## Cold Front Brings More Rain

The season's first major cold front pushed into the area Sunday, triggering rainfall ranging from small amounts up to almost 2 inches early Monday morning.

The wet weather was an unwelcome visitor for area farmers, some of whom had already started harvesting cotton. Sunny weather and warm temperatures, however, made a return to the region Tuesday and Wednesday.

The high temperature Monday was only 62 degrees, following a low Sunday night of 46. The low reading dipped to 44 Tuesday night but was expected to be higher Wednesday night.

Rain reports in Slaton ranged from .75 of an inch to about 1.5 inches. Some areas west and southwest of the city reported only small amounts of rainfall. Lanny Swanner, just southeast of town, reported almost 2 inches while little moisture was recorded further south.

Francis Grabber, 3.5 miles west of Slaton, reported about 1.8 inches of rainfall, with some farmers in that area recording from 2 to 2.25 inches of moisture from the early Monday morning rain.

Although the damp weather has caused some damage on the quality of the cotton, area farm observers are still predicting a big yield in the South Plains. There are more acres in cotton this year, and less of the acreage has been lost to damaging weather.

A few cotton producers had already started mechanical pickers in their fields last week, and with continued dry weather the harvest of the cotton is expected to increase sharply.

Boll worms, wet weather and scattered hail storms joined forces over the past 30 to 40 days to lop 127,000 bales off the estimated total cotton production for the 25 counties surrounding Lubbock in the territory of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

As of Oct. 1 estimated production comes to 1,862,000 bales, down from 1,989,000 bales estimated on Sept. 1.

Cotton production estimates are jointly compiled for the area by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers on the first of each month each year, Aug. 1 through Dec. 1.

Donald Johnson, PCG executive vice president, commented "The drop in the estimated production potential is of course disappointing, but if we reach the current estimate our production will still be up from the area's total for 1968 by 200,000 bales, for an increase of just over 12 percent."

The 25 counties produced 1,662,300 500-pound bales in 1968 according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

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## Tigers Host Dunbar In Final Non-Zone Contest

### Fire Prevention Week Observed At Junior High

In observance of Fire Prevention Week, students at Junior High are participating by making posters and other exhibits; writing themes; and hearing lectures on effective methods of fire prevention.

The 6th grade classes are preparing displays which use a fire prevention theme. Members of the 7th grade are writing paragraphs and making oral reports; and the 8th graders are writing themes and have heard several local speakers discuss the various aspects of fire prevention.

Speakers addressing the classes are Jack Clark, Johnnie Moore, Bob Kern, Charles Marriott and Don Kendrick. The 8th grade themes will be judged and a first, second and third place winner selected.

Members of the art class, which includes students from all grades, have made posters relative to fire prevention. A number are on display and will be judged later for a first, second and third place winner.

The teaching of fire prevention and fire safety in the schools is instrumental in the reduction of fire insurance rate locally, a spokesman said.

Smarting after two one-sided defeats and some unkind publicity, the Slaton Tigers will be shooting for an upset of the Lubbock Dunbar Panthers when the two teams clash at Tiger Stadium Friday night.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. for the non-district game - the final contest for both teams prior to zone competition. Slaton is in Zone A and Dunbar in Zone B of the big 3-AAA district.

The Tigers open zone action here against Sweetwater next week, while Dunbar catches Estacado in its first zone clash. The two zone champions will meet at the season's end to determine the district winner.

Slaton escaped from the Estacado game last week without serious injuries, and Coach Ernie Davis expects all his gridgers to be ready for action Friday night.

The Panthers have registered three decisive victories this

season and have one loss - a close 13-10 decision at Snyder. Dunbar walloped Littlefield by 55-0, Brownfield by 34-0, and downed Levelland last week by 48-0. Slaton owns a 2-2 record going into the contest.

Although Dunbar will probably rate a five or six-touchdown edge in the game, the Tigers will be hoping to make a better showing in their second home game of the season.

Dunbar probably lacks the depth of last year, but the Panther's speed and power is still there. Quarterback Ernest Davis and tailback Ronald Kinner return in the backfield, along with big skillet Meredith.

