

# Freedom is Beauty' Theme For Lion Queen Contest

have been Cynthia Hamer and Vicki Nowlin. The club's first queen, Miss Nowlin, also ascended to the district throne after winning runner-up honors.

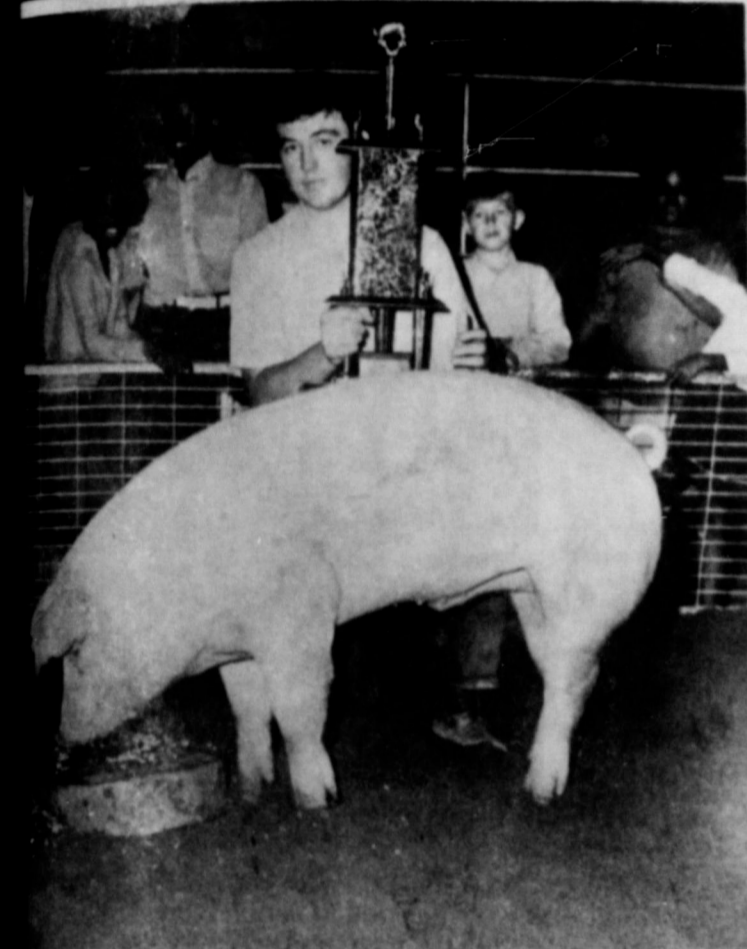

## Five for School Board, One for City Post

# Six More Candidates Announce

Six persons announced for city and school posts this past week to assure voters of a full slate of candidates as well as offer a selection in all but one race.

The Rev. F. D. Courright, 62-year-old minister, has announced as a candidate for the Ward 4, Slaton City Commission post.

Five more candidates have filed as candidates for trustees of Slaton Independent School District. Alex Bednarz and Joe Gamble, two farmers, filed early the past week.

Wednesday it was announced that three more candidates had

filed for the school board. They were Mrs. Sharon Head, an employee in the city secretary's office; the Rev. Emilio Abeyta, pastor of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church, and P. C. Kitchens, a farmer in the Posey area.

