... FEATURING MRS. MARTY MERCER



A native of North Carolina, Mrs. Mart Mae (Marty) Mercer came to Texas when she was eight years old with her mother, sisters and brothers.

She was born in 1893 at Hazelville, N.C., near Murphy, N.C. She was one of 10 children in the family. Her father, the late James Evans, worked in a mine and also built all their furniture and coffins for sale. She said he was a deacon in the Baptist Church, a Mason and a very kind man. He died when she was five years old.

In 1902 the family moved to East Texas on a farm near Cooper. She said her mother was a little more strict than some since they didn't have a father alive, but that they still had a lot of good times. She especially remembers the ice suppers, box suppers and camp meetings.

Mrs. Mercer met Paul Charles Mercer at church in An- och, Tex. and after a court- ship of eight months and two weeks, they married on a country road in a buggy in September of 1911. She said 54 people attended the wedding. After the wedding they went to town to church services and some of their friends had a wedding supper for them at their home.

The couple had five children, four daughters and a son. After their marriage, they farmed a year and then moved to Slaton where Mr. Mercer went to work as a pumper for Santa Fe Rail- road.

ITEM: The Federal Consumer Credit Protection Act which went into effect July 1 requires disclosure of finance charges and the annual percentage rate applied to credit transactions. In the purchase of a dwelling, annual percentage rate, any taxes, license fees, registration, title or other legal fees must be itemized. Some real estate closing fees must be shown in writing.

Mr. Mercer died in 1937 leaving her with a three-year-old daughter, daughters who were 10, 12 and 18 and a son who was 24. Mrs. Mercer said she went to work in the fields, cleaned yards and washed and ironed to earn money to raise her children. She said her children helped her a lot.

Her children are Rosco Mercer of Slaton, Celon Barnard of Austin, Bonnie Strost of Fort Worth, Patsy Gairdoid of Fort Worth and one daughter, Alice Hamock of Slaton, died nine years ago. She has 19 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Mercer apparently enjoys life and loves to tease people. She has been in the Slaton Nursing Home about two years and has many friends there.

Service Offered For Homemakers

Texas Residents Get More Benefits

Residents of Texas will receive an additional \$167,000,000 in 1970 as a result of the 15% increase in Social Security benefits, according to Wayman E. Register, Dallas Regional Commissioner of Social Security.

The law recently passed by Congress and signed by the President becomes effective as of Jan. 1, 1970.

Social Security beneficiaries need not apply for the 15% increase, as each of the 1,208,000 men, women and children in Texas now on the benefit rolls will receive the increase

automatically, Register said. The first regular check in the new amount will arrive the first week in April on the usual day for the delivery of benefit checks.

A separate check for the amount of the increase for the months of January and February should reach the beneficiary during the last week in April.

Register estimated that the total Social Security payments to retired or disabled workers and their dependents and for survivors in Texas for 1970 will amount to \$1,283,000,000. Refiguring the benefit amounts for the 25,000,000 now on the rolls in the United States is a tremendous task and it must be done without disrupting the regular monthly payments.

As of the end of December, these monthly payments totaled 2.2 billion and the monthly total will go up by 345 million as the 15% increase becomes effective.

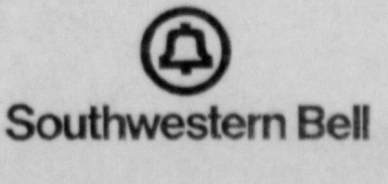
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Immunization Clinic Today

Texans Face Increase In Insurance Rates

Texas may face another auto insurance rate increase unless traffic accidents in the state are reduced by 140,000 in 1970, according to an insurance industry spokesman in Austin.

Expressing overall support for Gov. Preston Smith's traffic safety program, the spokesman said additional measures were needed to strengthen the Governor's plan and reduce the carnage on Texas highways. F. Darby Hammons said the present program was not extensive enough to achieve this purpose.

"We must face our total responsibility regarding the terrible human losses suffered on our roadways," Hammond said. "The direction of our auto insurance rates will be an accurate indicator of our success or failure."

In a letter to Gov. Smith, Hammond proposed stricter enforcement of Texas traffic laws both by law officers in arresting violators and by judges in taking a "harder line" toward traffic law violators.

Hammond noted that traffic accidents would have to be reduced by 140,000 in Texas to even begin thinking about holding the line on auto insurance rate increases. "It is quite unlikely the Governor's traffic safety program, as it now stands, would accomplish such a reduction," he said.

Gov. Smith was also urged in the letter to begin public information and education programs. One such program would promote improved knowledge of traffic laws.

2. A driver training program aimed at providing drivers with knowledge of traffic laws.
3. A program of intensive enforcement of traffic laws by judges in traffic courts.
4. An evaluation of traffic courts.
5. A call for General to insist on stop granting suspensions to deny violators the opportunity to return to those with traffic violations.
6. Impounding of those arrested for intoxicated.
7. Encouraging coverage in the existing driving habits.

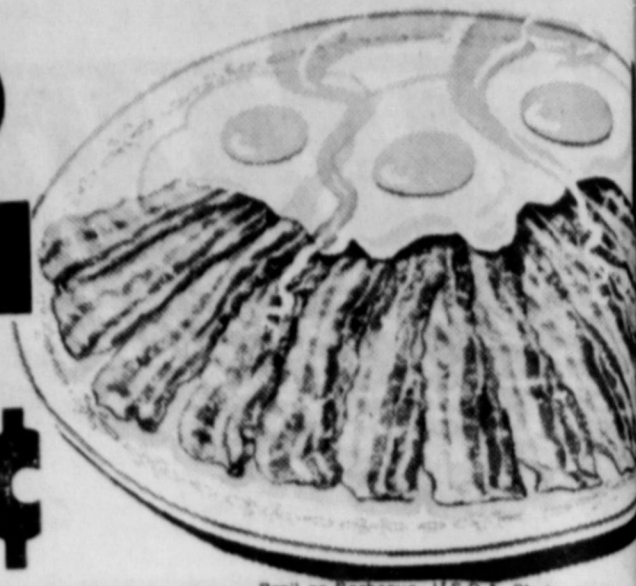
