Tornado Alert Signal Given

Of all the winds that sweep the earth's surface, torandoes are by far the most terrible. Their time is short and their path of destruction generally rather small, but their march through populated areas leave scenes of awful devastation.

With the tornado season approaching, Slaton Civil Defense Director Don Kendrick reminds citizens of the tornado warning signal and seeks volunteer spotters--especially on the fringe areas of the city.

The "take cover" signal is a wavering siren, sounded off and on, it is similar to a fire signal except that it keeps sounding. A tornado alert signal will be sounded only if a funnel has been sighted and there is a possibility of it hitting the city.

Kendrick urges citizens around Slaton to call 3212 if a funnel is sighted. Citizens are requested not to tie up the phone line for information during times of violent weather. The direct contact with CD headquarters and will report any tornado sightings as quickly as possible.

Anyone interested in being signed up as a spotter should contact Kendrick.







Not for older folks, perhaps, but for preschool tots who learn the "E" game, complete with "Magic Shoes" and a topsyturvey "Table", an eye test can be a happy adventure in growing up healthy.

Such fun will begin in Roosevelt at a free vision screening program to be held tomorrow, May 2, at Roosevelt Baptist

Volunteers from the Roosevelt Young Homemakers, trained by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, will check youngsters for signs of visual problems 9:00 a.m. -11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. 3:00 p.m.

The "E" game, an integral part of the screening procedure, is used to discover indications of visual faults in children who have not yet learned to read. The topsy-turvey table is actually the letter "E" that tops the usual eye chart, The "E" appears on the wall chart in diminishing sizes and rotating positions, with the "table legs" pointing in a different direction

The child being screened indicates which direction the "legs" are pointing, thus permitting him to be checked even though he cannot read.

For the actual screening test, the child performs alone; however, to enable the youngsters to learn the game and overcome any possible shyness, the preschoolers play it in a group first. The children sit in a semi-circle before a volunteer who displays the "E" symbol, and they move their arms up, down, right or left to correspond with the rotation of the "E" by the volunteer screener.

dividual test arrives, the "Magic Shoes" help to sustain the child's interest as well as aiding the accuracy of the test. To obtain a precise check of the youngster's visual acuity, the chart must be read from a distance of 20-feet. At the 20foot measurement, the child finds two small shoe prints sketched. Standing within the "Magic Shoes" while he reads the chart is all part of the game for the tot.

"We hope every preschool child in Roosevelt will be brought in by his parents". Mrs. R. D. McCallister, chairman of the screening project said today, "A vision problem can be a tragic and needless handicap for a youngster going through school".