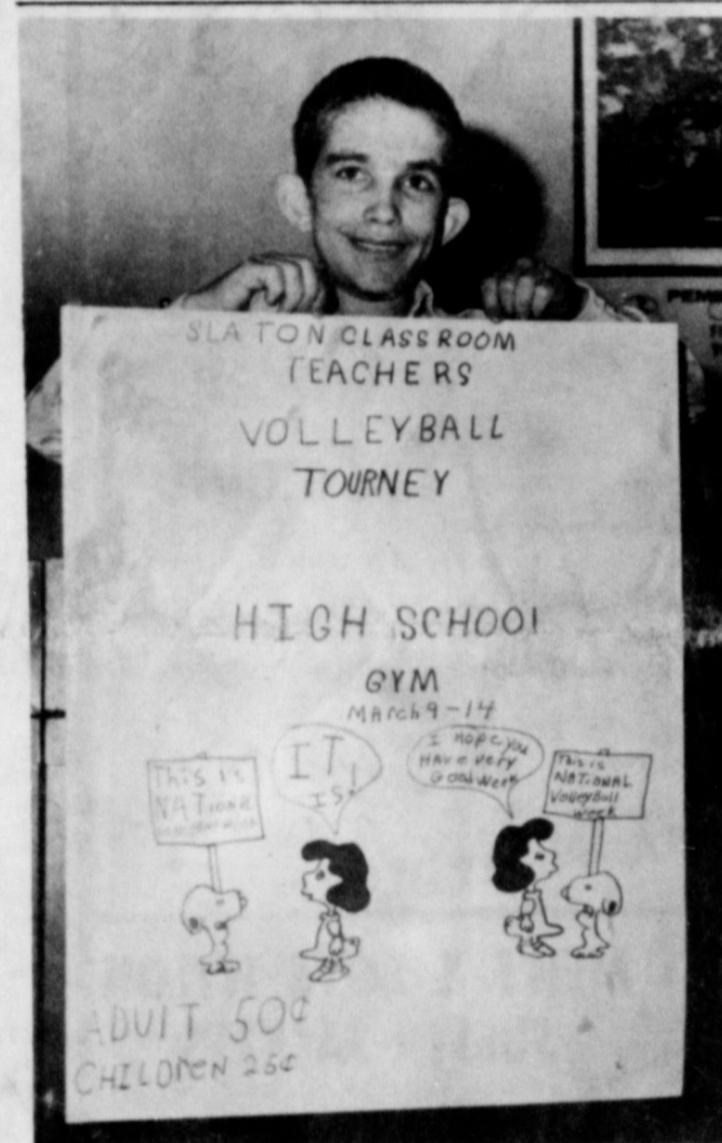
Jake Wendel, local tv dealer, had previously announced as a trustee candidate, giving voters a choice of six persons for the three posts.

Filing deadline is today at 5 p.m. for the school board, and the city commission deadline is 5 p.m. Friday. Elections are set April 4 for the school district and April 7 for the city commission.

Two ward elections are set in the city. Incumbent Otis Neill is seeking re-election in Ward 2, after the Rev. Johnnie Moore became the first candidate for that office.

Rev. Courright, the Ward 4 candidate, is the only person to file for that post to date. Rudy Dominguez is the current commissioner. This ward covers southeast Slaton. Courright has been a resident of Slaton about four years and is currently pastoring the Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Floydada.

On the school board, the three-year terms of Ted Swanner, Dr. M. J. McSween and Jack Clark expire in April. Swanner is current board president.

## Melton to Lead Little League

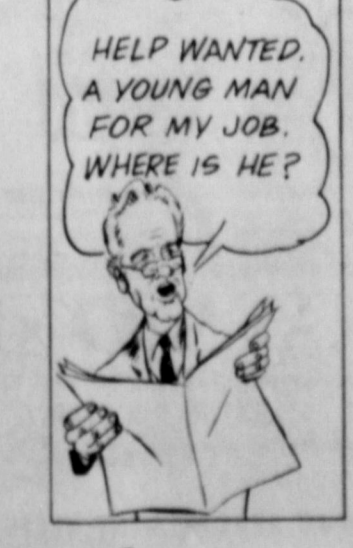
Paul Melton was elected president of Slaton Little League for 1970 during a business meeting and election of officers last week in the Reddy Room.

Strong Mental, Physical, Spiritual Growth Urged

Challenging the youth to keep their nation strong and free by being physically tough, mentally alert and leading a deeper spiritual life, Dr. Walter Kerr

enlightened Slaton High School students here Friday in a special assembly. The "inspirational troubadour" emphasized the need for American youth to strengthen themselves and realize they are the hope of the Western World in combating the Communist menace.

