The Head Start program will be conducted in Slaton Schools again this summer, starting Monday, June 2, it was an . nounced this week by Supt. P.

The eight-week program is designed to help prepare beginning students, who are from families with limited incomes, for entrance into the public schools.

All children who are eligible to start to school in grade one in September, 1969, and meet the financial limitation of income as imposed by the Office of Economic Opportunity are eligible to attend.

These children will be given dental and medical care. Each student will be fed at noon of each day, as well as receiving a snack in the morning. All expenses are paid by the Federal government and all supplies are furnished free.

This is the fifth year for the Head Start operation, and officials say the program has proven beneficial to children eligible to attend. The progress of the students in the regular school term is accelerated by the training received in Head Start.

The program is to be conducted in the Slaton Junior High building this year. It will start at 9 a.m. each day and sessions will end at 1:30 p.m. each

Bill Smith, president of Slaton Industrial & Development Foundation, and Carroll Mc-Donald, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce industrial development committee, appeared at the session to discuss the price of lots on industrial tracts at Slaton Municipal Airport.

McDonald explained that an industrial prospect had been found who was interested in about a five-acre tract. He and Smith expressed belief that it would be to the best interests of the city to price the acreage at a reasonable amount in order to promote development of the area. After discussion, the commission set a price of \$600 per acre on the

These included water and sewer lines and drainage problems. It was primarily a "briefing" session for the new commissioners.

Joe Cardenas, water superintendent, announced that Slaton will host the area Water Works meeting here in June, Site of the meeting is passed around to participating cities.

Discussion of a "Youth Council" suggestion submitted to the commission was tabled due to the long agenda. It is expected to be discussed at a future meeting.

Byron Henderson, Lubbock Aid ambulance service of Lubbock, appeared at the meeting on request of the mayor to discuss types of emergency ambulance service available to a city. He was asked to come back with figures on the cost of this type service.







Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Foerster, said she was probably born with it, but they didn't realize it until she couldn't hear over the telephone. They discovered it when she was six years old. She is now eight.

"It never really seemed to bother her, she had adjusted so well, but now that Jaime has a hearing aid, she is hearing things she never was able to hear before," her mother said. For instance, after the last rain, she could hear the tires of the car hitting the mud and water and she said she had never heard that sound before. Jaime visited the Luxury Liv-

ing Show held in Lubbock recently. She and her parents were especially interested in the Sonotone of Lubbock display, knowing as they did that Jaime had a hearing loss. They, along with many others, dropped a card into a box from which the name of the winner of a free Sonotone hearing aid would be drawn.

Jaime's name was drawn from the box and a few days later Jaime and her mother were at the Sonotone Clinic where audiometer tests were made and an impression taken







Tax Man Sam Sez

One of the popular questions at Internal Revenue Service this year has been "Who must file an estimate?" The tax in -structions spell out the rules quite clearly.

If you don't have tax withheld

from your salary you are usually liable for filing an estimate, since this is the way Congress set up the pay-asyou-go system for you. If your withholding is not enough to pay all the tax you owe then you may need to file an estimate. If you are not going to owe more than \$40, you don't have to file an estimate in any case. Since a large part of our

Nation's taxpayers do have a salary or wages and do pay withholding, they simply drop exemptions by changing their Form W-4, or request their employer to withhold additional amounts to assure that they have paid enough through withholding to cover their tax bill for the year.

Drunks Sock It To Sober Drivers

AUSTIN -- Drunk drivers may be taking the lives of more safe and sober Texans than many folks realize, the Texas Safety Association reported today, noting that several recent studies reported by the U. S. Department of Transportation indicate that most drivers killed in accidents caused by drink. ing drivers have not been drinking at all.

One two-year California study shows that 80 percent of the drivers killed by drunk drivers had no alcohol content in their blood, Another research report shows that the drinking driver runs into others four times as often as he is run into. The proportion of "rammers" among the drinking drivers was significantly greater than the proportion among the non-drinking drivers.

Researchers also conclude that the higher a driver's blood alcohol concentration, greater the likelihoodhe has initiated a crash in which he is involved. The contribution of a driver with an alcohol content of .15 has been rated by one Canadian researcher as 42 times that of a non-drinking driver.

The Texas Safety Association, which has endorsed proposed legislation designed to remove drunken drivers from the streets and highways of the state, emphasized that there is no reason to believe that the Lone Star State's drunk dri vers have more control behind the wheel that the drunk drivers of the other states and Canada.

TSA called Senate Bill 74, which would require breath tests for violators suspected of drunk driving, a first step toward saving some 500 lives a year in Texas.



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

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
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
