Slaton Police Chief Walter Head this week announced officers were "increasing their efforts" in two areas which have caused concern to citizens recently. He said officers have been

instructed to "make a closer check" on possible liquor law violations -- especially at places of entertainment, and a tighter security patrol is being made in an attempt to prevent break-The police department made

23 arrests the past week, logged 14 traffic violations, and made 5 ambulance calls. Officers "visited" three es-

tablishments Saturday night and made six arrests on liquor law violations. A public dance hall downtown and a cafe and dance hall in southeast Slaton were the targets Saturday night. The manager of one dance

hall was charged with making alcoholic beverages available to minors, and a boy and girl were charged with minors in possession of alcoholic beverages. Two men were charged with consuming after hours, and another was booked for drunkeness.

#### License Tags On Sale Now

Vehicle registration is underway in Slaton and Lubbock, and the county tax assessorcollector's office reported the new computerized system is "going very smoothly."

Tags can be purchased at the courthouse or at the tax substation on the east side of the Slaton square.

All most motorists have to do this year is take in their registration renewal notices which were mailed to them. In the past, they have been required to take proof of ownership and the past year's registration receipts.

The new procedure makes it

easier for both vehicle owners and tax offices. Motorists were mailed three-part registration "strips" earlier, but the computer in Austin missed some vehicle owners, forcing them to get their license plates in the old manner.

They were charged in district court Tuesday with burglary and with conspiracy to commit burglary. Bonds were set at \$2,000 on each count. Moore also pleaded innocent in county court on a charge of carrying a prohibitive weapon.

Head said that both men gave signed statements to local officers. The burglary at Balls' was discovered last Thursday morning, and Bill Ball reported about \$3,800 worth of clothes was missing.

Police said statements by the suspects indicated they had broken the glass on the front door with a jack handle, then "drove around awhile" before coming back to enter the store. The burglars reportedly parked in the alley and made several trips into the store through the front door to remove the merchandise.

The attempted burglary at Anthony's apparently started the same way. However, an accident Sunday night indirectly led to the suspects' capture. After breaking the glass door, the suspects were "scared off" before making entry. A siren sounded when a fire truck went to the scene of an auto accident near the overpass on the Lubbock highway, and an Anthony employee happened to stop by the store about 1 a.m. and

discover the broken glass. Police immediately started checking all vehicles leaving the city, and sheriff's deputies stopped a car near the accident scene at the overpass. City officers Timms and Noble arrived on the scene and became suspicious of two coats in the car, items that matched the description of some articles missing from Ball's.

One suspect had a cut on his leg, and one had a pistol in his possession. They were booked on misdemeanor charges of driving without a license and carrying a prohibitive weapon, Later during questioning, the suspects signed the statements in connection with the burglaries.


#### Senior Citizens Hear Eastman







# DEAR EDITOR

Because the nation-wide film rating system is of importance to movie-goers in your community, I am anxious to describe what it is and what it is not, what it tries to do and what it does not do.

The movie rating system has one objective: To inform the public, especially parents, about the suitability of movie content for viewing by their children. That is its only aim and purpose.

The film rating system does not rate films for adults. A film is not rated for artistic quality, or lack of it. The system does not recommend films or ban films or censor films. It provides a public information service, which the great majority of responsible film producers and distributors believe is desired by parents.

A recently completed nationwide survey conducted by the Opinion Research Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey, has revealed some significant findings about how the public reponded to this new program in its first year of operation.

Fifty-eight per cent of the movie-going public considers the rating system "very useful" or "useful" in helping parents guide the movie-going of their children, Only 169 does not find it useful, ("no opinion" was the answer of the rest.)

The survey also pointed out the need for some revision. Because the "M" category (M:

discretion advised) was confusing to a substantial portion of the public, that category's description is being changed to "GP: All Ages Admitted. Par-ental Guidance Suggested." Moreover, in order to strengthen the system even further, the age limit in "R" and "X" films is raised to 17.

The following then are the revised rating symbols and admission policies:

MOVIE RATINGS FOR PAR-ENTS AND YOUNG PEOPLE G - All Ages Admitted, General Audiences.

GP - All Ages Admitted, Parental Guidance Suggested. (Note that the above two categories have an unrestricted ad-

mission policy.) R - Restricted, Under 17 Roquires Accompanying Parentor Adult Guardian. X - No One Under 17 Ad-

mitted. (This age limit may very in certain areas.) How do these rating categories translate into usuable

guidance for parents? G. Films rated G include those with a broad range of theme and appeal to both the young and their elders. These films, in the judgment of the rating board, contain no material which parents would find objectionable for viewing by

their youngsters.

GP. While much like a G film, a GP film is more sophisticated in treatment. Because tastes and standards vary by geographical area and even by neighborhood, some parents may want to give guidance to their children, but both G and

GP films are open to all ages. R. These are films of adult themes or adult treatment, but may see if they are accompanied by a parent or adult guardian, such as their teacher on an organized movie outing.

X. No one under 17 will be admitted. It should be noted that many X films have not been submitted to the Code and Rating Administration. These non-submitted films self-apply the X rating. No X film may carry the Seal of Approval of the Code and Rating Administration.

This, in brief, is the movie rating system. Reponsible leaders in the motion picture industry are providing these ratings as a public service to parents and families. We try to make the ratings as accurate as humans can, though we know there will always be disagreements with our judgment. Meanwhile, we are continuing to urge responsible filmmakers to command all their skills to produce movies of good taste and creative excellence.



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

## Texans Face Inc. In Insurance Ra

insurance rate increase unless traffic accidents in the state are reduced by 140,000 in 1970, according to an insurance industry spokeman in Austin.

Expressing overall support for Gov. Preston Smith's traffic safety program, the spokesman, said additional measures were needed to strengthen the Gov-ernor's plan and reduce the carnage on Texas highways. F. Darby Hammons said the present program was not extensive enough to achieve this purpose.

"We must face our total responsibility regarding the terrible human losses suffered on our roadways," Hammond said. "The direction of our auto insurance rates will be an accurate indicator of our success or failure." In a letter to Gov. Smith,

Hammond proposed stricter en-forcement of Texas traffic laws both by law officers in arresting violators and by judges in taking a "harder line" toward traffic law violators. Hammond noted that traffic

accidents would have to be reduced by 140,000 in Texas to even begin thinking about holding the line on auto insurance rate increases. "It is quite unlikely the Governor's traffic safety program , as it now stands, would accomplish such a reduction," he said. Gov. Smith was also urged

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