Meredith is a strong 210-pounder, while Davis, Kinner and Milton Crittendon all have speed to burn. The interior of the Panther line has 200-pound-plus gridgers to open the holes. Dunbar scored a 42-19 win

over Slaton last season. The Tigers hope to get their offense rolling again this week. Fullback Larry Moore, leading ground gainer, was the target for Estacado last week and he wound up with a minus 7 yards. That left him with 290 for the season. Alan Fondy has racked up 199 yards in four games, while Nick Farrell has 75 and Don Smith 67 yards.

Davis reported spirited workouts this week as the Tigers worked hard to bounce back. He said the starting lineups would probably be the same as last week.

That would find Robert Englund and Jimmy Rogers at ends, Allen McDonald and Dennis Rushing at tackles, Louis Scott and Ollie Rainwater at guards, Charlie Geer at center, and Terry Mosser, Alan Fondy, Nick Farrell and Larry Moore in the backfield.

The defensive alignment includes Englund and Allen Walters or Paul Payne at ends, McDonald and Scott or Rushing at tackles, Charlie Thomas and Ronnie Howard at guards, Ted Dixon and Don Smith at linebacker posts, Glen Akin Jr. and Bruce Schuette at defensive halfbacks, and Frank Self at safety.

The probable Dunbar starters: Hodge (190) and Wilson (198) at ends, Bryant (190) and Atkins (210) at tackles, Moore (195) and Sanders (170) at guards, Ervin (210) at center, and Davis (165), Crittendon (160), Meredith (210) and Kinner (180) in the backfield.

### Red-Black Day Set Oct. 17

Slaton Tiger Club, at its weekly meeting Monday night, voted to sponsor a "Red and Black" Day on Friday, Oct. 17, date of the first zone game of the Slaton Tigers.

The opening zone game of the district will be against the Sweetwater Mustangs. Fans will be urged to wear red and black during the day and to the game. The club still has red ponchos for sale.

The club also made final plans for its light bulb sale, which was held Tuesday evening. Members saw a film of the Estacado game and heard a report from Coach Ernie Davis on the upcoming game with Dunbar.

A "Turkey Shoot" has been scheduled north of town Saturday and Sunday, with proceeds going to Slaton Little League. It was announced this week by project chairman J. Martin Basinger.

The turkey shoot will start at 9 a.m. Saturday and will be held on city property located just around the curve on the Golf Course Road. The site is about 2 miles from Montgomery-Snell implement.

The "shoot" will be held again Sunday afternoon beginning at 1 p.m., according to Basinger. Shells will be sold, or persons are invited to bring their own shells and shotguns.

In a "turkey shoot", several entrants compete by shooting at clay targets and the winner gets a turkey. The project is scheduled to be conducted the next three weekends.

### Pioneer Gas Seeks Increase In Gate Rate

Pioneer Natural Gas Co. has announced its intention to file an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas for an adjustment in the city gate rate for gas delivered to its West Texas system.

A new gate rate will have no immediate effect on current gas rates, according to the announcement from Pioneer's offices in Amarillo, however, such an increase would establish a new cost of gas the city gate for any subsequent changes in domestic and commercial rates in cities on the system.

The last determination of Pioneer's gate rate was based on operating costs and investment values for the year 1961. Since that time the field cost of gas, labor, materials and supplies, as well as interest rates, have gone up frequently and substantially, Pioneer officials noted.

It is Pioneer's intention to ask the Railroad Commission to establish a city gate rate of 34¢, plus an allowance for federal surtax, compared to the present rate of 28¢. The Federal Income Tax 10% surtax charge would currently expire December 31. Pending legislation would cause its continuation and the outcome can be better judged during the pendency of the Railroad Commission proceeding. Continuation of the tax at a 5% rate would add approximately 1/2¢ and continuation of the tax at a 10% rate would add approximately 1¢.

Pioneer intends to file its application to the Railroad Commission by Oct. 10.