Dr. Kerr is the director and founder of the National Youth Foundation and recognized as one of the top youth leaders in the country. He was featured speaker at a banquet in Lubbock Friday night, and made the short visit to Slaton High at the urging of school trustee Betty Burks.

Kerr uses a "soft-sell presentation" to gently prod teenagers into a more active, responsible life. One approach he takes to discourage going steady is a song, "Single Saddle." He points out, "There's no back seat on a single-saddle horse." He followed that song with "I Walk the Line."

The speaker also slipped in this challenge: "If you're satisfied with a lower grade instead of working for a higher one, you're almost a traitor to your country."

He subtly slipped in other messages, such as encouraging the teenagers to go to church and to "give it all you got" in school activities.

Kerr assailed Communism while describing his ex-

periences in Russia, but added that "we've got to be more dedicated to the American way of life than they are to Communism." He told of interviewing a Russian at the Olympics. He was supposed to be the strongest man in the world.

Asked how he got so strong, the man replied: "I thought for it, I worked for it, and if there was a God I would have prayed for it."

"Because there is a God," stressed Dr. Kerr, "we can pray for freedom and this is why we will win."

Dr. Kerr came to Lubbock and Slaton from Tyler, He was sponsored here by the Lubbock chapter of the National Association of Women in Construction.

