, was seriously injured in Vietnam April 7 while on patrol. He tripped off an enemy explosive device, and as a result of the injury, it was necessary to amputate his right leg below the knee. His left leg was broken in two places and his right arm injured.

Stokes is now a patient in the U. S. Army 106 General Hospital, Yokohama, Japan, receiving further treatment, and it was there that he received the Bronze Star two days after the accident.

Cpl. Stokes went into service with the U. S. Marines in February, 1968, and has been in Vietnam since last July. He attended Slaton schools before entering service. His father is employed in the body shop department at Slaton Motors, Inc. His parents received a letter from a corpsman in the intensive care unit at 1st Medical Battalion stating that Stokes would remain in the hospital there for some time, then will be sent to the nearest naval hospital, which in this case would be Corpus Christi.

Planting Time Here For Area Farmers

Planting time arrived in the Slaton area this week, with a full-scale operation expected in the fields in the next few weeks.

Many farmers have already planted feed, and some cotton has been put in the ground, according to spotted reports. Another shower Saturday night added to the excellent pre-plant soil conditions. The Slaton area had received from 1.5 to 3 inches of rainfall the previous week, adding to the good underground moisture recorded over the winter.

Tornado warnings in the area and a cool wind preceded the shower here Saturday night. The rainfall was not heavy, however. The possibility of more rainfall was in the forecast Wednesday afternoon. The soil temperature ranged from 57 to 64 this week, and the 10-day average was about 54 degrees at the customary 8-inch reading.

Storms were more severe in some areas Saturday. Two twisters were sighted and confirmed around Seminole, and one destroyed a vacant farm house. No injuries or widespread damages were reported from the violent weather over

the South Plains, however.

While prospects are bright in the fields, farmers are worrying about other factors which affect the cotton crop. A move on the part of the Beltwide Cotton Producer Committee to get "anniversary month" loan procedure applied to 1968-crop cotton was not successful. Idea was to prevent CCC from taking over on July 31 the unsold portion of the '68 crop and reselling it into the market just before and during the time producers

will be trying to sell 1969 crops.

However, it appears policies for the 1969-70 marketing year were influenced to the better. Sales prices for Government-owned cotton should be higher in relation to loan values than in recent years. Producers are also concerned about loss of exports due to the Gulf ports dock strike. The strike was blamed for the loss of about 300,000 bales of cotton exports. The strike was settled, but officials are worried about the temporary measures.

Slaton Co-Op Pays \$143,300 To Stockholders

Slaton Cooperative Gin paid out \$143,300.55 in cash dividends to stockholders at the annual membership meeting Tuesday afternoon in the Community Clubhouse.

Stockholders also elected A. A. Wimmer and Ed Moseley as directors, while the board re-elected Alex Bednarz as president.

Moseley, appointed the past year to fill out the unexpired term of Fred Stephens, was named as vice president of the board, and Ray Kitten was re-elected as secretary-treasurer. J. B. Lamb is the other holdover director, and J. E. Gray is the gin manager.

An audit report to the members was cited by Edwin E. Merriman & Co. as being "very good...one of the best around." Net margins for allocation was \$191,070. The cash outlay to patrons was \$143,300 with the remainder being in stock issued.

Co-op representatives from Lubbock were guests at the meeting, and several of the men made brief remarks and reports. Other special guests included T. J. Wallace, J. W. Holt, Dee Bowman and Speedy Nieman. Coffee, cakes and cookies were served to about 80 stockholders and guests.

Two Wounded In Shooting

Two Slaton men were hospitalized after a shooting incident in southeast Slaton early Saturday morning. No charges had been filed by Wednesday.

Wounded and in a Lubbock hospital is Willie Hardrick, 58, who was shot in the abdomen. C. V. Cox, 41, was wounded in the shoulder, taken to a Lubbock hospital and has since been released.

Police reported the shooting occurred at the Hardrick Hotel, and apparently stemmed from an argument between the two men about some change for a \$20 bill. The incident was reported at 3:20 a.m. Saturday.

Slaton police made 20 arrests the past week and issued 18 traffic tickets. The department was also holding three prisoners for Post, two for the Texas Highway Patrol and one for Lubbock County.

Two accidents were recorded by the police. Minor injuries were reported in one of the mishaps.

Devin Bednarz, 2-year-old son of David Bednarz, Rt. 1, Slaton, suffered minor injuries about noon Sunday in a two-car accident on FM 41, about a quarter mile west of U. S. 84. He was in a car driven by his father. The child was released from Methodist Hospital after stitches were taken over his right ear. His parents reported his condition as satisfactory.

One More Deadline

Attention, Slatonites! In case you have forgotten you have one more deadline in April to meet, April -- the deadline month -- saw Slatonites licensing motor vehicles, paying income taxes and complying with the motor vehicle inspection law.

Now, comes No. 4 requirement -- claiming homestead exemption for state ad valorem property taxes.

Deadline for filing for the exemption is April 30.

While the mortgage company, loan agency, or bank, may pay the property tax for the owner and add the tax to regular mortgage payments, each property owner must file the application for exemption for his own property each year.



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

No Forms Are Required to Buy Ammunition

Hunters and sportsmen need only identify themselves to be able to purchase ammunition under the 1968 Federal gun control law, B. Frank White, Southwest Regional Commissioner of Internal Revenue, said today.

There are no forms to fill out, but a person must show some identification such as a driver's license to indicate he meets the age requirements set forth in the gun law.

The 1968 Gun Control Act limits the sale of ammunition for pistols, revolvers and other handguns to persons 21 years of age and over. Ammunition for rifles and shotguns may be purchased by persons 18 years of age and over.

White said that unlike the restrictions on the sale of firearms, a person can buy ammunition outside his home state. Thus, a hunter on a trip or a sportsman attending a shooting match will have no problem obtaining ammunition.

Dealers are required to keep records of ammunition sales including the name and address of the purchaser.

White said the Federal gun legislation enacted in 1968 was designed to help law enforcement officials at all levels of government fight crime. The legislation was not intended to place unnecessary restrictions on hunters, sportsmen or citizens using firearms for any lawful purposes.

Administration of Federal gun laws is the responsibility of the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division of IRS.

You can prolong the new appearance of a just-finished floor with a coat of wax. The wax protection will last as long as the wax finish is intact. The floor should have at least two coats of wax - but if you use a liquid wax, you have to apply additional coats to build up an adequate film. Paste wax is best on a floor finished with shellac.

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