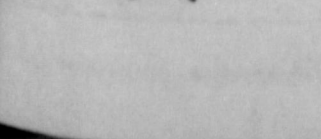

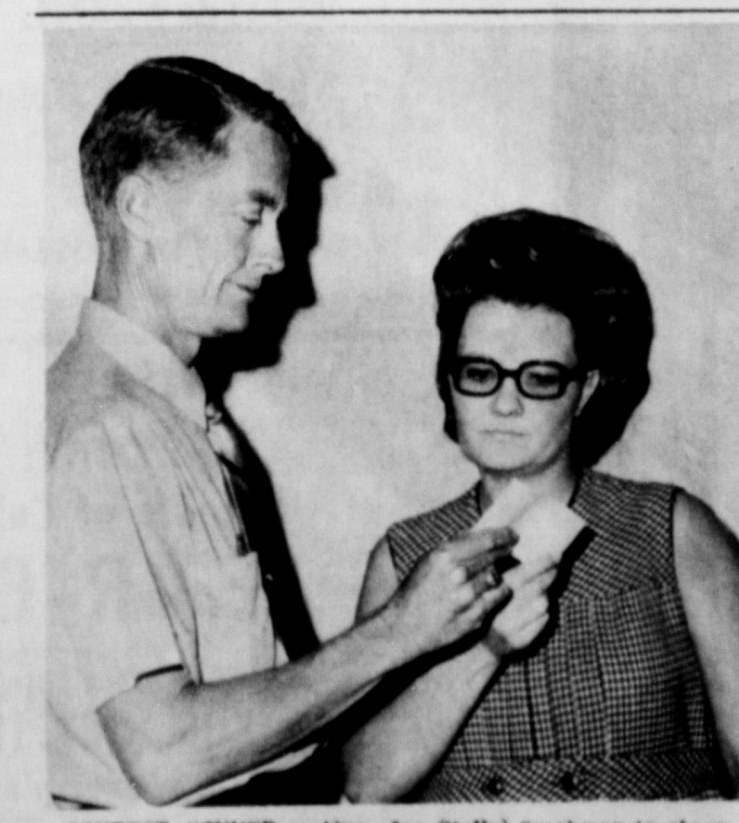

### Library Is Topic At Rotary Meeting

Slaton's Library was the topic for a Rotary Club program last week, with Bill Stewart, director of the Lubbock City - County Library, and Greely Sanders, president of the Slaton Friends

of the Library, as guest speakers.

Sanders outlined the successful move and expansion of the local library, giving credit to "the full cooperation of the city, organizations and interested citizens, and the City-County Library in Lubbock."

Sanders pointed out that there were 4,000 checkouts for the last year in the Clubhouse. At the new downtown location, the library had 7,000 checkouts from January through September last year, and the number was up to 13,000 for the same period this year.

Stewart outlined the services of the City - County Library, which has been designated as one of ten major resource areas in the state. The Lubbock unit assists libraries in a 26-county area.

If a person cannot find a book he desires here, it likely can be secured from Lubbock, Stewart pointed out. If the book is not in Lubbock, it will be sought elsewhere.

He also explained new services being offered or planned. One is an art library service. Persons can checkout art reproductions to display in their offices or homes, much in the same manner as checking out a book. A photograph library is also being planned.

Byron Crandall was in charge of the weekly program. J.S. Edwards presided at the regular Rotary luncheon meeting. Several guests and visiting Rotarians were introduced at the luncheon.