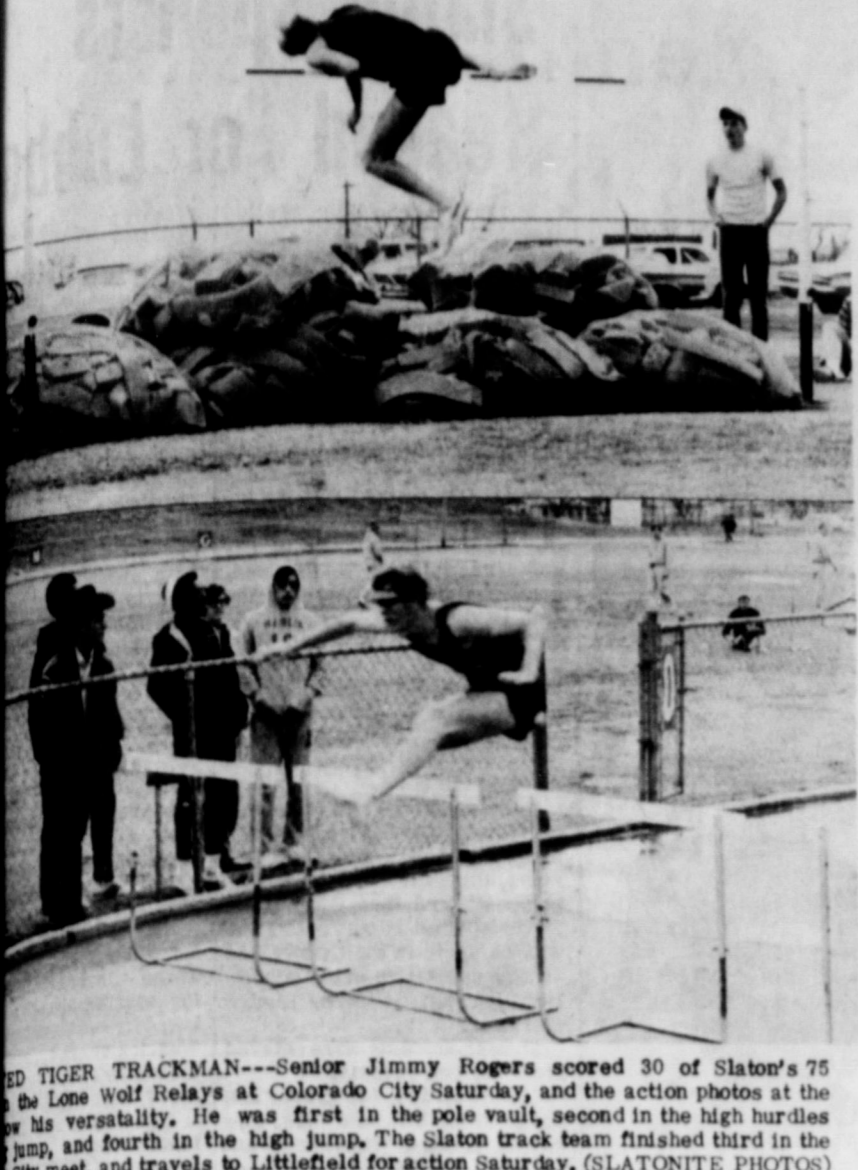

### Girls' Track Coaches Meet

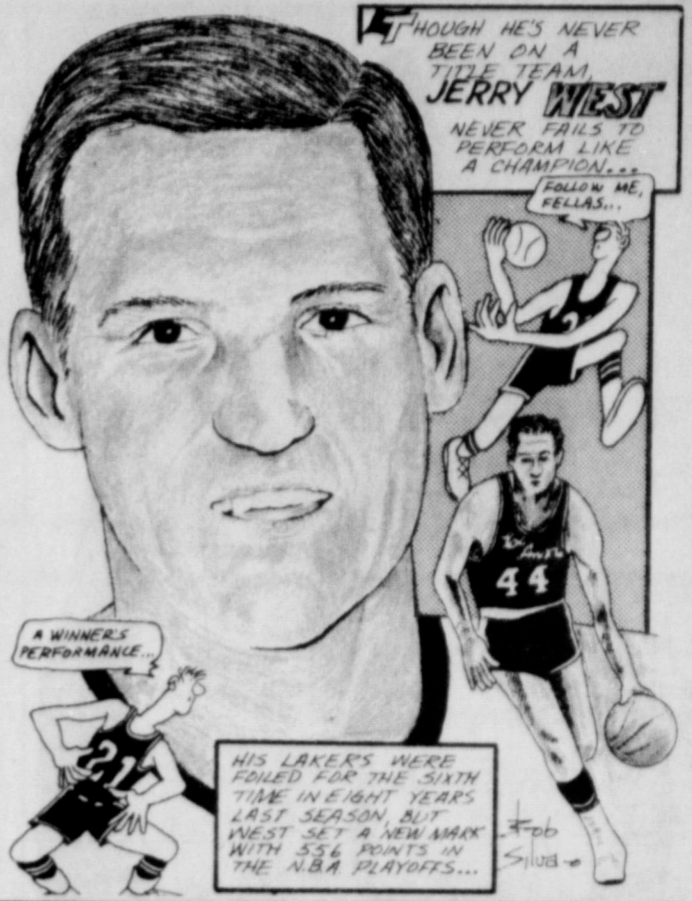

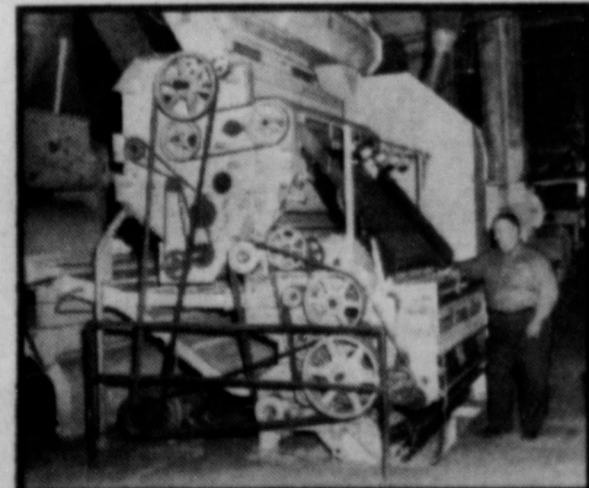

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. last week took a firm stand on each of 10 points referred to by PCG officials as "the real gut issues" in a government cotton program for 1971 and future years.

The PCG Board of Directors, with two elected members from each of 25 High Plains counties, adopted the organization's

legislative policy at a 4½ hour session in Lubbock February 16.

