## City Senate raises City

that the Senate of the State of Texas, in its 57th session, sends its hearty congratulations to all the citizens of Slaton, for this outward display of love for our great country, and that these citizens be lauded for this patriotic act, and that copies of this resolution be sent to the Slaton VFW Post, the Slaton High School, the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, and the City Hall of Slaton, Texas.

## Community Crusade For Christ Planned City to Observe Loyalty Day

"For God, Flag and Country" will be the patriotic theme in Slaton today during special Loyalty Day activities sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 6721 of Slaton.

District 7 of the VFW, along with the local post and its Auxiliary, will host the observance, according to district Loyalty Day chairman Dewey Nelson of Slaton.

A parade at 10 a.m. and a

patriotic address at 11 a.m. will keynote the observance, said Nelson. Cleo Clayton, VFW Department Commander from Amarillo, will be guest speaker on the city square at 11 a.m.

Parade participants will include several VFW posts in the district, the Slaton High School Band, the Khiva Shriners, and other organizations, including floats. Howard Bryant is parade marshal.

The parade will form at the park and proceed along West Garza to the city square. Slaton Mayor David Hughes last week issued a proclamation praising the patriotic purposes of Loyalty Day and urging "every citizen, school, church, organization, business establishment and home to display the flag of the United States and to participate in special public patriotic programs sponsored by

the VFW."

Some organizations scheduled to appear in the parade include VFW posts from Slaton, Lubbock, Levelland, Spur, Brownfield, Post and Lamesa; Slaton High Band, Slaton American Legion Post, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cubs and Brownies, Smith Ford, Tom Sims Chevrolet, and representatives of some armed forces groups.

Loyalty Day was originated by the VFW as a counter-offensive against Communism and other anti-American May Day demonstrations. The VFW members pushed the atheistic Reds and their sympathizers into the background with public patriotic activities dramatizing positive Americanism.

Congress and the President have added to the patriotic fervor officially designating May 1 annually as Loyalty Day and urging all citizens to participate in appropriate programs through their schools, churches and other groups in every community.

### Tornado Alert Signal Given

Of all the winds that sweep the earth's surface, tornadoes are by far the most terrible. Their time is short and their path of destruction generally rather small, but their march through populated areas leave scenes of awful devastation.

With the tornado season approaching, Slaton Civil Defense Director Don Kendrick reminds citizens of the tornado warning signal and seeks volunteer spotters--especially on the fringe areas of the city.

The "take cover" signal is a wavering siren, sounded off and on. It is similar to a fire signal except that it keeps sounding. A tornado alert signal will be sounded only if a funnel has been sighted and there is a possibility of it hitting the city. Kendrick urges citizens around Slaton to call 3212 if a funnel is sighted. Citizens are requested not to tie up the phone line for information during times of violent weather. The radio station--KCAS--is in direct contact with CD headquarters and will report any tornado sightings as quickly as possible.

Anyone interested in being signed up as a spotter should contact Kendrick.

He was born and raised in San Antonio. A graduate of Howard Payne College and Southwestern Seminary, Sanchez and his wife are the parents of four children.

Boyd is accompanied on the piano by his wife, Margaret. They are both natives of Belfast, Ireland. Wesley is a baritone soloist, who has won many outstanding awards in his native Ireland, including the John McCormack Cup in Dublin and the Rose Bowl Award in Belfast. Since 1958 he has been engaged in Evangelistic singing in many countries, including the U.S., Canada, the British Isles, Australia, Malaysia, Ceylon, the Caribbean. He has often been song leader for the Rev. Joe Blinco, while he was an associate Evangelist of the Billy Graham team.

Margaret is a professional accompanist, having graduated from the Royal Academy of Music, London, England. She has toured many countries of Europe and the U.S.A. as pianist for the Belfast Girl Singers and

### TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

Ten weeks from the date a Federal income tax return calling for a refund is mailed, the taxpayer either has his check in his pocket or he is waiting for it. If he is waiting, he should write the IRS. If he is not waiting, he should write the IRS. If he is not waiting, he should write the IRS.

For this reason, a taxpayer who has not heard about his refund should wait ten weeks before writing IRS. By waiting this length of time, most taxpayers will find their inquiry unnecessary, Campbell said.

If it becomes necessary to write, the taxpayer should indicate where and when he filed his return and give his name, address and social security

number, Campbell said. Millions of tax returns are handled every filing season at the Austin Service Center which serves Northern Texas taxpayers. The volume of processing operations there makes it practically impossible for IRS to locate a particular return and to answer any question about it until processing is complete.

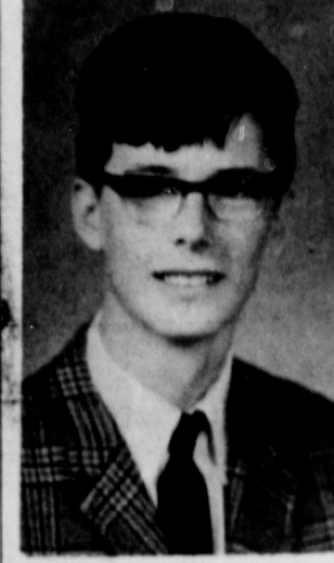

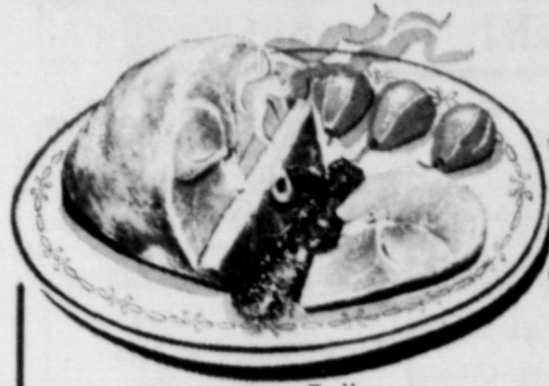

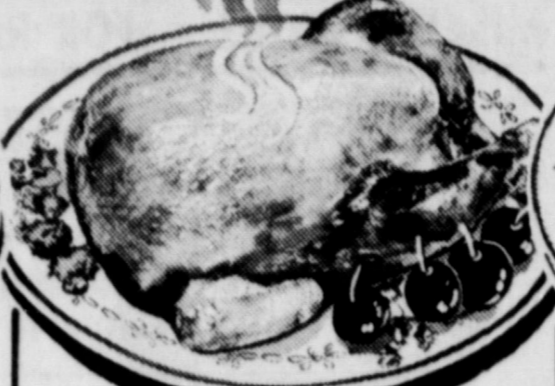