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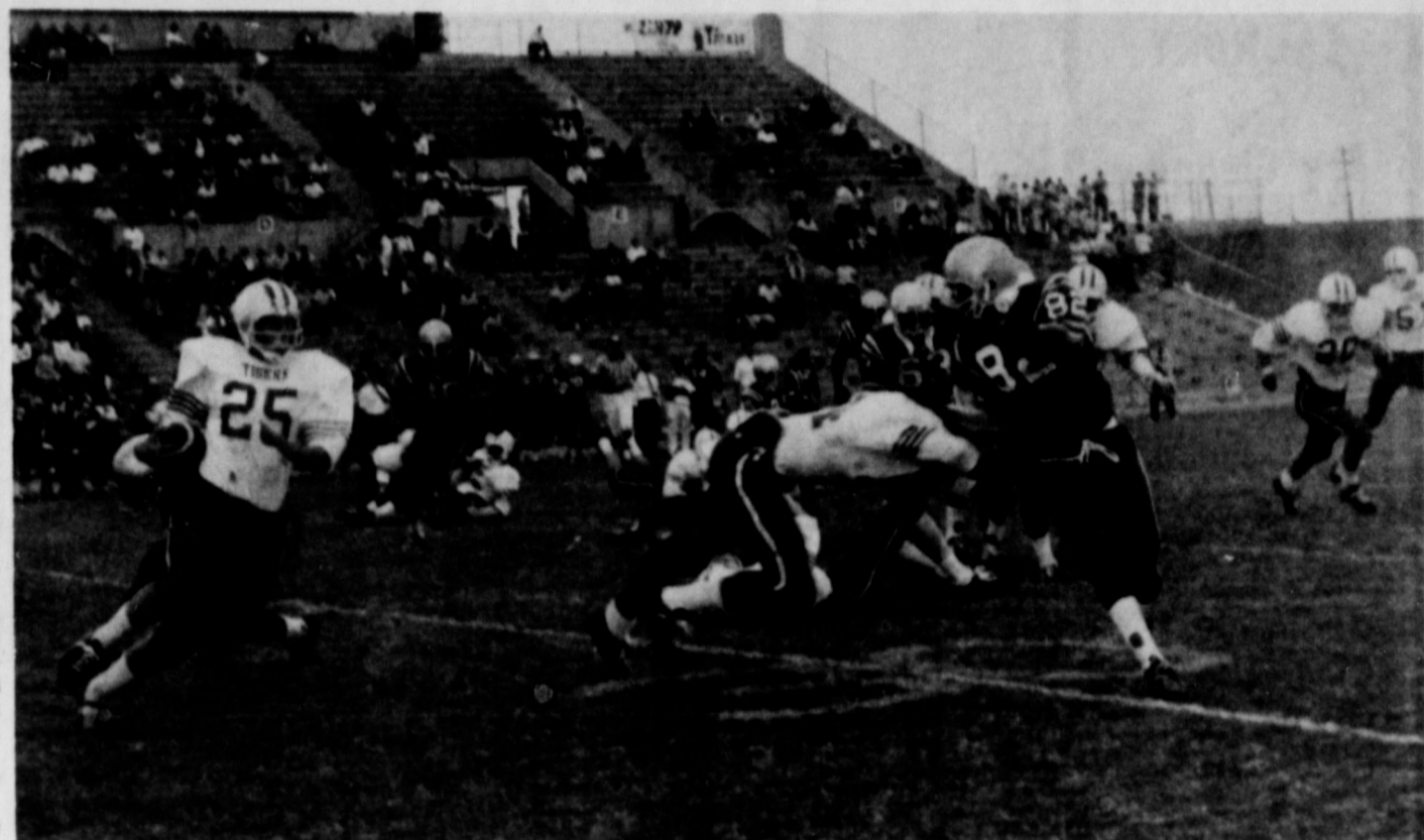
# Estacado Flaunts Strength In Rolling Over Tigers

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...sor.  
The Matadors - apparently wanting to gain votes in the rankings - scored two touchdowns per quarter in racking up the one-sided total against the Tigers. The Estacado second unit had the honor of scoring the last touchdown, driving 24 yards after Slaton fumbled.  
The hard-hitting Matadors were detected by officials seven times for holding, clipping or hitting late - but even a total of 11 penalties for 125 yards didn't deter the defending state champs from rolling up the score.  
Coach Ernie Davis, who naturally was not happy about the game, defended his Tigers for their efforts. Despite the score, he thought a number of Slaton gridgers played a good defensive game.  
"We wouldn't accept the fact before we played them, but they simply overpowered us," Davis said. He added that he was disappointed in the offensive game of the Tigers, pointing to some mistakes that shouldn't have been made this late in the season.  
"We're down after two de-

feats like the last ones, but we are not out," Davis said. The Tigers catch Lubbock Dunbar here Friday night in the last non-district game. "Then, it's a new ball game, and we're still looking forward to a good season," the Tiger coach added.  
Halfback Alan Fondy accounted for most of the rushing yardage registered by the Tigers - winning up with a net 57 yards on 18 trips. Nick Farrell had 17 yards on 7 carries. The Matadors kept Moore well in check, and he wound up with a minus 7 yards on 10 trips.  
Reserve fullback Don Smith carried twice for 8 yards, and Bruce Schuette 1 time for 3 yards. Mosser had a minus 32 yards after being trapped several times trying to pass.  
Mosser hit 2 of 9 passes for 86 yards, including the long 77-yarder to Moore. One interception went for a Matador score. Fondy threw one time and it was intercepted.  
Four of the Estacado touchdowns were on drives of less than 40 yards - two of them after Tiger fumbles and two