PCG President Donnell Echols of Lamesa said of the policy "Essentially we are sticking pretty close to the kind of cotton program contained in present law, but I think we are suggesting some changes which

will definitely serve the interests of High Plains cotton producers, both for the immediate and the long range future."

The cotton producer group's policy covers marketing quotas, acreage diversion, yields, payments limitation, allotment transfers, federal appropriations and research and promotion.

The PCG position on each, together with some of the Board's reasoning, follows.

1. "The marketing quota concept should be retained."  
While Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin has recommended doing away with marketing quotas and the attendant penalties for overplanting, PCG believes quotas are

necessary to protect the land, research and promotion, equipment and other investments made over the years by present allotment holders.

It was noted that the value of present allotments has been capitalized into the value of land, and the removal of production controls could cause a serious drop in land prices where cotton production is a major enterprise.

2. "There should be a single allotment system, with payments made on total allotments that are sufficient to produce adequate supplies for domestic and export markets plus a carryover of not less than 7 million bales; provided that

needed production for export markets should not be deemed less than 6 million bales per year."

The current program offers production incentive payments only on a "domestic" allotment, leaving producers with a choice as to whether they produce above that acreage, at world market prices well below production costs. PCG feels it is necessary to have a single allotment system to assure adequate production for all markets and to assure that producers will be properly compensated for all production.

3. "The loan rate should be placed at 90 per cent of the world market price for the preceding two years."

Present law sets the loan level "not in excess of" at 90 per cent of the "estimated" world market price, with the estimating done by the Secretary of Agriculture. Discussion by the PCG Board brought out that under present conditions the low loan level is necessary to make cotton competitive with man-made fibers and with foreign growths. But made it clear that the loan plus price support payments should be tied to a minimum percentage of parity to protect producer income.

4. "Price support payments should be made on production from a single allotment at a rate which, when added to the price support loan, will equal

no less than 65 per cent of parity."

This position is similar to provisions in the current program, but is directly opposed to the Administration's proposal that the parity concept be abandoned. In view of increasing prices for agricultural inputs and other factors, the producer group feels their income must be tied to some tangible minimum rather than left to the discretion of the present or some future Secretary of Agriculture.

5. "When producers are required to divert income-producing land from production, they should be adequately compensated for the cost of

maintaining such land and interest on the pay and for loss of reason of such diversion.

Current law stipulates that the PCG Board must have the necessary for this income, they prefer that it be made as a part of made on cotton production directly on acreage.

6. "For the years 1971 and 1972 producers given a choice of base support payments or projected yield established farm in 1969 or an farm yield for the preceding year in yield is established and subsequent producers should be given of basing payments actual yield for the preceding year in yield is established average actual production the farm in any three crop years preceding the year in which the year established."

The PCG position price support payments "projected yield," which is not always available. Its popularity, according to discussion, stems from it has provided a crop insurance.

7. "There should be of limitation on payments can be made to individual producers under government programs."

There are no payment included in the program, and the long PCG contention is that the payment limit would be a capitalistic society would destroy the management effective farm programs.

8. "There should be restriction on sales of cotton allotments state."

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## Wives, Widows Take Advantage Of Assistance

The Veterans Administration reported that some widows and widowers are taking educational assistance.

Administrator of Affairs Donald E. Johnson said that certain widows and widowers became eligible for benefits under the law when it became effective Dec. 1, 1968.

The law makes educational assistance available to widows of veterans who die of service-connected causes.

Also eligible are widows of non-service-connected veterans who are totally and permanently disabled. In addition, the law covers children of such widows and servicemen.

Johnson also reported that one trainee in six was a woman, then 10 years of age when she was in training.

The VA chief added that more than half of the widows of trainees, about 54 percent, resumed their education in 1968, while about one in 10, or 8 percent, studied in schools.

Almost half of the trainees, 48 percent, rolled on a part-time basis, while just over 85 percent of those studying below high school level did so on a part-time basis, Johnson said.

He urged persons interested in applying for such benefits to contact their nearest VA office.
