# **Cold Front Brings More Rain**

front pushed into the area Sunday, triggering rainfall ranging from small amounts up to almost 2 inches early Monday

The wet weather was an unwelcome visitor for area farmers, some of whom had already started harvesting cotton. Sun-ny weather and warm temperatures, however, made a return to the region Tuesday and Wed-

The high temperature Mon-day was only 62 degrees, following a low Sunday night of 48 . The low reading dipped to 44 Tuesday night but was expected to be higher Wednesday night.

Rain reports in Slaton ranged from .75 of an inch to about 1.5 inches. Some areas west and southwest of the city reported only small amounts of rainfall, Lanny Swanner, just southeast of town, reported almost 2 inches while little moisture was recorded further

Francis Grabber, 3.5 miles west of Slaton, reported about 1.8 inches of rainfall, with some farmers in that area recording from 2 to 2.25 inches of moisture from the early Monday morning rain.

Although the damp weather has caused some damage on the quality of the cotton, area farm observers are still predicting a big yield in the South Plains. There are more acres in cotton this year, and less of the acreage has been lost to damaging weather.

A few cotton producers had already started mechanical pickers in their fields last week. and with continued dry weather the harvest of the cotton is expected to increase sharply.

Boll worms, wet weather and scattered hall storms joined forces over the past 30 to 40 days to lop 127,000 bales off the estimated total cotton production for the 25 counties surrounding Lubbock in the territory of Plains Cotton Growers,


As of Oct. 1 estimated production comes to 1,862,000 bales, down from 1,989,000 bales estimated on Sept. 1.

Cotton production estimates are jointly compiled for the area by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers on the first of each month each year, Aug. 1 through Dec.

Donald Johnson, PCG executive vice president, commented "The drop in the estimated production potential is of course disappointing, but if we reach the current estimate our production will still be up from the area's total for 1968 by 200,000 bales, for an increase of just over 12 percent."

The 25 counties produced 1, 662,300 500-pound bales in 1968 according to the Texas Cropand Livestock Reporting Service.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. for the non - district game - the final contest for both teams prior to zone competition. Slaton is in Zone A and Dunbar in Zone B of the big 3-AAA

The Tigers open zone action here against Sweetwater next week, while Dunbar catches Estacado in its first zone clash, The two zone champions will meet at the season's end to determine the district winner.

Slaton escaped from the Estacado game last week without serious injuries, and Coach Ernie Davis expects all his gridders to be ready for action Friday night.