after short punts into the strong wind. Fondy got off two booming punts of 65 and 74 yards with the wind.  
Estacado won the toss at Lubbock's Lowrey Field Saturday afternoon and chose to take the strong wind behind their backs. The Tigers took the opening kickoff, with possession on the 20 when the kick sailed into the end zone.  
Moore lost 3 on the first play, then Fondy sliced off tackle for 12 big yards. Farrell hit for 2 yards and Slaton had a first down on its first possession. Three more plays, however, found the Tigers a yard short and first downs were few and far between after that.  
The Tigers stopped Estacado for 1 yard on two plays, then quarterback Ken Wallace eluded a would-be tackler behind the line and got 13 yards to start the Matadors rolling. Two plays later the Tigers stacked the play in the middle, but speedster Jessie Lothridge hunted another place to run and turned on the speed as he hit the sidelines and raced 49 yards for the first score.  
On the first play following the kickoff, Moore fumbled a pitch-out and Estacado claimed the ball on the 21. Miller broke around left end and shook off tacklers for a 21-yard touchdown run on the next play. In a matter of 12 seconds the score had changed from 0-0 to 14-0.  
The Tigers held the Matadors on the next series and forced a punt, but the kick put Slaton in a hole on their own 5-yard line. The Tigers needed six inches for a first down after three tries, and Fondy's punt went only 13 yards into the brisk wind.  
With only 27 yards to go, the Matadors went to work and drove the distance in 7 plays. Wallace passed to Marvin Turner for 7 yards on third down for the score. The tally came at the start of the second period, giving Estacado a 21-0 lead.  
Slaton was unable to move after the kickoff, and Fondy boomed a 65-yard punt with the wind at his back. The Tigers held again and forced the Matadors to punt, giving Slaton its best field position at the 50.  
The Tigers again had to kick, however, and Estacado started from its own 6. Several plays later, Wallace fumbled and Ted Dixon recovered for Slaton on the Matador 27.  
The Tigers were unable to take advantage of the break, however. Facing 4th and 19, Mosser fired a short pass over the middle and Estacado's big linebacker - William Hall - intercepted. He picked up a few blocks and raced all the way to a 64-yard touchdown play. That made it 28-0 with 1:52 left in the first half.  
An 18-yard run by Fondy and a 9-yard pass from Mosser to Duane Cox boosted Slaton hopes, but then a pass was intercepted by Estacado as the half ended.  
Slaton fumbled on the second play following the kickoff to start the third period. Estacado was unable to move, but on 4th and 8, Miller booted a 48-yard field goal for the Matadors. That upped the score to 31-0.  
The next time Estacado got the ball, the big, strong Miller broke several tackles and raced down the sidelines on a 49-yard scoring jaunt. His kick made it 38-0 with 7:36 left in the third period.  
A short punt into the wind gave Estacado the ball on the Tiger 32 on the next series of plays. Moseley broke on a 20-yard run to the end zone, but it was erased on a clip-

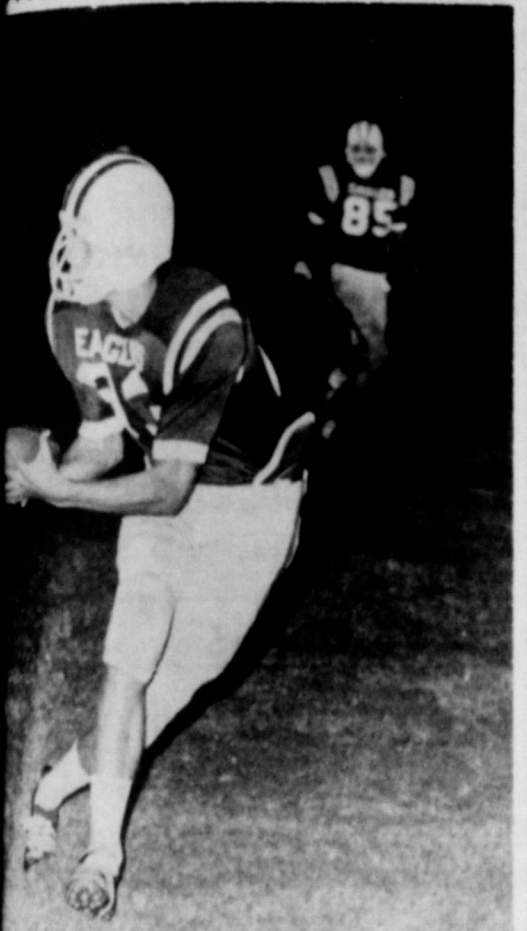
## Junior Varsity, Freshman Lose
