New Bug Control: 'Swallow' Them!

By KATHY WALTER

Mosquitoes can be sprayed, swatted, slapped, even sub mitted to, or -- they can be swallowed. A most unusual experiment in mosquito control is being conducted by Slatonite John M. Fondy Jr., 1000 W.

Crosby. An avid nature enthusiast, Fondy read of the purple martin, a large type of swallow who eats up to 2,000 mosquitoes at each "meal." He decided the bird was worth investigation, and to attract the large, unusual birdhouse which

the martin requires. An experiment conducted at Beaver Reservoir in northwest Arkansas proved the birds kept the recreation areas mosquito free. The martins are common throughout the United States and have been spotted as far south as Plainview and Tahoka, but are found more frequently from Wisconsin to Amarillo, However, none have been seen in

this locale. "The purple martin is a very particular bird," Fondy commented, "and requires a spec-

After the eight weeks of school, officials stated that they felt the students had learned how to get along with other students better, school routine and learned more about the English language.

EDITORIALS

Water Plan A "MUST"

TEXANS ON AUGUST 5 will determine the course our state will take into the next century. One course, begun nearly two decades ago and ready for action now, will provide adequate water resources to keep Texas moving ahead with vision and determination. The other leads to stagnation and decline because of an inadequate water supply.

WHAT IS AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO?

Amendment No. 2 authorizes the Texas Water Development Board to issue \$3.5 billion in bonds to finance Texas' share of the cost of the Texas Water Plan. This money is not to be used to provide gifts or grants, but will provide temporary financing which will be repaid by water users. The Amendment also removes the 4 per cent ceiling on Water Development

WHAT IS THE TEXAS WATER PLAN?

The objective of the Texas Water Plan is to provide adequate water to maintain the growth and prosperity of Texas into the next century when it is estimated that we will have a population of 30.5 million people. The Plan provides for the full development of our water resources and the importation of surplus water from the lower Mississippi River for distribution to areas with declining water resources.

WHO IS TO PAY FOR THE PLAN?

Cost of the \$9 billion Texas Water Plan-Texas' share is estimated at \$3.5 billion-will be shared by local, state and federal governments, with those who ultimately use the water paying much of the costs of the Plan.

WHY DOES TEXAS NEED A WATER RESOURCE PLAN?

By the end of this century-in just 31 years- Texas will not have enough water to supply its growing cities, its expanding industry, and its irrigated agriculture. To assure an adequate water supply, the state has prepared a plan for the full development, management and use of its water resources- and an imported water supply-to serve Texas to the year 2020 and to assure all Texans water to meet their needs.

WILL THE PLAN PROVIDE ADEQUATE WATER FOR TEXAS?

Yes. With our current major reservoirs (157), the proposed full development of our water resources (67 dams and reservoirs) and an imported supply of water, Texas can meet its water demands to the year

The people of Texas will benefit from the Texas Water Plan. The plan provides for meeting all essential and beneficial water requirements throughout the state. AUSTIN-The Texas Water Plan is the first major water plan in the United States where substantial provision is made for maintaining the ecological balance, declared a 45-year veteran of water engineering

THE TEXAS WATER PLAN

The Texas Water Plan is a comprehensive long-range guide to serve as a basis for solving the water problems of the State of Texas over the next 50 years. The plan has been left flexible to allow change, correction, addition or deletion as future studies, needs or lack of justifiable demand may be deemed necessary by the State of Texas.

Since 1958, the State has spent approximately \$10 million developing the Texas Water Plan. The time has come for Texans to decide whether this investment is to bear fruit or be thrown away.

Amendment No. 2 (HJR 9) will ask the voters of Texas to give the Texas Legislature the authority to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to sell up to an additional \$31/2 billion in bonds over a 40-50 year period in increments as needed. No bonds are pected to be issued before 1975 for constru of the proposed system or until Texas ha cured an out-of-state supplemental

The adoption of Amendment No. 2 wil Texas in a much stronger position for se the federal assistance necessary for the ject, since the Legislature and the citizen have expressed readiness to provide finan-for their proportionate share of the cost in plementing the Texas Water Plan.
